

"TOMORROW" NEVER COMES

Sunday, 6th June — the date set for the start of Donegal's defence of their Ulster and All-Ireland Championship titles — is just 14 weeks away from today. How prepared are the Donegal team to defend their titles?

We all know about the graveyard that is the Ulster Championship for the defending champions. Derry in 1975 and 1976 are the last side to retain their Ulster crown — and it is difficult to see it being any easier in 1993.

With apologies to Antrim, Donegal have a reasonably favourable draw but a lot will depend on their attitude and appetite for the long haul that must go into the preparation.

That preparation must get underway in earnest in the very near future. The same talent is still there — with an added confidence that had been missing until last Summer.

However, despite all the talent in the world if 1992 has taught us anything it is that the preparation and physical well-being for the challenge is of the utmost importance.

I don't know why it has taken me so long to get to the point, i.e., there is a strong concern among supporters that the Donegal panel are finding it difficult to shed the social circuit attached to success. There is always "one more" function and it is that "one more" function which postpones the training session until tomorrow.

The revelation at the weekend that between the Monday and Thursday of the week before last county captain, Anthony Molloy was asked to fulfil seven different engagments brought it

home to me that the public are not being fair to the captain, manager and the rest of the panel.

A refusal causes offence, so the players and manager are left in a very difficult position which can only find a solution with the people making the demands.

The time has surely come for the people within the county to 'back off' and give the panel breathing space. It is only with that breathing space that they can begin the preparations in earnest. Whether they qualify today or in two weeks time (as they must surely do) for the play-off stages of the National League, the panel will face difficult and competitive games which must be approached in a professional manner. That is apart altogether from preparing for the Ulster Championship.

If the social burden is not lifted in that period then again the training session is again put off until tomorrow.

The problem about that is "tomorrow" never comes.

Good luck to both teams

Declan Bonner - Jack and Master of both games

Most inter-county footballers are happy to take life easy when they aren't on playing duty on Sundays during the winter months. However, Declan Bonner, Donegal's gifted attacker, has been doing the opposite over the past number of Sundays.

Three weeks ago, the flame-haired Na Rossa man made the long journey south with Finn Harps, and made a significant contribution in the Ballybofey-based League of Ireland side's hard-earned scoreless draw.

The previous Wednesday, the sharp-shooting utility player scored a glorious free kick against St. James' Gate in what was his first game for Finn Harps for 12 months.

Scorer of 18 points in Donegal's memorable championship run last season, Bonner made a dramatic recovery from a serious pelvic injury which almost ended his playing career just over a year ago.

The manner in which he fought his way to peak fitness in a relatively short time epitomises the fighting spirit he possesses.

"At the time, I suppose I did fear the worst. But I rested for a while, and looking back now, everything really fell into place for me," insists the modest Bonner, who has always been a favourite with the ever growing band of Donegal supporters.

Declan was Donegal's top scorer in the 1990/'91 National Football League campaign, when he notched up an impressive tally of 3-21. In Donegal's five League games so far this season, he has chalked up 1-11.

Bonner, who began his career with Finn Harps at the end of the 80's, and returned for a second spell when he impressed former Harps boss, John O'Neill before the 1991/'92 season began,



is one of the few players in the county, let alone in the country, who is both Jack and Master of both gaelic and soccer.

His will to win a skill on the field, coupled with his good nature off it has made him one of the most respected sporting figures in the North West.

In the corresponding fixture two years ago, Bonner was Donegal's top scorer in the 1-9 to 1-6 victory when he scored 1-4 when he lined out at centre-half forward. One suspects that the Na Rossa man who has built up a formidable partnership in front of the target with Donegal full forward Tony Boyle - won't be far away from being the game's top scorer this afternoon again.

When 'Shov' Comes to Push

Undoubtedly the biggest cheer to reverberate around Mac Cumhaill Park today will go up if thirty-one years old Dunkineely man, Martin Shovlin, enters the fray.

"Shov" of course was ruled out of the All-Ireland final on September 20th due to a neck injury incurred in a training session in Donegal Town three days before the final.

He has not worn the Donegal jersey in a competitive match since the All-Ireland semi-final victory over Mayo on August 16th and the telephone technichan with Telecom Eireann was virtually on the treatment table up until three weeks ago. But counties throughout Ireland should take note that "Shov" is on his way back to full fitness and hungry for the All-Ireland medal as a player on the winning team, he so dearly missed.

"Words just cannot decribe how it felt to miss the final. It was without a doubt the biggest disappointment I ever had," he says.

"We were just knocking around in training on the Thursday night and after evading a challenge I got a sudden jerk in the neck. I stopped training straight away and got treatment from the physio. Since then it has been five months of treatment."

The decision to declare himself unfit to play in the All-Ireland final was heartbreaking and was made at the Finnstown Hotel, Lucan, just hours before throw-in.

"I went through a fitness test along with Brian McEniff, Michael Lafferty, Seamus Bonner and the team doctor. Although I did receive painkillers the pain seem to move down the back of my shoulders. For the sake of the team I had to take the decision not to play" Shovlin said.

"While obviously it was great to get a winners' medal it's not the same, having not played" he added.

A surgeon in the Mater Hospital, Dr. Tim O'Brien diagnosed the injury last month as being located in a joint and since rejoining the squad for training over three weeks ago, 'Shov' is happy to report that there has been a great improvement.

"Up until Christmas I was receiving treatment two or three nights per week. I did feature in a squad match in Ballybofey on January 17 but it was still uncomfortable. It was then that I went to Dr. O'Brien and he diagnosed the injury and prescribed treatment for it. I had also attended Dr. Pat O'Neill, the Dublin team manager," he said.

Typically "Shov" is eager to get back into the Donegal team although he admits frankly that the competition for places is extremely keen.

"I am available for selection. It is up to the manager if he wants to play me."

Martin began his career in gaelic football with

the formation of the Naomh Ultan club in 1972. He made fifteen championship appearances for Donegal and a total of sixtynine in all. He made his league debut in November '84 against Mayo and his championship debut against Armagh in 1988. Since then he has won a Railway Cup medal (1991), Ulster Senior Football Title medals in 1990, and 1992, and was the Ulster Sports Writers' Player of the Year in 1990 and Donegal Player of the Year in 1986.

He rates Jack O'Shea (Kerry) and Dave Barry (Cork) as his toughest opponents and also admitted that Derry's Dermot McNicholl was "a little hard to handle" as well.

Aside from football, Martin enjoys a spot of fishing and squash although recently due to his injury he had been unable to play the game. He is married to Mary (nee Cannon) a former secretary of the Naomh Ultan club.

Martin said that he was grateful to the people who sent letters to him after missing the All-Ireland final and the disappointment was made up for shortly after the final with the birth of his second child, Sarah. His son, Danny two years old is following his father's footsteps and enjoys kicking football around the family home.

Martin believes that sometimes people do not fully appreciate the effort and committment players make for a county team. "He explained that in the build up to the All-Ireland players would go straight from work in the evening to training which often meant that they would leave home at 8 a.m. and not return until 11.30 that night.

He firmly believes that players should be well "looked after" expenses wise and thinks a Players Union would be a good idea.

Recent forecasts putting Donegal at odds of 10/1 to win the All-Ireland behind Kerry and Dublin is just the incentive that Donegal need to retain the title, according to "Shov."

"I was a member of the All-Ireland Under-21 squad of 1982. I had been on the team up until I fell off a pole at work and injured myself. Missing the All-Ireland final last year was like lightning had struck twice" Martin said.

The Ulster final against Derry last year and the All-Ireland semi-final against Meath in 1990 are the two most memorable games he has had for Donegal.

The man who took his place in the All-Ireland final, John Joe Doherty told me after the final in the dressing room that if any player needed incentive to win "Sam" all they had to do was look at the expression on Martin Shovlin's face.

Missing the final was obviously sore for the Dunkineely man but he was determined to get back again in 1993.

Cork Football at Crossroads

The days of wine and roses are over for the moment at any rate and following the heady triumphs of not so long ago Cork football currently finds itself at a crossroads.

The phenomenal record of success at under 21 level coinciding with the arrival on Leeside of Larry Tompkins and Shea Fahy provided the launching pad for the establishment of a golden age. True there were teething problems and the path to glory did not run smooth.

But despite two traumatic All-Ireland final losses to Meath the pinnacle of success was reached in 1989 when for the first time in the history of the county a memorable league-championship double was recorded. Back to back All-Ireland successes were enshrined for posterity in 1990. Cork football was at an all time high. The future promised even greater things particularly with Kerry receding into the shadows after the Kingdom's

long sojourn at the helm of Gaelic football affairs.

In the Munster semi-final of 1991 however Cork made the fatal mistake of underestimating Kerry and have paid dearly since. Vibrant three in-a-row All-Ireland ambitions about it went up in smoke and to be truthful about it Cork football has never really recovered from that dagger-blow inflicted in Killarney.

Matters were not helped last season when Cork failed to make the knock-out stages of the Royal Liver National League and were trounced by Kerry in the first round of the championship on their home ground of Pairc Ui Chaolmh.

Many believe however that with one good, prestigious victory under their belt Cork's footballing fortunes can be resurrected. Certainly a step in that direction would be taken today if the All-Ireland champions were to be beaten on their native heath. This is certainly a game of crucial importance for Cork.

CRUNCH MATCH FOR BOTH TEAMS

As the National Football League reaches its most interesting and hard-fought stages, the importance at this late juncture in the campaign has become heightened by the fact that poor performances could result in division two or even division three next season.

That is the situation facing Cork as they make the marathon trip north today. Currently joint third in Section B on seven points, the Rebel County have had an indifferent season thus far.

In direct contrast to Donegal, their recent fortunes have been in the decendency. Their All-Ireland titles are but a fleeting memory as they struggle to ensure first division football for the tens of thousands of Cork faithful next

And with Donegal blazing away at the top of the group with five wins from five starts, Cork will know only too well that a victory is vital if they are to halt a possible slide down the National League.

Already they have lost to Kildare and been held to a draw by Leitrim in Carrick-on-Shannon. A defeat at the hand of Donegal would see them lose almost all chance of finishing in the top two of Section B. They would then face Tipperary at home on March 14th and could only expect a total of nine points, a figure that is unlikely to guarantee top quality teams at Pairc Ui Caoimh in 1994.

You don't have to tell Donegal supporters that their's is a different story. Unbeaten since the first round of the Ulster championship ten months ago, they are having their best ever run of success.

One more win will guarantee a spot in next year's NFL division one and treasurer Danny McNamee will have less problems balancing the books. Today's home game against Cork is followed by a trip to Longford, a side who haven't exactly been setting the world on fire of late with only one win in five outings.

So should they win against Cork today, a full seven wins out of seven starts is not an impossibility for Anthony Molloy's men.

However, it seems unlikely that there will be any over confidence in the Donegal dressing room in MacCumhaill Park today. Last fortnight's Tipperary trip, while maintaining the unbeaten run, hardly inspired much confidence in the supporters who made the long journey to Thurles.

Donegal, while evidently confident and talented, lacked a fitness edge and only performed in fits and starts. Brian McEniff has promised us a different story today... and it most likely will have to be if Donegal are to obtain another two points.

But a lot of water has passed under the bridge since then. There have been injuries and there have been changes. A couple of undistinguished games in Carlow and Tipperary have demonstrated the champions possible fallibility and it's to this that Cork will look for inspiration.

In all fairness however, wins against Kildare, Leitrim and Cavan all counted for something and no team goes ten months unbeaten without having established a very, very successful style of preparation and football.

Yet as Donegal's run stretches on and on, more and more of us are thinking of Derry's fortunes last year. They won the National League without dropping a point. They stormed into the Ulster final - seemingly invincible and odds-on to take the Sam north, but then it all fell apart at the seams.

Some have argued that the confidence inspired by the Oak Leaf men's long run of success was the cause of their eventual downfall against an unfancied Donegal. There is, they would add, a salutory lesson for the men of Tirconnaill in Derry's tale of woe.

Yet you can't wish anything other than success for your county, and given a solid performance and a victory today, most supporters will be satisfied with Donegal's progress since lifting Sam five months ago.

They will have qualified for the play-off stages of the league and will be guaranteed the likes of Down, Galway, Kerry, Mayo and possibly Dublin, Clare, Derry or Offaly at MacCumhaill Park next year.

And qualification must be the number one priority in Brian McEniff's mind. A victory today is essential to that plan and that's what his side will be striving for in front of thousands of Donegal faithful.

Cork should provide a stern test but the long journey may take a lot out of them, just as trips to Munster and Leinster seemed to sap the Donegal players' keenness.

McEniff has promised some of the oldguard will return and he has pledged that his players will have total commitment. Today's performance will be the acid-test of his comments.

One prominent GAA official revealed his roots as a Kerryman when he commented acidly; "I wish to Christ it had happened twelve months ago."

That is a reflection of the esteem in which Clare football is now held and a reflection of the magnitude of the task which faces Billy Morgan and Cork when they travel to Ennis on May 30 for the first round of the Munster championship.

Since Morgan and his marvellously talented team won the All-Ireland title in 1990 the football landscape has changed dramatically. The only certainty about the championship and League now is the uncertainty.

Clare's emergence as a power in 1922 and the proof over the winter that they could stay the pace has provided only some of the ingredients of change. The rest has come from Donegal and, to a lesser extent, Down.

No longer can the teams which have traditionally dominated in their own provinces and at national level take anything for granted. The upstarts have grown up and are now competing on a level pitch.

It would be fanciful to suggest that every county now has a chance of winning honours. Some have remained in the dark ages, have failed to take the hint from Clare and Donegal that hard work, attention to detail and fierce commitments will bring about an improvement in results.

Cork themselves laboured for a dozen years under the shadow of "the greatest team of all time". It took organisation, determination and gut-wrenching determination to remain competitive and ready to seize the chance when it eventually came.

Many of the Donegal players who are currently basking in their deserved glory of the All-Ireland success would have been forgiven if they had cried enough was enough. But they would never have forgiven themselves.




The Greene Cup is sponsored by Alfie Greene and he also gives the Cup a subscription every year.
