





he first ever test between the countries attracted an attendance of 8,000 to Páirc Uí Chaoimh, but memories of that historic occasion are mixed with many recalling the ugly third-quarter dust-up rather than the infrequent patches of good football. With any new game there are bound to be teething problems, but it was the visitors tackling (most of which was overly robust) that caused particular ire among the hosts.

The opening quarter saw the home side settle quickly and by the end of the first quarter they had established an eight-point lead. However, the Australians dominated the second quarter scoring 22 points and conceding just three to turn over eleven to the good. Little divided the teams in the "infamous" third quarter at the end of which Australia led 49-39.

The visitors pulled well clear early in the final quarter, but two late goals narrowed Irish arrears to 13 points by the finish. Best for Australia were Garry McIntosh, Gary Pert, Brad Hardie, Murray Rance, Maurice Rioli, Ross Glendinning and Craig Bradley while Ireland were best served by Seamus McHugh, Jimmy Kerrigan, Tom Spillane, Jack O'Shea, Eoin Liston and Matt


week later at Croke Park a crowd of 12,500 was in attendance for the second test and they saw the home team emerge narrow victors. Although the tackling continued to be of the robust nature, the nasty niggling elements of the previous encounter disappeared, with particular credit going to the visitors in this regard. Indeed, most of the pulling and dragging was carried out by the home team.

Ireland had slightly the better of the opening quarter and turned over leading by 16 to 15 and that slight edge continued into the second period and at the interval they led by six points - 40-34. At the end of the third quarter it was 65-60 to Ireland, but with just two minutes remaining Australia had pulled level - 76 points each. However, Colm O'Rourke added an over and a behind before the end to give the home team the verdict.

nterest in the series had grown substantially and a crowd in excess of 32,000 made their way to Croke Park for the deciding test. It was a close contest with a late rally from the Australians giving them an exciting victory, but unfortunately some of the rougher edges of the opening test reappeared and three players - Robert DiPierdomenico, Craig Bradley and Greg Blaney - were sent off with a further six being booked.

Australia sprinted out of the blocks to establish an early 14-1 lead, but a brilliant Irish rally saw them turn over at the end of the first quarter leading by 18 to 17. At the end of the opening half Australia had edged back in front (36-35) and by the end of the third guarter they were five points to the good - 61-56. However, the home side started the final quarter in the ascendancy and led by 71-69 with just six minutes remaining, before overs by Daniels and Healy and a behind by Greene gave the visitors a five-point victory and the series.

week prior to this test Australia beat Alreland in a warm-up fixture by 60-51 at the Hands Oval in Banbury and at the Western Australia Cricket Association Oval at Perth the home country gave a repeat performance to win by seven points. However, after some violent scenes on the pitch, which resulted in five players - Pat O'Byrne, Pat Spillane, Gary Pert, Robert DiPierdomenico and Garry McIntosh being sent to the line, the future of the series looked in serious doubt.

The game itself saw the Australians use the breeze cleverly in the opening quarter to establish an early cushion, which Ireland were unable to overcome. The home side led throughout, although the visitors did have chances in the final quarter, but their kicking for overs let them down.

ix days later at the V.F.L. in Melbourne, Ireland levelled the series with a comfortable 16-point victory in a game that wasn't marred by the violent scenes of Perth. The ability of the Irish players to mark (field) and an improvement in their kicking for overs were the crucial elements of this

The visitors established an early advantage in the opening quarter, which they never subsequently lost, and turned over leading by 14 to 8. Despite being outplayed in the third quarter, Jimmy Kerrigan's goal allowed Ireland to turn over leading by 29 to 26. and early in the final quarter they killed off the game. Three overs and a converted penalty by John O'Driscoll were supplemented by overs from Kerrigan and Teddy McCarthy to make it 50-26, and with the outcome decided the game petered out.

reland had yet to win the opening game of a series, but they put that right when they won this contest by two points before 15,500 spectators at Croke Park. Australia elected to play with the breeze in the opening quarter, but Kieran Duff's goal allowed the locals to turn over on level terms - 13 points each. With the elements, the home team had the better of the second quarter and led at the break by 24-17.

However, the Australians dominated the third quarter and a goal by Richard Osborne helped them into a 37-31 lead with 20 minutes remaining. Two overs and a behind helped the visitors move 13 points clear early in the final quarter, but with seven minutes remaining Ireland were on level terms - 47 points apiece. Two overs from the locals brought one in reply from the visitors, and Bruce Linder's late shot from in front of the posts garnered only one point to give Ireland an historic win.

virtual identical attendance turned Aup for the second test, but they witnessed a totally different game as Australia powered to a 25-point win the biggest ever in the series. From the off the visitors looked a determined bunch and at the end of the first quarter they led by eleven points - 17 to 6. They continued to have the better of matters in the second quarter and were not flattered by an interval lead of 32-16.

Each side notched two goals in the third quarter - Jim Stynes and Chris Lewis for Australia, Niall Cahalane and Tom Spillane for Ireland - at the end of which Australia were still comfortable leaders -51-32. Halfway through the final period Sean Wright punched home the visitor's third goal to end the game as a contest, before Pat Spillane had a late consolation goal for a well-beaten home





The first five minutes of the second quarter was scoreless before Devenney notched overs at the 25th and 27th minutes to make it double scores (20-10), but three overs - Black and Bowden (two) and a behind (Lappin) had the sides level six minutes later. Australia continued on the offensive and further overs from Johnson and Harvey and a behind from Stuart Maxfield made it 27-20, before Padraig Joyce and Michael Donnellan's single-pointers sandwiched a behind from Black to leave the home side leading by 28-22 at half-time.

A brace of overs from Graham Geraghty within two minutes of the resumption made it 28 apiece, but a goal and an over from Caracella gave the Aussies a nine-point lead. That extended to ten at the 56th minute, but an over from John Crowley, a goal by Tohill and a behind by Darragh Ó Sé left the sides deadlocked (41-41) at the end of the penultimate quarter.


The visitors started the final quarter brilliantly and within five minutes had registered four scores - Devenney (1), Seamus Moynihan (1), Kieran McGeeney (6) and Tadhg Kennelly (3) - to establish an eleven-point cushion that Australia was not able to overcome. Half-way through the final quarter they narrowed the arrears to seven, but two overs in three minutes from Geraghty left Ireland 13 clear with eight minutes remaining. Five behinds - four to Australia and one to Ireland – littered the closing minutes as Ireland took a six-point lead into the second test.

t Football Park in Adelaide little divided Athe sides in the opening quarter before an attendance of just under 32,000. Graham Geraghty opened the scoring with a behind in the second minute to which Australia replied with a brace of one-pointers from Bradley and Lloyd. Michael Donnellan had the first over of the evening to make it 4-2, before Smith (over) and Stevens (behind) made it 6-4 to the home team. A goal by Anthony Tohill put Ireland back in front and half-way through the opening quarter they led by 16-6, but they failed to score again and Australia narrowed their arrears to the

minimum after Lappin, Lloyd and Bradley scored overs.

A swap of overs between Brendan Jer O'Sullivan and Harvey left Australia still trailing by the minimum, before a goal by Graham Geraghty and an over by Tadhg Kennelly made it 28-18. However, a goal by Lloyd was accompanied by overs from Maxfield and Harvey to edge the Aussies in front, and three overs - two to Ireland one to Australia - completed the first-half scoring at which point the home team led by 33-32.


Within a minute of the restart Brendan Devenney brought Ireland level and 60 seconds later another behind from the same player put them ahead. A brace of overs from Kennelly increased the lead to seven and after Lloyd and John Crowley swapped overs the gap remained the same. When Cormac McAnallen fired over at the 53rd minute it gave the Irish a 50-40 lead and they extended that to twelve points (56-44) by the end of the third quarter.

Five minutes into the final quarter Ireland moved 15 points clear when Kennelly scored an over to which Australia responded with two behinds from Bowden. A behind from O'Sullivan and an over from Devenney made it 63-46 with ten minutes remaining, and it was clear that Ireland were going to win the series. Australia did battle on and Harvey and Ottens scored overs, but Padraig Joyce and Kennelly replied with like scores for the visitors to which Francie Grehan and Joyce added behinds to stretch the final margin to 19

From small beginnings

n May of 1983 a small group of men, entrusted by the GAA with investigating the possibility of a link between Gaelic Football and Australian Rules, issued a comprehensive report. It dealt with every aspect of such a marriage in minute detail and opened the way for the International Rules series we have today.

In their deliberations, the wise men listed four reasons why tours in general for GAA teams were worthwhile. Three of those reasons were connected to the promotion and development of Gaelic Games. Significantly the first reason stated pleasure and reward for players.

Had the committee added the words "officials and journalists" to that sentence they would have been even more prophetic. Over three years later the first tour by an Ireland team to Australia took place and set the tone for a marriage that might not have been made in Heaven but has been great fun anyway.

Any reflection on the Irish experience in Australia since the International Rules series was initiated must concentrate on the 1986 experience. It was a voyage into the unknown. Although Meath and Kerry had organised tours to the Antipodes in the past, this was the first international jaunt. It was a coming together of some of the top talent in the country to play a competitive series

Those pioneers (and the word is used strictly in the sense of adventure) set off on a month-long odyssey that would take them across the world to a vast continent. The amateurs were becoming professionals for a month and taking on the hardened pros of the Footy game who had imposed themselves so physically when they had played in Ireland in 1984.

It was impossible to know then how the players would react to such a new environment; how they would marry the opportunity to visit a new land and witness new lifestyles and cultures, while at the same time playing competitive sport. We know now it was a spectacular success.

CONTROVERSY

There was a controversial edge to the tour that, on reflection, made a huge difference. The choice of Kevin Heffernan as coach was popular in many quarters in the GAA, though not in Kerry where there was anger that Mick O'Dwyer was overlooked. Then Jack O'Shea, O'Dwyers star pupil, was named Ireland's captain and that simply added to the fury within the Kingdom.

These turned out to be inspirational appointments. Heffernan proved to be the coaching and tactical master over his abrasive counterpart John Todd. O'Shea charmed his way into the hearts of the Australians, appearing on prime time television chat shows and becoming a major star throughout Australia.

There was an innocence in some aspects to the planning of the tour. The series took place over three tests in order to incorporate Western Australia into the visit. So the Irish party started their visit in Perth, the wonderful capital of the western state and a five-hour flight from Melbourne, the heart of Aussie Rules. After three nights in the luxury of the Hilton Hotel, the party travelled to the seaside town of Bunbury where a warmup game was played. Then it was back to Perth for four days and the first Test at the WACA Oval, a famous cricket ground that was staging its first major event under lights.

There were times that evening when the authorities must have been tempted to turn off the lights to protect the capacity crowd from witnessing some of the scenes. The Australians were clearly intent on proving how much stronger they were physically. The Irish were having none of it and the game developed into a brawl. Pat Spillane was one of five players sent off! Australia won by seven points.

As Heffernan tried to re-group he had to contend with a flying visit to Adelaide where the Australasian GAA finals were taking place and where his players would play a Gaelic football game against an Australasian selection. One note of considerable interest was the presence of the Brooke brothers, Zinzan

and Robert with a New Zealand team. They would later achieve worldwide fame with the All Blacks.

"BUNCH OF WIMPS"

The squad moved to Melbourne and the quaint Old Melbourne Hotel for the second test. This would prove to be the scene for the memorable tirade from Aussie coach John Todd that the Irish were just a bunch of wimps, a quote spat at the late Mick Dunne in a memorable interview after the Irish had won the second test quite comfortably.

The stay in Melbourne also gave us an insight into the Australian sporting psyche at the time. The sport you followed depended on where you lived. In the state of Victoria, in which Melbourne is situated, Aussie Rules dominates and other sports were ignored. A regular visitor to the Irish team hotel was Andy Slack, the Australian Rugby Union captain who had played rugby for a time in Dublin. He was hugely popular with the Irish who were amazed that no one amongst their hosts seemed to know who he was.

Through the promotional efforts of captain O'Shea and the performances of Brian McGilligan, Teddy McCarthy, Pat O'Byrne, Jimmy Kerrigan, Damien O'Hagan and 19 year old John O'Driscoll, the Irish team was gaining a reputation. By the time of the Third Test in Adelaide, two nights before the Australian Grand Prix on the streets of the city, not even a monsoon could prevent the crowds from turning up. They were given an exhibition by O'Driscoll who repeatedly tormented the bigger and more powerful Aussies with high-fielding, balance and shooting power. Ireland won the test and the series.

The most remarkable sight of all was that which greeted the squad on their return. Almost 3,000 people packed the arrivals hall of Dublin Airport to greet the team, an emotional occasion that is still talked about when the players gather.

Eugene McGee was coach, with Sean McCague as his assistant, when the Irish toured for a second time in 1990. Bob





O'Malley captained the team that had the series won by the second test. This time the Irish were far superior with Bernard Flynn, Martin Gavigan, Noel Roche and Stephen O'Brien amongst the stars.

That tour brought the Irish to Canberra, the seat of government in Australia and not the most exciting place in the world to visit. People live there from Monday to Friday and then go elsewhere. After a few slow days in the city the Irish were desperate for some action. Two officials were dispatched to find some

nightlife and engaged the services of a local taxi-driver. "Can you bring us to a club where we might find some action?", was the simple request.

After a short drive, the driver pulled into a side street and told the two gentlemen to climb the stairs and knock on the door. They did as told and climbed in great anticipation. On knocking they were ushered into a brightly lit room where a bingo session was taking place!

There was a nine-year wait before the

next tour. The stamina-sapping month long tours were replaced with shorter, snappier tours. Western Australia is no longer on the itinerary and that is a pity. Perth, Freemantle, Bunbury and places north and south in that remote part of the world are magical. Apart from the proximity of the vineyards of South Australia, there is little to recommend Adelaide. It closes down at 10.30 at night anyway.

Note to the GAA and AFL: Melbourne and Perth would be the perfect venues in 2003.


Brian White (Ireland)

He was also on duty during the Allianz League as well as in the Ulster Senior Football Championship replay between Armagh and Tryone at Clones.




Scott McLaren (Australia)





International Yarn

er since the first Australian Football team ventured to Ireland in 1967 to play the hybrid brand of the game, the International Rules experiment has been widely supported by Australians.

It is no different this year as 25 of the best Australian Football League players cross the globe to avenge their defeat in last year's International Rules Series in Australia.

It has been 35 years since the first Australian footballers took on the Irish. The year was 1967 and some of the best players of the then Victorian Football League donned green blazers and slouch hats topped with plumes to take on the Irish champions.

The Aussies faced All-Ireland champion County Meath and while the visitors towered over their local counterparts, the Irish won the match 4-8 to 0-5. That was the start of a tradition.

Even in those early days, the Australian players spoke highly of the hybrid game experiment. Royce Hart, then a rookie with the Richmond Football Club, said he had been surprised by the skill of the Irish

"We didn't know much about the Gaelic game apart from the training sessions (we had) behind the Royal Children's Hospital in Royal Park, Melbourne," Hart recalls.

"We arrived at Croke Park and saw these little five foot nothing Irish blokes run out on spindly legs and thought, 'What have we got here?' But they were as tough as hell."

LAVISH

One of Australian Football's most decorated players, Bob Skilton, was equally lavish in his praise of the Irish after the first international game.

"It was a great trip," he said. "Croke Park was chockful and it had a wonderful atmosphere. When they played the national anthem and we were wearing the green-and-gold jumpers, I felt as though I was representing my country.

"The real enjoyment was the companionship in going away with a

bunch of blokes. Some of my closest friends now are the guys I went away with."

The organiser of the original Australia v Ireland match, Harry Beitzel, arranged another trip the next year, 1968. This time, the Australians were better prepared and won the best-of-five series 3-2.

Australian vice-captain Neil Kerley fondly remembers the first Test. "It remains one of my greatest sporting memories. The opening game was against Kerry at Killarney. We jumped in the bus and drove to the ground. There was not a soul there. The pitch was covered in sheep. I asked the bus driver where the crowd was and if it was normal an hour before the game for sheep to be grazing. 'They're at church,' I was told. And the sheep? 'They're mowing the pitch.'

"Sure enough, a huge crowd turned up and we drew the game."

TEN YEAR GAP

It was 10 years before the next tour of Ireland could be arranged with the Australians again triumphant 2-1. In 1984, the concept gained momentum. It was also the year in which Robert 'Dipper' DiPierdomenico make his first trip to Ireland.

"Going to Ireland for the first time was the highlight of my whole career," says Dipper, a premiership player and winner of the game's highest individual honour, the Brownlow Medal.

Melbourne-based football writer Bill Cannon, who toured with the Australians, remembers a series of physical Tests that eventually went the visitors' way 2-1.

"Australian coach John Todd worked out that they (the Irish) were really skilful and that without tackling, our blokes stood no chance. He knew they had to take out Jack O'Shea. Mark Lee punched him right in the head and then there were all sorts of smack-ons," Cannon remembers.

"Looking back, I felt sorry for the Irish, these skinny, skilful little blokes, against the muscular semi-professional Australians." Ireland got their own back in 1986 when they travelled to Australia for the first time and won the series 2-1.

DiPierdomenico says the series was as physical as in 1984 with the Irish playing for their national pride.

"They came out here and for the first time, we played them under lights at the WACA. I suppose we thought we'd keep going where we left off in 1984 and hit them hard. You wouldn't believe it – they hit us with everything. They'd had karate lessons, judo lessons, step-on-your-toe lessons. They knew every dirty trick in the book. We lost the series."

REBOUNDED

Australia rebounded with a 2-1 series win in Ireland in 1987, with the Irish bouncing back in 1990 with a 2-1 win in Australia.

The 1990 Test series will be remembered for Melbourne Football Club champion Jim Stynes playing for Ireland against Australia. Stynes remembers the series with enthusiasm.

"I always wanted to play for Ireland. You always want to represent your own country. In 1987, they (Ireland) didn't know I was in Australia or if I was up to it. It gave me the chance to play with some of the legends of the game – blokes like Jack O'Shea. He was huge.


"The crowd seemed to be mainly Irish. At Waverley Park (Melbourne), there were a lot of Irish, but at Bruce Stadium in Canberra, they were everywhere."

After an eight-year break in International Rules Tests, interest was rekindled with a one-all series draw in Ireland in 1998. The draw proved that the two countries were as evenly matched as ever.

POPULAR

The following year, the game was enormously popular with 64,000 fans watching the opening Test at the Melbourne Cricket Ground. Ireland won 70-62 and then fought out a draw in the second and final Test at Football Park in Adelaide.

That series loss to Ireland seemed only to fuel support for the game and there was unprecedented enthusiasm for the 2000 series in Ireland.

"The most important thing about the tour of Ireland in 2000 was the number of AFL club officials who were over there with us," DiPierdomenico says.

"They came and saw the national team wearing the Australian colours and then went home and told their players just how big this International Rules Series thing had become. They finally understood it."

Australian captain in 2000, Craig Bradley, who this year returns to Ireland 18 years after his first tour, sums up the development. "You could see the changes," he says. "The whole thing was more professional. The thing I remember most is seeing a little Aussie flag on the second tier (at Croke Park), up in the distance. (That) makes you feel proud."

COMMITMENT

As if to underline its commitment to the four-year agreement between the Australian Football League and the Gaelic Athletic Association, Australia won the series 2-0.

But last year in Australia, the Irish made a statement of their own, with a series clean sweep.

Which brings us to this year's tour of Ireland. The Australian team, coached by Garry Lyon, boasts some of the biggest names in the AFL and all are keen to represent their country with distinction.

If the intensity at the final practice session before leaving for Ireland is any indication, then the Australian team circa 2002 is just as excited by the International Rules concept as the original team was 35 years ago.

RULES IN SCHOOLS

THE INTERNATIONAL RULES SERIES has captured the imagination of children in the primary schools of Ireland. They find the games fast, exciting and skilful and they relish the opportunity to support a Gaelic football team wearing an International jersey.

These games also enable them to see stars from counties not regularly seen on television and to realise that there are talented players in all counties who have reached a level of skill and fitness comparable to the very best. Cumann na mBunscol, Áth Cliath - an

organisation of primary teachers promoting a love of Gaelic games in the primary schools of Dublin - has always taken a keen interest in the International Rules Series. Schools have been encouraged to take advantage of generous group rates to attend the

games and the feed-back has been

phenomenal. Follow-up work in the classrooms and on the playing fields has been impressive.

Cumann na mBunscol, Áth Cliath, has had a special relationship with the Series in recent years as organisers of the 'warm-up' game for the travelling party. This year's game in Parnell

Park was a tremendous success, with thousands of children and their parents visiting our County Grounds for the very first time.

The occasion provided a unique honour for the Dublin All-Star selection to play against our visitors and test their fitness and skills against professional athletes.It was an experience they will never forget and it will, no doubt, motivate them to develop their skills in the months ahead.

THE INTERNATIONAL **RULES GAME**

- The matches will be 80 minutes in duration played in four quarters of twenty minutes. There will be an interval of 5 minutes at the end of the first and third intervals, 10 minutes at the half time interval.
- · Each team will consist of twenty named players, 15 playing and 5 interchange players.
- At any time during the game players can be interchanged. Players must leave and enter through an Interchange Area. No interchange player can enter the field of play until the player he is replacing has entered the Interchange Area also.
- · Each team will be allowed one official runner, who may run on to the field of play to make team changes or deliver instructions.
- The ball will be the regulation Gaelic Football.
- The scoring area will be two goal posts with cross bar and goal net and two goal behind posts positioned 6.5 metres from the goal posts on the end
- Scores will be registered as follows: GOAL - 6 points: when the ball is driven between the goal posts and under the crossbar.

OVER - 3 points: when the ball is driven between the goal posts and over the


POINT (BEHIND) - 1 point:is scored when the ball is driven between the goal and behind posts.

- Each country will appoint an official to act as timekeeper/scorer. These officials will be responsible for recording scores and indicating the end of each quarter by siren or horn. The officials will add on time as instructed by the
- · A player will not be allowed to carry the ball more than 10 metres without bouncing or playing the ball.
- · A mark is catching the ball directly from the kick of another player, not less than 20 metres distant. Having being awarded a mark a player may move back behind the spot where the mark was made and take a free kick. Alternatively the player may play on immediately after taking the mark. kicking or hand passing the ball.

THE CLOCK

At the end of each quarter, a hooter will sound. A score resulting from a ball in flight at the start of the sound of the hooter, i.e. when no other player of the same side touches the ball, shall be allowed. If the ball is played over the end-line and outside the goalposts by one of the defending side, a 45m free kick shall be awarded. This must be scored direct.

A-Z OF AUSTRALIAN FOOTBALL

- AFL: The Australian Football League Aruns the most popular spectator sport in the nation with 16 clubs out of five Australian states (Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, South Australia and Western Australia).

- Bounce down/Ball up: A bounce down Bis the term used for the umpire bounce ing the ball to commence play at the start of each quarter, after a goal is scored or during general play. At this point the opposition ruckmen attempt to either knock or tap the ball to one of their players, or to take dean possession of it. Ball up is the term used when the umpire tosses the ball up instead of bouncing - this usually occurs when unfavourable ground conditions prewent a suitable bounce down occurring.

- Centre Square: Only four players from each team (the ruckman, ruck-rover, rover and centreman) are allowed inside the centre square (clearly marked on the arena) as the ball is bounced at the start of each quarter and after each goal is scored.

Defenders: There are six nominated players known as defenders in each team. Their role is to prevent opposition goalscoring and are said to play "in the back lines" - two half back flanks, a centre half back, two back pockets and a full bark.

- Eighteen: The number of players in each team actually competing, on the field, at any one time. This does not include the interchange players.

Finals: Held in September of each season they are the most exciting time of the year for football supporters of all clubs. On the last Saturday of September the Coca-Cola AFL Grand Final is held at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG, or affectionately known as "The G"). It is the ultimate day in Australian Football.

- Goal: A team is awarded six points for Gkicking the ball between the tail goalposts provided the ball has not been touched between the time of being kicked and going between the tall posts. If touched by any player after being kicked, only one point is awarded. If the ball is off target and hits a tall goalpost only one point is awarded. If the ball goes between the tall posts and small posts the team is awarded one point.

- Handball: The ball is held on the palm of one hand and hit on one end of the ball with a clenched fist by the other. It is one of the skills that makes the game move so quickly. It is one of the two (handball and kicking) legal methods of disposing of the ball and can be used at virtually any time except when attempting to score a goal.

- Interchange: Four players sit on an interchange bench. In overseas games numbers on the interchange increase. Players can be replaced at any time and as many times as

the coach decides during a game. They must, however, enter and exit the playing arena at a specific point known as the interchange gate which is simply a marking on the boundary line.

- Jumpers: Also called guernseys: Treated as sacred parts of Australian Football. "Play for the jumper" is a famous cliché of the game.

K- Kick: The most important skill in Australian Football. Players need to kick well under pressure, both physical in general play and mentally when taking set shots for goal. Good players must be able to kick accurately for goal or in general play, with either foot. There are different types of kicks, the most commonly used being known as the drop punt.

Ladder: There are 16 teams on an AFL ladder, the weekly points table. A win gains four points. The team which finishes on the top of the ladder immediately prior to the commencement of finals is known as the "Minor Round Premier".

- Mark: One of the spectacular aspects of Australian football is the catching of the ball, the "marking". Some players are able to leap high, often using other players as "stepladders" in their attempts to take marks. These are commonly called "speccies" due to their spectacular nature.

N- NSW: The largest state in Australia, New South Wales (NSW) has had an AFL club, Sydney, playing as part of the AFL since 1982. Australian Football is now a hugely popular spectator sport in Sydney, the capital city of NSW.

Out of bounds: When the ball crosses the boundary line the boundary umpire will signal to the field umpire that the ball is out of bounds. The ball is then thrown back in by the boundary umpire. If the ball is kicked over the boundary without touching the ground or without any player touching it then it is out of bounds "on the full" and the opposition gets a free kick.

P- Play on: This can occur after a player takes a mark (catches the ball after it has been kicked and without touching the ground or any other player) or is given a free kick. If the player with the ball runs off to continue play then the umpire will call play on and it is permissible to tackle the player.

Quick hands: A player who is able to deftly and accurately dispose of the ball by legal handball is said to have "quick hands". Occasionally a player may attempt to dispose of the ball too guickly and in doing so not execute a strictly legal handball, which may then be deemed a "throw". A free kick will result.

- Ruckmen/Rovers: Generally the tallest Iplayers in each team, ruckmen contest centre bounce downs or ball ups and

boundary throw ins. Rovers tend to be the smallest men on the field and are usually the quickest. The ruckmen attempt to direct the ball to the rovers whose jobs it is to clear the ball from any assembled pack by kicking, by running and bouncing the ball, or by handpassing.

- Spoil/Shepherd: Both are defensive tac-5- Spoil/snepneru. Both are december the tics. A spoil is when a player punches the ball away from an opponent who is attempting to mark. A shepherd is applied by a teammate to fend off opposition players and allow a player with the ball free passage. The shepherd can only be applied if the ball is within five metres.

Tackle: A method of impeding a player in possession of the ball. A tackle can only legally be applied above the knees and below the shoulders and involves wrapping the arms around the opposition player to halt his progress, or by grabbing the opposition player's jumper. A tackle above the shoulders is deemed "too high" and below the knees is deemed a "trip" and a free kick against the tackler will be awarded.

Umpires: There are three field umpires, two boundary umpires and two goal umpires who control a game of Australian Football. The three field umpires are the main adjudicators of decisions. They can in fact override decisions of the goal and boundary umpires. However, in practice this rarely occurs.

- Versatile: A player who has the ability to play in a variety of positions, forward lines, defence or midfield, is said to be versatile. While most players have preferred positions match developments will often call on their ability to play other

W- Work rate: Teams have expectations which relate to how much effort a player is putting in - his "work rate". Players will be called on by coaches to "lift their work rate" when things are not going as well as they should.

- Xenophobia: The great passion for the game is the fact that supporters will hear no evil, see no evil, think no evil of their club.

- Youth policy: When teams look to gain young players through the draft (player selection process) and develop them they are said to be embarking on a "youth policy".


- Zone defence: Players will be assigned a Z-Zone deterice. riayers will be designed to cover. They need to be very good at reading the play and moving to pick up a loose (unattended) opposition player if that player is in a position to receive the ball. With kickouts (conducted when a point has been scored) the forwards will cover particular areas of the ground making it hard for the defender kicking out from full back to find space.



SHANE CRAWFORD (HAWTHORN)



THE MARK

One of the outstanding features of the Australian Rules game is 'The Mark' whereby the player making a clean catch of a kicked ball from another player not less than 20 metres distant cannot be tackled and is allowed to take a free kick. The Mark is incorporated in the International Rules game and there have been many suggestions that its introduction would greatly improve gaelic football. Like most suggested changes there is much to be said for and against; many followers of the gaelic

code would be surprised to learn that more than a century ago when the rules were still at a developing stage with different interpretations in various parts of the country, in one area at least "The Mark" was a feature of the game. This was confirmed by the well-known writer, Sceilg in the 1940s when he recalled that in the game being played in the Ring of Kerry in the 1880s - "When one player fielded the ball, he stood back and no member of the opposition was permitted to approach beyond the mark thus made

until the man in possession had kicked

Other interesting features of the game was that a player was not allowed to catch from a hop, nor was lifting with the toe allowed, except when it was done without bending the body. And when a goal was scored the teams changed sides.

However, "The Mark" eventually disappeared as the rules became more unified, but the fact that it did exist represents an interesting connection between the Irish and Australian games.



About the AFL

Australian football is the country's only indigenous game and boasts some of the oldest football clubs of any code throughout the world.

Geelong and Melbourne, now members of the national AFL competition, were formed in 1858 and 1859 respectively. From those humble beginnings, Australian football has grown into the country's most successful national sports competition, the AFL, which consists of two teams from Perth, two from Adelaide, ten based in Victoria and one each in Sydney and Brisbane.

In recent years, the Coca-Cola AFL premiership season, which is completed at the end of August, attracted over six million spectators. That represents an

average of approximately 35,000 people for each of the 176 matches which make up the premiership season.

The Seven Network attracts a cumulative national television audience of some around seven million people for the final round of the premiership When you consider that the population of Australia is about 18 million, you get an appreciation of the support for the AFL competition which is at least three times greater than the next most popular spectator sport, rugby league.

Off the field, major stadia developments have been occurring at major AFL venues around the country.

About A\$40 million has been spent on an upgrade of the Gabba stadium in Brisbane which has taken the capacity

of this stadium to some 42,000 for Brisbane Lions home games. In Perth, Subiaco Oval, which is a venue shared by the West Coast Eagles and Fremantle Dockers, has had a A\$35 million redevelopment, completed in the year 2000.

The new Docklands Stadium, built at a cost of A\$420 million on the western fringe of Melbourne's central business district, will be the venue for at least 30 AFL games per year from 2000 and for A\$30 million, the AFL will ultimately own the stadium after 25 years.

Plans for the continued upgrade of the MCG, where the AFL will schedule 41 games per year plus four finals including the Grand Final until 2032, are also being developed.

Unlike many other grounds, Croke Park with its sunken areas close to the pitch presents particular hazards in a pitch encroachment situation.

Supporters are sincerely thanked for their cooperation to date and are asked to continue this cooperation in the future to ensure that games can be enjoyed without recourse to fencing or avoidable obstructions to seeing the action from all vantage points. Together we can ensure that a Croke Park experience is both enjoyable and safe, particularly for the young and vulnerable.
