




REFEREE FOR THE SENIOR FINAL Mick McGrath (Aodh Ruadh)



Mick referees his 8th Senior Championship Final today. Having refereed two Senior Finals in London where he lived in the eighties. He is in charge of his 6th Donegal Final and goes into the record books as the only referee to have reached that milestone. Mick was recognized for his many years of national commitment when he was

appointed to officiate at the 2002 All-Ireland U-21 Football Final between Galway and Dublin. So far, this year, he has refereed two All-Ireland Senior Football Qualifiers (Down v Fermanagh & Louth v Roscommon). A much sought after referee, he is highly respected by players as a man who keeps a game flowing while maintaining authority, control and common sense.

REFEREE FOR THE MINOR FINAL Seamus McGonigle (Aodh Ruadh)



Seamus has been on the Referees' National Panel for the last six years and has officiated at all levels of the game throughout Ireland. The highlight of his career, to date, was when he took charge of the Al-Ireland Minor Football Semi-Final in 2002. Seamus has been refereeing in the

County for eight years and, in

that time, he has refereed Under 16, Minor, Under 21, Junior, Intermediate and Senior Finals.

In the Senior Final the more experienced Naomh Adhamhnán team meet the youthful Naomh Conáil team. The Cathedral Town has won eleven titles if we include Láimh Dearg of 1905 and Ruagairí Leitir Ceannann of 1927. Their last win was in 2001 when they defeated Na gCeithre Maistir. Naomh Conaill have not as yet collected the Dr. Maguire Cup having contested four finals, the last being against Naomh Íosaef in 1965.

This should prove to be a great contest under the watchful eye of referee Mick Mc Grath.

Dr Maguire cup which will be presented to the Senior Championship winner's to-day is in perpetual remembrance of our first President/Chairman.

My thanks to our Development Officer, Terence Mc Ginley together with the Officers and Ground Staff of Fo- Chumann Seán Mhic Cumhaill for having the pitch in such good condition to-day and indeed through the year.

GROUND REGULATIONS

- LAI persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and regulations of Cumann Luthchcleas Gael. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas- horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
- 3. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
- The unauthorised climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in the ground is strictly forbidden.
- Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets, gas- horns and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- 6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
- 7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Stewart may be ejected from the ground.
- 9. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
- 10. The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochana.
- 11 Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- 13.All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to any one using the grounds.

Cathair v Tuath - Cluiche Ceannais 2005

Séamus Mac Géidigh RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta

Nuair a rinneadh an tarraingt do Chraobh Shinsear Peile RTÉ/Raidió na Gaeltachta i dtús na bliana, b'iad Naomh Conaill agus Malainn an péire deirneach a tháinig as an mhála agus is beag a shíl ar an lá sin i Mí Eanáir go mbeadh bunadh na nGleanntach sa chluiche ceannais ar an mhí dheireannach den Fhómhar. Leoga ní mheasaim gur shil bunadh na nGleanntach iad féin go mbeadh siad go fóill sa rás.

S'iad Naomh Conaill an 10ú bhfoireann le áit a bhaint amach sa chluiche ceannais le deich mbliana, rud a léiríonn gur éacht mhór atá ann an cluiche ceannais a bhaint amach ins an Chontae seo. Seo an chéad uair do Naomh Conaill le daichead bliain agus do dhuine ar bith a thaisteal tríd Baile na nGleanntach ón chluiche leath-cheannais tá sé furast sin a fheiceáil. Ba dheacair a shamhailt go bhfuil an oiread sin tacaíochta ag foireann nach raibh sa chluiche ceannais ó 1965, ach le dhá chraobh mionúir bainte acu le dhá bhliain anuas, tá lucht leanúna ag na Gleanntaí nach bhfuil le fáil in áit ar bith eile sa Chontae.

Tá ceantar mór faoi fhó-chumann Naomh Conaill, ó Dhroichead Ghaoth Barra go Mín a' Ghualainn go dtín Éadan sa Ghaeltacht Lár agus isteach go dtí an teorann le Ard a' Ratha. Ceantar tuaithe scaipthe, idir Ghaeltacht agus Galltacht, atá scriosta ag an imirce agus dífhostaíocht leis na blianta. Nach mór an difríocht idir sin agus Naomh Adhamhnán, fó chumann i gCathair Leitir Ceanainn le daonra de 30.000. Ach ar an lá níl ann ach

cúigéar fear déag an taoibh agus bratheann sé cé acu atá spiorad na tuaithe níos láidre ná spiorad na Cathrach. An bhfuil an pheil i Leitir Ceanainn slogtha ag an chathair nó an bhfuil an ceangal láidir céanna idir na himreoiri agus an pobal is atá sna Gleanntaí, áit nach bhfuil ach ábhar comhrá amháin le trí seachtainí.

Seo an 58ú craobh do Naomh Conaill agus an 5ú uair sa chluiche ceannais ach go fóill ní raibh Corn an Dr Maguire sna Gleanntaí diomaite dona huaireanta a himríodh na cluichí ceannais ansin ar an bhaile. Do bhunadh Leitir Ceanainn, seo an 78ú craobh agus an 26ú uair sa chluiche ceannais, an bhua dheireanach in 2001. Ar dhóigh, tá sé cosúil le Craobh na hÉireann, Baile Átha Cliath in éadan na foirne tuaithe agus sa chas seo chomh maith bunús do phobal Dhún na nGall ag tabhairt tacacíochta do Naomh Conaill.

Tá imreoirí le taithí thar na mblianta ag Naomh Adhamhnán, le cois glún óg agus go leor imreoirí eirimiúla ar an taobh líne. Ar an lámh eile tá grúpa d'óganaigh speisialta ag Naomh Conaill agus le cois Seán Mac Giolla Dé, Seáinín Mac a' Luain agus Pádaí Ó Cáilín ní bheidh eagla ar bith orthu roimh bhuachaillí na Cathrach. Cé bith acu a bhainfeas is cinnte go mbeidh go leor do pheileadóirí na contae sna blianta amach romhainn le feiceáil i gcluiche ceannais na bliana seo.

A Foot in Each Camp

THE rich success both on and off the field for St Eunan's over the years is in no small way thanks to a Glenties man!.

For the best part of 35 years Connie Maguire has been at the heart of the Cathedral Town club. But did you know that 'Mr St Eunan's' actually played in a senior championship final for his native town.

That was back in 1965- the last time Glenties appeared in the final. Glenties lost 1-11 to 0-10 (after a replay) to St Joseph's but Connie has few memories of the big day.

"I don't remember that much about it except I didn't play well. I lined out at full forward but things didn't go well. I was dropped for the replay. We had some good players at the time like Neil McKelvey and Frankie Campbell," Connie quips.

A native of the 'Glen Road' Glenties the affable retired ESB Area Supervisor first came to Letterkenny in 1970. Since then he has held various adminstrative roles with the club but nowadays he is the mastermind behind the ongoing redevelopment of O'Donnell Park. Over 1.5 million has been spent on re-developing the ground into one of the finest in the country including a 2,500 seater stand, six dressing rooms, toilets and meeting rooms.

A fomer County Board Development Officer, Connie quietly kept a 'close eye' on the development at O'Donnell Park. Indeed many an evening he'd be there on his own toiling away at something or another. Every club has one- the quiet guy that does all the unseen work behind the scenes. They seek no credit yet without their presence the club is at a loss. While players come and go people like Connie are rocks upon which the club continues to flourish.

Connie played at Under-16 and Minor level for Glenties. He won a minor championship title with Glenties in 1962 by defeating Bundoran 2-3 to 0-1 in the final. He lined out at centre half forward. After a few years in Sligo where he served his apprenticeship with the ESB Connie came to Letterkenny in 1967 as an electrician.

He retired at the end of last year after spending 42 years with the firm and left as Area Supervisor.

"When I came to Letterkenny it was natural to join up with the local GAA club. There wasn't many other outlets. I spent a few years as an ordinary member before getting involved at officer board level. I have served in many roles but the highlights would have been as Chairman on two stints in 92 and 93," he said.

It was in 1993 that Connie led the massive redevelopment of O'Donnell Park.

"We were badly caught at the time because we couldn't expand. The town was growing yet our facilities were tied so we had to buy additional ground. We purchased 14 acres from Roulstons. We started off with two new practice pitches and then moved onto the new pitch that we have at O'Donnell Park now. We've just finished Phase Three which involved the 2,500 seater stand and support facilities such as the dressing rooms," he said.

"Phase Four would be the terracing of the town side. We hope to fundraise for that and hopefully begin work next year. The old dressing rooms have been bought off us from the council and they've agreed to put in turnstiles and gates as part of the road widening needed to accommodate the new housing development at Kelly's Lawn," he said.

Looking forward to Sunday's match Connie is adamant which side he'll be cheering for.

"Sure I'm almost twice as long now in Letterkenny as I was in Glenties. I'll be cheering for St Eunan's but will always hold a soft touch for my native Glenties," he said.

Connie is married to Ursula, a native of Ballybofey and they have three grown up daughters- Michelle and Joanne who are in Dublin and Caroline who resides in Mullingar.

"Glenties on paper are a young side and relatively inexperienced. St Eunan's are a much more experienced outfit. That might not count for a lot. It all could come down to a bad decision- a slippery surface or that but I'd fancy Eunan's to win," he concluded.



A Brief History of The Senior Football Championship

my research is right (and I do not for a minute claim any kind of infallibility) 2005 is the 62nd year that Glenties have attempted to win the Donegal Senior Football Championship. They have never succeeded. There won't be many 'neutral' supporters at today's final. Glenties made it to the final on four occasions - 1922, 1941, 1942 and 1965. They deserved to draw the great final of 1941 when Jackie Gallagher's last-minute point from a fifty yard free broke the hearts of Columba Mc Dyre and his men and gave Gaoth Dobhair their third crown. Glenties did draw the final of 1965 against St. Joseph's. 1965 was a year of epic games for Glenties beating Mac Cumhaill's (going for 4-in-a-row) in the quarter-final (1-12 / 1-7), beating St. Eunan's in a wonderful semi-final (1-10 / 1-9), drawing the final (0-10 / 1-7) and losing a sparkling replay in late November by 1-11 to 0-10.

Glenties' loyalty to this Championship is matched by St. Eunan's. The town of Letterkenny has participated in the last 82 Championships - a record unbroken sequence going back to 1924. Letterkenny Rovers won the 1927 Championship and St. Eunan's have been successful on nine occasions. They have lost 12 finals (eleven and 1997!) and qualified for the unplayed 1950 final.

Although the Donegal County Board is celebrating its centenary there seems to have been no activity from 1908 or so until 1919 after the initial flurry of 1905 – 1907. The Senior Football Championship has been played every year since 1919 – 20.

ROLL OF HONOUR

1. GAOTH DOBHAIR ... 13

(1935, 1938, 1941, 1944 – 47, 1949, 1953 – 55, 1961, 2002)

Gaoth Dobhair's thirteen includes a four-in-a-row and a three-in-a-row and a 41-year drought from 1961 until 2002. The great Hiúdaí Beag was on the first winning team 70 years ago. Sixty years ago saw the epic final and final replay of 1945 against Ballyshannon with Hiúdaí Beag scoring 2-3 out of Gaoth Dobhair's 4-5 in the replay. Fifty years ago Gaoth Dobhair completed the 3-in-a-row with legends such as Barney Coyle, Hughie Tim, Micky Rua etc defeating a star-studded St. Eunan's team with Hoare, Carroll, English, Peadar Mc Geehin and a certain James Mc Gettigan.

The winning team of 1955 was:

Gaoth Dobhair: Teddy Gallagher, John Gallagher, Nonnie Gallagher, Barney Coyle, Paddy Mc Gee, Packie Gillespie, Charlie Bonnar, Connie Mc Bride, Michael J. Gallagher, Liam Hickey, Hughie Tim Boyle, Antoin Rodgers, Paddy Coyle, Paddy Carr, P.J. Gallagher.

In 1961 Neilly Gallagher got his only medal while his son James was one of the heroes of 2002.

2. AODH RUADH, BALLYSHANNON 12

(1929, 1932, 1937, 1942-43, 1951, 1986-87, 1994, 1997-98) Ballyshannon, as a separate club, has won 12 Championships, including 3 doubles.

The 1942 victory over Glenties was 'the finest encounter ever staged on Ardara grounds', the paper said. Convoy fell to Ballyshannon in 1943 ... fell to legends — Mick

Melly, John Mc Dermott, Red Jack, P.J. Goan, Bob Gallagher, Dan Doherty, the Slevins ...

The Aodh Ruadh youth policy along with the dedicated work of De La Salle College yielded the doubles of the eighties (Tommy Mc Dermott, Gary Walsh, Sylvester Maguire, Brian Murray, Gerry Curran, Eunan Gallagher, Diarmuid Keon etc.) and nineties

(Gary Walsh and Sylvester still there with John Duffy, Brian Roper, Nal Mc Cready, the Wards and O'Donnell's etc now on the scene.

3. ST. EUNAN'S 9

(1948, 1956, 1950, 1957, 1969, 1972, 1983, 1999, 2001) In every decade since the forties St. Eunan's have won. They stopped Gaoth Dobhair's bid for 5-in-a-row in 1948. In 1956 Peadar Mc Geetin won his second medal and John Hannigan, Joe Carroll, Noel O'Donnell, Seán Curran were there too along with two men who will be here today, as eager as they were in 1956 - Harry Blake and James Mc Gettigan. The late sixties saw new heroes - the Gallagher brothers. Seamus Hoare, Seán Ferriter, Joe Winston, Par Conagnan.

The 1983 final saw Anthony Gallagher surrounded by a new breed - Noel Mc Cole, Micky Houston, Eunan Mac, Paul Mc Gettigan, Charlie Mugrew, Damien Judge, Pádraig Mc Daid booked him once ... or twice!)

1999 will be remembered for one of the greatest

individual displays in a County final with Brendan Devenney scoring fourteen points and for Mark Crossan's richly-deserved medal.

4. DUNGLOE ____ 7

(1930-31, 1933, 1936, 1940, 1957-58)

It is nearly 50 years now since Dungloe won the Championship and set the Dungloe – Gweedore rivalry of the forties and files realists status as the most famous and fiercest of all Championship rivalries.

Gweedoremen Diver Mc Fadden and O'Donnell helped Dungloe to their victories of 1930 and 1931, aided by a plethora of Sweeneys. The great John O'Donnell was the star in 1933 and 1935. Charlie Campbell was in goals in 1940 with the Mc Garveys outstanding. In 1957-58 legends got their ewards - Frank White, Cookie, Seán O'Donnell, Dom Murray John Campbell, Eddie O'Donnell ... Other legends seem destined not to be so rewarded Tony Boyle ...

5. ST. JOSEPH'S ____ 7

(1965, 1968, 1970, 1973-76)

The Bundoran – Ballystannon combination was one of the greatest club teams in the history of the Championship. Glernies could have nipped them in the bud in '65 but Brady – Mc Enrif – Mc Loone – Mc Shea – Granaghan eic won the day and went on to greater things culminating in the four-in-a-row of 1973-76 with Mc Eniff and Granaghan winning their seventh medals and Declan O'Connell, Alan Kane, Peter Barry, Martin Carney, Josie Boyle and others shiring brighty.

6. KILLYBEGS 6

(1952, 1988, 1991-92, 1995-96)

The 1952 winning team was more of a South-West team than a Killybegs team but the other five victories were the

result of exceptional Killybegs talent carefully-nurtured over many years. The 1988 victory will be remembered for its last-minute controversy but the four victories in the nineties ensured that the Cunninghams, the Boyles, the Whites, the Carberrys, the Gallaghers, Meehan, Mc Ginley, and Mc Gowan, especially Mc Gowan, will always be remembered along with their companions in the Fishing capital of Ireland.

And the fact that the medal-winners of 1988, John Bán and Manus, played in this Championship of 2005 bears witness to the loyalty and commitment and pride of place that make this championship what it is.

7. SEÁN MAC CUMHAILL'S 6

(1959, 1962-64, 1971, 1977).

Seán Mac Cumhaill's won their first title against Kilcar in 1959. Great battles against St. Eunan's in the Eastern Division contributed immensely to the Mac Cumhails 3-in-a-row in the sixties. The Mc Feelys and the Lavertys formed the backbone of this outstanding Twin Towns' team. Micky Mc Menamin and Andy Curran contributed handsomely in 1971 while big Martin Griffin, Brendan Dunleavy and Micky Lafferty were among the '77 heroes against Gaoth Dobhair.

8. ARDARA 6

(1923, 1926, 1928, 1981, 2000, 2004)

Ardara had to wait 53 years before adding to the three titles won in the twenties. Kieran Keeney, Séamus Gallagher, Gerard Mc Nelis, Anthony Harkin and the Molloys were among the stars in '81. Ardara are on top of the 21st century Roll of Honour with Damien Diver inspired victories in 2000 and 2004.

9. KILCAR 5

(1925, 1980, 1985, 1989, 1993)

If the Kilcar success of 1925 was best-forgotten the other victories were more than memorable: Michael Carr and Martin Mc Hugh (0-10) leading the way in 1980; Martin McHugh stealing the show in '85; Mark Mc Shane the hero in '89; and wee James conducting the orchestra as '88 was avenged in '93.

10. BUNDORAN 3

(1920, 1934, 1979)

Bundoran beat Killygordon in the 1919-1920 final. They beat Dungloe in 1934 and in the dull final of '79 they beat Mac Cumhaills with Mc Eniff and Granaghan equalling Danny Gillespie's eight medals.

11. FOUR MASTERS 3

(1982, 1984, 2003)

Donal Monaghan's twilight years were brightened by the victory of 1982. Michael Kelly, Dermot Mc Gettigan, Joyce Mc Mullan, Séamus Meehan, Corny Carr and company were back again in 1984. A new generation of Monaghans along with the Carrs and young guns Lacey, Durcan, Dunnion and Doherty led the way in 2003.

12. NAOMH COLUMBA 2

(1978, 1990)

Seán Gavigan, Michael Oliver Mc Intyre, Michael Gallagher, John Mc Ginley (his son on St. Eunan's team to-day), wee Rory, Pádraig Carr were among the Glen trailblazers in 1978. Six finals in the nineties but only one victory for John Joe Doherty, the Hegartys and their team-mates.

13. DONEGAL TOWN 1

(1924)

Before the Four Masters Club came to be Donegal Town had won the 1924 Championship, beating Dungloe in the final 3-2 to 1-4.

14. CASTLEFINN 1

(1922)

Castlefinn beat Glenties in the 1921-22 final. The Glenties' team in the semi-final was

Memories

With time approaching to the start of to-days Senior County Final no doubt the adrenalin will start flowing and the pulses increase for the players, officials and many of the supporters of both Naomh. Conaill and St. Eunans. I was fortunate enough to be involved with both of to-days finalists when they contested County Finals in the past. Amongst the many that have shared with me the distinction of representing both of to-days Senior finalists are Tommy Gillen, Fr John Mc Loone, Paddy Mc Geehin, Connie Maguire, John O Donnell and Hugh McBride and I am sure most Letterkenny Gaels are well aware that the home of St Eunans is called after a son of Inniskeel Cardinal O'Donnell a native of Kilraine and whose nephews and their families have given sterling service for many years to Naomh Conaill. Tommy Gillen who won a Minor Championship in 1945 with Naomh Conaill and both Connie Maguire and myself who were on the 1962 successful Minor team all went on to serve as Secretary of Eunans at various times.

Since the foundation of the GAA in the county the Naomh Conaill club have contributed greatly to the Association since the first meeting was held in Donegal Town in 1905 and where the call was made to our people to adopt a Gaelic Code. When the first County Board was formed in Mountcharles in 1906 Alex McDyre from Kilraine was selected as joint Co Secretary and also Bishop O Donnell became the first Patron of the County Board.

As a native of Glenties Naomh Conaill was my first club and I am indebted to the many great GAA people in the area at the time who instilled a GAA pride in us. Many of these are now gone to their eternal reward and amongst them are Davy Brennan, Danny Boyle, Danny Sweeney, Columba McDwyer, Eugene Boyle and John O'Donnell. It is good to see Jimmy Mc Kelvey still as active in the Club now as he was in the early 1960s. Jimmy was the father figure to many of the Dublin based players before he became an officer when he returned to the County. At this time in the early 1960s Naomh Conaill had good under-age teams and we contested many under-age County finals mostly against the Ballyshannon/ Bundoran amalgamations which was later to become St Josephs. In 1961 we lost the Juvenile Final which was played on a Xmas Eve. In 1962 we won the Minor and in 1963 we were defeated in the Minor Final. At adult level we lost the Junior Final to Convoy in 1963 and came back in 1964 to win the Junior Championship by beating Castlefin. In 1965 we again met up with the now St Josephs and lost out in the County Senior Final after a replay. Most of the team that played in these County Finals were still only 20 years of age and unfortunately mainly due to emigration the players went to different places.

In 1969 I started playing with Eunans and I was in digs in Letterkenny with Patsy O'Donnell who was an Officer of St Eunans at the time. Patsy got me interested in administration and along with Joe Winstone and Paddy Gallagher we got involved in under-age in the town. Eunans were not taking part in under-age for a year so we started to get a team together. I can recall the first success we had was in 1971 when we won an U-15 County Championship. I can remember a problem we had for that particular final in relation to transport. We were depending on people involved in the club who had cars to transport the team and on the day of the final James Mc Gettigan's mother died and we had about half a dozen players at the square with no way to get to Ballybofey. Luckily Joe Winstone saw a man he was working with passing up the town and he was dispatched to McCumhaill Park with the remainder of the team. After that we immediately ran a draw for a coloured TV and with the profit we employed Josie McCormick from Churchill to transport the teams to games. Eunans had a lot of success in the 1970s at under-age. There was a 3 in a row County Minor Championship winning team from 72 to 74. During my stint as Secretary in 1972 with James McGettigan as Chairman and Brendan O Boyle as Treasurer we had a very successful year winning the Senior, Minor, Juvenile and U-12 titles as well as the Senior Hurling Championship. We also had great success in Scor winning the best Club. There was a great crop of under age players in the town and amongst them were Paul Mc Gettigan, Jim Clarke, Paddy Tunney, John and Paul McGeehin, Frank Cumiskey, Christy Callaghan, Declan Nee and many more.

Seamus O Donnell our County PRO asked me to put a few lines together for this Programme and all I can do is wish both teams the best in to-days Final. Unfortunately many of my friends in both clubs are now no longer with us and I know that to-day they will be looking down at to-days final from that great place in the Sky. Amongst them urging Eunans on will be James Larkin, Noel and Pat O Donnell, Sean Curran, Peader McGeehin, Patsy O'Donnell, Martin Rafferty and Denis Doherty and not far away supporting Naomh Conaill will be Davy Brennan, Danny Boyle, Danny Sweeney, Columba McDwyer, Eugene Boyle, Bernie Gildea, John O' Donnell and a few Connaghans also supporting the boys in blue as I will be doing down here myself.

Céad bliain den Chamann Láthchleas Ghaeil i nDán na nGall

Tá a fhios ag achán dhuine fán cruinniú stairiúl a bhí in ostán Uí hÉidhe i nDurlas Éile, Condae Thiobrad Arainn sa bhliain 1884 nuair a bunaíodh an Chumann Lúthchleas Ghaeil. Bhí na h-aimeanna a bhí ag na fir a bhunaí an CLG mar a leanas. Cluichí Éireannanch (peil Gaelach agus iomanaíocht go mór mhór) an chultúr agus an Ghaeilge a chuir chun tosaigh. Sa chead trí nó ceithre bhliain bhí níos mó suim sa lúthchleasaíocht nó a bhí sa pheil agus iomanaíocht. Spréidh an CLG go gasta agus sa bhliain 1908 bhí 337 chlub i gCuige Laighean, 222 i gCuige Mumha, 124 i gCuige Chonnachta agus 105 i gCuige Uladh. Sa bhliain 1945 bhí níos mó na 2,000 chlub bunaithe sa tír agus inniú tá suas le 2,500 fhóchumainn sa tír.

Bunaíodh an CLG anseo i nDún na nGall sa bhliain 1905. Bhí an chéad cruinniú i dTamhnach an tSalainn. Sa leabhar (The GAA, A History le Marcus De Búrca) tá tuaraisc go raibh cúig chlub sa chondae seo sna blianta 1907 agus 1908. Tá athrú mhór ar an domhan ón am sin agus tá biseadh mhór ar chúrsaí an CLG sa chondae. Inniú tá 40 chlub i nDún na nGall. Tá an chuid is mó de na clubanna seo ag glacadh páirt iomlán in imeachtaí an CLG. Tá peil Ghaelach fir sa láidreacht. Tá foirne iomanaíocht ag thart fá ochtar de na clubanna. Tá peil Ghaelach na mná ag dul i láidreacht ar fad. Tá na clubanna uilig ag obair leis an aois óig agus tá seo le feiceál san ardú chaidhgean atá inár gcluichí. Glacann thart fá leath de na clubanna sa chondae páirt i scór na nÓg agus ghlacann suas le ceithre chlub déag páirt i scór sinsear. Tá áiseanna mhaith ag achán chlub sa chondae le dhá pháirc imirthe ag cuid mhór acu. Tá cuid de na clubanna a bhfuil ardáin acu don lucht féachaint ag na cluichí agus clubtheachanna fá choinne deoch agus comhrá indiaidh na cluichí. Bhí an lá is mó ag na Conallaigh sa bhliain 1992 nuair a bhain an foireann peil sinsear craobh na h-Éireann ar an 20ú lá do mheán Fómhair i bPáirc an Chrocaigh. Ní dhéanaidh muid dearmad go deo den lá sin agus beidh áit go brá ag foireann '92 i stair CLG Dhún na nGall.

Senior Final upset as Kilcar triumph

Kilcar (1-13) Ardara (0-08)

Displaying a determination, flair and a level of fitness their opponents could never come to grips with, underdogs Kilcar tore the form book to shreds at McCumhaills Park, Ballybofey on Sunday with a decisive eight points victory over their fancied South-West neighbours, Ardara, which gained them their first Donegal Senior Championship title since 1925.

On form, and particularly after their showing in the semi-final, when they were fortunate to defeat Naomh Columba, there were few in the County outside of their own supporters, who could see them preventing Ardara from adding the Championship to the Shield title won earlier in the season, but what a revelation they were on Sunday.

They were so impressive that it was difficult to believe that it was the same team which played in the semi-final. That they had done their homework in earnest since that game was very evident, not only in the fact that they were yards faster than Ardara and still running as strongly as in the last minute as in the first, but in their whole approach to the game. They ran, tackled and contested every ball as if their lives depended on it, and yet all the time they played with a confidence and competence that Ardara could not achieve.

The favourites were struggling from an early stage. The little Dutch boy plugged the hole in the dyke with his finger, but Ardara just did not have enough fingers to plug all the holes in the dyke. Their mentors switched and changed players all over the field to try and hold back the ever surging Kilcar tide, but to no avail.

KEY MEN

Their efforts were particularly directed at negativing the threat posed by Michael Carr and Martin McHugh who were key men in the Kilcar win. County star Carr was the man of the match. Posted at centre half back, he was not only commanding in defence, but menacing in attack when he took off on runs up the field reminiscent of Dublin star Kevin Moran. Usually these runs resulted in a free within range of the Ardara goals. It was there that McHugh came in. He pointed frees from everywhere. In all he scored 10 points from 13, most of them from frees. But his effectiveness did not end there. This brilliant young player's speed and wizardry, made him a constant nuisance to the Ardara defence and try as they might, Ardara could not find a player to keep tabs on him. Apart from Conal A. Gildea, they tried Noel Watters and Lanty Molloy.

However, lest anyone think that this was a two man team; it wasn't. Victory was achieved with a whole hearted team effort, that had Ardara playing second fiddle all over the field.

DISAPPOINTING

Ardara were disappointing and, all through, one kept expecting them to raise their game but it never happened. Whether they were caught on the hop due to complacency, perhaps, they never settled, or perhaps more correctly, they were never allowed to settle. With one of the biggest County Final crowds for years, a pitch in great shape and a dry ball, the conditions were perfect as referee Jack Furey threw in the ball. Ardara started in the style most expected when Kieran Keeney pointed before a minute had elapsed on the watch.



The sides were level in the second minute when McHugh landed the first of his points, but by the sixth minute Ardara were two points up, when Connie Molloy landed two pointed frees. McHugh had another point from a free in tenth minute after he was fouled himself. He had another point in the 13th minute and a Charlie O'Donnell score put them ahead for the first time. Ardara then switched full forward Kieran Keeney and centre forward Connie Molloy and in the 21st minute, Molloy pointed a free after his brother Lanty was fouled. Two minutes later however McHugh was fouled again and exacted full retribution by putting Kilcar ahead and from another of his frees in the 25th minute Charlie O'Donnell pointed. It was at that stage Anthony Molloy moved to centre field, but McHugh stretched the lead to three points. Just before half time, Martin Sweeney broke clear from defence and pointed to leave the half time score - Kilcar 0-07 Ardara 0-05.



Killybegs and Ardara get this afternoons programme on the road in what promises to be a mouth watering clash between the two best teams in the county. The all South West encounter pairs two of the top minor teams in the county. And there can be no great argument about that. This Ardara group of players are bidding for a clean sweep of championship from U12 up having already swept the boards at Ucd U16 along with the U12. 
