

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
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
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The Hegantys

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Forwards win Matches

SIXTEEN years ago Kieran Finlay secured his place in Monaghan folklore by scoring a goal and nine points against Donegal in the Ulster Final at Clones.

He scored all but six points of his team's 1-15 total as Monaghan lifted the Anglo Celt trophy after an

absence of 41 years.

It was a victory that marked the beginning of a glorious new era in Monaghan football and reinforced once again the value of a scoring forward.

Monaghan manager Michael McCormick will be hoping that Michael Slowey, Stephen McGinnity, Declan Smyth or even debutant Peter Duffy can assume that role this afternoon.

The visitors have been written off with indecent haste, cast in the role of also rans, but they are determined to have the last laugh.

How Donegal cope with the mantle of being red hot favourites will have a huge bearing on the outcome.

Victory over Down marked them out as genuine championship contenders, but that in itself brings inevitable pressures.

But by the same token victory that day in Clones will have restored both confidence and morale, severely bruised and dented after losing a league final to Derry.

Styles may have changed somewhat since Kieran Finlay's 1979 epic, but scoring forwards still win matches and Donegal's greater potency in this area could be the deciding factor.



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"THANKS MONAGHAN"

When it comes to representing Ulster at Croke Park, Monaghan has had more than its share of humiliation, suffering as they did, two of the heaviest defeats ever at the hands of Kerrymen. In 1930, when they reached their one and only All-Ireland Final, Monaghan were well beaten in one of the most one-sided Finals up to that time. Often described as the "Final Battle of the Civil War," Monaghan lost by 3-11 to 0-2. Champions Kerry, in the build-up of an amazing four-in-a-row, were backboned by veteran Republican fighters of the 1922-23 conflict, while Monaghan were equally backboned by soldiers of the then Free State army, and members of O'Duffy's relatively new Garda Siochana. The result was inevitable, but what most people seemed to forget was Monaghan's brilliant and historic victory over the great Kildare team of the period, in the semi-final, earlier that year.

Half a century later, when Monaghan regained the Ulster title after an amazing fortyone years lapse, they were again the whipping-boys for a Kerry team, going for yet
another four-in-a-row of titles. What most followers failed to realise was that no Ulster
team would have fared any better than did Monaghan on that occasion. Kerry teams
of 1930 and 1979 were two of the greatest Gaelic Football teams of all times. But
Monaghan honour was well and truly redeemed in 1985, however, when Peadar
O'Brien's two word heading "Thanks Monaghan" in the 'Irish Press' of Monday 12th
August, described Monaghan's truly heroic performance against the All-Ireland
champions the previous day in the 1985 semi-final, a game that had ended all-square
and marked Monaghan's greatest ever performance at GAA Headquarters.

DONEGAL'S BREAKTHROUGH

Following defeats in the 1963 and 1966 Ulster Finals, Donegal finally made the long-awaited breakthrough in 1973, and they did it in fine style too. On their way to that year's Ulster Final, they overcame Down and Cavan, then regarded as the two strongest football sides in Ulster, Down having taken three All-Ireland titles to the North the previous decade, and Cavan, the champions of four years earlier, and still probably the most formidable football force in the province. The Final against Tyrone could surely be described as one of the most historic ever in Ulster history – O'Neill versus O'Donnell. Tir Eoin v. Tir Chonaill. The two great kingdoms of the North, that had produced the greatest leaders in Irish political and military history, were now in opposition in friendly rivalry on a Gaelic Football pitch.

One wondered if the "Two Hughes" might be looking down in pride, and perhaps amusement, on the huge expanse of Clones on Sunday 30th July 1973, as Fintan Tierney threw in the ball to send these two great kingdoms into sporting battle. Eventually, Frankie McFeeley led his Donegal side to triumph, on a 2-13 to 1-11 scoreline, a victory that was well and truly celebrated with bonfires on practically every one of "The Hills of Donega." Ably abetting McFeeley were Pauric McShea, Anton Carroll, Declan O'Carroll, Brian McEniff, Martin Carney, Donal Monaghan and Company, and, at the conclusion, a brave Donegal supporter daringly went through the daunting and dangerous ritual of scaling a Clones goal-post, to nail his county's colours to the top of the mast for the first time in Gaelic Football history.

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A dame to Remember?

No matter what happens this afternoon Donegal's Paddy Hegarty has already had cause to celebrate this season.

A magnificent performance in the preliminary round against Down earned him the Ulster GAA Writers Merit Award for May, and why not. His was a particularly brilliant performance in what's been the game of the Championship so far. Donegal celebrated the defeat of the All-Ireland champions but in effect they won nothing and today is another chapter in the search for further glory.

Today too the pressure is on Donegal. At home to Monaghan and favourites here in Ballybofey, Hegarty knows Monaghan will be tough. "We have played Monaghan a few times this season and Monaghan are always difficult to beat. Today will be no exception," and today Hegarty and his team take on a Monaghan side who have been preparing quietly away from all the media hype. A strong performance in the League gave them the Division Four title and promotion to Division Three. That will have certainly boosted their confidence and they will travel to Donegal with no fears and nothing to lose.

Monaghan are a side who are beginning to reap the rewards of a strong Under 21 structure which has produced top class players such as Stephen McGinnity. Players like McGinnity can makes things happen and while Donegal will start as clear favourites, Monaghan supporters will arrive in Donegal today with a certain quiet optimism. Lets hope it's a game to remember.

Donegal v. Monaghan PREVIOUS ENCOUNTERS

In the past twenty years Donegal and Monaghan have met three times in the Senior Championship with Monaghan emerging victorious on two occasions. In each case the winners went on to win the Ulster title. In 1979 Monaghan won their first title in 41 years. In 1985 Monaghan went on to beat Derry in the Final while in 1983 Donegal went on to beat Cavan before a record attendance in 1983.

St. Patrick's College, Maghera may be regarded as a great footballing nursery – and rightly so – but the south Derry seat of learning has also provided more than its share of hurling stars over the years.

Only a matter of weeks ago St. Patrick's were in the All Ireland B Colleges Hurling Final in which they were defeated by Doon (Clare).

But there were mitigating circumstances – Debny McGrellis one of the mainstays of the Maghera outfit, was injured in the early stages of the match and had to retire.

Today though, along with several of his St. Patrick's College colleagues, he bounces back for the Minor Hurling semi-final against Down.

It's a match that the Derry management team of Seamus Doherty and P.J. McKenna are particularly keen to win. They know that the formidable presence of the Maghera contingent will bolster their chances against a Down side that is backboned by a new brand of Peninsula youngsters – players who hope to prove worthy successors to the Noel Keiths, Ger McGrattans, Noel Sands and Paddy Breniffe of this world.

But to succeed today Down will have to counter Derry's teamwork and cohesion. Players like Owen and Neil Farren and Michael Kelly have helped to give Derry hurling at under-age level a fresh image but, as everyone knows, its success and not image that the fans crave.

Several of the Derry side are dual stars and indeed no-one more so than Danny McGrellis.

In a Division Two football encounter the other day he emerged as Banagher's outstanding performer. And no wonder – he scored three goals and a point against luckless Faughanvale who were left in no doubt as to his many-sided talents.

Down are hopeful that they will not find him in such potent form this afternoon


