I welcome in particular the Players, Team Mentors and County Board Officials from the four participating counties and I wish all the teams well in their endeavours. I also welcome our Match Officials and hope they also have an enjoyable and successful afternoon.

Cumann Lúthchleas Gael is grateful for the generous support of our sponsors and I especially welcome the representatives of Allianz who sponsor the National Hurling and Football Leagues.

For reasons well known by now the Semi-Finals of the Allianz Division 2 National Football League could not be played last weekend. Indeed it appeared at one stage as if the concluding stages of the competition would be further delayed as play-off games looked very likely. However, results fell kindly for the fixture-makers and this evening's pairings look like delivering two exciting games.

Meath will not need reminding that they lost the Allianz Division 2 Final to Monaghan by a single point in rather dramatic circumstances in 2005. The Ulster side has been the most impressive team in this year's Allianz League, entering today's game unbeaten, but they can expect a stern test from Meath. The Leinster side sneaked into the semi-finals despite a loss to Wexford in the last round and then had to depend on scoring difference to secure a last four spot. Both sides are no doubt working hard in preparation for the upcoming championship, so reaching a league final would be an ideal test for the stiff challenges that undoubtedly lie ahead.

The last time Roscommon supporters came to Croke Park was to witness a famous draw with Kerry in the 2006 All-Ireland Minor Football Final. The title was duly captured some days later. While those young men have yet to make an impact at senior level, a rebuilding process is underway in Roscommon and reaching this evening's semi-final shows the good progress the side has made since the beginning of this year's league. It is the best part of ten years since Cavan last played in Croke Park and the county's return to Headquarters is most welcome, particularly as this is their first visit since the redevelopment of the stadium. The county's new management team and the players deserve great credit for their excellent progress in this year's league and I don't expect there will be much between the sides at the finish.

I gave the recent G.A.A. Congress an update on the planned renovation programme for the Croke Park pitch. The programme will commence next Monday and will be finalised in time for the Leinster S.F.C. games on the 20th May. An on-going maintenance programme will continue during the summer. The pitch has experienced a lot of activity since the beginning of the year and with little natural grass growth during that period until recently, it needs more attention than usual at this time.

I wish you all an enjoyable evening and I thank you for travelling to Croke Park. If you are driving home after the games or perhaps staying over in Dublin for the Allianz Division 1 Final tomorrow, I appeal to you all to take great care on the roads. We must all play our part to eliminate or at least lessen the level of tragedy on our roads.

# IT HAPPENED IN THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE DIVISION II

 Meath and Cavan finished all square under lights on a Saturday evening in early February in the opening round of the Allianz National Football League Division II at An Uaimh. A late goal by Brian Farrell earned the Royal County a draw—2-7 to 0-13.

Cavan had a defender dismissed by the referee after only five minutes but made light of the set-back with a very spirited performance.


- Ciarán Duignan made a fine contribution to earning what many considered a surprising winning start by Leitrim at the expense of Offaly at Cloone. He scored five points.
- Wicklow, under new manager Mick O'Dwyer, made a winning start at the expense of Antrim at Aughrim. Tommy Gill scored 2-2 for the winners.
- The steady advancement of floodlighting at grounds nationwide was given a further

impetus in early February when Meath beat Antrim under new lights at Casement Park.

- The lethal finishing of Declan Browne (who else?) was a key factor in Tipperary recording their first win of the campaign by seeing of Waterford at Ardfinnan in round five. He scored 2-6 of his side's total of 3-10.
- It is not often that a county wins an important game by as many as seven points but still ends up as "losers". That was Wexford's contrasting fortunes in their meeting with Meath at Wexford Park in round seven of Division II earlier this month.


They needed to win by eight points to pip the Royal County for the runners-up position in Division II "B" and with that ranking, a place in the semi-finals. Wexford and Meath both finished with eleven points, one behind leaders Cavan, but the Royals went through with a higher scoring rate.











Monaghan were the real success story of Division II of the Allianz National Football League. They were the only county to finish with full points in Divisions I and II.



Their winning start against Roscommon at Dr. Hyde Park back in early February was a game that went on to cast a long shadow. Few could have then anticipated that the two counties would go on from there to qualify for the last four.

Monaghan did not look back after that.
They played good football and took their scoring opportunities well in an impressive march that brought a seventh successive win when they ended their Division II "A" programme with a hard-earned win over Leitrim at Cloone last Sunday.

The Ulster men lost little time in indicating that they were in no mood to allow their unbeaten record go by the board. The game was only two minutes old when right half forward Ciarán Hanratty had the ball in the Leitrim net. Monaghan went on to lead at the interval by 1-6 to 0-6.

### **IMPROVING**


Leitrim took the game to their opponents from the restart and reduced their arrears to a point. Then came a real test of character for Monaghan as the improving home team took a two points lead with a fine goal.


However, The Ulster men responded in positive fashion. Powered by midfielder Paul Finlay, who chalked up some fine points, they regained the initiative and six unanswered points sent them on the road to victory.

They had a late set-back in added time when Leitrim scored a goal, but Monaghan held out for a well-deserved 1-14 to 2-10 win.

Hanratty, with his morale boosting early goal and good all round play, and Finlay, who chipped in with four points from frees, made big contributions to the narrow win.

Tomás Freeman in attack and Conor McManus in defence also did much to fuel what was a very workmanlike performance and one that, following on their earlier successes, should help to boost Monaghan confidence for this latest challenge to their unbeaten record.

Despite that defeat Meath still qualified for this sage as runners-up to Divisional leaders Cavan. Wexford needed an eight points win to claim the second spot.

The defeat came after Meath had made a splendid recovery from a somewhat uncertain start to the competition in early February.

Uncertain start? It took a late, late goal by full forward Brian Farrell to earn them a draw against Cavan under lights at An Uaimh. That proved to be the only point Meath dropped in six games prior to their visit to Wexford Park. A good record and one that augured well for a winning end to the Divisional programme.

#### **TATTERS**


However, their unbeaten record was in tatters at the interval when they trailed by 2-9 to 0-2. Meath fared somewhat better in the second half, conceded just a single point, but still were well beaten at the end—2-10 to 0-9.

It would be foolish to lightly dismiss the Royal County's prospects in this game because of that heavy set-back. They showed earlier in the League that they are capable of better things and also have potential match-winners in all departments.

Brian Farrell is one of the sharpest finishers in the game and Stephen Bray is another forward who knows how to make the most of scoring opportunities. Darren Fay, Caoimh King in defence, and midfielder Anthony Moyles are among others who have demonstrated that they are capable of pushing their side to winning heights.

The nature of the occasion is also tailor-made to envoke an extra special response from the Royal County men.

### THE ROYALS' LAST SUCCESS...1998

#### Meath 1-13 Monaghan 0-2

Both sides had won their opening fixture in this campaign - Meath against Clare and Monaghan against Laois - so a completely one-sided encounter was not expected at Pairc Tailteann, but for three-quarters of an hour the visitors failed to trouble the scoreboard operator and at the end of the day were 14 points shy of the hosts.

The game as a contest was over by the interval as Monaghan failed to convert any of the chances they were presented with in the opening half. At the other end Ollie Murphy had a Meath goal after fine work by Nigel Crawford and Nigel Nestor and at the break it was 1-7 to 0-0.

Monaghan kicked yet another wide on the restart and it looked as if they would be the first county since Carlow to fail to score in a league

match. Three Ray Magee points pushed Meath 13 clear before Stephen McGinnity finally opened Monaghan's account at the 45th minute. The same player added a second ten minutes later, but this was an afternoon to forget for the Ulster side. Although this Division Two final may have lacked a little in the quality department, it overflowed in excitement with Monaghan grabbing a last-minute goal to secure the honours. Defences on both sides were guilty of slack defending in the opening half as Thomas Freeman notched goals at the 13th and 29th minutes while Anthony Moyles and Trevor Giles found the net at the other end.

An interval lead of 2-6 to 2-5 for Monaghan looked less than secure and within six minutes of the resumption they trailed as Niall Kelly set up Ollie Murphy for the Royals' third goal and Giles converted a free to make it 3-8 to 2-7. However, Monaghan didn't panic and had five of the following six points to tie it up at 2-12 to 3-9.

Points by Regan and Ward put Meath two in front and a swap of scores between McElroy and

Farrell didn't alter that position. With time virtually up Monaghan were awarded a 35 metre free and Paul Finlay's kick eluded a packed goal-line to give the Ulster side an unlikely victory. 

### REVENGE


The Breffni men finished their divisional campaign by taking a handsome revenge over Waterford, who shocked them in the concluding round last year—and at Kingspan Breffni Park.




#### STRONG WIND





# MEMORIES OF A GOAL IN DOUBLE-QUICK TIME



he programme of Allianz National Football League Division II semi-finals this evening revives memories of a goal that was scored almost before spectators had time to blink.

That was in 2005 when Tomás Freeman scored one of the quickest goals of the entire year in **Monaghan's** last appearance in an Allianz National Football League Division II semi-final.

Their meeting with Derry at Clones was a mere ten seconds old when the left full forward had the ball in the Oak Leaf net. The home team went on to lead at the break by 1-9 to 0-4, despite having a forward dismissed midway through the half.

Derry rallied strongly in the second half, but Monaghan battled on bravely to eventually book their place in a League final for the first time in twenty years by 1-13 to 1-11. Tomás Freeman finished as their leading scorer with 1-2.

#### **RUN ENDED**

It was a case of sixth time lucky for **Meath** when they ended a run of five defeats in competitive football by Fermanagh by outscoring the Erne men by 2-14 to 0-15 at Clones in the Royal's last Division II semi-final appearance in 2005.

The scores were tied at 0-7 each at the interval, but Meath firmly laid the foundations of their success with goals from full forward Trevor Giles and left half forward Peadar Byrne in the third quarter.

### **CAVAN TITLE**

Cavan won the Division II title in 1989. They beat Mayo in the semi-final by 0-13 to 2-5 at Ballina, with Ronan Carolan in sharpshooting form. He contributed 0-6. The Breffni men beat Kildare in the final, and, as a result, qualified for a crack at the Division I title proper that season.

They went into a quarter-final against Division I representatives Derry at Croke Park and under the bogey of not having won a game at headquarters in some twenty-two years.


Inspired by centre half back and captain Jim Reilly they recorded a 2-9 to 1-5 win. The victory march was ended by Dublin in the semi-final.

### **IMPRESSIVE**

Roscommon last sampled National League semifinal action in 2002—but in the premier division.

### **DECLAN BROWNE ALREADY ASSURED OF PREMIER POSITION**



  - Throwing any object onto the pitch.
  - Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
  - Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
  - Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
  - Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
  - Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or


