


### Na Réiteoirí

### Henry Downey (Doire)





# "Derry This Time Round"

For years Down were automatically installed as Ulster Championship fabourites with little or no regard for current form.

Tradition it seemed was all that mattered, but then again when you were able to boast of All Ireland success in 1960, 1961 and 1968 with 1991 and 1994 still to come few were prepared to argue.

Now Derry have the dubious distinction of being the team the bookies have taken a shine to, but so far in the Nineties they have been the great under achievers of Ulster football.

Eleven years ago they beat Armagh to lift the Anglo Celt trophy, but have been unable to consolidate in the subsequent years apart from Ulster and All Ireland success in 1993.

Donegal marked their championship arrival in 1972 with an historic first Anglo Celt success before adding a second two years later.

They again enjoyed the sweet taste of championship glory in the Eighties and already twice in the Nineties embellished by All Ireland glory in 1992.

Twelve months ago they were totally outclassed by Cavan in a high scoring Ulster semi-final and it seemed they were destined for a long spell in the footballing wilderness.

But such are the vagaries of championship football that they now find themselves back in the Ulster decider reviving memories of recent final meetings with old adversaries Derry.

Derry and Donegal met twice in competitive games half a century ago – both games at Letterkenny. In the first of those Derry defeated the home side, 3-9 to 3-4 in the Dr. McKenna Cup and in the second Donegal got revenge by beating Derry, 2-5 to 1-4 in the Dr. Lagan Cup.

In the Dr. McKenna Cup on Sunday, 2nd May 1948, Derry's best were Roddy Gribben at midfield, Keenan and McCann in defence and Mullen and Niblock in attack, while Donegal were best served by Red Jack Gallagher, E. O'Donnell (Rosses Rovers), J. N. Doherty (Carndonagh), P. Watters (Ardara) and E. J. Gonigle (Corlea). Derry led at half-time by 2-2 to 1-2. The teams were:


### THEY MET IN TROUBLED TIMES

Donegal made their debut in the Ulster Championship in 1906, when they were defeated by Derry, 0-2 to 0-18. It was also Derry's Ulster debut — they had entered for the Championship previously in 1904, but gave a walk-over to Monaghan. They entered again in 1907, but again gave a walk-over to Monaghan.

In the troubled period of 1920-'21 these counties met twice, Derry winning on both occasions — 0-11 to 0-7 in 1920 and 2-1 to 0-4 in 1921. Newspapers of the time gave little mention to any of these clashes. "Sport", the main sports newspaper of the time, gave the following meagre preview to the 1920 clash, in its issue of Saturday, 22nd May, 1920:

"Donegal and Derry are listed for the 'Maiden City' in the Ulster Championship. Last year Donegal made an auspicious debut by defeating Tyrone at Strabane, and Derry ousted Fermanagh at Wattlesbridge, but both counties disappointed in the next round. We believe both counties have improved since and should give a good display, with a narrow winning margin." The result of the game was not given until six weeks later, in their issue of July 10th, 1920, when they recorded that Derry had won by 0-11 to 0-7.

### ST. TIGHEARNACH'S PARK, CLONES

### **GROUND REGULATIONS**

- 1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
- 3. The consumption of intoxicating liquor is permitted only in authorised places and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
- 4. The unauthorised climbing of stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- 5. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- 6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
- 7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- 8. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
- 9. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
- 10. The Ground Management reserve the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochána.
- 11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground/arena any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- 13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligations under Section 18 (3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to any one using the premises.

### New Rules? NO

Contrary to what some people are saying - there are no new rules in Football this summer. The National Referees' Committee decided that a determined, consistent approach should be made to tackle the following areas that were causing concern:

(a) Taking FREES from where the foul took place.

We have all seen players looking up and moving forward all the time. Referees were asked to ensure the free took place from the proper place.

(b) The Proper Handpass

The basic element of the handpass is that there must be a clear striking action - no throwing or slinging.

(c) Persistent foulding must be penalised

What is understood by Persistent Fouling? The Official Guide to the Playing Rules includes the following: To push or hold an opponent with the hand (s)

To use the fist on or around the body of an opponent for the purpose of dispossessing him of the ball.

To charge an opponent in the back or front.

These Fouls are distinguished from Fouls which merit a Caution e.g. To pull down an opponent, To trip and opponent with hand or foot, to jump at an opponent etc.

### What to do about Persistent Fouling?

The National Referees' Committee decided to tackle persistent fouling the following way:

- (I) For the First Offence, the player's NUMBER is noted. This is NOT a caution.
- (II) For the Second such Offence, the player is Cautioned in the normal way.
- (III) For the Third such Offence, the player is sent off.

At the beginning of the Championships, the Referees were brought together and were asked to implement the above guidelines. Each month, they were brought together again and games played in the previous month were reviewed in both hurling and football.

### Confusion between Cautions and Noting Numbers

The Committee accept that there has been confusion among commentators and spectator about whether a player has been cautioned or not. Actually, there hasn't been confusion among the players - they know they have been cautioned. The Committee have now decided that for the noting of the player's name, the referee clearly holds up one hand as he jots the number. For the second offence the player's name will be written in the book and he is cautioned in the normal way.

### Is the New System Working?

Again, we emphasise these are NOT New Rules. But we judge and many people, including players, agree - there is less pulling and dragging this Summer. There are less off-the-ball incidents. If that continues, them we will all enjoy our games more - especially the players who wish to play positive not negative football.

There's a touch of deja vu about today's Ulster Minor Football championship decider. I mean, both teams contested last year's decider and given that there are quite a number of players available again, it will be a case of 'fancy meeting you here again'.

And if the match itself throws up an interesting clash of styles, it also offers the absorbing prospect of a titanic midfield battle between four of the best engine room exponent in the province. Tyrone skipper Cormac McAnallen and his partner Kevin

But if Tyrone start favourites, then Antrim are the most determined of challengers. Manager Brian Coyle mapped out his plan for this champi-



### JORDANSTOWN SILVER JUBILEE

In 25 years the Gaelic Football Club has become the largest and most successful third level Club in the country. Jordanstown fields 6 football, 3 hurling, 3 camogie and 2 ladies football teams and boasts four of the finest Gaelic fields in the country. This year alone the Club entered 8 competitions, reached 8 finals and won 6 All-Ireland titles. Great credit is due to Gerard O'Reilly (Armagh), Paddy Farrell and Dessie McKenna (Tyrone), John Duffy (Cavan) and Oliver Cassidy (Fermanagh) for having the foresight and dedication to lay the foundation of this great Gaelic Club.

The Club's first break through came in 1976 when they entered and won the Freshers Championship. The following year in 1977 players like Mark Turley, Jim and John McCartan (Down), Kevin McCabe, James Devlin (Tyrone), James McAfee and Hugh Martin McGurk (Derry), Brian Canavan (Armagh) captured the Division II League and brought the Club to Division I, a position we have maintained ever since.

In 1985 the Ulster Polytechnic became the University of Ulster and the Club entered the prestigious Sigerson Cup competition. The next year under the management of Charlie Sweeney and Eamon Coleman, captain Colin Harney (Armagh) lifted the Sigerson Cup for the first time. Gerard Houlahan (Armagh) was voted player of the tournament. This feat was repeated the following year with D.J. Kane (Down) as captain and Barry Young (Derry) as player of the tournament. That year Jordanstown became the only Club to win the Division I, League and Sigerson Cup in the same season. Jordanstown has won twice as many Fresher's titles as any other institution and last year 1997, became the first Club to win the Division I and Division II Freshers Championship in the same year. This remarkable achievement has been repeated this year.

The community of Gaels at the Poly is now a well organised, highly motivated and committed band of players, administrators and supporters. This can be easily demonstrated by the fact that the Club played the first exhibition of Gaelic Games in Moscow in 1992, and was able to successfully raise in excess of £80,000 all through fundraising, for a month long tour of Australia in 1996.

To mark the celebration of 25 years of success the Gaelic Alumni are planning a number of celebratory events, beginning with a Silver Jubilee Banquet, attended by the GAA President, Joe McDonagh in the Slieve Russell Hotel on Friday 6'h November, 1998.


