

It is my honour to extend a special welcome to you on the occasion of today's Bank of Ireland All Ireland football championship quarterfinal games. The prospect of two wonderful games should keep supporters fully entertained throughout the afternoon.

The first game today places Gaillimh and Dún na nGall in Championship opposition for

the first time since 1983. Amazingly twenty years ago, Brian Mc Eniff was at the helm for Dún na nGall and is in the managerial hotseat again this year! If memory serves, Gaillimh scraped through on that occasion by a single point and a similarly tight game could well be in store today.

Ros Comáin meanwhile have waited almost 23 years for another chance to land "the one that got away". The 1980 All Ireland was the county's best chance in recent times to claim the Sam Maguire and of course my own Ciarraí were the opposition on that day also. They return today with former Dublin player and manager Tommy Carr at the helm, having enjoyed a great run in the

qualifiers. Ciarraí, with wins over Luimneach and Tiobraid Árann, are again Munster Champions, but they will be taking nothing for granted in a game that will revive memories in older generations of the great clashes of the 1940's.

This is the third year of the Bank of Ireland All Ireland football championship qualifiers and interest in the games is currently at an all time high. We have established a task force to examine our Championship structures going forward, and indeed I would welcome any submissions from our supporters in this regard to our Games Development Department in Páirc an Chrócaigh.

Today we will be using the big screen again to present our games in a more modern way. This arises from the activities of the PR and Presentation Committee, which I set up after Congress. You'll be hearing more from them.

I am also aware that there are many concerns at the moment regarding suspensions, appeals etc. This is a complicated area, but hopefully by Congress 2004 we will be in a position to divide the Games Administration Committee into two distinct sections and this should make matters more manageable in the future. I am also aware of the restrictions of our appeal system and in this regard an independent tribunal might well be worth considering. As in all cases, your views are always welcome, but hurry as our committees will need to formulate their suggestions by the fall.

In the meantime, I hope you all enjoy today's games as we look forward to the latter stages of the 2003 Championship with great anticipation.

REGULATIONS - PÁIRC AN CHRÓCAIGH


- All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 2 Fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any persons in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
- 3. Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
- 4. The climbing of walls, stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- 6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any objects onto the pitch.
- 7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play and shall be ejected.
- Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
- 9. The stadium management reserve the right of admission.
- 10. The stadium management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of An Garda Síochána.
- II. Any person who remains in a gangway or aisle may be ejected from the ground.
- 12 The G.A.A. reserves the right for its servants or agents to remove from the stadium any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence on the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.



SAFETY NOTICE

In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.

The policy to prohibit such encroachment in the future has been taken to avoid further injuries and possible fatality and has been taken on the advice and promptings of the safety authorities, namely the Gardaí, **Dublin Corporation & Fire** Brigade and the Eastern Health Board. lar éis sárchluichí dheireadh na seachtaine seo i bPáirc an Chrócaigh ní bheidh ach ceithre chontae fágtha sa rás do dhuais na peile 2003. Féasta chluichí atá chugainn i ndáiríre agus na foirne is fearr sa tír ag triail ar Pháirc an Chrócaigh. Nil amhras ná go mbeidh aird an phobail ar an gcaismirt idir curaidh uile Éireann, faoi stiúr Joe Kernan, agus an draoi Chiarraioch atá i gceannas ar curaidh nua Laighean. Nuair a chasadar ar a chéile sa sraith Allianz bhí an á ag Laois ach ceaptar nach raibh aird Ard Mhacha ar an duais áirithe sin. A third championship meeting for Donegal and Galway



Donegal and Galway meet for the third time in the senior football championship.

Donegal were Ulster senior champions for the second time when they met Galway in a 1974 semi-final. Brian McEniff, now the county team manager, was the Ulster county's player/manager that year.

He was at right half back as the Northerners went down by 3-13 to 1-14.

McEniff was Donegal team manager when the counties met in a 1983 semi-final. Galway won that game by 1-12

Kerry and Roscommon also renew senior football championship rivalry after a long time. Their last clash was in the 1980 final, in which the Kingdom won by 1-9 to 1-6 to collect their third title in a row.

Roscommon's last championship win over Kerry was as far back as their 1944 All-Ireland final. A year earlier the Western county won the Sam Maguire Cup for the first time and they completed a noteworthy double by beating Kerry by 1-9 to 2-4 the 1944 summit.

Tom Carr, now the Roscommon manager, was manager of Dublin when they lost to Kerry in a replay at Thurles in an All-Ireland quarter-final in 2001.

It happened in the senior football championships 2003

A rare break-through for Limerick football..... A family affair up North.... Some impressive individual scoring returns...The end of a long wait for Laois in Leinster.

These were some of the features in this season's Bank of Ireland Provincial Senior Football Championships and the All-Ireland qualifiers.

Limerick, superbly led by captain and midfielder Muiris Gavin, bridged a long, long gap with a surprise win over Cork at Páirc Uí Chaoimh in the opening game of the Munster campaign in early May.

Gavin scored a superb 0-9 as Limerick recorded their first championship win over the Rebel County since as far back as 1965. They did it in handsome style as well,

finishing with ten points to spare.

It was a real family affair at Casement Park as Antrim surprised Cavan in a first round tie in Ulster at the end of May. Two first half goals by full forward Darren O'Hare on his senior championship debut set the home county on the road to a first championship win over the Breffni County in twenty-one years.

Darren, who is 21, is son of P. J. O'Hare, whose behind the scenes work as team manager also contributed to the break-through.

Earlier in the Ulster season Paddy Bradley scored 1-6 for **Derry** in their first round tie with Allianz League champions Tyrone at Clones but still did not finish on the winning side. The game ended in a draw.



PRESSURE KICK

One of the real pressure kicks of the season was faced up to by midfielder Ciarán McManus for

Offaly in their start to the Leinster season at Portlaoise.

The Faithful County looked to have victory snapped from their grasp when Michael Lawlor goaled for Laois two minutes into injury time to give them a point lead.

Offaly swept back into the attack and won a "45". McManus faced up to the opportunity of earning his side a draw from the kick and, displaying

coolness in the tension laden atmosphere, expertly drilled the ball over the bar to send the match to a replay.

Earlier in the game, McManus scored one of the goals of the year. Half-time was approaching when he won possession, raced forward and from well outfield powered a cracking shot to the Laois net.

Peter Canavan, in the No.14 jersey, marked Tyrone's convincing Ulster final replay win over Down at Clones last month with a real scoring tour-deforce. He finished with eleven points, seven from frees and one from a '45'.

His sharpshooting revived memories of the expert finishing of another Tyrone man in an Ulster final. Frank McGuigan, who also wore the No. 14 jersey, scored 0-II, all from play, as the O'Neill County beat Armagh in the 1984 summit at Clones.

GOAL SCORING FEATS

Ciaran McManus scored three goals for Offaly in their win over **London** at Tullamore in early June in round one of the All-Ireland qualifiers.

Steven McDonnell shot three goals last time out for **Armagh** in their win over Limerick at Dr. Hyde Park in Round Four of the qualifiers. He also helped himself to four points.





Frankie Dolan raced to the top of the points review with 0-13 for **Roscommon** in their win last week-end over **Kildare** at Portlaoise in Round Four of the qualifiers, that game went to extra time.

Barry Owens was a very consistent star at full back for Fermanagh in their heady campaign in the All-Ireland qualifiers. He was rated by many as the man-of-thematch in each of their three games on the way to the quarter-final.

PLACE APART FOR GALWAY

Galway's win over Mayo in the Connacht final at Pearse Stadium earned them a place apart in this year's review. They have the distinction of being the only county to have retained a provincial title this season.

The sharpshooting and leadership of captain Adrian Sweeney did much to power Donegal back from a first round defeat in Ulster by Fermanagh to a quarter-final outing.

Kerry gave a fine display of points scoring when rifling

over twenty-five as they took the first step on the road to regaining the Munster title after two years by beating Tipperary at Austin Stack Park, Tralee.

Goals by Brian McDonald and Ross Munnelly in the second half and a five-star display by Tom Kelly at centre half back were features of the Laois win over Kildare in the Leinster final at Croke Park. The 2-13 to 1-13 victory had something of a "Famous First" win for very many Laois followers in the attendance of 61,786 as it was the county's first final win in 57 long years.

And a special place as well for Laois manager. Mick O'Dwyer, who has now managed three different counties to provincial senior title wins—Kerry, Kildare and, of course, the O'Moore County.









Donegal at Croke Park

delicious irony, of which not many followers of gaelic games may be aware, is that Donegal contested an All-Ireland senior hurling semi-final on the famous sod almost half a century before the footballers made a first championship appearance there. This hurling first was in 1923 when Donegal, as Ulster champions, opposed Limerick in the penultimate round. Not surprisingly, Donegal proved no match for the Munster men and were heavily defeated. But there was a noteworthy – even memorable – feature of that game in that it was the first occasion on which the teams wore numbered jerseys in an inter-county game at Croke Park, or indeed, elsewhere.

Hurling, however, soon slipped into the background of Donegal Gaeldom and it was left to the footballers to carry the county's ambitions outside Ulster. But it took a long time to open the way to a championship appearance in Dublin. In fact, at times it appeared that it would never happen and as recently as the beginning of the 1970s, Donegal shared with Fermanagh the dubious distinction of being the only Ulster counties to have never made a senior championship appearance at headquarters.

But Donegal's day finally came as, on their third appearance in an Ulster final, they won the right to travel south with a five-point win over Tyrone in 1972. Pitted against the reigning All-Ireland champions Offaly, Donegal put up a magnificent display, were ahead at half

time and were caught only by a late surge by the champions (1-17 to 2-10). By any reckoning it was still an auspicious entry to Croke Park.

Two years later they were back as semi-finalists, but defeat was again their lot as they failed to match an experienced Galway side, going down by 1-14 to 3-13. At the third attempt they came agonisingly close to making the breakthrough, failing by a single point (1-11 to 1-12) to Galway in the 1983 semi-final. Seven years on it was a case of missed chances as Meath's cleverness carried the day (3-9 to 1-7).

But 1992 was to see the dream of generations of Donegal followers come true. Goal-scoring may not have been the forte of this year's team, but as the defence did the needful in curbing the opposing forwards, the attack swept over the points that gave the county its first ever championship win at Croke Park (0-13 to 0-9 versus Mayo). Five weeks later the summit was reached against the odds as Dublin were defeated by 0-18 to 0-14. Donegal had nothing more to prove.

The Qualifiers brought Donegal back to Liffeyside and three championship appearances in 2002 – a 1-13 to 0-14 win over Meath, a draw with Dublin (0-14 to 2-8) and a most disappointing replay defeat (0-7 to 1-14) – brought mixed results. Although a ten-point win did scant justice to Tipperary's brave effort a month ago, the win did go some way to redressing the balance of Donegal's Croke Park record, which currently reads four wins, one draw and five defeats.



Last Quarter-Finals


either Donegal nor Galway will have happy memories of their last quarter-final outings as both exited the All-Ireland championship at this stage of the competition twelve months ago.

Kerry 2-17 Galway 1-12


As reigning All-Ireland champions, Galway went into this contest quietly confident, but on a dismal afternoon for the Corribsiders they lost by eight points and were flattered to be that close to the winners at the end of the seventy minutes. The challengers made a positive start and Mike Francis Russell and Colm Cooper had points on the board with barely a minute played. Joe Bergin replied for the champions and then Michael Donnellan scored a marvellous goal, which was quickly followed by a point from Padraig Joyce. However, over the next 20 minutes Kerry ran riot, scoring I-7 and conceding just 0-2, although Galway did have a good period just before the interval, but Matthew Clancy and Padraig Joyce blazed over the bar, when goals were possible.

nlike their first visit to Croke Park two years earlier when lack of experience may have cost them the game against Offaly, Donegal were a much more mature outfit as they shaped up to Galway in this All-Ireland semi-final clash. If Donegal had acquired some valuable experience in the past two years, they still couldn't compare with the Corribsiders who were appearing in their fourth semi-final in five years.

Donegal switches before the start from the published lineout may have confused themselves rather than the opposition and Galway went in front almost from the throwin when Johnny Tobin shot a point before 20 seconds had elapsed. For eleven subsequent minutes that was the only score on the board, but when Tobin raised the second flag of the day, a green one, Donegal looked to be in slight disarray.

But Brian McEniff was swift to rally his team-mates and Neilly Gallagher, deadly from placed balls, had the arrears down to the minimum by the 20th minute

(0-3 to 1-1). Galway's response was immediate and effective as Liam Sammon broke the ball to Colin McDonagh, who placed it well out of 'keeper McCole's reach. Points were exchanged by Tobin and Gallagher before Donegal suffered two severe blows when McEniff and Seamus Bonnar were forced to retire with injuries.

The moving of Martin Carney to midfield led to a more even share of the exchanges for Donegal, but Galway turned over leading by 2-7 to 1-6 and when Tobin grabbed his second goal of the afternoon and tacked on four points with the help of Sammon and Tom Naughton, it was 3-11 to 1-8 with 20 minutes left to play. Donegal, however, were far from finished and as they began to pres forward, anxious defenders conceded frees that were remorselessly

punished by the impeccable Gallagher.

Slowly the gap narrowed and with five minutes remaining Galway's advantage had been reduced to a mere three points. As Donegal, scenting victory, pushed forward in search of the goal that would save the day, Jack Cosgrove at full-back and T.J. Gilmore in front of him were immense; Cosgrove especially was almost unbeatable under the dropping ball. At this stage every ball was vital and a couple of Donegal wides that might have been scores helped to keep Galway in front and as Donegal finally began to run out of steam, the Westerners raised the siege and went in search of the scores to settle the issue.

And they got them as Sammon and company rediscovered their touch they seemed to have lost once the Donegal revival got underway. Willie Joyce sent a long ball into opposition territory and Sammon eluded a couple of defenders to slot over his side's twelfth point. Granahan and Carney made desperate efforts to rally their colleagues, but it hardly needed Naughton's point to ensure a victory that Galway undoubtedly deserved, but not by a margin of five points.

Donegal were back in Croke Park after an absence of nine years, but Galway had been there at the semi-final stage a year previously when they lost by a point to the eventual All-Ireland champions Offaly. Donegal were on something of a high after their 1982 All-Ireland under-21 success, but whether they could match the more composed and mature opposition was debatable. However, this game was not to be decided by maturity, real or imagined, but by the luck of the day, which seemed reluctant to bestow its favours on either side until it was a factor in the only goals of the game.

First use of the wind went to Donegal, but it was Galway who showed up more aggressively in the opening minutes and soon had two points on the board. Donegal gradually settled and had a goal with eleven minutes gone when a ball that appeared to be going wide hit an upright and dropped into the welcoming grasp of corner-forward Kieran Keaney, who had the simplest of tasks to find the net.

By the 16th minute Donegal's lead had stretched to four points with Galway appearing to have problems in a number of areas. They eventually steadied, and though they could do no better than knock a point off the arrears, an interval score of 0-6 to 1-6 represented a comfortable enough position with wind advantage to come.

Defenders on both sides - notably Stephen Kinneavey and Pat

O'Neill for Galway and corner-backs McDermott and Newton for Donegal, had the better of the second-half exchanges and there was just a single exchange of points until Galway got the goal that sent them on their way. And like Donegal's major, there was an element of luck to it. Stephen Joyce mis-hit his effort at a '50', but when Val Daly gained possession the Donegal defenders had gone missing and Daly didn't hesitate.

A quartet of points soon had Galway three to the good and apparently cruising to victory, but Donegal rallied and points by Tommy McDermott and Martin McHugh left just the minimum dividing the sides. However, time ran out for the Ulster men and the Corribsiders won the 1983 semi-final by exactly the same score as they had lost the previous year's penultimate contest.



PATH TO THE QUARTER-FINAL CIARRAÍ



Kerry bid to maintain unbeaten record

erry are bidding for a third successive
Bank of Ireland All-Ireland senior football
quarter-final win. They beat Dublin in a
replay in 2001 at Thurles and Galway at Croke
Park last year.

The Kingdom displayed a flair for points scoring when they opened their bid to regain the Munster title after two years by beating Tipperary at Tralee by 0-25 to 1-10 in a semi-final.

In the Munster Final at Killarney a late scoring burst in the first half that resulted in I-5 without reply set Kerry on the road to a convincing win over Limerick for their first title in two years and 68th in all.

Limerick, who were striving for their first crown in 107 years, started promisingly enough but their cause was not helped by the fact that Declan O'Keeffe in the Kerry goal saved a penalty after eleven minutes.

Kerry's late scoring run sent them into the half time break nine points clear—I-6 to 0-3. The goal was scored by Dara Ó Cinnéide, who was put in possession by Eoin Brosnan.

The home county had a player dismissed by the referee soon after the restart but that did not upset their rhythm. They continued to have the better of matters, with Ó Cinnéide kicking some excellent points.


Limerick continued to battle bravely, but lost another good scoring chance when a penalty kick came back off the crossbar and was cleared. Kerry eventually finished convincing winners by I-II to 0-9.

Ó Cinnéide played a major role in fashioning the win. He was top scorer with I-6. Declan O'Sullivan and Michael Francis Russell also showed up well in the attack. Seamus Moynihan's leadership and utter dependability at the back was also an ace in the Kerry pack while Tomás Ó Sé was another giant at the back. Brosnan had a fine game at midfield.

A solid performance, then, by Kerry, who have experience (they have a framework of All-Ireland medal winners in their side) and class to recommend them. They have much to recommend them as they strive for a third successive quarter-final win.

Declan O'Keefe (Ciarraí) - faced two penalties against Limerick in the 2003 Bank of Ireland Munster Final, but kept a clean sheet.

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Roscommon the extra time specialists

oscommon are establishing a record as the extra time specialists. They beat Offaly in extra time in round two of the Bank of Ireland All-Ireland senior football qualifiers and last time out had three points to spare over Kildare in a memorable game at Portlaoise that also went to extra time.

A feature of both games was the excellent sharpshooting of Frankie Dolan. He scored 0-12 against the Faithful County and chalked up some wonderful points when recording 0-13 at Portlaoise.

The Roscommon-Kildare game was a thrilling affair with the issue in doubt right until the end. Dolan sent the match to extra time when he provided the perfect finish to a movement started by Roscommon goalkeeper Shane Curran by shooting a late equaliser.

A keenly contested first half ended with the Connacht side ahead by 0-8 to 0-7. Kildare restarted in promising style to go three points clear, but Roscommon hit back for a decisive blow with a goal from substitute John Tiernan.

Soon afterwards Roscommon had a man sent to the line by the referee, but they continued to play with great spirit and skill. The accuracy of Dolan proved vital and he eventually sent the game to extra time with that late equalising point.

Roscommon had the better of the exchanges in the first period of extra time and turned over 1-15 to 0-16 ahead. Kildare battled back bravely in the second period, but the Connacht county held out for a well-deserved 1-18 to 0-19 win.


While Dolan was undoubtedly the star of the show, others contributed in rich measure to Roscommon's return to championship action at Croke Park.

Substitute Tiernan, with his vital goal, Jonathan Dunning and midfielder Stephen Lohan did well. The defence, superbly marshaled by Ray Cox, David Casey and Francie Grehan, presented the lively Kildare attack with a testing road to goal.

This was a good all round performance by Roscommon and the perfect morale booster for their bid to get back into an All-Ireland senior semi-final after an absence of twelve years.

Roscommon at Croke Park

Roscommon featured in a championship game in Dublin years before any of their Connacht neighbours, but that game was at Clonturk Park in the 1892 All-Ireland semi-final, and it was 20 years later before Roscommon appeared at Jones's Road for the first time. But that first appearance was not a winning one as Dublin won the penultimate tie by 2-4 to 1-1. And if it was a disappointing day for Roscommon, it had the consolation for one of their players Harry Hession, who made a piece of history in becoming the first Connacht man to score a goal in a championship game at Croke Park.


Roscommon's next two semi-final outings were at Portlaoise in 1914 and '15, in which they unsuccessfully opposed Kerry, and it would be a long time before they had another chance to represent the West at G.A.A. headquarters. In fact it would be close to 30 years, but when Roscommon returned for the 1943 All-Ireland semi-final with Louth, both Croke Park and Roscommon had changed beyond recognition. In place of bleak embankments there was the Hogan and Cusack Stands and the team that wore the primrose and blue included some of the finest players of that era - Jimmy and Phelim Murray, Donal Keenan, Bill Carlos,

Liam Gilmartin, Eamon Boland, Brendan Lynch and Bill Jackson. And their colleagues were not far behind.

That 3-10 to 3-6 win over Louth and the drawn game and subsequent replay victory over Cavan, established Roscommon as a football power of the first order, and since then no decade has passed without a Roscommon appearance at the Mecca of gaelic football.

In all, Roscommon has made 24 championship appearances at Croke Park, with the record reading seven wins, three draws and 14 losses, the details of which are:

Some Past Encounters

1944 - Roscommon 1-9 Kerry 2-4

t will never be known how they got there. At the height of the Emergency travel restrictions, 79,245 people crowded into Croke Park on September 24th 1944, and those whose ingenuity had achieved the seemingly impossible feat of travelling scores of miles without 'visible means of support' were to be amply rewarded with a football classic.

Roscommon enjoyed a rare distinction - favouritism on a first-ever meeting with Kerry, but the disparity in semi-final form could not be ignored. Kerry had scraped home against luckless Carlow while Roscommon's last step to the final had been one majestic sweep as they beat Cavan by 5-8 to 1-3; the biggest win for 25 years at the penultimate stage of the competition.

It was a classic confrontation; Roscommon, the brash talented newcomers to the All-Ireland scene, seeking confirmation of their status and Kerry the honours-laden masters of more than a dozen championships.

Eddie Dunne's goal for Kerry set the tone of the afternoon and drew an appropriate response when Jimmy Murray and John Joe Nerney set up the chance for Frank Kinlough. With Donal Keenan's superb marksmanship and Eamon Boland and Liam Gilmartin ensuring the supply from midfield, Roscommon edged into a 1-4 to 1-2 lead at the interval.

Boland's point stretched the lead within three minutes of the restart, but Kerry's big effort was soon under way. Paddy Kennedy had a point, Dunne squirmed past two defenders to shoot a goal and Murt Kelly pointed a free to make it 2-4 to 1-5.

Kerry looked good. Roscommon, however, rose magnificently to the challenge. Keenan pointed a free and followed with one from play, to level; Kinlough snatched the lead and Keenan's late point confirmed Roscommon's right to the title.

1946 - Kerry 2-4 Roscommon 1-7

he 1946 All-Ireland final, which was played on October 6th and attracted 75,771, was to prove one of the most memorable finals of the forties, not for the exchanges, but for the dramatic closing moments when the game suddenly flared to vibrant life in a blaze of excitement.

The pressure was early and persistent on the Kerry lines. Donal Keenan pointed a free to open and at the sixth minute JJ Fallon blasted in a magnificent goal from 25 yards. The woodwork saved Kerry before Batt Garvey raised their first flag at the end of the opening quarter.

Roscommon surged back for points by Keenan, Fallon and Kinlough to leave it 1-5 to 0-1 at the break - a scoreline which reflected the Westerners' dominance.

Paddy Kennedy's move to midfield flickered a resurgence on the restart with points coming from Tom O'Connor (2) and Paddy Burke, but as that flurry lost momentum, Roscommon took it up again and Keenan's two points appeared to have taken the game out of Kerry's fading

Then suddenly the game was alive as Burke crashed home a great goal, though Roscommon's position still looked reasonably safe as the final minutes spun out. "Gega' Connor's sideline kick posed no obvious threat as a dozen hands reached for the centre, but as over-eagerness clouded judgement, neither defender nor attacker made contact and in a flash an equaliser, that had seemed as remote as the moon, was nestling in the Roscommon net.

Replay - Kerry 2-8 Roscommon 0-10

f the drawn game had needed that dramatic finish to rescue it from oblivion, this second meeting of football giants required no such support for the 65,661 crowd. For this was Gaelic football at its scintillating best with Roscommon's quicksilver teamwork being matched by the dash and enthusiasm of a Kerry team which had completely shed the lethargy that had afflicted them for long stretches of the game three weeks previously.

The Munster men, with Paddy Kennedy as captain in place Gus Cremin, shaped infinitely better in the opening stages than they had in the drawn game, but Keenan's marksmanship kept Roscommon ahead through most of the opening half, although Kerry twice hauled them back to level terms by sheer persistence. Yet the half-time scoreboard recorded an accurate picture of the proceedings as Roscommon led by 0-6 to 0-4.





Third Time Lucky

Roscommon's win over Kildare last week was a case of third time lucky for, contrary to general belief, the westerners had featured in championship action at Portlaoise. But there was nobody at O'Moore Park who remembered Roscommon performing at a provincial venue in Laois, for the connection with the Laois capital goes back almost 90 years.

As Connacht champions in 1914. Roscommon took on Kerry in the All-Ireland semi-final at O'Moore Park. More suitable venues were probably available, but the powers-that-be decreed that the game should go on at Portlaoise and on September 6th Roscommon travelled by rail to fulfil the fixture. The result was disappointing. The defence, subjected to long periods of Kerry pressure, did well to concede just 2-4, but at the other end the attack managed just a single point. A year later, as nominated Connacht representatives. Roscommon again restricted the Kingdom to 2-4, but again fell short themselves with a return of 1-1.

With two strikes against them at Portlaoise, Roscommon had to wait 88 years to change their luck at the venue with last week's victory a thrilling case of third time lucky.

Ready-made replacements

When the Kerry squad turned up at the Cork Athletic Grounds for the 1923 Munster semi-final with the Leesiders, the mentors found themselves with a problem - or it might be said, with three problems - as they had only 12 players prepared to line out. Fortunately, one of the Kerry selectors knew where replacements could be found among the spectators! And apparently these ready-made replacements rose to the occasion as Kerry were victorious by 3-4 to 0-3.

But whether these "emergency men" were rewarded for their contribution is not known. The team which contested the Munster final with Tipperary included six players who were not on duty when Kerry lined out against Dublin in the All-Ireland final – and presumably the three spectator/players were among that half dozen.

A final thought about the famous trio; as they almost certainly had paid to get into the Athletic Grounds that day—was the admission charge refunded?

Kerry resumed with a splendid show of aggression and as Roscommon conceded the inevitable frees "Gega" Connor put the sides level (0-6 each). A Roscommon attack brought a free and the deadliest left foot in the game did the needful and the lead was quickly stretched by McQuillan from play. Kerry responded with a great goal from Burke for the lead, but Keenan set the scores level for the fifth time with five minutes remaining.

In a welter of excitement, Cremin, who had come on as a sub, swung over a high point and after Kerry had repulsed an equaliser-seeking Roscommon raid, a Kerry free floated into the Roscommon goalmouth where Dolan fielded confidently, only to be swept to the net by inrushing Kerry forwards.

A consultation between umpires and referee ended with the green flag fluttering and Kerry were champions for the 16th time.

1962 - Kerry I-12 Roscommon I-6

Shades of more bountiful days fell reproachfully across the 1962 final meeting of Roscommon and Kerry on September 23rd, for if the '46 encounter had displayed all that was finest in the code, this lacklustre, mediocre game did little for the image of victor or vanquished.

Gerry McMahon's goal after only 35 seconds gave Kerry a lead they never surrendered and the only incident to linger in the mind after 60 tortured minutes was a bizarre one of a Roscommon attack launched by Kerry midfielder Jerry Lucey, who at one stage mistakenly drove a huge centre in the direction of his own goal.

With Mick O'Connell in deadly form from frees, every Roscommon indiscretion was remorselessly punished, and when the Connacht men somehow failed to score a goal from a situation where three players had a chance of stabbing the ball home, the game went its inevitable and boring way.

A converted penalty by Dan Feeley, after Cyril Mahon had been fouled, only vaguely hinted at Roscommon's resurgence and Kerry points by O'Connell (2) and Tom Long quickly nullified the effort of Feeley's score. John Kelly's point left the half-time score 1-8 to 1-1 in Kerry's favour.

A third-quarter exchange of points between O'Connell and

the Feeleys altered neither the gap between the teams nor their prospects, and when O'Connell drove over his seventh point of the afternoon to put Kerry nine points clear, even the semblance of a contest disappeared. Don Feeley's three points from frees, which brought a late reply from Paudie Sheehy were no more than statistics of a most disappointing final, watched by 75,771 spectators.

1980 - Kerry I-9 Roscommon I-6

If ever the challengers if any competition got the start they needed, it was Roscommon in this final. Kerry, seeking a third successive title for the first time in almost 40 years, were rocked by a Roscommon goal that was set up by Dermot Earley and Tony McManus and finished by John O'Connor with the game not 60 seconds old. And when Seamus Hayden hit two points Roscommon appeared to be on their way. But Kerry gradually clawed their way back and a goal and a point from Mikey Sheehy and a point from Ger Power had the sides level at the 20th minute.

The game, however, was slipping into a less than attractive pattern as repeated fouling ruled out any suggestion of fluency. By the interval, with scores level at 1-3 each, the frees tally was well on its way to record territory with 30 infringements having been whistled by referee Murray.

The pattern of foul and free continued through the second half, with both sides contributing equally and if the conditions were undoubtedly responsible to some degree for this unsightly litany, there were culprits fore and aft on a day when neither victor nor vanquished did themselves, nor the game, a great service. With 58 minutes gone scores were level, but Kerry finished the stronger with three unanswered points.

All Ireland Football Final weekend promises to be a truly international weekend with over 500 people watching it live in Hong Kong having slogged it out over the previous two days in their own All Asian version. In what promises to be the biggest and best celebration of Irish sports and culture ever held in Asia, the 8th Asian Gaelic Games will take place in Aberdeen stadium, Hong Kong from September 26th to 28th.

The three day event will bring together the Irish diaspora from across the region. Teams representing Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, Beijing, Shanghai, Singapore, Taiwan, Dubai, Abu Dabi.

Bahrain and Macao, will compete in the seven-a-side men's and ladies' football competitions. There will also be an exhibition of hurling and International Rules Games (GAA select V Aussie Rules team). Over 300 players will participate in the competitions with Korea seeking to regain the Derek Brady Trophy in the men's competition and Japan defending their ladies' title. In 2002, a lean, mean Korean machine gave a masterclass in seven's football, brushing aside all-comers with a display that brought the competition to a new level in their first appearance. This year, past winners Japan, Singapore and Hong Kong will be hoping to stop them in their tracks and relive their past glories. In the women's competition a kimono-clad Japanese team received their winners medals from the President of Ireland, Mary McAleese after a bruising final against Dubai. Hosts Hong Kong will be eager to ensure that this year the winners will be receiving their medals in cheung sams and with Korea competing for the first time, Japan will have to be at their best to retain their title.

The Asian Gaelic Games was founded by a group of Irish people in Taiwan on New Year's Eve, 1995. The first games took place in Manila in 1996 which was also the venue in 1997 and 1998. In 1999 they moved to Singapore and have been held in Phuket since 2000. Men and women from many different countries and cultures take part in various competitions; the most prestigious of which is the Derek Brady Cup, the oriental Sam Maguire. Derek was one of the original founders of the games in Taiwan and died tragically in a road accident before he could witness the incredible success of the venture he had helped to inspire. His parents have continued to support the event throughout the years

In addition to its sporting and cultural significance, this weekend also provides an excellent opportunity to raise a substantial amount of money for charity. The games will continue to support the Human Development Foundation in Bangkok which co-ordinates 31 kindergarten schools for 4,500 children aged three to six years. These centres provide vocational training, support for AIDS sufferers and hospice care for older

children.

Support will also be given to the Hong Kong Down Syndrome Association, whose Special Olympic team members were unable to travel to Dublin due to complications with the SARS quarantine arrangement agreed with the Irish Department of Health. The entire Hong Kong Special Olympics Team will also be invited along to the Sunday of the Games.





Catch and Kick Programme

"Catch and Kick" is a new Coaching/ Development initiative for Primary Schools that is sponsored by McDonald's Restaurant's of Ireland. It involves three key elements: Coaching Inputs, Fun Blitzes and the Catch and Kick (C&K) Challenge. 
Carr was Cumann

Experience v. Promotion

The main criterion of appointment is — the best person for the job. But this could mean giving all the sames to the experienced referee — the safe hands. but how do the less experienced referees get that experience if they don't get appointments? Experienced meetes argue they need regular games to keep them in mentally and physically.

and coming referees are appointed to League They are assisted by their more experienced maleagues as linesmen and are assessed by their performance.

There is a huge difference between League and Championship — games played before small crowds in heavy conditions and Championship games played with speed and passion before huge crowds. One needs strong nerves and a cool disposition to walk out as the person in the middle before 30,000 people in a local derby between neighbouring counties.

Yet every referee on the National Panel has the ambition to progress to Senior Championship, to Provincial Final and to the highest honour, an All-Ireland Final. The Appointments' Committee has to balance two needs - the best person for the job and the progression of newer referees to the big scene.


Attitude of Players

Most players don't analyse as much as managers do the appointments of referees for their game. If it's an experienced referee they will usually say "we know him and his form" and get on with their preparation.

Experienced referees readily admit that any mistake they make is not greeted with the same criticism as the one made by a less well known colleague. In his article in the Sunday Independent of July 27th, Ciarán McBride commented on what Down should have done towards the end of their drawn Ulster final with Tyrone: "But that's the time Down needed to be steetwise. To stop Tyrone getting a run at them, they needed to keep possession, take short kickouts, have a man go down with an injury, bitch at the referee, even start the odd row if necessary. Anything to break up the play and run the clock down".

Interesting comments from a player and it shows how streetwise a referee must be in such a situation.

Young Referee of the Future — a New Initiative

The National Referees' Administration Committee has launched a new Referee Course aimed at the Transition Year in Post-Primary schools. Information on the course has already been sent to the schools and is available for the coming Autumn. Students completing the course will receive certificates from C.L.G. as "Young Referees of the Future". Selected students from each county will be invited to Croke Park for further training. The sessions are a mixture of theory as well as practice and are supported by suitable resources. Hopefully it will encourage young people to start a career path in refereeing.
