





Micheál Greenan (An Cabhán)



New Confidence; New Belief

No matter what the future may hold, Donegal can already feel proud of their past 12 months and should they collect their fourth Ulster S.F.C. title this afternoon it will complete what could best be described as one of the best comebacks to date.

A year ago it looked like the team had hit an all-time low when they travelled to the Athletic Grounds in Armagh only to be humbled in the June heat. That shattering eight point defeat threw an almighty spanner in the works and even with the best will in the world their new found status in N.F.L. Division One already looked in jeopardy.

To the surprise of many, that championship defeat provided the spur needed to get the side back on the road. They dusted off the cobwebs and by the time the League got underway the panel had a settled look about it. Small wonder then that mighty Meath and kingpins Kerry were to feel the cutting edge of the Donegal razor sharp determination. It was these victories in particular that shaped new confidence in the side, gave players and supporter new belief and perhaps more importantly brought home to the side that they had it in them to compete with the best.


After the League and McKenna Cup campaigns the side knew the championship was their main goal. The retention of Division One status — a feat in itself and the fact that they had been tagged 'underdogs' left them in a unique position. No one fancied them against Cavan and look what happened there. Their football impressed but against Derry in the semi-final many thought they wouldn't be strong enough. Again they defied the odds and found the right formula for success.

Today's match revives memories of the 1983 final. The glorious Summer, the flamboyant football, the carnival atmosphere and the will to win.


Donegal football has at last come out of limbo. For weeks we've thought, talked and dreamt of nothing else. We'd stand for hours discussing players, tactics and how the match was going to be won. The Ulster final is very important to us, it's the match where we hope to usher in a new chapter in our footballing history. Not many would have predicted a year ago we would be in an Ulster final. But then again isn't that the beauty of the Ulster Championship?

Donegal are here on merit, the lads have worked hard for it by taking the National Football League and the McKenna Cup seriously. It has paid off so far and now as they know they are 70 minutes away from joining the elite they are not going to fail for the want of trying.

PROGRESS IN TÍR EOGHAIN

DOMINIC McCaughey

The decade of the eighties is regarded by many as having been the most successful for senior football in Tir Eoghain.

In terms of league competitions, fortunes can only be described as having been mixed, with the county having spent a couple of years in each of the three divisions, the last two being in the lowest — Div. Three.

What effect this has had on the development of a team is difficult to gauge with any degree of accuracy, but it is generally accepted that it is as difficult to win — or as easy to lose — a Division 3 league game in the Winter months as it is a Division 1 match at any time. However, there is probably greater pressure in the lower divisions on a team seeking promotion — an objective set by all managers at the start of each campaign — and in particular in Div. 3 where just one team is guaranteed this success.

Tir Eoghain achieved this first objective of 1989, earlier this year, when, having lost just one game in the league, they were promoted to Div. 2, after a play-off with Div. 3 (South) runners-up, Luimneach.

The second objective set by Tir Eoghain, and the objective of all teams — to win their Provincial Championship title — will hopefully be achieved today.

Tir Eoghain, like our close neighbours, Ard Mhacha, are regarded as a "Championship team" of the '80's and the record books bear this out, showing that today we are contesting our 5th Provincial Final since 1980. In that year, they lost to Ard Mhacha in a thrilling, high-scoring game. The other years were 1984 when Tir Eoghain overcame Ard Mhacha with much of the glory of that game resting with Frank McGuigan, 1986 when Tir Eoghain were again successful at the expense of An Dun, and last year, 1988 when Muineachain had a 2 point victory over them.

Can Tir Eoghain collect the Anglo Celt Cup today for the sixth time in their history?

All the fans within the county provide only one answer — YES. Players and team manager are confident, even optimistic. Those of the team which tasted a certain amount of success in 1984 and later enjoyed the thrills of playing Ciarrai in the '86 All-Ireland Final, are keen to get another chance. Most of today's panel were on duty in 1986 and feel that "Lady Luck" did not favour them on that occasion. This year things might be better!



All are versatile, physically strong and skillful and all have played throughout the National League — with their experience put to the proper use they should provide the answer the fans are expecting.






A WORD FROM THE CAPTAINS





DOWN MEMORY LANE

"Tell us about your '46 memories of Antrim's Ulster Final day in Clones," he said, never realising what that was going to entail.

An innocent and simple enough request, it would seem, and yet – how does one recapture on paper, the drama, excitement and thrills of long ago? Doing justice to all that happened, whilst neither under-playing or going over the top about events, and all the while, reliving the dreams, hopes and aspirations of the time.

A light-hearted and carefree period, those days of over 40 years ago, enriched with a rousing intensity and stimulated by the full-blooded participation of youth.

A long road it was to Clones then, and an even longer one back on many an occasion, but like the weather, it's mostly the good times which stand out, green, fresh and warm.

No distracting TV, no extra grind of night classes to weigh us down. Quite simply, football was the main preoccupation, and every ground in the country, echoed in the evening air to the sounds of vigorous shouts and the thump of a well kicked ball.

Sure, there were organised County training sessions, but Managers, Coaches and Physios had not yet arrived on the scene, and the extent of training, consisted in lapping the field, a few sprints, exercises and a match.

Half a life time ago, the Cavan tradition held sway in Ulster, and with a proud history of success behind them, the Breifne blue shirt was worth two or three points against any Northern opposition. Not without cause either, as five All-Ireland titles in '33, '35, '47, '48 and '52 would testify, along with thirty-two Ulster Championships.

To think of defeating Cavan in that era, was almost an impudence – more especially if it was one of the 'Wee Six' in opposition.

Great players like Big Tom and John Joe O'Reilly (R.I.P.), Mick Higgins, P.J. Duke (R.I.P.), Phil Brady, Victor Sherlock, Peter Donohue, Tony Tighe, Simon Deignan and many, many more, had gained their impressive reputations in the heat of battle, and even with much less reporting by the media than now, they were all household names.

To succeed against that lot, was the equivalent of winning an All-Ireland Championship.

A much different game too, from that seen today. Not as much movement, every player, more or less keeping to his own little patch. The third man tackle was allowed, plus a heavier concentration on the basic skills of the game.

That was the setting when Antrim came to the fore in the '40's. Supplanting the 'Catch and Kick' with a much greater emphasis on speed, space, handpassing and combination, the Antrim style was entertaining to watch, and a difficult technique to combat.

Attracting the attention and support of followers everywhere, not alone in their own County, but over the whole country as well, Antrim acquired a huge following. Ulster Secretary, Michael Feeney vouches, that to this day, the 1947 Final between Antrim and Cavan, with well over forty thousand people in attendance, was the biggest crowd ever seen at an Ulster Final in Clones.

Antrim's strength and spectator appeal, lay in their fast movement of the ball over the entire field. Allied to this, the individual brilliance of players like Kevin Armstrong, Harry O'Neill, Sean Gibson, John Gallagher, Frankie Hamill (R.I.P.), George Watterson (R.I.P.) and Co. made them all attractions in their own right.

Stories of the '47 Final on a resolute day in July are still retold, by those who were present. Suffice to say here, that in an electrifying atmosphere, Antrim went on to dramatically beat Cavan 2-8 to 1-7.

Stewarding was not as efficient in those times at Clones, and for the last ten minutes a sizeable proportion of the near delirious Antrim supporters were down on the touchline, enroaching on play, and going in and out in waves, as the ball travelled in their direction.

Unforgettable emotional scenes of ecstatic rejoicing and exhilaration followed the final whistle on that bright, sunny afternoon, when a long spell of Cavan dominance was broken.

Peculiar, the odd thins which still stand out in the memory after so many years. The first sight of the distant Chapel spire on the approach road to Clones, for instance. The impact of seeing a seemingly never ending line of buses on both sides of the road, all the way down the straight, into the little market town. The colourful cheering crowds hanging out of the train windows, the numbed and dazed feeling when it was all over. The unbelievable had happened.



ALL-STAR MANAGEMENT

Both Tyrone and Donegal can boast of All-Star management.

Prior to Tom Conaghan, Bundoran hotelier Brian McEniff, held the managerial reins and he won a coveted All-Star award in 1972, the year the county won its first Ulster senior title.

Donal Monaghan, the current assistant manager, maintains that All-Star link for he picked up the county's second All-Star award in 1974, on the strength of superb defensive play.

Monaghan has fond memories of Clones for when Donegal won their second senior provincial title there 15 years ago he won the first Player of the Match award in an Ulster senior decider.

Tom Conaghan and Donal Monaghan are old hands in terms of management. Seven years ago they were at the helm when Donegal won their first All-Ireland U-21 title.

There is general acceptance that Monaghan brings to management the same dedication that typified his own playing career.

And Tom Conaghan readily accepts that contribution: "We work well as a team," he says, "but now we're under increasing pressure with everyone expecting success."

Centre-half-forward Martin McHugh, an All-Star in 1983, is keen to add to his collection and even more significantly he's determined to enter into management once his playing days are over.

Tyrone's Eugene McKenna can boast of having combined both roles in the championship to date. Against Armagh he figured in the attack, but then swopped roles for the game against Down in the semi-final.

With manager Donal Donnelly unavailable, assistant manager, Paul Doris, handed over the reins to the Augher clubman who then proceeded to call the shots during the course of the game.

Awards and accolades come second nature to McKenna and twice he has been an All-Star, 1984 and 1986, and who's to say he might not make it three before he bows out.

He's making no predictions but there's no doubting that both on and off the field his influence on the entire squad is immense.

Tyrone will be looking for a supreme team effort to deny Donegal, but more than anyone else Eugene McKenna holds the key to what promises to be a memorable Ulster senior decider.

GROUND IN ULSTER

In recent times there has been much ill-informed debate on the choice of venues for major senior inter-county games in Ulster. Under our present home and away system based on a two-year cycle, the choice is automatic provided the home county has a ground capable of handling the game. Our semi-finals and final are not played on the home and away system and so the venues are selected for each particular game. In selecting venues for our games, a number of criteria must be met and in the interest of the safety and comfort of our spectators the Ulster Council insists that major games will be fixed only for venues that are capable of handling the fixtures.

The main criteria in selecting venues for major games are:

- (1) That the ground must have the capacity to accommodate the expected attendance. If there is a doubt regarding a ground's ability to cope with the expected attendance, then the Council is duty bound to fix the game for a ground with a greater capacity if such is available.
- (2) That crowd control facilities at the entrance to grounds are capable of coping with the expected crowd. In the interest of the safety of both supporters and officials, Ulster Council has decided that admission to our major grounds must be via properly-operating turnstiles. For the past two years the Council insists that all stiles being installed are the floor-to-ceiling type. County grounds have been actively encouraged to instal such stiles to the extent that Ulster Council actually supplies the stiles free to the grounds.
- (3) Adequate toilet accommodation for ladies and gents. For a ground expecting to house a crowd in excess of 10,000 the Council insists on at least three separate ladies' and gents' toilet blocks.
- (4) Adequate protection for players and officials coming on and leaving the playing pitch. There should be no possibility of the players or match officials coming in contact with the general public between the dressingrooms and the playing pitch.

These are the criteria used in selecting our major venues and there are no vested interests, political or otherwise, considered in determining where our games are played. Local or other loyalties greatly exaggerate the capacity of our grounds but based on experience of recent games at the various venues, the Ulster Council is satisfied its statistics in these matters are accurate.

Based on the best information currently available, the following statistics in respect of a number of our major grounds are worthy of note:—

Capacity: Only two grounds in the province could be considered

possibly capable of handling a crowd in excess of 30,000 — Clones and Casement Park. Breifne Park and Castleblayney are capable of housing 15,000 to 25,000 with about 8,000 seated. Omagh and Irvinestown can each accommodate under 12,000 with 5,000 seated; while Armagh and Newry can accommodate under 9,000 with 3,000 seated.

Access to Grounds: Clones has 28 turnstiles; Casement Park has 8 turnstiles; Breifne Park has 28 turnstiles; Castleblayney has 26 turnstiles; Omagh has 12 stiles plus 6 manned openings; Irvinestown has no stiles and 16 manned openings; Armagh has 12 stiles; Newry has no stiles and 8 manned openings.

Toilet Facilities: Clones has four public toilet blocks (ladies' and gent's); Casement Park has one; Breifne Park has 3; Castleblayney has three; Omagh has one; Irvinestown has two; Armagh has two; Newry two.

Comhairle Uladh last year spent 50% of its total income — a sum of £130,000 — on grounds development. The main grounds in Ulster, with the exception of Casement Park and Breifne Park, are owned or administered by clubs. It is they who must initiate and carry out development work. Comhairle Uladh encourages proper development by the payment of substantial grant aid. The Council hopes that over the next few years, this policy will ensure that every county in the province will have at least one major ground fully equipped to cater for the comfort and safety of our patrons.



No Strangers to Final Day

Tyrone and Donegal have become no strangers to Ulster Final Day, especially over the past dozen years or so, and their respective county colours have become quite a familiar sight in St. Tiernach's Park, Clones. In the first half of the present century, however, their appearances in Ulster Finals were few and far between with the Donegal men only reaching their first ever Ulster Final in 1963.

Tyrone's first Ulster Final was way back in 1890 when they were beaten by Armagh at Lisburn and they suffered two more Ulster Final defeats, both to Cavan, in 1933 and 1941. The number five was an unlucky one for Tyrone in those years as that was the sum total of their scores in each of those three defeats. Success eventually arrived in 1956 and they made it two-in-a-row in 1957.

Donegal also suffered two Ulster Final defeats, in 1963 and 1966, before they savoured success in 1972 — and that was at the expense of today's opponents. That year marked the beginning of a period of dominance in Ulster for both counties, with Tyrone regaining the title in 1973 and Donegal taking the honours in 1974, but then came another lapse before they returned to the Clones scene only to taste defeat — Donegal in 1979 and Tyrone in 1980 at the hands of Monaghan and Armagh, respectively.

The 'eighties have been kind to Tyrone and this is their fifth Ulster Final since 1980. Two wins and two defeats has been their lot so far and few will forget their fine performance against Monaghan in last year's Final when they went under narrowly by 1-10 to 0-11.


Despite being such frequent visitors to the Ulster Finals of the past seventeen years, it is remarkable that these sides have only met previously on one occasion at this stage and that was in the 1972 Final already mentioned. Donegal took that one by five points, so Tyrone naturally feel that they have a score to settle with the green-and-gold brigade.

THE LIAM HARVEY CUP

Sunday last saw Antrim defeat Down in the final of the revived Ulster Senior Hurling Championship for the new Liam Harvey Cup. The cup, which was donated by Antrim County Board, commemorates one of the most highly respected figures of the Antrim and Ulster G.A.A. scene for the past half century. A member of the O'Connell's Club in Belfast, Liam first came to prominence in organising schools' competitions in Belfast. As Chairman of Antrim Co. Board, he was involved in the acquisition of Corrigan Park for the Co. Board. Later he was involved in acquiring Casement Park and the Shaw's Road grounds.

Liam was Antrim's representative on Central and Ulster Councils for many years. Although hurling was his first love, Liam devoted as much energy to the promotion of the language and was involved for many years with Comhaltas Uladh as well as being a director of the Irish language magazine, "An tUachtach".

THE COLLEGE INFLUENCE

A cursory glance at the Derry and Armagh minor teams in today's Ulster Final will prove the continuing influence of colleges on the under-18 football scene. For the past 20 years or so, colleges in Ulster have had a big bearing on minor football and, undoubtedly, have raised the standard of the game at this level.

Today, there will be 11 members of the St. Patrick's High School, Maghera, squad which romped to victory earlier this year in the MacRory and Hogan Cups, included in the Oak Leaf panel. Armagh will have 14 players of big time college experience including three members of the St. Paul's, Lurgan, side which swept through the province.

They have also six from Abbey CBS, two from St. Patrick's (Armagh), and two from St. Colman's.

And, of course, Seamus Heffernan, who is assistant to manager Bro. Ennis in the Armagh camp, is steeped in college tradition himself. Not only does he guide the fortunes of St. Paul's in Lurgan but he played on the first Maghera team to lift the Hogan Cup — that was in 1977.

Poor Seamus, no matter who wins today he'll have mixed feelings!

There are, of course, cycles when colleges do not play such a high profile as at the present but if one goes back to 1965 when Derry blazed the All-Ireland under-18 trail so successfully that was the year that St. Columb's collected the Hogan Cup so it is plaintively evident that a good college grounding "makes the man", so to speak, at minor level.

Armagh have collected provincial honours eight times and were in a dozen other finals — Derry have also eight titles to their credit but only three losing appearances. In '80 and '81 Derry had back-to-back wins over today's opponents while Armagh's last Ulster title, in 1968, was gained at the expense of the Oak Leaf lads (4-8 to 1-7).

Adrian McGuckin is a man who knows more than a thing or two about the game at this level — from the colleges' point of view — and he will verify the claims of the educational establishments to having a big influence on minor county teams.

"There is no doubt about it, that for the past 20 years at least minor teams, in Ulster at any rate, have been stocked with college players and it is proof of the influence when you take a look at who has won what."

"Particularly, teams which are successful like Derry, and Down. Also the year that Donegal came to the fore coincided with De La Salle, Ballyshannon, doing well," Adrian points out.

Yes, it seems that the college football of recent vintage has played a most important role in the shaping of Ulster minor teams. It is an exciting brand of football, too, and let's hope that is portrayed in the fare served up by Armagh and Derry this afternoon.


