





New counties, Donegal and Monaghan, hold the limelight in today's Senior Football Final and it is interesting that this is the first occasion for twenty-seven years that two counties south of the border have contested the Final.

A special word of welcome is due to Monaghan and its loyal band of supporters for reaching the Final against all the odds. Donegal too deserves a special word of praise because the difficulties which have to be surmounted in Donegal to keep the G.A.A. alive and glowing are sometimes not appreciated.

Let's hope that today's Final will set a headline for skill and sportsmanship and honest endeavour. Down and Tyrone are worthy minor finalists. Each has had the honour of winning an All-Ireland in this grade. It could well be that we will be witnessing an All-Ireland finalist and a possible All-Ireland champion today.

It is with pleasure I record the ever-growing development of the G.A.A. in the province. New grounds have been officially opened this year in Crosskeys. Co. Cavan; in Ballinderry, Kilrea and Lavey. Co. Derry; St. Paul's, Belfast and Threemilehouse in Co. Monaghan; while others such as Aughnamullen, Oram and Killanny, all in Co. Monaghan, are patiently waiting the official blessing. Many others not officially opened are in regular use and thus at grassroots level the G.A.A. moves forward inexorably.

I would like too to pay a special tribute to the many thousands from every parish in Ulster who demonstrated their support for Crossmaglen Rangers (in their long battle with the British Army to hold on to St. Oliver Plunkett G.A.A. park) in the monster and dignified protest march in Crossmaglen last Sunday. The heart of Ulster is indeed sound and the Ulster Council and Crossmaglen Rangers are deeply grateful.

Despite many pessimistic prognostications about the standard of football in Ulster, Sean O'Neill and his merry men captured the fourteenth Railway Cup title for Ulster this year. It's surprising what a bit of inspiration plus a large amount of sweat can do! We all indeed salute them.





DONEGAL TO MAINTAIN UNBEATEN RECORD IN CLONES

THE DONEGAL team return to-day to Clones where for the first time in 1972 and again in 1974 the County won its only two Ulster Senior Football Championship titles to date as well as its only Minor Football Championship in 1956. On the face of it then Clones can be considered a lucky venue for Donegal and despite the fact that Monaghan provide the opposition to-day and are playing on home soil the Donegal team is quietly confident that it can maintain its unbeaten record in Clones in Ulster Finals.

This is only Donegal's fifth appearance in an Ulster Final and all have been since 1963, so it can be said that the sixties and seventies have been reasonably successful for the County while it is evident from Monaghan's record of eleven Ulster Championships

that the good times for them were in the early part of this Century.


The Donegal team to-day has still many links with the 1974 winning team and indeed has still one member of the 1972 team—Seamus Bonner. In terms of experience of the big occasion, Donegal has a distinct advantage over Monaghan. However, on this the first meeting of Donegal and Monaghan in an Ulster Final there is no complacency in the Donegal camp but rather a healthy respect and admiration for the manner in which they played to reach to-day's final. We in Donegal have admired the great run of Monaghan Champions Scotstown in reaching the All-Ireland Club Championship Final and no doubt this has been a factor which has contributed to the resurgence of the County team and the McKenna Cup victory has no doubt added to the confidence of the team. Donegal's return to form can be attributed to greater determination and commitment than in the past four years and credit for this new spirit must go to team Manager, Sean O'Donnell who has over the past year and a half patiently put together a team after a great number of players had been given an opportunity to show their paces and now he has a blend of youth and experience which are the hallmarks of all successful teams.

Many people have remarked also on the great improvement shown by Donegal on their mediocre displays in the National Football League and I personally feel that one of the reasons is that the present National League structure is not conducive to improving the standard of our games and hopefully the present efforts by the Central Activities Committee to re-structure the competition will result in better games from the point of view of players, administrators and the spectators who deserve better than they have

been getting in the past few years for the money they put into the game.

The Donegal Team, their Management and supporters everywhere are looking forward to a good clean sporting game with Monaghan and while we all would wish to see Donegal successful, I am sure that I speak for the G.A.A. followers of Ulster generally when I express the wish that the standard of football displayed in to-day's game is very important, since on all sides there has been sustained criticism of the standard of football in Ulster and I hope that the two teams to-day will give a clear indication that the game in Ulster is alive and well and that the Ulster Champions of 1979 will be a match for the best on August 12th and 16th September.

Noel McCole (Civil Service): Age 24. Height 5-11. Weight 12 st. Occupation—Bank Official. Played Co. Minor, U-21 and Senior. Senior debut in 1974. Holds 1 Ulster Championship and 1 Dr. McKenna Cup medal.

Michael Houston (Glenfin): Age 24. Height 6-0. Weight 12-8. First played senior county in 1976 after coming up through Minor and U-21 ranks. Holds 1 All-Ireland Club medal. His greatest thrill was beating Austin Stacks in the semi-final of the Munster Club Championship.

Martin Griffin (Sean Mac Cumhaills): Age 24. Height 6-3. Weight 14 st. First appeared in the county senior jersey after minor and U-21 county experience. Also plays hurling and holds many club medals, won with his club, Sean Mac Cumhaills.

Sandy Harper (Robert Emmetts): Age 22. Height 5-9. Weight 11 st. Occupation—Machine Operator. Has also come up through minor and U-21 ranks, and his greatest memory was winning this year's S.F.C. semi-final against Derry.

Sean Gavigan (Naomh Columba): Age 21. Height 5-9. Weight 11½ st. This Factory Employee first wore the Donegal senior jersey in the N.F.L. against Sligo this year. Was also a county U-21 player. His greatest memory was winning the All-Ireland Gaeltacht Championship last year.

Finian Ward (Naomh Columba): Age 25. Height 5-10. Weight 12-10. This Teacher captains the side and was on the successful Ulster Railway Cup team earlier this year. He first played senior county against Cavan in 1973 and has played in every defensive position. One of the most be-medalled players on the side, he is certainly one of the greatest exponents of the game ever to come out of Donegal.

Martin Sweeney (Ardara): Age 26. Height 5-11. Weight 12 st. A former minor and U-21 player, he first wore the senior jersey in '75. One of the most consistent players on the side, his favourite position is wing half-back.

Brendan Dunleavy (Sean Mac Cumhaills): Age 22. Height 5-11. Weight 12-10. Another teacher, he first played senior county in 1974 against Louth in the League. His honours include 4 Sigerson Cup medals, and his biggest disappointment was being eliminated in the first round of the S.F.C. every year since 1974.

Michael Lafferty (Sean Mac Cumhaills): Age 24. Height 5-11. Weight 12-4. Teacher. His medals include an Ulster Senior Championship in 1974 and a Dr. McKenna Cup medal. A versatile player, his greatest memory was winning the Ulster Senior Championship in 1974.

Kieran Keeney (Ardara): Age 26. Height 5-11. Weight 12 st. This Post Office Technician has played all grades of football for his county and first donned the senior jersey in 1971. His greatest thrill was scoring the winning goal in the 1974 Ulster Final.

Seamus Bonner (Civil Service): Age 29. Height 6-0. Weight 13-3. This Garda has been playing senior county football for Donegal since 1970. Holds 2 Ulster S.F.C. medals, a McKenna Cup medal and a Carroll's All-Star award. His greatest memory was winning his first Ulster senior medal in 1972.

- Jim Brennan (Rosses Rovers): Age 30. Height 5-11½. Weight 12-9. First appeared on the county senior team in 1975. A Garda, his favourite position is centrefield or centrehalf-forward. Has played much of his football in Connacht where he starred with Balla.
- Seamus Reilly (Bundoran): Age 25. Height 5-10. Weight 13 st. Another Garda, his first senior county appearance was with Mayo in 1973. Also played minor and U-21 football with that Connacht county and holds two All-Ireland Minor Championship medals.
- Paul McGeehan (St. Eunan's): Age 22. Height 6-3. Weight 13-0. A student, his first senior county appearance was against Leitrim in the recent N.F.L. Holds many "under-age" medals and is interested in a wide range of sports. His greatest memory was winning the Inter-Seminary Final this year.
- Seamus Flynn (Ballyshannon): Age 19. Height 5-11. Weight 11 st. A corner forward, he first came on the senior county scene in October of last year. His biggest disappointment was losing the Colleges Under-19 Final in 1978.
- Michael Gallagher (St. Columba's): Age 21. Height 6-2. Weight 12½ st. A Clerical Student, 1977 saw his first appearance in the Donegal senior jersey. His happiest memory was winning the County Senior Championship with St. Columba's.
- Michael Carr (Kilcar): Age 25. Height 6-0. Weight 13 st. His favourite position is half-back and he first played senior county in September, 1973. Has also played county minor and U-21. His greatest memory was winning an Ulster S.F.C. medal in 1974.
- Anthony Harkin (Ardara): Age 23. Height 6-1. Weight 12-8. First appeared on the county senior side against Fermanagh in the Dr. McKenna Cup in 1978. A P.E. Teacher, his medals include an All-Ireland Club Championship medal with Thomond College, Limerick, in 1977—the 4 games with Austin Stacks of Tralee provide his greatest memories.
- Finian McDonnell (Civil Service): Age 28. Height 6-1. Weight 12½. This Maintenance Supervisor came through minor ranks to graduate onto the senior county team in 1976. His biggest disappointment was losing the Final of the Dublin Senior Championship to Na Fianna this year.

- Hugh McClafferty (Downings): Age 29. Height 5-11. Weight 12-4. March, 1969, saw this Teacher first appear in the senior county jersey. Holds 2 Ulster S.F.C. medals and 2 Dr. McKenna Cup medals. Veteran or the side his greatest memory was that first Ulster Championship in 1972.
- Christy Murphy (Bundoran): Age 23. Height 5-10½. Weight 12½. First came onto the senior scene in October, 1974, and has come up through the minor and U-21 grades. Holds a Connacht Gael-Linn medal and his greatest memory was the Connacht Final of 1975.
- Seamus Carr (Glencolumcille): Age 24. Height 5-11. Weight 11½. His first senior jersey was against Antrim in the League this year so this is his first season on the county panel. Won an All-Ireland Gaeltacht Championship also this year.
- Tommy McFadden (Kilcar): Age 22. Height 5-10½. Weight 12 st. His favourite position is in the half-forward line. Made his first senior appearance this year against Sligo and has also worn the minor and U-21 county jersey.
- Mícheál Ó Donnabháin (Glencolumcille): Age 20. Height 5-11. Weight 12½. Reserve goalkeeper, he first appeared on the senior side last year. His greatest memory was winning the All-Ireland Gaeltacht Championship and the Co. Senior Championship in 1978.
- Eugene Sharkey (Rosses Rovers): Age 22. Height 5-11. Weight 11-4. Occupation—Teacher. January, 1976, he made his senior county debut and his greatest memory was scoring the goal against Derry in this year's Ulster senior semi-final at Omagh.

MONAGHAN EYES

IT IS surely incredible that the vast majority of the present Monaghan playing panel had not even seen the light of day when Monaghan last played in an Ulster Senior Football Final and haven't the slightest idea of how it feels to have your county in the Ulster Final, much less actually playing in one. The long twenty-seven years wait, since 1952, to figure in the Final is the longest for any Ulster county, with the exception of neighbours Fermanagh.

Forgive me if I can see this Final only through Monaghan colours. After all, what with blue eyes and white hair, what other colours can I possibly see it through??? But 27 years has been a tortuous wait, and ever since that fateful 1952 Final when Cavan beat us by 1-8 to 0-8 at Breffni Park, during one of the National Daily Newspapers strikes, it has been a niggling thought in my mind at every Ulster Final since then—"Just when will

Monaghan ever again reach this stage?"


The minors gave us some hope in 1961 and again last year, 1978; but the seniors have inevitably fallen at some stage or other along the line before the magical Ulster Final Day. Now, at long last, we've finally got there, and, if Monaghan win today, you are in for the greatest display of blue-and-white you have ever witnessed, for the very simple reason that, since the advent of the 'seventies, figures have proven that Monaghan has the most enthusiastic following of all the Ulster counties. This was proven at Breffni Park only a few short weeks ago; at Castleblayney a couple of weeks before that again, and at Dungannon, Portlaoise and even Croke Park on various occasions during the past five years. If you don't believe me—then just watch it if Monaghan win today.

And what if Monaghan should win today??? To be quite honest, I haven't the foggiest notion what it will be like. I just hadn't much interest in Gaelic Football when Monaghan last won an Ulster title forty-one years ago, being only a youngster running around Emyvale in short pants and worrying about my third class sums for Monday morning. So, a Monaghan win today would certainly be a new experience for all of us, since there weren't many of us kicking around when Monaghan last took the Ulster title in 1938 and went on to meet Galway in an All-Ireland semi-final at Mullingar—a game that featured the first ever broadcast by the one and only Michael O'Hehir.

However, we are not so presumptious as to think that the Ulster title is just going to be handed to us to-day out of sympathy or just to give the poor lads from Monaghan a bit of a gee-up, to bring them into line with Antrim, Armagh, Derry, Donegal, Down, Cavan and Tyrone, all of whom have figured in All-Ireland semi-finals since Monaghan last got to one. In no way are the footballers of Donegal going to show the slightest bit of mercy towards us since they, too, have their eyes set on much higher things, but they, too, are going to find that Monaghan will be no pushover and that those chaps out there in the white-and-blue have but one intention in their minds—and no three guesses as to what that particular intention might be.

Yes indeed, these lads of ours are hungry for a success that has far too long eluded us, and the huge Monaghan following are behind them to a man, woman and child, for there are not going to be many full houses anywhere throughout Co. Monaghan this afternoon.




