

In the current social and economic circumstances facing our youth, there is an even greater need than heretofore to continue to provide such a service.

I thank all those who contributed to this great work in the past and I know that in the future they and others will continue the work with even greater fervour and keep Cumann Lúthchleas Gael in the forefront of service to the young people of our country.






He has also refereed various finals at college and school level and was honoured in being chosen to referee the Centenary Hurling and Football Finals in Antrim in 1984.

At the start of this season very few would have taken a bet on Derry contesting an Ulster Final in 1985, a poor League programme that included defeat by Leitrim and a draw with Clare, both at home, followed by McKenna Cup defeat by Cavan and Ford Cup slump against Limerick did not auger well for an onslaught on the Championship.

But the Championship season seems to change attitudes and after a rethink of the panel and the inclusion of several from the Under 21 side, the team to play Tyrone got a new lease of life and total dedication to the task of first round victory saw the team

get down to the task of beating local neighbours.

The present side is based mainly on the successful under-age teams that had been part of Derry football since the mid-seventies. Ulster Minor champions in '80, '81, '83 and '84 and Under 21 winners in '83 have given this team a wealth of experience. In addition, many of the side have come up through the two colleges of football in the county, St. Pius X, Magherafelt and St. Patrick's, Maghera.

Players like Dermot McNicholl who has played for St. Pat's in five McRory Cup finals and wto Hogan Cups, and Damian Barton who led St. Pius to three All-Ireland Vocational schools' titles show the sort of colleges' background most of this team

have.

Four of the present team are also members of the Senior hurling squad and have won Ulster and All-Ireland medals in that grade as well. Hugh Martin McGurk as an example was a member of the Derry Team to beat Monaghan in the All Ireland final of '82 and in opposition that day was Mick O'Dowd and the Clontibret man will be in direct opposition for this final.

Even though the three McNicholls and the two Mackles in the panel come from the same clubs they are not as reported, brothers, Declan and Dermot are cousins with

Cathal no relation; John and Paddy Mackle are distant cousins.

Of the present team, Dermot McNicholl, Joe Irwin and Eugene Young have all played for Ulster and the latter two have Railway Cup medals. Dermot is a current All-Star and led Derry to the All Ireland Minor win of '83. In all, he played for the County in three All Ireland Minor finals.

Damian Barton has the honour of leading three different Derry sides in All Ireland finals, he was captain of the All Ireland vocational schools' winning team and led the Minors in '80 and the Under 21's in '83. Eddie McElhinney and Hugh Martin McGurk are following in the footsteps of older brothers who played for the county

with Gerry and Anthony winning All-Star awards.

From the successful Minor side of '83, Dermot McNicholl, Damian Cassidy and Eddie McElhinney are in the side for to-day with Cathal McNicholl, Niall Mullan, Brian Kealey and Damian McCusker are also members of the panel, all of them are in the present Under 21 side who play Tyrone next Sunday.

Terence McGuckin was captain of the Derry Minor side of '81 who contested the All-Ireland final, his two older brothers, Adrian and Mick have played for the county

with distinction.

Derry will be in their first Ulster decider since 1977 and were previously in the Ulster semi-final against Down in '81. It is perhaps a long time to be away from the top but there is a hope in Derry that the present team will be a leading force in Ulster Football for some years to come, and with young players like Dermot McNicholl, who at only 19 has already played for Ulster and Ireland as the target for others to follow, Derry will be a force to be reckoned with.





## ... A Most Unusual Pairing

By today's standards and by what we have come to expect over the past twenty years, the meeting of Derry and Monaghan in the Ulster Senior Football Final must surely be regarded as unusual, to put it mildly. Admittedly, both have been knocking at the Ulster door for quite some time now and both did tremendously well in the 1984 Centenary Year Special Competition, nevertheless their clash at the ultimate stage of the Ulster title race has taken most northern followers somewhat by surprise.

If you check on the records pages elsewhere in this programme, however, you will find that this is not the first Derry-Monaghan meeting in an Ulster Final. The first ever Ulster Final between the sides was as far back as 1907 when it is recorded that Monaghan got a walkover from the Derrymen in the Decider. Records for that particular year are scant in the extreme and it is more than likely that Monaghan, the then reigning Ulster champions, were nominated by the Ulster Council to represent the northern province in the All-Ireland series, as competitions were more than a year in arrears.

The sides again reached the Ulster Final of 1921 and this time they DID succeed in playing it out on the field, but only after a series of the most unusual circumstances. In fact, that 1921 Final was more remembered for happenings prior to the game than for the game itself. After wins over Armagh and Cavan, Monaghan were detailed to travel to Derry City for the Ulster Final on 15th January 1922 for the 1921 Final. Those were troubled times, however, and the game was later postponed to the following Sunday, 22nd January, 1922.

Monaghan prepared as best they could in the circumstances and on Saturday, 21st January six cars set out from Monaghan to take the team to Derry. Many of the travelling party were members of the IRA and, since the Border had barely begun to exist, they travelled armed with their usual revolvers under their coats. About 7 p.m. they were stopped and searched by a party of the recently formed 'B Specials' near Dromore GNR Station in Co. Tyrone. The arms were discovered and ten members of the Monaghan party were arrested, taken to Omagh and later interned in Derry jail where they spent six weeks' imprisonment. The ten were:—

Dan Hogan, Thomas Quigley, Edward O'Carroll, James Murphy, James Winters, Thomas Donnelly, Joseph Brannigan, James McKenna, Thomas Mason and Patrick McGrory.

Little did the Monaghan men realise that, instead of spending a happy week-end as guests of the Derry GAA people, they would instead be guests of the British Government in one of their jails. Eoin O'Duffy protested to the British but the men continued to be held. The 1921 Ulster Final was eventually played out on 29th October 1923 at Derry City – two years behind schedule, with Monaghan taking their seventh Ulster title on the score – Monaghan 2-2, Derry 0-1.

Monaghan were to figure in many more Ulster Finals in the next thirty-five years but Derry had to wait until 1957 before they made the Final stage again, and still one more year (1958) before they made that all-important breakthrough that every Ulster county dreams about. They followed this with wins in 1970, 1975 and 1976 with Monaghan out in the cold until 1979.

The 'eighties have not witnessed either team in the Ulster Final but the signs were there that both were on their way back when they met in a hectic Centenary Cup semi-final at Croke Park in May of 1984, a game that had everything and that took extra time to decide before a fitter Monaghan side qualified to meet Meath in the Final. So here they are again, this time at Clones just over twelve months later and an Ulster

Championship title at stake between them.

We can expect an outstanding Final – both of them showed scant regard for the form-books in the opening rounds with Derry shutting out Cavan and Tyrone (the reigning Ulster Champions), and Monaghan ousting Donegal and Armagh, with Donegal having already accounted for Down. Monaghan are National League Champions while Derry boast of the Ulster Champions' scalp in their belts, so the ingredients are all there to make it an Ulster Final that will do credit to our province and that will long be remembered by Ulster folk.

# GLEN WATTY GRAHAM'S G.A.C., MAGHERA

Wishing the Derry Team every success in the Ulster Final.

It's a Pilgrimage. Some go to Lourdes, some go to Mecca and some go to the Olympics. But me, well I go to the Ulster Final. It used to be on the fourth Sunday in July but nowadays it's on the third Sunday of this month. It sometimes was in Cavan and it sometimes was in Belfast, but the vast majority of times it has been in Clones and, since that's only twenty miles up the road, I don't even have to leave my own county to get there.

The first time was in 1944 when Cavan stole it from Monaghan despite the herculean efforts of **Percy McCooey**. Monaghan, by the way, played in black jerseys with amber shoulders in those days. The following year, when Monaghan had returned to blue and white, Fermanagh made a rare appearance on a glorious day but the sunshine didn't help them much as Cavan coasted to a rather facile win. I got some

consolation that day when Monaghan took the minor title.

Then there was the great arrival of Antrim the following year with **Armstrong**, **Gibson**, **O'Hara** and Company playing zig-zag through the Cavan defence and mesmerising us schoolboys with their scintillating movements and hand-passing. I dreamt of that Final for months afterwards. It was Cavan v Antrim the next wto years as well when the old bicycle was my mode of transport to Clones. One of those years the heavens opened and I got the worst drenching I can ever remember.

Cavan, we thought, were invincible but Armagh and Antrim lowered their colours in 1950 and 1951 respectively. Then, during the National Newspapers Strike of 1952, Monaghan got to the Final again and I travelled to Breffni, arriving late and having to stand away at the back in one of the corners. Not being a giant in height, I had a great view of players' heads and the ball, every time it was airborne. What happened at ground-level I hadn't a notion. In 1953 we got inside Casement Park for

the first time but, for the rest of the 'fifties, it was Clones every year.

Tyrone caused us to raise our eyebrows in 1956, and then a most unusual Final in 1958. Unusual in that it was the first time I saw an Ulster Final without a Cavan team. This may sound hard to believe nowadays, but there really was an air of unreality about the whole thing, we just couldn't believe that it was an Ulster Final. The **blue jersey** was there, however, as Tyrone and Derry had to change jerseys because of their similarity of colour-scheme. So, one side wore the saffron Ulster jersey and the other

wore the blue of Cavan.

The ritual of **nailing their colours** to the top goalposts, carried out by Tyrone in 1956, was simulated by Derry in 1958 and then the '**Mighty**' Down in 1959. It was to be Down, year after year from 1958 to 1969 inclusive, most times they were winners but surprisingly beaten in '62, '64, '67 and '69. Seven of these were in Belfast and one (1963) in Cavan. Some were great games, some were dreadful, but they were all Ulster Finals and the sense of excitement and exhilaration always the same.

The 'seventies brought an awful mixed-bag and Donegal went through the ritual of nailing their colours to the Clones posts in 1972. In 1974 we had the first **drawn Final** in my memory and Donegal and Down had to make the return trip to Clones in that year. We had a repeat of this only two years later (1976) when Derry and Cavan were the culprits. Finally came the day I will forever remember – 1979 when Monaghan came in from the cold to win the title for the first time in **forty-one** years. It was like coming out of the grave.

By that time too, I had been given the 'talking-job' by **Mick Feeney** and nearly fell off the wee roof above the old pavilion. The cheers could be heard in Bragan but Brendan Brady's victory speech couldn't be heard even by Brendan himself. Things seem to have become more streamlined since the advent of the 'eighties with much more space on the roof of this new dressing-rooms complex. But it's still the Ulster Final – the day of my **annual pilgrimage**, the day I still look forward to months in advance.

And this one has, of course, a unique appeal since the old home county is again in action. Mick Duffy was unexpectedly called to his eternal reward a few short weeks after realising his greatest ambition—seeing Monaghan winning its first national senior title. The Ulster Final without Mick Duffy's cheerful and friendly greeting is a sad occasion; the Ulster Final without Mick Duffy, and Monaghan playing, is unthinkable.

Mick's two great interests in life were the GAA and Monaghan, and he was totally and singlemindedly devoted to both. He lived Monaghan's triumphs and disappointments as if they were his own, and he freely admitted he was a bad loser where Monaghan was concerned. He was the most loyal and committed GAA man I have ever known, and while normally the most placid and gentle of men, let anyone cast aspersions on his beloved Association, and Mick took them on, no matter who they were or whatever the circumstances.

It would be impossible to list all Mick's great qualities, his ready wit and sparkling repartee, whether at County Board or Annual Congress; his care and concern for members or former players who fell ill or on hard times; his attendance at funerals the length and breadth of, not just Monaghan, but all Ireland. Mick was as well known in Killarney or Bundoran as he was in Blackhill or Knockatallon. He was the most charitable and sympathetic of men, and was as dedicated when working for the mentally handicapped or the St. Vincent de Paul Society as he was for the GAA.

I had the privilege of being closely associated with Mick for over thirty years. As a friend he was totally loyal, helpful and courteous. And it was as a friend everyone knew him – Mick had no enemies. Nora, Padraig, Brian and Rose will miss his friendly smile more than anyone else. But we all miss him – especially today.



## "MONAGHAN"

MONAGHAN'S appearance in today's Ulster Senior decider did not just come about by accident but is as a result of a new spirit that pervades all G.A.A. activities in the County at present.

The progress of the county team can be charted from Sean McCague's reappointment as team manager at the start of 1982. At that time, Monaghan was in danger of relegation to Div. IV of the N.F.L. but desperate ills require desperate remedies and a partial cure was found. Relegation was avoided and the team finished in mid-table.

Things were certainly looking good as Monaghan proceeded to win the 1983 McKenna Cup and began their championship campaign with a resounding 2-18 to 0-4 victory over Antrim in Castleblayney, but their hopes were dashed in Irvinestown by Donegal to the tune of 1-14 to 1-9.

It was almost, though, as if this was a test of character for this team because they rested that summer determined to make a bid for promotion to Div. II of the N.F.L. A feat which they achieved and, as Division III champions, gained a place in the quarter finals. In this they were paired with Meath in Breffni Park on March 11th, 1984, going down by 5 points, 1-12 to 1-7, having led at the interval by 1-4 to 0-6.

This, in fact, was to be the first of two meetings with Meath in Centenary Year as Monaghan progressed through the various rounds of the new Centenary Cup competition, to reaching the final v. Meath after some great encounters and none more so than the epic semi-final against today's opposition, Derry.

Monaghan were again denied victory but the experience gained was to manifest itself in the League campaign later in the year. Despite going out of the championship at the semi-final stage, Monaghan were to prove that they were no "flash in the pan". The goal was set at promotion to the premier Division and despite an initial setback v. Dublin in the opening game, Monaghan were to continue undefeated in their remaining 10 games, a sequence that ended with the county's first N.F.L. title. It was after the Dublin game that a new face came into the backroom team, Gerry Smith, from Castleblayney. Gerry's influence as trainer, on how the team has performed, has been great as his record is one of no defeats so far in League or Championship football.

Winning the League has matured this Monaghan team greatly and, as in the semi-final of the League, they showed great character in coming back to win the replay of the Championship semi v. Armagh to reach today's decider.

Victory today would be a just reward for the efforts of team manager Sean McCague who has performed a near miracle in giving Monaghan the type of tradition that few believed they could ever have.

The administration of G.A.A. affairs in Monaghan is of a high standard, a standard set by Co. Chairman Pauric Duffy, himself a selector, and the performance and achievements of the county team are a reflection of those standards. Success has not and does not come automatically but has to be worked at. The schemes of work exist in Monaghan and they will not relinquish their new-found position easily. To add the provincial title to their N.F.L. title would indeed be a great achievement and what better year to do that in than the first year of our second century.
