



Experience or Youth but football's the winner

For the past two weeks we thought, talked, dreamt of nothing else but now sixty minutes of football will answer all those questions. The meeting between Kilcar and Killybegs in the county Senior Football Championship final is now a reality and what an exciting final we have in store.

On the match front, classic play was in short supply in this year's Championship but many games still came up trumps in a big way on the entertainment value.

Now all attention is on the two sides to see which can lift the Dr. Maguire Cup. The fierce but friendly rivalry between these neighbours has guaranteed a tense, close game which can only be good as in recent years the county final has been something of an anti-climax.


If we are to believe all we hear both sides are confident of winning. Killybegs believe they have the young footballing side, while Kilcar point to the fact that this is their fourth final in eight years with basically the same team lineout.

Killybegs appearance in the championship final comes as no surprise, but once more the question is: Can they adjust to the big occasion and convert their usual generous share of possession into scores? The determination and organisation in the team is matched with skill, flair and occasionally some devastating finishing in front of goals but time and again they promised so much only to lose steam when the heat becomes too intense.

This year they have shown some promising signs in the league so perhaps they've finally come of age.

Kilcar must start favourites in everybody's mind, however. They are looking for their fourth title, third in the '80s, and don't want to lose a county final two years on the trot. Their consistency and experience should be a big asset today but as they know from the past championship football can be cruel and the wrong bounce of the ball a costly thing!

The old and the young—in terms of experience that is—are represented in this year's final but don't be fooled, both sets of players have been around a long time but maybe in different competitions. It all points to an intriguing battle of wits with the orders



from the sideline probably having as much bearing on the final outcome as the scores. It will be interesting to see whether Killybegs adopt their normal flamboyant style against the rugged sturdy Kilcar machine.


Kilcar's rating as championship favourites is owed more to the combination of past experience and unequalled track record in recent times. They may well prove good enough to win but as last year showed they are not unbeatable. The pressure is on them not to lose again and this in itself is a burden on final day.

Killybegs are good enough to win. This opinion might seem presumptuous but there is no lack of evidence to support this case. They've won everything else. This exciting young side bases its challenge on at least four points of strength: the fact that most of the team have come up through the ranks together since winning their first U-12 title in 1979; their strength, ability and hunger for the big breakthrough. They have proved the 'dark horses' of the championship so far....will there be another surprise today?

County U-14 Final should be a thriller

Today's County U-14 final sees All-Ireland champions of Feile na nÓg Group B, Killybegs, meeting a good St. Eunans team. Both clubs are now reaping the benefit of a lot of hard work which is being put in within their respective areas at underage coaching.

Killybeas are going for their fourth County U-14 title having been champions in 1980, 1985 and 1987 while St. Eunan's are bidding for their fifth title at this level as they won it in 1973. 1974, 1983 and 1984.

On their way to the final St. Eunans accounted for Ardara and Cloughaneely, while the Killybegs boys had victories over Four Masters and Sean MacCumhaills.

CILL CHARTHAIGH — STAIR

This is Cill Charthaigh's eighth appearance in the County Senior Football Championship final. They were champions in 1925, 1980 and 1985 and runners-up in 1959, 1963, 1982 and 1987.

1925-In the South and South-West League of 1924-'25, Ballyshannon and Ardara finished on top with Kilcar third and so out of the running. Ballyshannon and Ardara had to playoff and the match was fixed for Kilcar. Ballyshannon and Ardara agreed to play it in Mountcharles. Ballyshannon won, thus qualifying to meet Dunfanaghy in the county final. Kilcar, however, protested on the grounds that Ballyshannon and Ardara were automatically disqualified owing to their not playing at the proper venue. The Kilcar protest was successful and they were to play Dunfanaghy in the county final in Letterkenny on July 26, 1925. Dunfanaghy failed to turn up and Kilcar were awarded the Championship. The Kilcar line-out was: Jim Toland, Johnny McGinley, Frank McGinley, Joseph McGinley, Eddie Gillespie, Brian Byrne, Mick Carr, Dan Byrne, Bernard Byrne, Phil McNelis, Michael W. Senior County Finals— "I Recall"

It is with a feeling of nostalgia that I look back and try to recall some, only some, of the great Senior Football finals of sixty years, and endeavour to call to mind some of the thrilling encounters, the players who participated, and the changes that have taken place in playing conditions, rules, tactics and the widespread participation of our youth in Gaelic games.

A County Football Final, senior I mean, as there was no other, was still a novelty away back in 1928. My interest was awakened by the fact that Ardara was contesting its third final on this occasion with Killygordon, who were outstanding in that decade-powered then by the Brady Clan (3) and others. Ardara had outstanding players in C. McDyre (Donegal and Ulster), Christy Kennedy, Leo Howley and Ta Gallagher, all intercounty players.

The final was played in Hollymount Park, (present G.A.A. pitch) in Glenties, Admission was 6 pence and the attendance was over 2,000. Ardara ran out winners, after a hectic game with a score of 1-4 to 0-3.

Dungloe contested four finals between 1930 and 1936, winning four. Probably the most thrilling of these was the 1933 final played in Ardara (in the Showfield) against Bundoran. This was the year that a Donegal team made its first appearance in Croke Park—as a junior team. Dungloe, winners by 3-2 to 1-3-had a powerful combination in the O'Donnell brothers, John and Bernie; the Sweeney brothers, Kevin and Dessie, McPaul and others. The Bundoran team included J. Foley, Gilmartin and Campbell, all intercounty. Late in the game two Dungloe players were sent to the line-one reprieved later.

In the 1936 final Dungloe defeated Ardara in Ardara, then powered by Jim Maxwell, William Boyle, Paddy McGill, Vinny McHugh and James McGinley. This was a good final, as was that of 1938 in Glenties, when Gweedore defeated Ardara 1-7 to 0-5. This Gweedore team boasted such fine

players as T. Coll, T. Kearney, Jackie and Hughie "Beag" Gallagher, Danny Gillespie, Hugh Roarty, J. McCole and D. McGinley, many of whom became famous over the next decade at county and provincial level, winning six county finals against the very strong opposition of Ballyshannon. Ballyshannon had outstanding players such as Jack Gallagher, Mick Melly, John McGahern, Seamus Slevin, P. J. Goan, Mick Slevin. Gweedore players of outstanding ability who appeared were Hughie Tim Boyle, Frank Mooney and Jim McFadden.

Letterkenny were worthy opponents in the years 1944 to 1952. These finals involving these three teams, to some of which I have already referred. were outstanding contests, with a vast array of brilliant players. It was not until the '60s that spectators were thrilled by scintillating displays in finals by MacCumhaills, St. Joseph's and St. Eunans.


The '60s witnessed the physically strongest teams of Donegal football and produced our strongest inter-county teams-without winning an Ulster Championship.

One cannot but recall the 1967 county final between St. Eunans and St. Joseph's and the replay, eventually won by the former by 1-13 to 1-9. Players like S. Hoare, Fionn Gallagher, Sean Ferriter, John Hannigan, Pat Gallagher and St. Joseph's with great stalwarts like Declan O'Carroll, Pauric McShea, Bernard Brady, Mickey McLoone, Seamie Granaghan and others -- most of whom continued to help St. Joseph's to win County Championships -- six in the next

Over the last ten years the power has swung to the South West of the county so that this year the last five teams remaining in the Senior Championship were based in the South-West Division. We express hope that the neighbouring teams, Kilcar and Killybegs will provide us with another memorable final.

MacCumhaill Park Development On The Way

Today we say farewell to MacCumhaill Park in its present layout. It has served C.L.G., well over the past decade but modern requirements, especially better spectator comforts dictate that we initiate a programme of improvements that will suffice well into the next century.

The development will be done in two phases. Initially the pitch will be re-aligned bringing the riverside endline forward five metres. The present stand will be removed and the pitch extended four metres in that direction. The town side endline will in turn be brought forward five metres.

The new stand will have a modern seating arrangement for approximately 5000 people with access from three points. On the Stranorlar side the existing bank will be realigned and extended for better spectator

comfort. New toilet facilities will be provided on both sides of the ground. A modern press box is part of the development but a location is not yet finalised.

New access and exit points with an adequate number of secure admission collection points are part of the scheme.

In the second phase the provision of a covered stand over the seating will be the major part of the plan. The development committee have examined coverings in other recent developments around the country and the better facets of these will be incorporated in the MacCumhaill Park development.

The Co. Committee appreciate the support given by the clubs to date and look forward to your continuing support for the project over the coming year so that phase one will be completed for the 1989 Co. Final.

Killybegs At The Crossroads

For the past nine years Killybegs have been the most successful club in the county by winning 17 under-age titles, 2 county Shield titles, 2 Ulster Club minor titles, and 1 Intermediate county title. This run of successes is remarkable for the fact that since the under-12 victory in 1979 the club has contested 16 under-age county finals and has been successful in every final. Surely a national record! All good things must come to an end, and to the Sean MacCumhaill club came the honour of lowering our colours in a county final for the first time in over ten years when they defeated us in last year's replayed juvenile final. Ironically we again fell in a county final for the second time in 1987 when a better prepared Naomh Columba outfit beat a depleted Killybegs under-21 team in the county final. (Manus Boyle, John Cunningham, Barry Cunningham and Willie McCallig were missing for various reasons in the final).

Our under-age record for the past nine years: County winners: Under-12: 1979, 1983, 1986; Under-13: 1984, 1986, 1987; Under-14: 1981, 1985, 1987; Under-15: (Og Sport): 1982, 1986; Juvenile: 1983: Minor Championship: 1984, 1985; Minor League: 1983, 1984, 1985; Under-21: 1986; Ulster Minor Championship (Club): 1984, 1985.

With this great run of under-age success supporters would be correct in assuming that we should be making the inevitable breakthrough at senior level. But football fortunes do not exactly run that way. To

achieve success at the highest level commitment, maturity, hard work, pride (in oneself and one's club), loyalty, discipline, teamwork, humility, honesty, integrity, fair play coupled with football skill should be some of the ingredients that a manager might look for in order to be successful.

That Killybegs failed so miserably in 1987 must be cause for concern for loyal supporters. The promise of 1985 when defeated by Four Masters in the county quarter-final in what was the club game of that particular year followed by great performances in 1986 when again we took part in the game of the year against Naomh Columba only to fail in the county semi-final against a Marty Carlin inspired Red Hugh's by the narrowest of margins left us relishing the coming of 1987. Struggling to overcome Naomh Ultan in the preliminary we reached an all-time low when succumbing to a mediocre St. Eunan's team in the first round proper and in fact being defeated by three goals at O'Donnell Park. This Letterkenny debacle left followers in the county puzzled especially since it came within a fortnight of the county under-21 success in Roscommon.

The question immediately being asked both in Killybegs and in the county at large was: "Is Killybegs just another under-age club with their players lacking the necessary 'gut' to make the transformation to a good senior team?"

Today will provide us with some answers at any rate.

Gweedore and Aodh Ruadh in Minor Semi-final

The opening game today sees the Minor footballers of Gweedore and Aodh Ruadh in action. The winners of this county semi-final will play St. Eunans who are already through.

Due to a marathon clash in the south-west between Ardara and Dungloe the minor programme schedule had to be revised. This year St. Eunans are bidding for their twelfth county minor title. Gweedore their eighth and Aodh Ruadh their ninth.

Gweedore became the first winners of the Domhnall Mac a' Bhaird Cup when in 1960 they defeated Dungloe in Ardara 2-3 to 1-5.

Domhnaill Mac a' Bhaird, or more better known as 'Big Dan' was a native of Ardara. He served as county secretary from 1938 to 1944 and was county chairman in 1945 and again in 1955. He also served his club in the positions of secretary and chairman for a number of years until his death in 1958. The Ardara club decided in 1960 to put up a cup in memory of this great Gael and with the permission of the county board the inaugural final of the Domhnaill Mac a' Bhaird Cup for the Minor County Championship was held in Pearse Memorial Park with Gweedore defeating old rivals Dungloe with a late goal.

Brighter Days Ahead For Hurling?

Those pessimists who claim that hurling is dying a slow death should have been in Markievicz Park, Sligo, on the first Saturday of this month to see Donegal's under-16 hurlers retain their All-Ireland crown. It was a heartening sight for those who love our oldest national game to watch the youngsters hammer opponents Mayo 7-7 to 0-4.

The u-16s have proven one of the big success stories over the past two years. The hard work and effort over the years seems finally to be paying off. But has the revival succeeded? Has it even started to succeed? A few years ago the answer would have been depressingly negative. Today - well, without being over presumptious we can say with some truth that hurling in Donegal has begun to turn the corner. We may not, indeed almost certainly not in our time, see the game properly played in every parish in the county, but it can at least be boasted even now that there are hurlers in greater or lesser numbers — actually playing the game. This invariably will lead to an increase in the standard and hopefully in the interest it so badly needs to succeed.

Our young heroes were far removed from the glamour of an All-Ireland title when they lined out at a wet Ballyshannon to beat Tyrone (7-11 to 1-3) in late June. They qualified for the semi-final when they accounted for the 'wee county' Louth in Ballybofey (2-11 to 0-5) in early June. A few weeks later to Brewster

Park, Enniskillen, for what was expected to be their toughest match against Longford. Now this side ran Donegal very close last year and wanted revenge but with confidence high Donegal showed their determination to go all the way with a convincing (3-10 to 0-7) victory and into another All-Ireland final we went.

Mayo were something of an unknown quantity. Some of the players on both teams had already met at Feile na nGael but this was going to be different. True it was different. Donegal's natural ability and skill won the day with a tearaway victory that not even the most

optimistic could have hoped for.

Team manager, Manus O'Donnell, was fortunate in many ways. He was able to call upon the services of ten of last year's successful panel, six of whom were on the side this year again. He must be equally pleased with the fact that out of his panel of 27 no fewer than 13 of them are eligible next year. He was fortunate to have a solid core of mentors, especially John Joe Doherty of Carndonagh and Neil Reid from Urris, to help with the task, and a fine bunch of lads who wore the Donegal jersey with pride and passion.

Believe it or not, Donegal remain the most effective match-winning side in this competition with seven wins on the trot over the past two years. There is an air of hope and promise for the future with the u-16s and James McLaughlin's minor side reaching the All-Ireland semi-final a few weeks ago. The talent is there, it must be put to good use.


