

Substitutes Play Vital Roles

Substitutes from Donegal played major roles in shaping the results of the last two meetings of Galway and the North-West county in the National Football League.

It is virtually eleven years since the last clash of the counties in the League and Manus Boyle proved a late hero for Donegal. On a December afternoon in 1987 at Tuam Stadium he went in as a substitute for the Ulster side in a Division II tie and scored a late point from a close-in free to earn his side a draw on a scoreline of 0-11 to the home county's 2-5.

Declan Bonner, now the Donegal senior team manager, was left full forward for the Northern county and scored two points.

It is interesting to look back on those teams:

Even more dramatic was a score by another Donegal substitute, Leslie McGettigan, when the Ulster county entertained Galway at Ballyshannon in 1986 in the concluding round of the divisional games in the 1985-86 National League.

A great second half revival by Galway brought them from arrears of six points at the interval to what appeared a match winning lead of two points with time virtually up.

But the age old maxim that a "game is never over until the final whistle" was strikingly brought home to Galway as they had victory snatched from their grasp with virtually the last kick of the match.

Stephen Joyce scored the two late points for Galway, but as victory loomed, up popped McGettigan to elude the Western cover and send a powerful drive to the Western net.

The 2-8 to 1-10 defeat proved costly for Galway as it ensured that they were relegated to Division III for the following season. They had just two wins in their seven outings in that campaign.

Those two games rank as the only meetings of Galway and Donegal in the National League since the competition was reorganised in 1980.



The Penalty Kick That Never Was

Although Galway and Donegal have not built up a long record of inter-county senior football rivalry over the years, they did provide a game that now commands a place in the folklore of the sport.

That game back on an early April afternoon in 1967 is remembered chiefly for the "penalty kick that never was".

Galway were then the top force in the game in the country, having won their third successive All-Ireland senior championship the previous September.

Naturally enough, they started firm favourites for the National League semi-final at Croke Park against Donegal, who had qualified for their second successive outing at that stage and only their fourth appearance in the penultimate round.

The Northerners far from being overawed by the reputation of their opponents or the big occasion, opened up as if they, and not Galway, were reigning national champions. On a wind swept day of sun and showers, they were 2-1 to 0-4 ahead after twenty five minutes, thanks to goals by centre half forward Sean Ferriter and left half forward Neilly Gallagher.

Donegal supporters were delighted by that great and unexpected start and they soon had more cause to jump for joy. Right half forward Des Houlihan broke through the Western defence and with the goalkeeper at his mercy was pulled down.

When referee Eamonn Moules, of Wicklow, signalled a penalty kick, the prospects of a first-ever appearance by Donegal in a League final looked very rosy indeed. A goal at that stage would have put Donegal a commanding six points in the lead and would undoubtedly have proven a great boost to morale.

Neilly Gallagher stepped up to take the penalty kick. He placed the ball twice before referee Moules blew the whistle. Then the elements took a hand. In the strong wind the ball moved and Gallagher ran up and handled the ball to reset it to his satisfaction.

The referee again blew his whistle and awarded a free out to Galway. A correct decision after the referee had earlier whistled for the penalty to be taken.

From that free, Galway went up field, won a free from which Cyril Dunne pointed. At half time, the then All-Ireland champions were just 2-3 to 0-5 in arrears and they had the better of the exchanges in the second half.

So much so that they conceded just a single point in the second half and ran out winners by 1–10 to 2–4. Cyril Dunne's expert finishing proved crucial for Galway. He finished top scorer on the day with six points.

So, the "penalty kick that never was" commands a unique ranking in the story of the National League and football in general.

Incidentally, Galway last won the National League title in 1981, their fourth crown. Donegal have still to win the League.
