MATT GALLAGHER

Club: Naomh Bríd. Job: Salesman. Age: 29. Height: 5'11". Weight: 13st. Matt is regarded by many Donegal supporters as the best defender, Donegal have produced in the 80's. Having learned his skills playing under-age with Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon and De La Salle College, Ballyshannon. He won an All-Ireland B Colleges with De La Salle in 1980 and an All-Ireland U-21 with Donegal in 1982 when his local area decided to form their own Junior Club in 1981 Matt was at the fore. And tremendous efforts and committments resulted in Junior and Intermediate Championships returning to the Laghy-Ballintra Club in the 80's. Winning the Ulster Championship in 1990 he feels has taken much pressure away from the team as many said they havnt't got what it took to achieve glory. His normal position of corner back is not where he starts today as an injury to regular full back Sean Bonner has resulted in Matt moving to full back a task he will relish and keenly contest.



JOHN JOE DOHERTY:

Club: Naomh Columba. Job: Publican. Age: 23. Height: 5'10". Weight: 12st. The gallant John Joe is the calm quiet gentleman of the team who gets on with doing his defensive job quietly and effectively and truly enjoys his game of football. John Joe holds a unique record in GAA circles in Donegal having won Ulster Championships at Minor in 1985, U-21 in 1987 and Senior in 1990. A nice hat-trick. He was captain of his club Naomh Columba, Glencolmcille when they won the Donegal Senior League in 1988 and the Senior League and Championship double in 1990.

MANUS BOYLE:

Club: Killybegs. Job: Fishing Industry Netmaker. Age: 25. Height: 6'0". Weight: 12st.7. Manus grew up in Killybegs, the heart of the fishing world on the North West coast. A netmaker during the week and a net breaker most Sundays. He won Championships at all under age levels with the Killybegs Club and the ultimate at Club level in Senior Championship in 1988. Manus is well remembered for his performance in the 1987 All-Ireland U-21 Final against Kerry when he scored a personal tally of 1-7. He was worked at his free taking and finds the range on a regular basis for Donegal in recent years scoring 0-5 against Cavan in the 1st round this year. His ambition is to win Sam Maguire for Donegal - and play more often in Croke Park. A TRUMP CARD

It's not often that any Ulster Championship game has thrown up the kind of intricate set of circumstances as has today's semi-final meeting between Donegal (holders) and rank outsiders, Fermanagh.

It all stems directly from P.J. McGowan's managership of the Lakeland county for, prior to taking up the appointment just over a year ago, he worked closely, as player, trainer and assistant under and with his Donegal counterpart, Brian McEniff.

In fact, it was Brian who brought the Sean McCumhaills star into the Donegal senior squad in 1973, after having served under him as a county Minor. Then, in the early 80's, when P.J. was about finishing his county career, he was appointed trainer of the county senior team of which Brian McEniff was manager and was his assistant up until 1986.

The following year, P.J. was manager of the All-Ireland winning Donegal U-21 side of which there are eight players on today's panel five of whom played against Cavan.

So, all in all, today's managers have a lot in common, with the odds stacked against McEniff, one would suspect, in each other's knowledge of their opposing players' strengths and weaknesses." Tom, Brian and myself would be in contact most weeks with regard to football matters - except for the last 4 weeks. I suppose you could say there's a cold war going on at the moment but, no doubt, when today is over, we'll be back to where we were," P.J. commented.

On paper, it is a David and Goliath encounter. Take the 1990 - '91 NFL where Fermanagh failed to get out of Div. 3 and where Donegal, hitherto unbeaten, fell to Kildare in the semi-final

Take last year's All-Ireland Championship where, after coping with an alarming number of injuries to win out in Ulster, Donegal went under to Meath at Croke Park after late goals from Stafford and Flynn.

Take almost anything, not least any Donegal supporter - but don't take for granted the word of any of today's Donegal players, as last year's Ulster GAA Writers 'Player of the Year,' Martin Shevlin underlined.

"For starters, the players are taking today's game very seriously. Not so long ago, we were in the same situation as Fermanagh when we used to play the likes of Dublin and Meath and we were never expected to beat them. Today, it has just turned around and we can hold our own with them - so, Fermanagh are in the same situation."

Martin readily admitted Fermanagh held a trump card in P.J. McGowan's inner knowledge of the Donegal panel and, as for Fermanagh, he and the rest of the players had watched televised highlights of their win over Antrim - and were greatly impressed.

"They're young, fast, eager and very keen to win and one thing we did notice about them was when the first (Antrim) goal was put in."

"A lot of teams, especially away from home, would have hung their heads - but they didn't. They came back and put it behind them and won the game very handy. They looked very, very fit - but, so again are we."

But, perhaps the last salvo in today's Cold War should be left with P.J. McGowan: "I think we have a chance. We will be outsiders, certainly, but that's the way we like it. On the day, if our lads perform, who knows?"

Snippets DONEGAL V. FERMANAGH by Adrian Logan

In their win over Antrim Fermanagh scored 3-12 with Paul Coyle scoring 1-4 and Mark Gallagher grabbing 1-2. In fact both players come from the Devenish club who provided the entire full back line and the entire full forward line. For good measure substitute Johnny Leonard also came on and scored a point. And who does he play for? You've guessed it.

Honours have been few and far between for Fermanagh although they did win an All-Ireland title back in 1959 at Junior level. They've taken Ulster titles at Under 21 level and last won the Dr. McKenna Cup in 1977. Their last Ulster Senior semi-final win was back in 1982 that was against Tyrone Will the Tyrone venue act as a good omen.

The Donegal manager Brian McEniff is one of the greats in Gaelic football. As a player he won an All-star in 1972 and Railway Cup medals in 1970 and 1971. He won Ulster SFC medals in 1972 and 1974. He's also successful as a manager in control of the winning teams in '72, '74, '83 and of course last season.

Donegal have won the Ulster Minor title twice in 1956 and 1985 but Fermanagh have never won the trophy.

Fermanagh's first ever appearance in the Ulster Senior championship final was back in 1914 when they lost to Monaghan 2-4 to 0-2. The match was played at Newbliss on August 23rd. Donegal's first appearance in an Ulster final was 1963. They lost 2-11 to 1-4 against Down.

Today's senior referee Michael Cranny is a member of the Glen club with whom he won a Senior Football championship in 1963. He's refereed Senior County Finals Ulster Minor, Under 21 and was in control of the Senior championship final Monaghan against Tyrone.

FERMANAGH PROFILES

MALACHY O'ROURKE

It is customary after matches, particularly if Fermanagh win, for Malachy O'Rourke to meet up afterwards with his old St. Mary's Teacher Training College 1987 Sigerson Cup-winning Fermanagh buddies, John Reihill and Fergal McCann and talk about old times. Such a get-together would be well worth seeing should Fermanagh topple Donegal today - and, given Malachy's prowess at spot-kicks, the outcome could depend on him. But, when it was put to him that there were few games in which he didn't score, he was frank in his reply: "Some days it goes well enough; other days you just be out of luck."

Today, he renews rivalry with Martin Shevlin, the two having been in direct opposition when the counties met in a challenge game earlier this year: "He was good that day. I suppose his (football) reputation goes before him but, there again, reputations are made to be knocked down."



Fermanagh were soundly beaten in that match but, today, Malachy feels Fermanagh can make the issue a lot closer.

A 24-year old teacher in St. Joseph's Secondary School, Enniskillen, he has secured footballing success with the boys there in his first academic year and enjoys working with them.

Will Shevlin be sailing at the end of today's game, as he was at the end of the previous encounter? If he's not, then look out for the Three Musketeers.

Enniskillen clubman, John Reihill seemed a little embarassed when it was put to him that he and Fergal McCann were now automatic midfield choices for Fermanagh: 'Colm McCreesh would be very close,' was his reply.

"We're tall enough but I don't know about anything else. We do well enough in most games and if you're talking about 50-50 possession, we're doing OK."

John felt the team as a whole needed 60-40 possession at least to be sure of winning any match and he was heartened by the fact that he and Fergal about broke even against Antrim - and victory was secured. "There's no reason at all why we can't do that against Donegal. I don't see their midfield as particularly strong. It's good and steady, but nothing spectacular."

The past couple of years have been personally happy for him - securing a teaching post in his home town (St. Michael's Primary School) in '89 and marriage last year around this time.

He finds the kids at school especially alert to his mannerisms: "They've been slagging me about spitting after I scored a point against Antrim. All I did was spit out while running back up the field and they didn't miss it."

But, slagging or not, he is looking forward to their noisy support again today and feels he and the players can offer them something to cheer about; "I am confident. I don't see any reason not to be."

Fermanagh's full-back and captain, Bart O'Brien, on the surface, appears to be a serious young man but suggestions in the media that Donegal will win today's game by a double margin had him smiling broadly.

"Most people are writing us off like that all I keep saying is let's have some more. We don't mind. Donegal are a good team and while I don't know how many teams are in front of them this year, they were the third or fourth best team in Ireland last year.

"But, Ulster football is very unpredictable and you never really know who will come good. If Fermanagh play to their potential, I would say

that two-figure margin that's predicted between us and Donegal will be an awful lot smaller."

A 26-year old joiner, Bart makes light of the burden of captaincy and, in fact, has been lately playing his best football in years. 'If there's a good bunch of players around you, it doesn't make any difference who the captain is,' is his philosophy.

He's one of seven Devenish players in the squad and one of five on today's line-out, Damien McGarrigle, one of an all-Devenish full back line, having to cry off; but, the captain was generous in his praise of his replacement, Ciaran Carey: "He has trained hard and played on the team against Monaghan (in a challenge game) and I thought he had a grat game againt Stephen McGinty, a very highly-rated player."

"I suppose it has been a hectic couple of months, really, trying to alternate Minor with Senior training."

Such is life for Fermanagh's (senior) corner-back for today's game, Ciaran Carey, called in as a late replacement for the injured Damien Mcgarrigle. 24-year old Ciaran, a teacher in St. Ronan's Primary School, Lisnaskea is trainer to the county Minor squad and is certainly one of only a few seniors with dual responsibility in an Ulster Championship semi-final day.

He intends remaining on the sideline at Healy Park till half-time in the Minor clash before gearing himself up for Donegal. Should the Minors win, it would give the Seniors a lift but he believes the atmosphere of

the big occasion will make his own team single-minded as to what they're about.

"I would reckon before today the importance of the thing hasn't hit the Minors and a lot didn't realise they were playing in an important match. But, we would be hopeful of doing well."

This is Ciaran's third Championship and, having come in as a replacement, he naturally felt sorry for Damien McGarrigle; but, he realises there will be no time for sentimentality once the ball is thrown in: "Everybody wants to play on the big day and, after you've been selected, it's a matter of going out and producing the goods.

"I suppose we will have to play very well to beat Donegal but it's not outside the bounds of our capabilities."




