Drawn game was a match of contrasts for both counties

Donegal and Galway experienced contrasting fortunes during their entertaining draw last Monday in the Bank of Ireland All-Ireland senior football championship quarter-final at Croke Park.

Each county in turn looked to be heading for a successful outing in a game that ended in heart-stopping fashion but in the end a draw was probably a fair result.

Donegal made light of their outsiders role in the early stages of the mach. They took the game to their opponents in sparkling fashion and powered impressively to an 0-7 to 0-2 lead after fifteen minutes.

The Ulster men were on top in most departments and looked likely to dominate the exchanges. But a mix-up in defence led to a lifeline for Galway with a goal by Michael Meehan. Credit the young Caltra man for taking the opportunity in fine style in his first encounter, with little between the sides at the end. senior game at headquarters.

That goal helped Galway to an interval lead of 1-5 to 0-7. Donegal started the second half as they began the first by taking the initiative. Paul McGonigle brought them level quickly with a fine point.

However, Galway, with Kevin Walsh and Joe Bergin doing well in midfield, dominated matters for some time after that and looked poised for the next round when they led by I-10 to 0-9 after fifty-two minutes.

However, Donegal displayed plenty of character by rallying strongly. McGonigle popped up again to send over the bar and bring the Northerners level after sixty-seven minutes.

With excitement at fever pitch, substitute John Haran pointed Donegal into the lead. but Galway battled back and Kevin Walsh proved a true captain by sending over the equaliser from 35 metres to send the game to this replay-I-II to 0-14.


McGonigle had a fine game

for Donegal. Team captain Sweeney and Brendan Devenney were other stars up front. Kevin Cassidy and Barry Monaghan in the half back line and full back Raymond Sweeney were others who did much to ensure that the North-Westerners kept their ambitions alive.

Kevin Walsh did well at midfield for Galway and set the seal on his contribution with that late, late equalising point.

Kieran Fitzgerald, Gary Fahey in defence, Joe Bergin at midfield, especially in the second half, and Paul Clancy in attack, did much good work as well for the Connacht champions.

No doubt both counties will have learned some valuable lessons from that exciting draw. The indications are that this will be another keen



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The quarter-finals... the stalemate stage

The All-Ireland Football quarter/finals have been in existence for just three seasons, but already five of the 12 contests have ended in draws, with half of the fixtures of the previous two years at this stage requiring second meetings.

2001: Meath 2-12 Westmeath 3-9

Des Dolan opened the scoring for Westmeath at the second minute, but Ollie Murphy levelled almost immediately. However, goals by Paul Conway and Michael Ennis did not bring similar replies and Westmeath led by 2-4 to 0-2 at the end of the opening quarter. The Royals did eventually get moving and Murphy's goal helped narrow the arrears to four points, before Dolan's goal on the call of half time left it 3-7 to 1-6.

By the 40th minute points from Trevor Giles, Graham Geraghty and Ray Magee had the Meath deficit down to four, but ten minutes later thanks to a brace from Joe Fallon it was back up to six. Points by Giles (2) and Nigel Crawford halved that deficit and having never lost to the Lake county, Meath kept their record intact as Murphy fired home the equalising goal in the final minute.

Replay: Meath 2-10 Westmeath 0-11

A crowd of 33,000 turned up for the replay at Croke Park and although Westmeath made the more promising start, Meath had the first major score when Graham Geraghty goaled at the ninth minute. The Lake county continued to have the better of matters territorially, but inaccuracy up front undermined their efforts and at the break Meath led by I-3 to 0-5.

By the 40th minute Westmeath had crept in front, but Ollie Murphy set up Ray Magee for Meath's second goal and the lead; a lead which they never subsequently surrendered. Now down a man, it was expected that Meath would struggle to the finish, but as often happens the numerical inferiority proved no disadvantage and they finished strongly to emerge deserving five-point winners.

Kerry 1-14 Dublin

John Crowley had the afternoon's first score at Thurles, but Des Farrell quickly found an equaliser for Dublin. However, a point by Crowley and a goal by Aodán MacGearailt brought just a single in reply from Declan Darcy to leave it 1-2 to 0-2. Kerry continued to have the better of matters generally and at the interval they led by eight points -1-8 to 0-3.

Eoin Brosnan extended the lead on the restart and before the end of the third quarter Kerry still found themselves eight points clear (1-10 to 0-5) and apparently cruising to victory. However, a Darcy point and a Vinnie Murphy goal halved the deficit, before

points by Ciarán Whelan and Wayne McCarthy and a goal by Darren Homan gave Dublin the lead, but Maurice Fitzgerald saved the day with a magnificent point from the sideline.

Replay: Kerry 2-12 Dublin

Despite enjoying the majority of the possession Dublin could only be on terms after the opening ten minutes (0-1 each) and Kerry made them pay when John Crowley goaled. Crowley's second goal at the 22nd minute gave Kerry a 2-5 to 0-2 lead, although Dublin did snipe a couple of points off the deficit with points from Declan Darcy (2) and Ciarán Whelan before the break (2-6 to 0-5).

The momentum stayed with the chasers on the restart as Colin Moran and Darcy pointed, but Crowley and Dara Ó Cinnéide replied for the leaders to leave seven between the sides. A goal by Darren Homan and a point by Paul Curran promised another epic comeback, but Maurice Fitzgerald and Crowley kept Kerry ahead. Dublin did reduce the deficit to three, but couldn't find an equalising goal.

2002: Armagh 2-9 Sligo 0-15

For most of this contest Armagh appeared on course for a comfortable victory, but they collapsed in the final quarter allowing Sligo to earn a second chance and almost sneak the win. Steven McDonnell's 25thminute goal was the principal score of the opening half and it allowed Armagh to turn over leading by two points - I-5 to 0-6, when they should have been further ahead.

Shortly after the restart Diarmuid Marsden goaled to send Armagh six points clear and it only appeared a matter of how much they would win by. Entering the final quarter Armagh were still six to the good and when Sligo had a player sent off it appeared all over. But amazingly, they continued to attack and six unanswered points earned them a second chance.

Replay: Armagh 1-16 Sligo

As with the previous meeting, Armagh looked the more likely victors for most of this contest, but on this occasion they managed to hold out for a twopoint victory. Before 22,000 spectators at An Uaimh, Armagh again had the better of the opening half, but this time they didn't have to rely on a goal to

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establish a two-point interval advantage (0-10 to 0-8).

Again like the drawn game the leaders goaled shortly after the restart, this time Ronan Clarke doing the honours and a couple of points quickly followed to make it 1-12 to 0-8. But again Armagh faltered and slowly but surely Sligo edged closer. The Connacht side were just two in arrears deep into injury time when they had a penalty appeal turned down and a relieved Armagh advanced to the semi-final.

Dublin 2-8 Donegal 0-14

The match was 13 minutes old before Shane Ryan opened the scoring, but Donegal soon found their feet and three unanswered points had them two clear at the end of the opening quarter. Ray Cosgrove's goal put Dublin back in front and there was little to choose between the sides for the rest of the half and appropriately just the minimum divided them at the break (1-4 to 0-6).

The tit-for-tat exchanges continued after the restart and with five minutes remaining they couldn't be separated. Ray Cosgrove's goal appeared to have settled the issue, but Donegal calmly set about finding the three points required for a second chance. Two of them fell to Adrian Sweeney while Paul McGonigle got the third to tie matters up.

Replay: Dublin 1-14 Donegal 0-7

As so often happens, the replay takes a completely different route than the drawn encounter, but initially this appeared to be an action replay of the first meeting. Little of note happened in the opening quarter as Dublin edged ahead by 0-3 to 0-2 but Ray Cosgrove's goal opened up daylight between the teams. By the interval Dublin were six points to the good and looking comfortable.

Donegal attempted to snatch a quick goal on the restart and Adrian Sweeney came close but Stephen Cluxton was alert to the danger and denied the Northerners. After that Donegal simply faded out of the game and Dublin did pretty much as they liked. Indeed, such was the fall off in the Ulster team's performance that the winners were not flattered by the final margin of ten points.

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Donegal...Stalemate and **Decisions**



ike their opponents today, Donegal were slow to embrace replays in the senior football championship and having made their debut in 1906, they waited until 1919 before making a second outing in the competition. Such inactivity obviously militated against any drawn encounters and indeed more than 40 years passed from their debut to their first drawn encounter.

However, the North-Westerners were involved in a couple of matches that were decided by objections with mixed results. In 1923 Donegal lost to Derry by the narrowest of margins, but on an objection they moved into the next round without requiring a second meeting. But on the flip side, they defeated Antrim by 2-4 to 0-2 in 1931, and when the Glensmen objected they were then given the verdict. It appeared Donegal were doing their utmost to avoid any kind of replay activity.

And when Donegal finally had to meet the same opposition for a second time, it was not by means of a drawn encounter, but by way of an abandonment. In 1948 Donegal trailed Antrim by 0-1 to 1-3 when the referee brought the game to a premature halt, but he wasn't doing Donegal any favours as it turned out for they lost the replay by 1-4 to 4-3.

The First Draw

Finally in 1950, a full 46 years after their debut, Donegal experienced stalemate for the first time when they drew with Down (3-5 to 2-8), but their first "official" replay didn't have a happy ending as the Mourne men advanced at the second time of asking by 4-3 to 1-7. Donegal were back in replay action within twelve months as they held Antrim to a 2-7 all draw, but again they just came up short in the replay and lost by the narrowest of margins (1-5 to 1-6).

At the third time of asking in 1965 Donegal didn't succeed on two fronts. Firstly, it was the third draw in their history and also the contest with Cavan went to a third meeting. But the story had much the same ending – a Donegal exit as, following a 1-8 all draw and a 0-14 to 1-11 stalemate, the Breffni men advanced at the third time of asking by 0-9 to 0-8.

However, on their fourth attempt Donegal had success. Again Cavan was the opposition and in the 1972 meeting Donegal should have won the initial encounter, but Cavan scored 2-6 to their 0-12. However, Donegal got goals in the replay and they were crucial in their 2-11 to 1-9 victory.


A Final Draw

In 1974 Donegal reached the provincial final and scored I-14 in reply to Down's 2-11 and they regained the Ulster title with a 3-9 to 1-12 victory in the replay. But 15 years later, Donegal's next replay had an unhappy outcome. Having lost the previous year's provincial decider, Tyrone were more than anxious for the title, but Donegal held them to a 0-11 all draw. However, Tyrone were not to be denied and won the replay by 2-13 to 0-7.

The last decade saw Donegal experience stalemate twice more with Armagh providing the opposition on both occasions. In 1993 it took a couple of late points to earn Donegal a second chance (0-15 to 1-12), but they took that chance with some aplomb as they dominated the replay and won by 2-16 to 1-7. However, the Orchard county had its revenge at the end of the decade as they held their hosts at Ballybofey (2-9 to 1-12) before advancing at Clones by 2-11 to 0-12.

The current decade has seen Donegal experience stalemate twice already, with neither having a happy outcome. In 2001 Fermanagh held them at Ballybofey (2-13 to 1-16) before ousting them at Enniskillen by 1-9 to 0-10. And last season they showed a cool head to score three late points to force Dublin to second meeting (0-14 to 2-8), but flopped in the replay and lost by ten points (0-7 to 1-14).

Excluding objections, etc. Donegal have been involved in ten replays of which they have won just three. Like Galway, they will be hoping to improve on a poor replay record today.

Donegal 2-16 Armagh

Donegal have to go back ten years to their last replay win and that was when they defeated Armagh at Breffni Park at the second time of asking in front of 18,000 spectators. As reigning All-Ireland champions, Donegal had struggled in the drawn encounter and it took a couple of late points to earn them a second meeting with the Orchard county. However, they grabbed the second chance with both hands and, from an early stage in this replay, they looked the more likely victors. Within 20 seconds of the throw-in Martin McHugh opened their account with a point and in the fifth minute John Duffy goaled for a four-point advantage. The title-holders continued their assault and further points followed from Paul Carr, Duffy and Declan Boyle. A second goal continued the rout with Mark McShane applying the finish and when McHugh had his second point of the afternoon it was 2-5 to nil.

Armagh finally got off the mark at the 15th minute and indeed they were highly competitive in the second quarter restricting the leaders to just two points, both of which were scored by Manus Boyle. However, an interval deficit of nine points - 0-4 to 2-7 - is a

formidable obstacle against any team; against the reigning All-Ireland champions it is nigh-on impossible.

And so it proved as the early second-half scores required by the chasers failed to materialise, with most of the action taking place at the other end of the field. A point by Brian Murray and two from Declan Bonner pushed Donegal's advantage into double figures, and although Armagh did have a purple patch that yielded a goal and a point in quick succession, it barely knocked the champions out of their stride as Boyle and Declan Bonner restored Donegal's double-digit advantage. And there it remained as, when the final whistle sounded, Donegal had twelve points to spare.






Unlike Donegal who have to go back a decade for their last replay success, Galway's last second-chance success was just four years ago when, as reigning All-Ireland champions, they defeated Sligo at Tuam before an attendance of 28,000. A week previously at Markievicz Park, Galway had seriously underperformed and were fortunate to escape with a draw, but on this occasion they made no mistake and had 13 points to spare when the final whistle sounded. However, they started nervously and with Eamonn O'Hara dominating the midfield exchanges they guickly found themselves in arrears and by the 20th minute Sligo led by three points (0-5 to 0-2). But then the home side suddenly clicked into gear and points by John Donnellan and Seán Óg dePaor narrowed Corribside arrears to the minimum. And just before the break Donnellan again raised the white flag to leave it 0-5 apiece at the interval.

Although Galway now had the momentum, it appeared as if the large attendance was in for an



exciting second period, but once John Donnellan gave the Corribsiders the lead within 60 seconds of the resumption there was only one team in it. The leaders attacked in waves and it seemed inevitable a goal would come, but Sligo 'keeper Peter Walsh was in fine form and in particular his save that denied dePaor a goal was out of the top drawer. However, dePaor was not to be denied and at the 63rd minute he finally beat Walsh for the game's only goal. But it was not the telling score as by the end of the third quarter it was obvious that the champions were going to win; the only question was by how much? With Gary Fahy starring in defence, Sligo's attacks were limited and they managed just two scores after the resumption, while further out the field dePaor and John Donnellan did most of the damage and the final margin of victory did not flatter the winners.



Galway's Championship Epics

f Galway had to present their football credentials at provincial or All-Ireland level, they can be assured that they will rank with the best that any county can present. And that for a county that experienced a positively disastrous opening history as far as the first decade in which they competed is concerned. They recorded just two wins in ten years in Connacht and on the occasions that they moved further afield – as nominated Connacht representatives – it was the same story.

Galway's displays in the second decade inside the province were a huge improvement on what had gone before, but when Munster champions were confronted, the story was less encouraging; that was until they opposed Kerry in the 1919 All-Ireland semi-final. All previous efforts by western representatives (including Galway's) against the Kingdom had ended in failure, but in that year Galway wrote a new page in their own, and Connacht's, history by not alone beating Kerry, but doing so on a replay (heretofore, Kerry's replay tradition had intimidated all comers). If the subsequent final with Kildare was a



huge disappointment, 1919 was the year in which Galway, and Connacht, football turned the corner.

When Galway line out at McHale Park this evening it will be their 256th championship appearance with the record to date reading 138 wins, 23 draws and 94 defeats.

Tipperary – The Premier County provided Galway's firstever opposition when the Corribsiders reached the 1900 "Home" final without having to play a game. It was poor preparation for a clash with the well-prepared Munster champions, who won with 22 points to spare (2-17 to 0-1). Galway have yet to get a chance to avenge that defeat.

Mayo – Galway's greatest championship rivals in actual meeting and tradition. Since their first meeting in 1901, they have met on 75 occasions with the balance slightly in Galway's favour – 35 to 34, with six games drawn. Galway's biggest win was in 1956 when they won the opening round at Castlebar by 17 points (5-13 to 2-5). Their heaviest defeat was by a margin of 16 points (2-3 to 4-13) at Tuam in the 1951 final.

Sligo – Galway's first meeting with Sligo was in 1909 and in all they met on 32 occasions with the Corribsiders winning 24, losing four and drawing four. The biggest winning margin was at Pearse Stadium in 1990 where the score was 6-18 to 0-4 (32 points). Sligo's biggest win was by ten points (1-13 to 0-6) at Markievicz Park in 1975.

Leitrim – Of their 32 meetings with Leitrim, Galway have won 24 and lost five (three matches were drawn).

Galway's best afternoon against Leitrim was the 22-point winning margin they achieved at Carrick-on-Shannon in 1976 (3-21 to 0-8) while their heaviest loss was by seven points in the 1927 final at Roscommon (0-3 to 2-4).

Kerry – Apart from their Connacht neighbours, Kerry have been Galway's most persistent opponents. Eighteen meetings have resulted in six Galway victories, three draws and nine defeats. The Westerners biggest winning margin was six points in the 1919 semi-final replay (4-2 to 2-2) while their heaviest reverse was by double that in 1984 (0-11 to 2-17).

Dublin – In nine meetings with Dublin Galway have won just twice and their best victory was by just two points in the 1934 All-Ireland final (3-5 to 1-9). The heaviest defeat suffered was by only five points (1-6 to 0-14) in the 1974 final.

Galway have clashed with 13 other counties with a credit balance being recorded against Donegal, Cavan, Monaghan, Meath, Down, Derry, Wicklow and Armagh, but debit balances against Offaly, Clare, Cork and Tyrone. They have shared the spoils in the four meetings with Kildare.

Donegal – the Championship Record



hen Donegal players step out on McHale Park this evening they will be taking part in the county's 155th championship game. By the standards of participation set by counties like Kerry, Cork, Dublin or Galway, Donegal do not compare, but if effort against the odds can assess a county's greatness, perhaps Donegal does not lag too far behind. For reasons that are not entirely clear, Donegal were latecomers to championship football, and even when they participated for the first time in 1906 when they opposed Derry at Strabane, that appearance did not imply any suggestion of permanence and it is a sombre

reflection that in the first 30 years of the championship, Donegal's only outing was the one against the Oak Leaf.

When organisation in the county came to grips with the problem of inter-county competition in 1919, their return was quite sensational as they recorded a stunning 0-16 to 0-3 win over neighbours Tyrone at Strabane. But it was a false dawn and Donegal were to know decades of frustration as they sought to match the achievements of other Ulster counties. Eventually they would triumph and they stepped on to the All-Ireland stage for the first time in 1972 and here is how they performed against the other eight Ulster counties and outside opponents.

Derry – As Donegal's first-ever championship opponents, Derry take pride of place and in all they have met on 16 occasions with the balance in favour of the Oak Leaf by nine to seven. Donegal's biggest win over the opposition was in the 1990 provincial semi-final, which they won by ten points (1-15 to 0-8). Derry's biggest win in the clashes of neighbours was by 16 points (0-18 to 0-2) in their first meeting.

Tyrone – Donegal and Tyrone have met on 14 occasions with Tyrone holding the upper hand with nine wins against Donegal's four (there was one draw). The biggest winning margin in Donegal's favour in any of those games was 13 points, which they recorded in the first-ever meeting at Strabane in 1919 (0-16 to 0-3). As recently as 1985 Donegal suffered their heaviest reverse at Tyrone's hand when losing the final at Clones by 0-7 to 2-13.

Cavan – Over the years the Breffni county has been Donegal's most persistent opponents. Thirty-five meetings have taken place of which Donegal won ten, drew two and lost 23. Appropriately, Donegal's biggest win came in their first victory (11 points) – 4-5 to 0-6 in the 1963 semi-final. Their heaviest defeat was by a margin of 23 points (0-4 to 5-12) in the 1939 semi-final.

Fermanagh – On 15 occasions the paths of Fermanagh and Donegal have crossed in the championship with Donegal enjoying an eight-five lead (two matches were drawn). Their biggest win was by 18 points in the 1966 semi-final (4-17 to 1-8), while Fermanagh's largest victory was by just five points (2-5 to 1-3) in the 1934 first-round meeting.

Armagh – The record in the clashes with Armagh is not impressive – six wins, one draw and nine defeats.

Donegal's widest margin of victory was, not surprisingly, in 1993 when as reigning All-Ireland champions they won the semi-final meeting (a replay) by 2-16 to 1-7. On the debit side was the 1981 first-round reverse in which the Orchard county's margin of victory was eight points (2-15 to 0-13).

Monaghan – The confrontation with the Oriel county also shows a modest return as in ten meetings Donegal have won just three and lost seven. The winning margins have also been modest – two five-point wins: in 1946 by 4-5 to 1-9 and in 1983 by 1-14 to 1-9. The heaviest reverse was by 13 points (0-1 to 2-8) in their first meeting in 1929.

Down – The record here is fairly evenly balanced with Donegal winning nine, drawing two and losing ten of the 21 head-to-heads. Donegal has won by eight points on two occasions – the 1957 semi-final (3-2 to 0-3) and three weeks ago in the fourth round of the qualifiers (3-15 to 2-10). Donegal's heaviest defeat was by 12 points (0-8 to 2-14) in the 1968 semi-final.

Antrim – Seven wins, two draws and five losses is Donegal's record against the Glensmen in 14 meetings. Both their biggest win and heaviest losses were by 14 points with a 5-9 to 1-7 victory in 1974 being balanced by a 0-3 to 3-8 defeat in 1947.

Outside of Ulster, Donegal have recorded wins over Mayo, Meath (whom they have also lost to), Longford, Tipperary, Sligo and Dublin (three games – a win, a loss and a draw). They lost their single meetings with Offaly (1972) and Kildare (2001), and of course they have yet to beat Galway to whom they lost in 1974 and '83.

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



Galway involved from beginning

he Ladies Gaelic Football Association was founded in Hayes Hotel, Thurles in 1974. Galway's Margaret Colleran was the first National Secretary of the organisation. Galway were involved in competition from the beginning. They attended the inaugural meeting and competed in the All Ireland Senior Championship that year and were runners-up in the All Ireland Final 1975. They were League finalists in 1979 and won the Junior Championship in 1985.

In the early years Galway built up some strong clubs, Galway Gaels were All Ireland finalists in 1981 and All

Ireland winners of the senior club championship in 1982. St Grellan's were runners up in this competition in 1990.

After this the number of clubs became depleted which reflected in the lack of performance by the county teams. In the late nineties the emphasis was put on

developing the clubs concentrating mainly on underage. The first ever under age success for the county was achieved in 1997 when St Brendan's club won All Ireland glory at Feile. This was followed in 1998 with the under 14's, under the management of Con Moynihan, winning the first Connacht title. This was the start of the revival and development of Ladies Football in Galway. Since then Galway have won 2 more under 14 Connacht titles, five under 16 Connacht titles, I Minor Connacht title, 2 Junior Connacht titles and in 2002 All Ireland Minor and Junior titles.

On the club scene Kilkerrin / Clonbern won the Intermediate All Ireland in 1999, St Brendan's won 2 further All Ireland Feile competitions in 1998 and 2001 as well as the Intermediate All Ireland in 2001 The year 2002 saw five years of hard work and dedication come to fruition. Galway's post primary schools won seven Connacht titles and this year again five titles came to Galway schools, two of whom

went on to win All Irelands.

On the county front the year 2003 has been a good one to date. We started out in the League in Nov '02 with two teams for the first time ever. The B team under the management of Pat Gleeson with Michael Ryder and Caroline Delaney went straight through the League undefeated and beat Cork in the Div 3 League Final and now play in Division 2 next season. They beat Sligo in the first round of the championship and things were looking good, however they lost the semi - final to a more experienced Leitrim. The under 14 team lost the Connacht Final to Mayo, who now play Cork in the All Ireland. We wish them the best of luck. The under 16 team won Connacht

again this year and by the time you are reading this they will have played Cork in the Semi -final and hopefully on their way to All Ireland glory. The under 12's will also have played Mayo and Sligo.

The game today is about the Senior team. This team gained Senior status for the first time this year after winning the All Ireland Junior in 2002.

They have a new management team, of P.J. Fahy, manager, with selectors Michael O'Connell and Richard Bowles. Fighting fit and full of the buzz of their All Ireland win they got off to a great start in the league with wins over Longford, Monaghan and Clare and despite being beaten by Kerry and Mayo earned a place in the League Semi -final which they lost to Kerry.

They have had mixed fortunes in the championship having lost the fist game to Mayo they defeated Roscommon comfortably to earn a place in the Connacht Final today.

The Galway County Board would like to extend its sympathies to the Mayo County Board and to the family and friends of the late Aisling McGing and also to the family and friends of the late Naomi Mulcahy of Limerick. Both young girls lost their lives tragically recently. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a hanamacha.

Mayo ladies ready for battle

Since regaining the All-Ireland senior crown at the end of September last, things have been busy on the ladies football front for Mayo. Hot on the heels of that title, Carnacon captured the All-Ireland senior club title, the first in the history of the county. Six players were involved in both successes, allowing them little time to rest before the intercountycampaign began again.

The Mayo ladies began training for this season in January and, following a short sojourn in the sun at the start of February, they set about making an impact in the National League. Victories over Clare, Monaghan, Longford and Galway were broken up by a home defeat to Kerry. Nevertheless, they qualified for the quarter-finals, where they disposed of Meath rather comfortably. A fortnight later, however, they fell to their conquerors in 2001, Laois, and bowed out of the

competition that Laois went on to win.

Since then all attentions have been focused on the Connacht championship. With three teams competing at senior level for the first time in years, emerging from the province was always going to be a difficult task.

In their opening game, on July 5th, Mayo met Roscommon and, after a tight first half, ran out winners by 16 points, in Hyde Park. Two weeks later, they met Galway at home in McHale Park. Home advantage made a difference and, in an excellent game of football, Mayo emerged victorious, but not without being pushed to the limit by the Galway girls.

This year's campaign is different for all who qualify for the provincial finals, as the limited back door system means they now all go through to the quarterfinals, regardless of who wins the provincial titles.

But the Connacht title means a lot to Mayo and they are not looking beyond that. Rivalry between the two counties has always been great at underage level and now that is transferring to the senior grade, to the immense benefit of the game in Connacht, Mayo will not let of the CBE cup, which they won for the first time just last year, without a fight.

Cumann Peil Gael na mBan Playing Rules

The playing rules of Ladies Gaelic Football are similar to that of mens' Gaelic Football. There are some modifications which are designed mostly to speed up the game and to eliminate unnecessary physical contact which are outlined as follows:

- A size 4 football is used in all grades of competition
- 2. A player may pick the ball off the ground providing she is in a standing position. (The standing restriction does not apply to the

- goalkeeper inside the small parallelgrams).
- 3. A player while on the ground may play the ball away from her but cannot bring it into her
- 4. A player cannot kick the ball as an opponent is about to pick up or take it into her possession.
- 5. All deliberate bodily contact is forbidden. When executing the tackle to dispossess an opponent it must be timed as the ball leaves
- the hands of the player in possession i.e. while the ball is being hopped or in the act of soloing or kicking. It may also be knocked from an opponent's hand by flicking it with the open hand.
- Deliberate use of the shoulder is forbidden.
- 7. All fouls (including short kick-outs (less than 13m) and where a freetaker fouls the ball) are penalised by the awarding of a free to the opposing team.



Donegal Links My links with Donegal

You have to hand it to Brian, one of the top businessmen in the North West.

Donegal's first All Star, he was involved in a big way in the creation of the first-ever club All Ireland when, with his club St.Joseph's (Bundoran- Ballyshannon), he helped to pioneer the first unofficial All Ireland with Bertie Coleman of Dunmore McHales way back in 1968, winning the first final against Dunmore after two smashing games in Ballyshannon and Tuam Stadium, Names like Granaghan, McLoone, O'Carroll, McEniff versus Donnellan, Keenan, McDermott, Leydon come to mind. Those games heralded in the official club All Irelands in the early seventies.

Manager again when Donegal conquered Everest and won Sam in 1992. Then this year he came to Donegal's rescue in a huge way when the county was in crisis at club and County Board level, taking on the onerous position of

Co.Chairman, becoming team manager again and giving the county team a new sense of direction. Donegal County Board owes this man a huge debt.

"The Follower"

He is of the old school of Irish and Latin scholars and his column has done much to co-ordinate and whip up support for the present and past Donegal teams. An old mate of my former teammate and captain Jack Mangan he always had a great grá for Galway's style of football over the years. Donegal football owes him a great debt too. He is to Donegal what P.F.was to Kerry, An Déiseach (Pat Fanning) to Waterford, Carbery to Cork, Culbaire in the Tipperary Star to Tipperary and Bob Hyland to Dublin. Their contributions have never been truly acknowledged.

Séamus Ó Cualáin

If the late Dympna was Galway football's greatest fan, then the eighty years old former schoolmaster from An Spidéal, Séamus Ó Cualáin must be Galway's longest serving one. He hasn't missed a game since the 1930's. He worries all the time about the game and Galway's chances. He is so proud of having taught Kevin Walsh, and the Fahey brothers Gary and Richie, in Killanin N.S. during the early eighties. "They were all lovely lads and great schoolboy footballers then". Séamus regularly sends a postcard of good luck to all



the lads from Connemara on the Galway panel before every game. Count that seven before every game in the S.F.C. —the three Killanin lads, Paul and Matthew Clancy, Seán Óg de Paor and Lorcan Ó Collaráin that's what I mean by dedicated support as far as Séamus is concerned. It's "Maroon and White Forever" no matter where he goes. Last Sunday I met Séamus at the back of the Hogan Stand immediately after the game. He had travelled on Lally's bus from Spiddal starting at 8 a.m. and knew he'd not be home before I a.m. with stops at Moate and Furbo. "I'll keep following them until I'm not able. I've seen them all since 1934 —Beggs and Nestor, Tom and Dinny Sullivan, Purcell and big Mattie, Tommy Joe, Jimmy Duggan, the Donnelan's and big Kevin is the best midfielder we've had since Frank Evers. I was so proud of him when he got the equaliser today. A captain showing the way".






