

Someone, and I would imagine that he had a considerable quantity of wisdom, perhaps more than I could ever hope to have, remarked that "There is much good sleep in an old story".

And that, I am certain, would apply to the little story I am now about to tell you. Quite a few of you will have heard it before ... but seeing that Donegal are back here at Croke Park, this time to take on the Dubs, you'll forgive me if I dust it off again and give it yet another airing.

But first, just a word or two about the central character of the story ... my late and always lamented friend Joe Keohane of Kerry, one of the most delightful and extraordinary personalities I have ever known in our ancient game of Gaelic football.

On the field Joe was a remarkable full-back, a player of immense and memorable quality and with his five All-Ireland medals, his place in the history of football is secure.

But there was another outrageously entertaining side to Joe. Off the field he was a thoroughly erudite conversationalist, a superb wit and an always engaging and particular friend.

It was wonderful to listen to him; sooner or later the impish and mischievous side of him would surface and not only was he provider of humour, he was also a source of humour.

Long before the late Bill Shankly made the legendary remark that the two worthwhile teams in English football were Liverpool and Liverpool reserves, I remember the day many years ago, back in

the 1950's when Joe offered his opinion that there were only two good teams in Gaelic Football ... Kerry and the Kerry substitutes.

And I remember too, when in good company one day, he made the striking remark that you could always hear Kerry men coming before you saw them ... and, without even the hint of a smile on that

genial face, he added ... "It's the jingle of the All-Ireland medals".

And I'm certain, too, that it was Joe who first created the line about the Kerryman with an inferiority complex ... he was the one with just the one All-Ireland medal! But let me move on to that story about Donegal...

Joe, as you will all remember, was an officer in our Army and it came to pass that during one summer he was posted to the Army camp at Finnure in Co. Donegal.

Word of his arrival soon spread through the G.A.A. strongholds of the county ... and almost inevitably, a little appeal was made to him that he might consider devoting a little time to Donegal's county team — and in those years, I should emphasise, Donegal football was at a reasonably low ebb.

Always delighted to be involved with the game he loved so much, Joe readily agreed to lend a hand ... and in due course, he turned up at various gatherings of the Donegal squad and gave his advice, guidance and help to the young men who had the ambitions to establish Donegal as a major power in football.

And there was the one final session

before Joe completed his duties at Finnure Camp and prepared to return to the south.

With his last chat to the players and officials ... and with all the sincerity he could muster, he gently explained the procedure that would be essential on the Hogan Stand in Croke Park after the end of a Donegal victory in the All-Ireland Football Final.

He singled out the captain of the team and, without a trace of even a smile, he pointed out that the Donegal captain should lift the Sam Maguire Cup from its plinth ... and then, most importantly of all, he should extend his hand to shake the hand of the Queen before holding the Sam Maguire Cup aloft in ecstatic triumph.

Someone queried ... "The Queen?"

And with a deadpan expression Joe uttered the solemn words ... "There will be a Queen again in Ireland by the time Donegal ever win an All-Ireland Football title".

But Joe always had his affection with Donegal ... and he had his pride and his hopes in the promising Donegal sides and in Brian McEniff and Paraic MacShea when they won the Ulster titles in 1972 and 1974.

The pity is that Joe did not live enough to be at Croke Park for Donegal's historic day in 1992 when the county took the Sam Maguire Cup for the first time.

The "Queen" wasn't there to present it ... but Joe would have relished the moment.

# Dublin footballers badly in need of points

Dublin go into this afternoon's fixture in a lowly and unusual position. Regular qualifiers for the play-off stages of the League they now find themselves pointless after two matches and propping up Division One of the Church and General National Football League. Their opponents — Donegal — on the other hand are in a totally different position. Two fine victories in their games see them sharing the lead in the Division and success this afternoon would make them certainties for the play-off stages.

However a defeat for Dublin would see them in serious trouble and the prospects of making the drop to Division Two would be enhanced.

Dublin started their League campaign with a home defeat by Meath and a fortnight ago they travelled to Killarney to face Kerry. They fielded just five of their All-Ireland final starting fifteen but with the wind at their backs they dominated the opening thirty minutes. By the break they had built up a 0-7 to 0-3 lead but this should have been considerably more as they were very wasteful in front of the posts.

They were still in front until they were rocked by a superb Kerry goal scored by Connor O'Donnell ten minutes into the second half and with 13 minutes remaining they were four points behind. With four minutes to go they were still three points behind but then newcomer Jason Sherlock struck with a marvellous individual goal that brought the sides level. However a John Crowley point 30 seconds from the end put Kerry in front and with Dublin being denied an opportunity of an equalising point, when referee Michael Curley ruled the game was over as Dublin substitute Andrew Stack was fouled in a scoring position, the Kingdom scraped home by a point. Final Score — Kerry 1-12; Dublin 1-11.

Donegal began their League campaign with a fine away victory over All-Ireland champions Down and continued their good form when they entertained Derry a fortnight ago.

Although they fell behind to a Dermot Dougan goal and trailed by 1-2 to 0-2 after the first quarter they soon stamped their superiority on proceedings to kick five good points and lead by 0-7 to 1-3 at half-time.

The second half saw them pull away with fine points from Manus Boyle, John Duffy, John Gildea, Tony Boyle and Manus Boyle and at the final whistle they were full value for their three points success. Final Score — Donegal 0-15; Derry 2-6.

Without a doubt Dublin will face a serious challenge this afternoon. Donegal under new manager P.J. McGowan are playing with confidence and after beating the All-Ireland champions of the last two years in the League to-date they will be anxious to notch a third valued scalp. Dublin on the other hand need the points if they are to avoid a battle against relegation. It should ensure a fine, competitive game.



# IAN ROBERTSON

The rise to prominence of Ballymun Kickhams' Ian Robertson will have come to no surprise to observers of Cumann na mBunscol football over the last ten years. Long before this talented young athlete captained the young dubs to Leinster minor honours he had blazed a trail through Primary School football with St. Joseph's N.S. Balcurris.

Marino proved too strong on the day but Robertson's display at centre-back hinted at greater things to come. That Junior defeat was soon forgotten as the Sciath Mhic Chraith title was won that same week.

In 1987 and 1988 Ian was firmly established as captain of the school team and got the opportunity to

climb the steps of the Hogan Stand in '88 when he took the Fingal League Cup to Ballymun. It was a fitting end to a glittering Primary School career and an amazing run of success for Balcurris N.S.

Ironically, Ian's teacher and football coach during this period was a native of Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal. He may have divided allegiance today but when it come to remembering Ian Robertson he is fulsome in his praise: "I always felt he was destined to wear the Dublin jersey. From the time he was in 2nd class he was totally committed. He wore the Dublin jersey to school when nobody else did. He was always first to training and was 100% committed to everything he did in and out of the classroom. He has the ability and the attitude to be a great success. The school is very proud of him".

Ian's success has continued with Secondary School and club since he left Primary School. He is currently vice-captain of Ballymun Kickhams. Cumann na mBunscol is also extremely proud of his achievements and we wish him a long and distinguished career in the sky blue jersey.

# DID YOU KNOW...

★ After two Rounds of Division One of the Church and General National Football League, Laois are way out in front in terms of scores. In their two games to date they have notched 3-31 (40 points) and are seven points clear of their nearest rivals Kerry who have scored 3-24 (33). Next are Donegal with 0-23 and Meath with 1-20 (23 points each), followed by Dublin with 1-18 (21 points), Derry with 2-14 (20 points) and Down with 0-18. Kildare have the worst scoring record having scored just 0-15 in their two games.

★ When it comes to defence Meath have the best record in Division One of the League to date. As Dublin found out in the first round it is not easy to penetrate the Royal County's defence as they have conceded just 0-14 so far. Next are Laois with 0-19 and Donegal with 2-13 (19 points each), followed by Kerry with 1-19 (22 points), Dublin with 1-20 (23 points), Down with 2-22 (28 points) and Kildare with 2-24 (30 points). Derry have the worst defensive record having conceded 1-32 (35 points).

★ The last meeting of Dublin and Donegal in the League was on the 7th of November 1993. On that occasion the Ulster side proved victorious on a 0-11 to 0-7 scoreline.


## NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUES 1994/95

### PLAYING RULES EXPERIMENTS —

1. That a player who takes a hand pass from a team mate shall not be permitted to play the ball away with the hand(s).
2. That when a team is awarded a free for an aggressive foul any player on that team will be permitted to take the free kick from the hands.
3. All kick-outs shall be taken from the 13m. line.




