

It is just over a year since Dún na nGall and Ciarraí met in Ballyshannon in the third round of Division One of the National Football League. Little did we think then that we would have Kerry back at this venue again so soon, in what is an important game for both sides.

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SUCCESS EVERY FOUR YEARS

It is a sign of the times when we see Donegal spending most of their time at the top of Division One of the National Football League and nobody seems to blink an eyelid.

The end of the '80s under, firstly Tom Conaghan and latterly Brian McEniff has seen Donegal gain a major standing in the country's footballing charts.

Before the corresponding game last year against Kerry we were in joint top position while before today's game they are in a clear one point lead, but it has not always been like that.

If we look back to the beginning of the '80s we see that Donegal were languishing in Division Three of the National Football League.

Even with the success of the Under-21s in winning the All-Ireland title in 1982 and the winning of the Ulster Championship and narrow defeat by Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final of 1983, it was not until the end of the 1983-'84 League that we were promoted to Division Two.

It took four more years for the team to win their way to Division One.

In our first year in Division One we consolidated with wins over Meath (home), Kerry (away) and Monaghan (home).

Then last year we progressed to reach the quarter-final and while beaten by a last quarter fade-out against Meath in Clones it remains that a further progressive step up the ladder towards success was achiev

Which takes us back to my open comments which suggest a supporters are not so much hop nowadays but have come to explain a Donegal team to be successful.



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SEAMUS MAC GEARAILT

Former senior All-Ireland medallist from the Gaeltacht club in Kerry, Seamus Fitzgerald has fond memories of two periods spent in Donegal in the '60s and '70s. In 1967 he spent a short period in Ballybofey when he remembers training for the Munster final with the Donegal side which included Sean Ferriter, Mickey McLoone, P. J. Flood and Pauric McShea among others.

However, his employment with Roinn na Gaeltachta required that he spend a year, from September 1971 to September 1972, in the Gweedore area. During that year he transferred to the Gweedore club but continued to play for Kerry and, in fact, played in that year's All-Ireland final and replay v Offaly. During a most enjoyable year he remembers many an exciting game in Maghergallon and throughout the county with a Gweedore team that included county stars at the time, Anton Carroll and Neilly Gallagher. He has fond memories of that period and though he did not have championship success he enjoyed his football and was particularly impressed by the successful St. Joseph's team of the

In a most successful career, Seamus won two All-Ireland minor medals with Kerry as goalkeeper in 1962 and 1963. An interesting member of the '63 team was Arthur Spring, brother of Dick Spring, who went on to become a well-known golfer. In 1962 he togged out as a sub. in the All-Ireland final due to the regular sub. goalie's absence through injury but never received a medal.

In 1963 Seamus won a National League medal, the first of a number of such awards. His success at national level continued with an U-21 All-Ireland win in 1964, again between the posts. At that stage, a serious leg injury interrupted his career and he missed much of 1965 as a result.

On his conversion to left full-back Seamus found his true position and continued in that position until he retired from the game. He won All-Ireland senior medals in 1969 and 1970 but suffered the disappointment of defeat both in 1968 against Down when he was sub. and after a replay in 1972 by an excellent Offaly side captained by Tony McTague. That proved to be his last All-Ireland and he had retired



from inter-county football when Mick O'Dwyer's young lions took the country by storm in 1975.

Since he retired from competitive football Seamus has been deeply involved in underage football for both club and county. He now lives in Tralee and is involved with a mainly under-age club, Na Gael, and is a great believer in the theory that the future of the Association lies in our youth. He has had a number of stints as trainer and manager of Kerry minor teams and has had particular success in All-Ireland finals in 1975 and 1988. The 1975 team included Jack O'Shea, Charlie Nelligan, Mick Spillane and Sean Walsh who later became household names throughout the country.

Seamus is of the opinion that the standard is quite high today among the top counties but feels that Cork will be the team to beat again in 1991. He cites the in-depth strength of their panel as their most valuable asset. Kerry are going through a team building process and much progress has been made with talent from recent U-21 and minor successful teams and with patience and perseverence from everyone concerned success will come.

He will be unable to attend today's game due to a work commitment, when he is involved in the opening of a new community centre in the Kerry Gaeltacht. The centre is being officially opened by none other than Gaeltacht Minister of State, Pat 'The Cope' Gallagher. No doubt, at some stage, the conversation will turn to Gaelic football and today's game in Ballyshannon.

JACK'S RETURN

Celebrating his 33rd birthday in Australia, Jack O'Shea returned to Ireland this week with the honour of being named Man of the Series.

Now in the twilight of his career, Jacko seems to have got a new lease of life with his performances on the tour with Ireland.

He has been a household name on the Kerry team since 1977 and was a prominent member of the 4-in-a-row side from 1978 to 1981 — a team that is thought to be the best squad of players to represent any county in Ireland.

Jacko broke the mould that midfield players were just for winning high ball as he roamed the field looking for possession, backing up colleagues and frequently popping up in scoring positions. His scoring rate was very impressive but it is his energy and natural fitness and skill which has made him one of the greatest midfielders of all-time.

In recent times he has been appearing in various forward positions on Kerry line-outs but the games are usually not very old until Jack is called to once again man the vital midfield role.

In the corresponding fixture last year at this venue Jacko was only a substitute for the first half but it is remembered that when he came into the game in the second half he very nearly swung the game in Kerry's favour. Indeed, it took a last minute Manus Boyle free to give Donegal the points.



Jacko was the first success captain of an Irish team when he I them to victory over the Australia in 1985 and among his numero honours in the game are seven A Ireland medals (1978-'81; 1984-'81 three All-Ireland U-21 medals (197'76, '77), minor All-Ireland (1975), I All-Star awards in-a-row (1980 1935) and four Texaco Awards (198'81, '84 and '85) — the only player achieve this.

'Tis a Kerryman's clear understanding That, when to those colours he's true, He's wearing a mantle demanding The best that a mortal can do.''

Kerry are running out of heroes, memories fade fast. They have a glorious footballing past, it's true; today in the Fr. Tierney Park may well see the emergence of some new heroes from the Kingdom.

It's hardly a stage of their choosing, but the late '80s Kerry no longer can afford to be choosy, so Donegal had better watch out for a new Kerry, a Kerry playing eight u-21s and four more warming the bench. No Bomber, no Pat or Tom or, indeed, Mick Spillane, just a Jack of trumps coming back from Australia as Caesar might have from Gaul, laden with new accolades, new trinkets — they'll hardly dazzle a plumber whose real expression of craft is with a football, not a wrench.

Kerry are never fit in November — until now — they never had to be. This time out Donegal are leading Division One, they are Ulster champions, they are favourites and that is uncomfortable.

Donegal are favourites, Kerry ARE fit; worse, they're hungry and it is no cliche when they talk about "respecting" Donegal. That alone makes Donegal's task all the more difficult, even at home, even in a tonow happy hunting ground called Fr. Tierney Park.

Last time out Donegal snatched victory thanks to a splendid pointed free in the final minute, scored by Manus Boyle.

Since then Kerry have remained under the red shadow of Cork, the



Munster final didn't work out at all, the League had to be taken seriously, perhaps for the first time in a decade? Against Armagh, while Donegal were beating Dublin 2-11 to 1-9, Kerry were heading for an eventual four point defeat, 3-6 to 1-8.

Three weeks later, October 21st, the first real hint of something special emerged from an 18 points to 2-7 victory over Roscommon at Killarney.


Only leading by three points 0-11 to 2-2 at the break, Kerry turned into the elements and allowed Roscommon only five more points to their seven.

Maurice Fitzgerald finished with 13 points, six in the first half, 12 of them from frees. Last Sunday Kildare proved easy meat in a challenge, the indications from Newbridge were all about a fit, sharp and accurate, if young, Kerry side. De ja vu? A young team from Kerry started something special in 1975, this time out, backboned by an under-21 side who have won this year's All-Ireland crown, Kerry come to Donegal.

We may not know this Kerry side VET

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



TONY BOYLE COMES OF AGE

The headlines jumped out of the national media, "Boyle called into Donegal team, youngster to face Lyons". The date, August 15th, four days before Donegal played Meath in the All-Ireland football semi-final in Croke Park. Brian McEniff had just released his team — Tony Boyle was about to come of age.


Few Donegal folk will need reminding of the result in Croke Park but many as they performed their 'post mortems' in the cold comfort of appropriate establishments afterwards were in unison that "young Boyle" was a player for the future.

A memorable point in the 6th minute of the game was a mere example of the talent in reserve. Tony admits openly that he had better games but attributes that to a combination of his own inexperience and the tactful display by veteran fullback, Mick Lyons, twelve years his elder.

Born in Dungloe it is hard to believe that Donegal's full forward for today's game is only 20 years old as he plays with a craft and maturity that way outnumber his age.

Tony is currently on temporary work placement with the Hospicare Engineering firm in Collooney as part of a diploma course he is studying at Sligo RTC. A measure of his commitment to the Donegal team is the fact that despite being based in Sligo he very rarely misses a county team training session.

We have come to expect nothing less from a player whose playing career blossomed at an early age while a student at the Rosses Communty School. In 1980 at the tender age of 10 he won a county championship medal with Rosses Rovers and three years later won a



county Og Sport title with Dungloe. He quickly points out that without the help of the members of the Dungloe club he would not be where he is today. "Every member and player helped me in some way but really it was men like Liam Reilly and Sean Ward who have helped me to play for Donegal," Tony said.

Success followed the Og Sport victory when he won two Ulster Vocational School titles with Donegal. In the first All-Ireland semi-final in 1986, Donegal were defeated by Kerry and it was the Kingdom who were again to defeat Donegal in the final a year later.

A Minor League medal in 1987 with Dungloe is also a treasured memento. Tony Boyle has represented Donegal at all levels from U-16 to senior. But it was while playing for the Donegal U-21 team this year that he came under the favourable notice of the Donegal senior selectors. A memorable performance against Derry prompted Brian McEniff to draft the young Dungloe man into a county panel for a challenge match against

Tyrone in conjunction with the opening of a new pitch in the county. He showed promise and was retained in the squad for another such outing, this time against Galway in Charlestown.

Throughout the Ulster Championship campaign, Tony sat on the bench, waiting for his call, but happy in the knowledge that he would get a run at some stage. It duly came in the closing minutes of an absorbing provincial final against Armagh. I remember interviewing Boyle afterwards and he said that he considered himself lucky to be part of the Donegal team and said it was just great to have won a provincial senior medal at such a young age.

After the Ulster final Brian McEniff and his merry men went south. Boyle was to be presented with his chance to impress. A magnificent game against Kerry was followed by an outstanding diaplay in Castlehaven (Larry Tompkins and Co.) against Cork when he scored five points.

There could only be one decision that Brian McEniff could make for the full forward berth — Boyle had to play. After shrugging off a troublesome knee injury, Boyle lined out at Croke Park in the All-Ireland semi-final.

"It was a marvellous occasion for me being so young. I scored a good point early in the match but a combination of the big occasion and perhaps the fact that I was playing against one of the most experienced full backs in the game contributed to a poor display. It has been the highlight of my carer to date. Hopefully, it is an experience I will learn by," Tony said.

When asked what his ambition was with Donegal, Tony said: "Well, at the moment all I want to do is hold down the full-forward position. There is so much competition for places in the team that no one is guaranteed a

start. Hopefully, we can have a goo run in the League and then, possibly go one better in the championship th year. We have a good draw in Ulste this year but we must remember the no game in this province is easy so w will have to be at the peak of or game."

He acknowledges the fact that h has received tremendous supportion the more experienced players in the county team, naming Anthon Molloy, Matt Gallagher and Marti McHugh specifically.

"They take me aside now and agai and give me some useful tips whic is a great help," Tony said.

Tony Boyle is a fine example to the young players in the county of what can be achieved by dedication and willingness to listen to those more experienced than himself! Certain! Tony Boyle is going to be a player that we are going to be hearing a lot more of in the year ahead.

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KERRY'S EMERGING STARS

Micky O'Sullivan and his fellow selectors took over the Kerry team just a year ago — at the start of the '89/90 league campaign.

It was an undistinguished league for the Kerryman who just avoided relegation. This in itself was an achievement as Kerry had to build almost a completely new team.

Hand-in-hand with the league the senior selectors concentrated on the U-21 team and duly achieved All-Ireland success. However, a disastrous outing against Cork in the Munster final left an air of doom in the county.

However, the recent wins over Roscommon in the league and Kildare in the challenge once again have given new hope that the young players will restore Kerry's footballing tradition.

BACKGROUND

Many of the newer players have experience of under-age success with the winning of the minor All-Ireland in 1988 and the reaching of the 1987 U-21 All-Ireland final where they lost to Donegal after a replay. In addition the U-21's won the Munster final in 1988 while the minors have won three in-a-row in Munster. Many of the stars of these successes are now graduating to the senior panel.

TEAM

Jack O'Shea just back from Australia, gives the team vital leadership but only Connie Murphy, Ambrose Donovan and Maurice Fitzgerald are well know. In all nine of today's side played in the U-21 side that won that year's All-Ireland. Four more U-21's are included in the substitute.

Peter O'Leary of Killarney Legior has replaced the injured Charlie Nelligan. He has vast experience with both minors and U-21's.

Kyran Culhane of Ballylongford has been part of the Kerry panel for 5 to 6 years has played well at full back in the Roscommon game. Aged 25, he could solve a problem position fo Kerry.

Liam Flaherty (U-21) makes his debut with the seniors after showing good form in recent challenges.

Jim Burke was U-21 full back bu is equally effective anywhere from ful back to mid-field.

Vincent Knightly (U-21) was a member of the Co. Champions West Kerry and could be the solution to one of Kerry's problem positions.

Stephen Stack holds All-Ireland senior medal since 1986 but after a two year absence, is now reestablishing himself in the team.

Fintan Ashe (U-21) is a tall mid fielder who starred in the 1988 mino success. His displays with West Kern in the championship earned him a senior call up.

Eamonn Breen played as centre back on the U-21 side but was very impressive in his forward position against Roscommon.

Sean McElligott at 25 is one of the older players to make the breakthrough. A tendency to injurie hasn't helped him.
