

An Unusual Situation

Cavan the defending Ulster Senior Football Champions For a variety of reasons it was find themselves in an unusual situation this afternoon.

In previous years it was common practice to see the holders installed as one of the championship favourites.

But Liam Austin's men find themselves being written off with Donegal fancied by many as the team most likely to lift the Anglo Celt trophy next month.

Cavan in fairness have had to endure more than their share of heartbreak and setbacks since winning the Ulster title last July.

Three days after losing an All Ireland semi-final to Kerry they then lost inspirational manager Martin McHugh.

the New Year before they were able to come up with big Liam Austin as his replacement.

To complicate matters still further he then had to plan for the future without such notables as Stephen King, Damien O'Reilly and Peter Reilly.

Donegal too are a team in transition, but their transition has been much smoother boosted by a highly impressive league campaign.

Manager Declan Bonner will be happy with progress to date, but he's too long in the sport to take anything for granted least of all in an Ulster Championship semi-final against old adversaries Cavan.

CAVAN PLAYER PROFILE

Anthony Forde

Born in Limerick in 1976 to a Monaghan Father and a Limerick Mother who moved to Cavan a few week later. anthony Forde has been a great asset to Cavan football over the past number of years.

He figured on the Cavan U16 team in the Fr Manning Cup Inter County Tournament, the County Minor and U21 teams while also getting onto the Senior team in 1995. While with the U21 team they reached the final of the Hastings Cup in 1995 when they were beaten by Donegal. Interestingly that game was also the Ulster U21 final played in Enniskillen which went to a replay.

The following year he tasted his first major success when Cavan won the U21 Ulster Championship Final and lost the All Ireland Final narrowly to Kerry after a pulsating game in Thurles.

Few people will forget his equalising point in the first round of the Ulster S.F.C. last year against Fermanagh when he was part of the great panel of players who took the Anglo Celt Cup "Home" after an absence of 28 years.

Two weeks ago he again provided an inspirational point when moving up from his half back position to shoot over the bar when Cavan were in danger of losing their crown. The fact that he lives with lives with his parents Gerry and Eileen across the river from Belcoo no doubt gave much pleasure to his club mates in the Shannon Gaels club based in Blacklion.

He received his Second Level Education at St Clares Secondary School Manorhamilton where he won a medal in a Corn Breffni competition. During his time in Athlone RTC he won a Leinster Freshers Medal in 1995 while last year they won the Division 1 League final and got to the Sigerson Cup semi final only to be beaten by the eventual winners Tralee RTC.


CAVAN PLAYER PROFILE

Dermot McCabe

1997 was Cavans best year for many reasons and for Dermot in particular it is one he will long remember. After suffering the heartbreak of loosing the U21 All Ireland Final in Thurles in 1996 he captained the U21 team in 1997 and while they were defeated by Derry in the Ulster Semi Final Derry went on to take the All Ireland title. McCabe was an inspirational figure on the Cavan Senior team in last years Ulster Championship and gave a great performance in the Ulster Final. He received an Eircell All-Star Award - only the second Cavan man to be so honoured, Ollie Brady was Cavans sole All Star until then.

Dermot first donned the Cavan jersey in 1992 when played with the U16 team in the Fr Manning Cup. He played minor for 2 years - captaining the team in 1994. In the same year he made his debut for the Cavan senior team in the NFL against Antrim in Breffni Park on the 16th October before actually playing for the U21 team in the Hastings Cup in November.

He won a Railway Cup medal earlier this year to add to his Ulster U21 and Senior medals. He also holds a division 3 NFL medal. In Dundalk RTC he played for the college team and last year had their best run when they were defeated by Dublin Institute of Technology in the final of the Trench Cup. An interesting feature of the DIT team was that it featured his good friend and Cavan team mate Peter Reilly. On the club scene Dermot has 3 Senior Championship and League medals, Junior B and underage medals.





Memorable Clashes of the 90's

1990: Donegal 0-13, Cavan 0-9

This early clash of the modern-day Cavan and Donegal teams was memorable probably for all the wrong reasons. Referee Seamus Murray had his hands full and two players were sent off, nine booked, and a midfield melee all in the first half. Things settled somewhat for the second period. Cavan led at the interval by 0-6 to 0-5, but seemed to lose their way in the second period.

Ballybofey was again the venue and 20,000 spectators turn up on Sunday 3rd June 1991. Turning point came when Charlie Mulgrew was the hero by laying on a perfect pass for the goal that decided the issue. It was level at half time Donegal 1-4, Cavan 0-7.

Cavan's Best Performance 1948

Cavan's best performance (within Ulster) half a century ago was, unquestionably, their Ulster Final defeat of Antrim at Clones on Sunday 25th July 1948. Before 32,000 spectators, the All-Ireland champions gave a scintillating last quarter display that totally mesmerised their opponents. Despite having been pulled back to level pegging midway through the second half, they turned on the power in the final fifteen minutes and ended up deserving and decisive winners by 2-12 to 2-4. In that dynamic finish, spearheaded by Peter Donohue, they proved too strong for the Antrim men. The midfield superiority of Phil Brady and Tony Tighe; plus superb performances by Billy Doonan, PJ Duke and John Joe O'Reilly in defence, and devastating attacking play by Mick

Higgins, Peter Donohue, Victor Sherlock and Edwin Carolan, all ensured that the title was brought back to Breffni.

Donegal's Best Performance 1948

Donegal's best performance of half a century ago was their Dr Lagan Cup victory over Derry at Letterkenny in September 1948. After a season of disappointing defeats, Donegal finally came good in their concluding game of the National Football League, Division One (Lagan Cup). The start of the game was delayed an hour as the Derry team arrived late, but this did not deter the home side and they finished deserving winners by 2-5 to 1-4.

Making his county debut, local player E McMenamin had a field-day at centrefield, getting great support from his fellow midfielder Jim McFadden of Gweedore. Donegal suffered an early set-back when half-forward D Doherty had to retire injured and was replaced by B Gallagher.

Donegal trailed by 0-2 to 1-3 at the break, their first half points coming from H O'Donnell and B Gallagher, but they assumed control in the second period when Gallagher scored a goal and a point to put them level, and O'Donnell (gl), J Gallagher (pt) and H O'Donnell (pt) added the winning scores. he team was:- C Campbell, J McGlynn, Frank O'Donnell, B Coyle, P Brogan, H Boyle, Red Jack Gallagher, E McMenamin, J McFadden, C Boyle, D Doherty, O Carney, M Slevin, H O'Donnell and EJ McGonigle.

ST. TIGHEARNACH'S PARK, CLONES

GROUND REGULATIONS

- 1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
- 3. The consumption of intoxicating liquor is permitted only in authorised places and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
- 4. The unauthorised climbing of stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- 5. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- 6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
- 7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- 8. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
- 9. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
- 10. The Ground Management reserve the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochána.
- 11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground/arena any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- 13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligations under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to any one using the premises.


