



A Massive Bonus or a First Step



They say a week is a long time in politics. But Antrim followers have long ceased to talk in terms of weeks or even months. Instead, it's a famine stretching back a dozen years now that is their chief preoccupation.

Not since 1982 — and that seems like a lifetime ago — have Antrim managed to surmount the first hurdle in the Ulster championship. Since then frustration, disappointment and false dawns have been the Saffrons' lot.

Oh, yes, there have been encouraging displays — none better than last year's effort at Ballybofey — but the outcome has always been the same, defeat.

Now once again optimism permeates the ranks of Paul O'Hare's side. For them, today is D-DAY — a match that spawns hope, fuels ambitions of progress and ultimately decides the footballing destiny of the county.

But while Antrim approach their task on a wing and a prayer, Donegal enter the fray as the hottest of hot favourites — and with a major aim to fulfil. Two years ago Donegal were the undisputed kings of football — the Anglo Celt and Sam Maguire trophies adorned the Tir Conaill sideboard and all was well in the camp.

Since then injuries, near misses and not a little controversy have blighted Donegal's hopes of maintaining their position of eminence. Today, though, offers the doorway to glory again — and Brian McEniff's side have an extra reason for wanting to make 1994 THEIR year.

It is an open secret that this Ulster championship could well represent the last throw of the big-time dice for several members of the Donegal squad. Time waits for no man — especially those prone to injuries — and no one knows better than McEniff that a massive push, both physical and psychological, is required if Donegal are to not only reach the top of the Ulster tree again but complete phase two and bring Sam home to the welcoming Hills.

For Antrim, success today would be a massive bonus — a fillip that would undoubtedly filter down to the grassroots of football within the county and further enhance the work of such sterling administrators as Gerry Barry, Hugh McPoland, Frank Shannon, and the others who keep the county ticking week in and week out.

But for Donegal victory would be seen as the first step on what is perceived as the road to a final fling. That success of '92 bred the kind of aspirations which Brian McEniff's side have found difficult to shoulder but now the crunch has arrived.

The teams may go into action today against contrasting backgrounds — Antrim seeking a glimmer of hope for the future, Donegal with two eyes on the Ulster title and one eye on 'Sam' — but they have the capability, drive and incentive to take the championspip up a further notch following the massive injection it received at Celtic Park a week ago.



Donegal, according to all reports, are on the way back and Brian McEniff has been quietly putting the finishing touches to their preparation. Donegal, as always, will be hard to beat.


Incidentally, Celtic Park was a picture last Sunday and no doubt Casement today will be in excellent condition as always. All we need is a quality game.


