



Opinions from Niall McCoy, Gaelic Life

SEVEN games, 19 goals and four victories by five points or less - this year's Ulster Minor Football Championship has certainly provided entertainment.

Most of the matches have went down to the final quarter and if you exclude Monaghan's 17-point victory over Antrim in the quarter-final, the average winning margin is just slightly over three points.

Even that Monaghan v Antrim match had its own exhilarating narrative as the Saffrons found the net three times in nine minutes after the resumption to get back into it before Monaghan's attacking talent allowed them to pull away at Pairc Esler.

By that stage, of course, Cavan and Armagh had already been in action with the Breffnimen, under the guidance of Gary Donohoe, battling to their first one-point victory of the season in the preliminary round.

Their never say die attitude would shine through in the quarter-final against





Fermanagh as four brilliant points from play by Tom Hayes helped them to another one-point success.

Elsewhere, Donegal's erratic shooting, which had cost them dearly in the league final against Monaghan, came back to haunt them in their quarter-final against provincial favourites Tyrone in Ballybofey.

With Ruairi McGlone calling the shots for Tyrone, they were comfortable sixpoint winners against a Tir Chonaill side that hit 18 wides and only managed a paltry 1-3 tally.

Mickey Donnelly's side would face Down in the semi-final after Pete McGrath's outfit won a crazy last-eight game against Derry at Celtic Park. Goals from Corey Quinn, Donal McKeever and Pat Haveron gave the Mourne county a 3-10 to 0-14 win with the Oakleaf defence crumbling at the crucial moments.

Down hit 2-10 from play in that encounter, and they would be hoping that the attack sparkled once again against a fancied Tyrone in the first of the two semi-finals.

Alas, it was not to be and Tyrone were never in serious bother as they ran out 2-10 to 0-10 winners, Stephen McGrath's late goal ensuring the Red Hands would have the chance to defend their title on July 21.

The second semi-final would see Monaghan and Cavan meet at Clones in one of the best games of the competition.

Monaghan, thanks to two beautiful finishes from Ryan McAnespie and Conor McCarthy, held a seemingly commanding six-point lead at the break - 2-8 to 0-8.

But Cavan once again showed their battling qualities in the second half, and the Oriel men were fortunate to get away with a two-point win after a Liam Galligan goal had brought the Breffnimen right back into it.

So here we are. Twelve months on from Tyrone and Monaghan meeting in an Ulster Final, they are back in the showpiece again.

The Red Hands were crowned champions on that day following a 0-14 to 1-8 victory, their seventh title since the turn of the millennium.

Monaghan will be hoping to gain revenge today and thereby securing their first Ulster title since 1945. Given what has went on before this season, who knows what today can produce?

When Monaghan last won the Ulster Minor Football Championship, they actually edged ahead of Tyrone in the roll of honour, three titles to two.

But since that Farney triumph in 1945, the Red Hand teenagers have torn up the minor grade, adding a further 20 provincial crowns and are streets ahead of any other county in Ulster when it comes to the Under 18 competition.


But Monaghan manager Frank Brady didn't come all this way for a history lesson. The Galway native, having already enjoyed success with the minor and senior hurlers of the Farney county, has now trained his sights on wrestling the Fr Murray Cup from its traditional abode.

Brady is unlikely even to give Monaghan's Ulster Minor League semifinal win earlier this year over today's opposition too much consideration either. The league was a time for tweaking for all counties, although the Farneymen can gain valuable experience from winning the title with a final victory over Donegal.

The winning habit is one Brady would like his side to get hooked on, just as successive Tyrone minor teams have.

A win over Donegal also got the Red Hands' Championship campaign underway, Mickey Donnelly's men beginning the defence of their Ulster title with an unconvincing 1-9 to 1-3 win in Ballybofey.

By contrast, Monaghan fairly put Antrim to sword in Newry, getting their Championship challenge off to a flier with a 4-20 to 3-6 win. They didn't have it so easy in their semi-final against neighbours Cavan thought. Having established an early lead, Monaghan were forced to withstand a stirring comeback from the Breffni boys before eventually running out winners by 2-11 to 1-12.



Tyrone booked their place in this year's final with an impressive 1-12 to 0-10 win over a fancied Down side. It was a game which had swung back and fourth throughout before substitutes Che O'Donnell and Stephen McGrath combined for the latter to score the goal which clinched the contest for Tyrone.

Today's final is a re-run of last year's decider which a relatively more experienced Tyrone side won 0-14 to 1-8. However, the Red Hand forward trio which did all the damage last year - Sean Hackett, Kieran McGeary and Mark Bradley - are not involved this year while Monaghan have a number of players who will line out in today's decider who were on the losing side 12 months ago.

Conor McCarthy scored Monaghan's goal in last year's final and has been in fine form this season, popping up with crucial goals and showing coolness from frees too. He is part of a slick Monaghan attack which

will have matured from last year's final and McCarthy, Ryan McAnespie and Fearghal McGeough are certain to give the Tyrone defence plenty to think about today.

Not that they have been found wanting in that department this year. A Down side flush with attacking talent were frustrated in the semi-final by the likes of Shea Hamill, Padraig McGirr and Frank Burns and, in a team without many stand-out stars, Tyrone's collective effort has been ther biggest strength.

Tyrone captain Ruairi McGlone is the only member of Mickey Donnelly's squad who was involved last year, although he was not a regular starter and has only this year become a driving force for the team.

Experience is a rare commodity at this level and Monaghan have the edge of their rivals on that front, but can they convert that into only a fourth Ulster minor title today?



The Ulster Final in Clones is very special. I hope today that our players can make their families, clubs and supporters proud.



DANNY DOWDS

As he sits in St Tiernach's Park today, Danny Dowds can cast his mind back over all of Donegal's provincial successes, back to 1972. He was here too for their near misses in the 1960s – the GAA has been a constant thread throughout his life.

Born into a family steeped in Gaelic games (grandfathers on both maternal and paternal sides won **Ulster Senior Championship medals** with the famous Burt Hibernians in 1906), it was perhaps inevitable that Danny Dowds would spend his life promoting the games.

Full back was his position when he played football in the 1960s, where he gained the reputation for fielding the ball with one hand and 'making room' with the other.

At the time, under-age football and hurling was pretty much non-existent in Inishowen, and indeed across Donegal. Danny, and his cousin James McLaughlin, resolved to do something about that.

in the mid-1970s they started coaching gungsters in the arts of football and nuring in the Black Park. Danny took the football, James the hurling, and ts no exaggeration to say that the generations since who have kicked a all or struck a sliotar were coached by the cousins at one time or another.

with no money to run buses, players instead were packed into Danny's old Cartina, or James' Capri for away games. Thirteen players in James' Capri was the record.) Inishowen titles came in due course, and county titles in hurling, but the real fruits of their labours appeared in the mid-1980s on both the football and hurling fields.

Having only fielded in the Junior Championship for many years, Burt finally made good on all the under-age work and entered the Donegal league in 1985, with Danny, of course, at the helm as manager.

Fielding in those early years was a struggle, with Danny, the bus driver and

others sometimes required to put on their boots to make up the bare 15. But in time Burt would play their way up the divisions, eventually reaching Division 1 and the Senior Championship by 1999. The club's senior hurlers too, would go on to dominate the game in Donegal in the 1990's and into the new millennium, and gain notable successes in Ulster too.

Proud days for Danny and James and the others who had rescued the club from near extinction in the 1970's and secured its future for generations to come. He was a driving force in the development of Hibernian Park in the 1980's and into the 90's.

Not content with managing every team from Under 12 to senior, Danny also spent more than 20 years as club treasurer and regularly represented the club at County and Divisional Board meetings. In many ways, he is Mr Burt GAA. If Noreen Doherty needs help with sorting Burt's Ulster Final ticket allocation, or Brian McEniff is canvassing support for some project or other, or Grace Boyle is chasing up a bill, the first person in Burt they pick up the phone and call is Danny. If he doesn't know the craic, he'll set them on the right path.

Even now, he remains an active member of the club executive and helps with under-age coaching.



Now retired from his job as an overseer with Donegal County Council, the GAA is as central to his life as it has ever been, as his schedule during one recent week attests.

Burt hosted Ballinacourty of Waterford during the recent Féile na nÓg in Derry. Danny was on hand when the team arrived on the Thursday night, went to the match and parade on Friday, and was still to be found helping out on Saturday morning. On Sunday, he was umpire as the club senior footballers hosted Urris. On Monday night, he was the Burt delegate at the monthly County Committee meeting. On Tuesday, he went to Malin to help manage the club U12 footballers and got back in time to oversee the weekly lotto draw. On Wednesday, he was back on home ground to watch Burt play St Eunan's in the Donegal Senior Hurling Championship.

GAA seven days a week. And all for the sheer love of it.


In boxing, suggesting that a fighter has a puncher's chance, is a polite way of saying that they have little hope at all. Today, Monaghan have a puncher's chance.

In the ring, such analysis intimates that one of the boxers has more skill, guile and experience, and the only way that they can lose is to get caught by one very good shot. To paint Monaghan's hopes as anything else is disingenuous.

In the run up to this final, various interviews have been carried out with the Donegal boss Jim McGuinness. The scurrying reporters are eager for a headline, and they've tried in vein to sculpt the shavings of his quotes to form anything that resembles exciting copy. But they have failed.

The best that they could get was a suggestion that his team have to be wary of Monaghan's physicality. That's like a pugilist being concerned that his opponent has two hands. But there is more chance of a banker losing his bonus than Donegal getting edged out on the physicality stakes. Monaghan are big, yes, but Donegal are fit for them.

I'd say that this Tir Chonaill team have done more weights sessions than I've had spuds this year. So the notion that they would go all weak-kneed and limp wristed at the sight of Owen Lennon and Dick Clerkin is a non starter for me.



But Jim McGuinness has to say something to take the pressure off his team. When every clown with a computer, and I'm referring to the darlings of the media as well as the forum junkies, is tipping Donegal for a three in-a-row, McGuinness has to expect that his team may start believing their own hype.

So he has to talk up the opposition, no matter how outlandish it may seem. Then again, there are a few people who do not buy into the notion that

Monaghan's hopes are as dim as the plumpest turkey in November.

I spoke to a former county manager, himself an Ulster Championship winner, who said that Monaghan have a better chance than most people think. He based his argument on the basis that Monaghan have the forward power to beat Donegal.

There is some weight to his argument when you consider the names that are there. Conor McManus, Paul Finlay and






ALMOST a year to the day later the sides did battle again, this time on Donegal soil.

Meanwhile, Monaghan had lost the Ulster Final to Tyrone and it was thought that they would find it hard to recover from that loss, though they had battled to the end after the Red Hands opened up an early lead.

As it turned out, the pundits got it completely wrong and Monaghan romped to a 2-12 to 1-7 win. Tommy Freeman scored 1-5 and Vinny Corey (who played the final 10 minutes of the game at fullback) added 1-1. It was the end of the road for Donegal.

Monaghan manager Seamus McEneaney was cock-a-hoop after the result. "The Championship starts here," said 'Banty'. "People outside of our family, of the team, may not know the commitment these fellas are giving but I'm very proud of them and they're very proud of each other."

In the Donegal camp, questions were being asked of commitment and desire. Centre half-back Barry Monaghan felt some soul-searching was required of the Tir Chonaill men. "We'll have to take a serious look at ourselves because this is not good enough," he said. "Championship is what it's all about and that's two games in the Championship where we were very, very disappointed."







THE LAST FINAL MEETING



1979 Ulster Senior Football Final

The last time that Donegal and Monaghan faced each other at the final stage of the Ulster Championship was away back in 1979.

Monaghan were appearing in their first Ulster Final since 1952 where they were defeated by the dominant Cavan team of that era. Donegal were back in the final after a five year lapse although the 1979 was one that they would rather forget.

Like today, the final was played in St. Tiernach's Park, Clones in front of over 30,000 spectators. Monaghan attackers Kieran Finlay and Bernard Brady caused havoc for the Donegal defence all afternoon and aid the foundations for a 1-15 to 0-11 victory for the Farney County.

This defeat came at the end of a successful period for Donegal who collected Ulster titles in 1972 and 1974.

After this defeat, they had to wait another 11 years to reach this stage. Conversely, this success was the beginning of a golden era for Monaghan as many of this side were successful again in 1985 and 1988.

The adjacent match report from the Ulster Herald encapsulates another great occasion here at St Tiernach's Park. One aspect that we hope is not repeated today is that the game does not start with the band still on the field of play as happened away back in 1979!



CHILD PROTECTION

Has your Club got a Code of Behaviour?

The GAA Code of Behaviour addresses the minimum appropriate levels of behaviour, practice and conduct required from our Young Players, Coaches, Supporters, Parents/ Guardians, Referees, Officials and Clubs. Everyone involved in our sports and activities should accept the miles and responsibilities that they undertake as we commit ourselves to maintaining a fun enjoyable and safe environment for all. The safeguarding of our members will always be a key priority as we recognise that the welfare of the child is of paramount importance in our work.

all clubs that cater for underage players must do so with a child centred approach and ensure that those thosen to work on their behalf with underage players have been selected allowing a thorough recruitment, selection, training, vetting and maching procedures, and furthermore mode adequate continuous support anable them to fulfil their roles.

Ensuring that your members have signed up to your Code of Behaviour enables you to deal with alleged breaches of the code. The Code of

Behaviour Booklet provides information on how you can deal with alleged breaches and the processes you should follow. When defined in advance, all members will be aware that disciplinary action may be taken if they do not adhere to the code of behaviour.

This Code is jointly promoted by the GAA, the Camogie Association, the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, GAA Handball Ireland and Rounder's Council of Ireland, and should be implemented in all clubs in tandem with the overall Code of Best Practice in Youth Sport – Our Games Our Code.

The Code in booklet form is available from Ulster GAA Offices and from Croke Park, and is also available for section download from www.ulster.gaa.ie/club-maith/. It is recommended that there is a 'sign up' procedure, whereby Young Players, Coaches, Supporters, Parents/Guardians, Referees and Clubs agree to abide by the Code and any other policies in your Club or Governing Body. A copy of the signed document should be retained by the Club Children's Officer.

The 2013 edition includes the GAA Anti-Bullying Policy, which aims



to adopt a whole organisational approach to addressing bullying. We are committed to implementing structures and relevant training to deal with allegations of bullying and Incidents of bullying are regarded as serious breaches of the Code of Behaviour and shall be dealt with accordingly. There is a new Anti-Bullying Course available to all clubs and is accessible through your County Children's Officer. The aim of the Two hour course is to equip clubs with methods to identify, prevent and resolve incidents of bullying in your club.

ULSTER GAA LAUNCH IRISH SCHOLARSHIPS

Gaeilge sa Chlub

Ulster GAA has announced a major sponsorship programme for adult students of the Irish language in conjunction with the University of Ulster. The scholarship scheme will run in partnership with the School of Irish Language and Literature and is to be known as Gaeilge sa Chlub (or 'Irish in the Club'). It aims to promote the use of Irish within clubs throughout Ulster by providing financial assistance to GAA members who sign up for the Diploma in Irish Language course at Ulster.

This two-year (part-time) course is currently available at the UU Belfast and Magee campuses, plus the university outcentres at Cookstown, Ranafast and Downings. It runs for three months in the Autumn (starting 23 September) and three months in the Spring (starting 27 January) and classes are taught in each centre on Monday and Wednesday evenings (5.30-8.20pm). Students are instructed in listening, speaking, reading and writing and many diploma graduates progress to the degree course in Irish Language and Literature.

Martin McAviney, President of Ulster GAA commented on the developing relationship between Ulster GAA and the University: "This initiative enhances the existing strong links between Comhairle Uladh and the University of Ulster, developing the current sporting partnership with a new cultural and linguistic dimension."

Ryan Feeney, Head of Community Development, Strategy and Public Affairs with Ulster GAA spoke of the importance of this scheme at community level: "This scholarship scheme is an investment in GAA volunteers at grassroots level and will enable many people to achieve a university qualification in Irish, developing their own career prospects and enriching their communities."

Dr Malachy Ó Néill, Head of School of Irish Language and Literature



at Ulster complemented Ulster GAA for this 'pioneering' scheme: "This is a significant investment by Ulster GAA in club members throughout the province. There is a growing appreciation of increased employability for Irish language graduates and this pioneering project is in keeping with the ethos of the GAA

"The Diploma was a real game-changer for me – now I'm starting the Degree in September. The part-time course is ideal for someone with a busy lifestyle!"

COACH & VOLUNTEER DEVELOPMENT

Continuing Personal Development

Ulster GAA continues to lead the way in the delivery of top quality courses and practical workshops as we strive to provide support for our coaches and volunteers within the province.

Our plans for the period from September 2013 to August 2014 are at an advanced stage and have been added to the Ulster GAA Events Calendar that can be found on our website homepage www.ulster.gaa.ie

We have also launched an additional two courses in conjunction with the Open College Network (OCN), which provide those that complete the courses with credits on the National Oualifications Framework.

Those Courses, The Diploma in Performance Coaching and Diploma in Team Management are delivered both at Ulster GAA's Armagh Office

and through the Southern Regional College. In October of this year the Diploma in Performance Coaching will also be delivered, for the first time at Letterkenny Institute.

Other courses that will be delivered will include our National Governing Body Child, Youth and Adult Coaching Level Two Awards as well as a number of practical and theoretical workshops.

The Community Development Department continues to deliver a comprehensive suite of courses to volunteers on the administration side of the Association.

Following AGMs in the winter period, and the election of new officers, training will take place in early January to ensure that this cohort of volunteers are equipped with the skills and knowledge to fulfil their new roles.

A further range of Volunteer Development courses will be delivered in each County for new and existing volunteers alike, ensuring that the most recent information is imparted and best practice encouraged. The format of the Volunteer Development Programme will change this year, with each county offered a 'menu' of courses from which they can select workshops depending on their needs.

The Department will also deliver advice clinics on funding opportunities which 'go live' in early 2014, in addition to workshops on form filling and sourcing public funds through the Sport in the Community Programme.

- · Use a sunscreen with SPF 15 and 4 star or more UVA protection
- · Check moles for changes in size, colour and shape.
- · Skin cancer can grow from a freckle, mole or a normal area of skin.
- · Look out for new growths

Coaches and parents - children's skin is especially sensitive to the sun and can burn more easily than adults' so make sure that children are aware of and follow the above rules. If you are coaching a team or running a competition this summer it's a



good idea to have some sun screen available, provide shaded or indoor areas for teams when they aren't playing and encourage all children to keep covered with a hat and t-shirt.


A Look Back at Monaghan's Ulster Success in 1988

The roads along the Monaghan Cavan border carried the graffiti. Nudie Hughes had inspired Monaghan to an Ulster Championship title in 1988. This championship was won in the 5th year of the most successful period in Monaghan GAA history.

(In 1984 Monaghan had reached the Centenary Cup final. In 1985 the Ulster Championship and National League double was completed. In 1986 another League final was reached. Division One League status was maintained).

Although we didn't know it, 1988 would bring the last major success for a long time.





22nd May 1988 - First Round: Monaghan 0-16 Cavan 0-14 at Clones


Many legends were born that day but a long standing hoodoo was broken. Monaghan and Cavan had met 19 times in the Ulster Championship since the fateful final of 1930, and Monaghan had never won. Apart from an honourable draw in 1958, Cavan had recorded 18 consecutive wins over Monaghan stretching back 58 years.

Most of the 17,000 attendance had not been born when Monaghan last defeated Cavan, and this was a victory to savour. The legend of Nudie Hughes was further enhanced as the rumours of his "conversations" with the Cavan defenders gained notoriety. But his boots did the talking also. He scored five points from play. But this was far from a one man performance. David Byrne dominated midfield while Owen Hamilton, at corner forward, terrorised the Blues full back line. With 3 minutes remaining, and Monaghan one point ahead, Big Davy was upended in the Cavan square. The message came in from the

sideline. Eamonn McEneaney tapped the penalty over the bar. The 58 year gap was closed after a truly entertaining, free flowing and pulsating game, a game played with great spirit and honesty. It kept the patrons on the edge of their seats right to the final whistle.

19th June 1988 - Semi Final: Monaghan 1-11 Down 0-9 at Cavan

If the Cavan game was exciting, the semi final against Down was a dour, tactical game which was easily won by the genius of Sean McCague. Down had one of the greatest forward lines of all time, including Shorty Treanor, Ambrose Rogers, Brendan Mason and led by the great Greg Blaney. Sean McCague decided that Monaghan's best tactic was to adopt a man-to-man marking system to smother the Down attack, and then catch them on the break, Brendan Murray, Gene Sherry, Gerry Hoey, Bernie Murray, Declan Loughman and Ciaran Murray were given very simple instructions "Wherever he goes, you go."



The Down attack was so stifled that all of their full forward line was substituted by the 60th minute. But this wasn't only a defensive success. Up front, that great warrior, Gerry McCarville, led a rampant forward line from the 40, Eamonn McEneaney chalked up 1-5 while Eamonn Murphy gave a "man of the match" performance on the edge of the square. Tactically, a game won on the training pitch, and on the drawing board. A game for the purists.

17th July 1988- Final: Monaghan 1-10 Tyrone 0-11 at Clones

Monaghan and Tyrone were the top Ulster sides in the 1980's. Both had run Kerry close at All-Ireland level, Monaghan in the 1985 semi-final, and Tyrone in the 1986 final. Each had a win in the First Round encounters in 1981 and 1982.

P.J. Finlay lined out in a midfield partnership with Kevin Carragher to counteract the height advantage of

Tyrone. But it was the Monaghan half back line of Bernie Murray, Ciaran Murray and Declan Loughman which turned the tide. Their fitness and commitment drove Monaghan again and again.

Nudie again stepped up to the plate, top scoring with 1-3. The sides were level at half time but in the early part of the second half, Monaghan shot a succession of wides which might have proved disastrous. Then, things came right. Four unanswered points opened up a three point lead. Two appeals for penalties by Tyrone were ignored and when former Louth star, Stefan White. scored the final point the victory was secure.

The All-Ireland Semi Final against Cork was an anti-climax. Injuries to key players weakened Monaghan. Although fans remember the unpunished foul which broke Brendan Murray's jaw, this was not the whole story. As the heavens wept on Croke Park, Cork dominated the midfield area, scored 1-14 to 0-6, and added 20 wides for good measure, leaving Paddy Linden as the only Monaghan hero.

But, an Ulster title was won. Nudie cantered into the Hall of Fame. The fitness levels achieved by Niall Moyna, added to Sean McCague's strategies, brought the well-merited success. All contributed to a memorable, if somewhat wet, summer of '88.

DONEGAL'S BAND OF BROTHERS

Brothers in 50 years of Ulster Finals - Peter Campbell, Donegal Democrat

Today's Ulster Final marks the 50th anniversary of Donegal's first final in 1963. It is their 18th final (excluding replays) and during those deciders they have used a big number of brothers in green and gold. From the first final in Breffni Park in 1963 where the Breslin's and McFeely's featured to today when the McGee's and McHugh's could feature.

In the sixteen finals, the Anglo Celt has gone back to the hills on seven occasions, but only one set of brothers played in Donegal-winning sides. That was in 1990 and 1992 when the elder McHugh citizens, Martin and James, were in the Tir Chonaill line outs.

Ironically, the McGee's, Eamonn and Neil (who feature today in the Donegal defence) did not play together in the two recent Donegal successes in 2011 and 2012 with Eamonn sitting out both games. The McGee's did play together in an Ulster Final in 2006, but they ended up on the losing side against

Armagh. Indeed that was a fate that was to befell most of the Donegal brotherhood on Ulster Final day.

Fifty years ago when Donegal played in their first Ulster final against Down, there were two sets of brothers on the field - the McFeely's and Breslin's. Brendan McFeely was at corner back for Donegal with his brother, Frankie at midfield, while the Breslins, Cormac and Donal, from Gaoth Dobhair were in the forward line (Frankie McFeely went on make his own piece of history by being the first Donegal man to lift the Anglo Celt Cup in 1972).

The McFeely's were on the field again three years later in 1966 when Donegal again lost to Down, this time in Casement Park, in a final that was the first Ulster decider to be shown live on TV (BBC).

While Donegal were involved in finals in 1972 and 1974, 1979, 1983 and 1989, it was not until 1990 that brothers appeared again, this

time the McHugh's, Martin and James, on the winning side that defeated Armagh in Clones.

A year later the Bonners (Sean and Declan) were part of the team that lost to Down, while in 1992 and 1993, the McHugh's were again on the field of play for the final.

In the new millenium the Sweeney's (Raymond and Adrian) were on Donegal teams that lost out to Armagh in 2002 and 2004, while the McGee's, Eamonn and Neil, were on the 2006 team.

Over the period, there were other sets of brothers, such as the Thompsons and Gavigan's, who were part of Donegal panels for Ulster Finals, but both did not play on final day. Indeed, the Gavigan's (Martin and Luke) have Ulster medals from the 1990 success. Today, Eamonn and Neil McGee and Mark and Ryan McHugh have the chance to join a very unique club.



MONAGHAN'S BAND OF BROTHERS

Brothers in 25 years of Ulster Finals - Mark Kellett


Twenty five years ago Monaghan secured their last Ulster Senior football title when they defeated Tyrone by 1-10 to 0-11 on Ulster final day here in Clones. That team will be celebrated at half time today and if you watch carefully the team captain Ciarán Murray and his brother Brendan will be introduced to the spectators. Many other Monaghan bands of brothers have starred down the years before that; the Moyna twins to name but two.

Both Murray brothers were lynchpins of a star studded Monaghan defence and both won their second Ulster medal in 1988 with that hard earned victory. They had previously won in 1985 when Monaghan defeated Derry. That jubilee team was paraded before then St Tiernachs crowd in 2010, ironically when Monaghan last appeared in the Ulster Senior football decider

Ciarán and Brendan Murray played for Clones and were household names throughout Ireland. Ciaran won an All-Star in 1985 at centre half back and in many ways changed the role of the wearer of the No. 6 jersey. Traditionally the role of the centre half back up to then was seen as being a stopper, but Ciarán turned defence into attack and his brilliant athleticism caused serious problems for any opponent he met. Many inter county players who played in the immediate years following that win cited Ciaráns displays as an inspiration to them.

Brendan was a dashing wing half or corner back and he held his position on the Monaghan team for almost a decade. Ciaráns playing career was cut short in late 1988 with a serious knee injury and he played only one more season with Monaghan. Ciarán is currently the Irish soccer team physio and runs a very successful practice in Dundalk.

Monaghan's band of brothers has continued over their last three Ulster



final appearances in 2007, 2010 and today. The Freeman brothers from Magheracloone Damien and Tommy played in the 2007 and 2010 deciders, Damien captaining the Monaghan team on both occasions. Damien was equally at home in defence and attack and was a superb player and leader. Damien won't be in action today but his brother Tommy is still a key member of this Monaghan side. Tommy of course won an All-Star in 2007 following a series of captivating displays. He still poses a serious threat and big days like today were tailor made for his skills.

The Mone brothers from Clontibret namely Dessie and John Paul also featured in 2007 and 2010. John Paul retired injured in the 2010 final and that game marked his last appearance in the Monaghan jersey. Younger brother Dessie still continues to be a vital part of the Monaghan defence and all Monaghan supporters will be looking to him to help guide the

county to ending a 25 year drought. Also featuring today are the Hughes brothers Darren and Kieran from Scotstown. Both figured in 2010 and were on the Ulster Railway Cup winning teams of 2012 and 2013. Darren of course captained Ulster to both those triumphs and the respective displays of both players will be key to Monaghans chances of success today.

Finally the Duffy brothers from Latton, namely Eoin and Kieran are also vital members of today's Monaghan team. Kieran operates very well in defence and brother Eoin has blossomed into a very effective forward and was man of the match in Monaghan's NFL Div. 3 title win over Meath in Croke Park in April. Monaghan's band of brothers remains very strong and no doubt history will record that the inputs of these footballing families was very significant to the progression of the GAA in Monaghan.

REACHING YOUR CLUB'S POTENTIAL

Club Maith

The Ulster Football Championship Finals are the culmination of many months and years of hard work by players, managers, coaches and the like. We gather to witness the best of what the GAA in Ulster has to offer yet we are acutely aware of where the seeds were sown.

Our GAA clubs continue to be the single most important unit of our Association and our Club Maith scheme successfully acknowledges the outstanding standard of our Clubs. Club Maith is now well-established as the bench-mark to which clubs aspire.

To date 30 clubs are accredited with many others in the process of completing their application. 'Applying for Club Maith' workshops have been rolled out in counties over the past two years through the Club Officer Development programme. Clubs are further assisted by the Club Maith website which offers a raft of useful documents which clubs

can amend in devising policies to suit their club's needs.

Feedback from accredited clubs has been very positive, with these clubs appreciating the value of Club Maith with regard to how they conduct club business. With additional pressure on people's time and Club resources, Club Maith equips clubs with practical ways in which to become more efficient with volunteer time.

Club Maith continues to adapt in response to changes in legislation surrounding child protection, health and safety and so on. Thus clubs reaching accreditation standard can be assured in the knowledge that they are carrying-out correct procedures. Fiona Teague from Greencastle St Patricks, a gold accredited Club, remarks "as Gael's we are very proud to be involved with a club who is committed to promoting Gaelic Games to the highest possible standard. As parent's we are confident



our children and young people are provided with a quality sporting experience in a safe environment".

In addition to accredited clubs being recognised with the GAA in Ulster, these clubs are also accredited through Sport NI's Clubmark NI scheme. This has knock-on effects in terms of applying for funding and so on. More local councils have been licensed through the Clubmark NI scheme, thus clubs will benefit from perks associated with their local council's involvement.

Moving forward, Club Maith is the singlemost important achievement for clubs away from the pitches and the scór stage. If it hasn't already been done, all clubs should log onto the Club Maith website to begin the process in your club.



CUP **HISTORY**

The Story behind the Prize

FR. MURRAY CUP (MINOR)

No other major field sport affords under age players the profile that Cumann Luthchleas Gael gives to its minor players. Playing before the major senior games raises the profiles of up and coming players. Today, the minor footballers from Monaghan and Tyrone take centre stage to compete for the Fr. Murray cup. The Leinster minor footballers also compete for the Fr. Murray cup, different cup but named after the same man.

Fr. Larry Murray was an Armagh born priest of the Archdiocese of Armagh serving in Armagh and Louth. He was a Gael of great energy. Along with his priestly duties he spent his life promoting Gaelic games and Gaelic language.

He established Irish colleges in the Donegal Gaeltacht which still thrive today. He had a special interest in promoting under age

football and he was an under age mentor in every parish that he served. He presented two cups, one to the Leinster Council and one to



the Ulster Council for their minor championships. 'Value the youth, they are our strength'.

THE ANGLO CELT CUP (SENIOR)

The cup was first played for back in 1925.

Like all other aspects of Irish society. the 1910's and early 20's were difficult times for the GAA. From 1918, Ulster Council games were harassed by the military with a resultant drop in attendance and income. In 1919 each

> county had to contribute 10 pounds to the Ulster Council to keep things afloat. Trouble intensified across the country in 1920.


At the Ulster Council convention on 17 April 1920, the British army forced their way into convention and arrested Secretary O'Duffy. The Ulster Championship continued however, and the final was played at Cootehill on 8 August, the referee was Dan Hogan, brother of Michael Hogan who was shot in Croke Park the following year and after whom the Hogan Stand is named.

The 1921 final was fixed for Derry on 22 January 1922, between Monaghan and Derry. By this date the border had been set up under the terms of the treaty. The Monaghan team were stopped at Dromore, Tyrone, on

route to Derry. Several weapons were discovered and ten players imprisoned. The Championships for the next few years were seriously disrupted and the Council's financial affairs in crisis.

A crusade to reorganise was launched by the Ulster Council at Convention in 1923. Top priority was to seek a suitable trophy for the Senior Football Championship. From 1923 until 1925 no donor emerged. In 1925 John F O'Hanlon, editor of the Anglo Celt. newspaper in Cavan donated a cup to the Council. The new cup gave a much needed boost to the GAA and helped stabilise the competition. O'Hanlon was a staunch GAA man and held senior positions on Cavan Co. Board and had been Vice President of Ulster Council. Cavan were the first county to receive the Anglo Celt defeating Antrim in the final played in Monaghan town. In 1962 the original cup was replaced and the new Anglo Celt was won by Down in 1963.

The Anglo Celt cup and Ulster GAA have forged a strong brand and the premier football competition has grown from shaky foundations to a towering competition today.



Donegal star inspires a new generation

At the beginning of this month, Donegal All-Ireland winning star Patrick McBrearty appeared as a guest speaker at the 2013 Ulster GAA Phoenix Elite Academy. Patrick addressed all the players before fielding a number of questions from the very captive audience. He spoke of his own experiences as an elite underage player and shared some excellent advice for the players both from a playing and personal perspective.

The Elite Academy, which is now in its 11th year, consists of a residential camp for 90 of the most talented Under 16 footballers and hurlers within Ulster. The players are subjected to an intense two day camp which features the highest level of coaching and associated training in areas such as performance analysis, nutrition, mental preparation, psychology and lifestyle management.

It was a familiar outing for Patrick, who himself attended the Elite Academy as a player in 2009.

Patrick is just one of a number of elite senior County players who have previously attended the Ulster GAA Elite Academy. Others include fellow Donegal star Michael Murphy, Tyrone's



Peter Harte and Antrim hurling captain Neil McManus. Reflecting on his previous experience at the Academy, Patrick paid tribute to the excellent standard of coaching and facilities available to the players, and indeed stated that it was a major contributor in his remarkable transition from underage to senior star.

TWINNING WITH CANADA 2013

Continuing Overseas Links

Ulster GAA's long standing relationship with Canada continues to develop. This past year we have provided support and delivered Child Protection courses (Toronto) and a Club Development Course (Edmonton).

Edmonton, located in the Western region of Canada, and a member club of the Western Canadian GAA Board was the base for a day-long clinic on Club Development, delivered by Comhairle Uladh's Club & Community Development Officer, Maura McMenamin. Western clubs Edmonton Wolfe Tones, Vancouver Harps, Calgary Chieftains, and Fort McMurray Shamrocks appreciated the opportunity to learn about the work being carried-out by Ulster GAA and how this may be useful for Canadian GAA. The clinic allowed clubs to collaborate in planning ahead addressing the needs of the Western Canadian Board. The geography of Canada poses many problems for Canadian clubs, not least the long distances clubs must travel to get competitive games. Issues raised during the Clinic will be fed into an overall strategy for continued support by Comhairle Uladh to the GAA in Canada.

In August, DENI Schools Coaches Ryan Daly (Tyrone) and Lisa McAliskey



(Down) who currently deliver on our Key Stage 1 Schools programme will travel to Newfoundland to deliver foundation courses and work in the summer camps for a week.

Ryan and Lisa bring an extensive background of working with nursery children, but they also combine as tutors to enable delivery of Handball, Camogie, Hurling and Football programmes. The weekend will be spent delivering foundation courses to the coaches and then actively

coaching and engaging the 6 to 12 year old children in the camps. It is planned to have 250 children on the camps during the week. Ulster President Martin McAviney states clearly that "this reflects Comhairle Uladh's ongoing commitment to the development of our games overseas in a time when many of our young people are immigrating." He also praises the great work that continues to be done in Canada by the GAA driven by President Brian Farmer. We wish Lisa and Ryan a safe journey.

STATISTICAL **ANALYSIS: PREVIEW**

A Statistical Preview of the Senior Final

Throughout the Ulster Senior Football Championship 2013, Ulster GAA has carried out statistical analysis of each match. We have attempted to establish which statistics may be able to point towards successful outcome and which have limited value in terms of predicting success.

Possession to Scores Ratios

The best predictor of match outcome is an analysis of the use of possession, more specifically, how effective each team are at creating scoring chances and then being clinical when chances do arise. Figure 1 provides an excellent display of how the teams will match up against one another based solely upon their averages to date.

The figures show us that Monaghan have been better equipped to build attacks and work shooting opportunities; however Donegal have proven much more ruthless with their chances, converting 71% of shots, compared to only 35% by Monaghan. Ultimately, if we based a prediction solely on these statistics the game should come down to a solitary score between the teams, in favour of Donegal.

The possession share is going to be in the balance, with Monaghan potentially enjoying a marginal advantage. It would appear that they should be able to build upon this advantage, converting 53% of possessions to shots, while Donegal will only manage to convert 39% to shots. However, despite this predicted superiority, the game will remain in the balance, due to Donegal's more clinical shooting. This forecast also points towards a single score game in favour of Donegal.

However, it is worth noting that this does not necessarily predict a Donegal win. The key for Monaghan will lie in the nature of the scores. It is fair to suggest that Monaghan may need to score a goal at some stage in order to be on the correct side of the result, while at the same time preventing Donegal from scoring any majors.

If the game remains goalless or both teams score the same number of goals, then Donegal are likely to win out, however if Monaghan can score at least one more goal than Donegal, they may just be able to deliver an upset.

Figure 1: Shots to scores ratios based on averages in the USFC 2013






Figure 2: Forecast for USFC Final 2013





NEW CASEMENT PARK STADIUM

Ulster GAA's Landmark Project



On June 19th, the formal application for Planning Permission for the new Casement Park Stadium in Belfast was lodged. This marks a further significant step in achieving what is the biggest Sports Capital Project in Ireland currently, with a cost plan of c. £80m Sterling. Within 9 months of the appointment of the Integrated Consultancy (Design) Team, led by Mott McDonald, the Casement Park Stadium Project Board has brought the proposed new 38,000 all-seater stadium through from conceptual to final design.

The intensive work undertaken over the past year, followed many years of work and negotiations to put in place the Financial Package for the Stadium. This includes in excess of £60m Sterling grant aid from the NI Executive via the Department of Culture Arts and Leisure, currently led by Minister Carál Ní Chuilín, MLA. The Stadium during construction and subsequently will provide a major economic stimulus to the Belfast area.

The final stage of the tendering process to select an Integrated Supply Team to construct the stadium is currently underway through full public procurement channels. Bringing this complex Project to this advanced stage has been a major undertaking. The planned timeline for delivering the Stadium is completion of construction in September 2015 with the Stadium hosting fixtures in 2016.



TOM KELLY

As a GAA family today we acknowledge and thank the sweat equity provided over 35 years to the promotion and development of Gaelic Games by the current club chairman of Clones St. Tiernach's Tom Kelly.

A "Tribesman" by birth from New Bridge Ballygar in rural Galway. close to the Roscommon border. Tom and his 7 brothers and 4 sisters were reared on a small rural farming household. Milking, turf cutting, hay making, growing vegetables and helping the neighbour were part and partial of his daily life.

The practise and principle of pride of place and parish identity were nurtured here from his involvement from the time he could walk through his local club St. Brendan's Ballygar/ Newbridge. So, when the Department of Agriculture posted Tom to work in the Tunney Meat plan in Clones in the late 70's his strong work ethic and a commitment to active participation was well rooted and grounded.

In his own words Tom describes how it was for him coming to an Ulster Border community. "Like most 'blow in's' that came to Clones I did not know what to expect. On my first day as a raw recruit to the Department of Agriculture in the meat factory I was invited to come to St. Tiernach's Park and train with the lads. I was smitten and so began for me a thirty five year affair with this club and the Drumlin county of Monaghan, It was not because of the field of dreams that St. Tiernach's Park is but the warmth and welcome of the players, the encouragement of the manager, the passion of the supporter and the enthusiasm and ambition of the club."

What Tom did not know was that club members soon recognised his value as a leader concluding that "He's a Keeper" not by wearing the number 1 goalkeeper shirt but as a person worth holding on too. Cupid, provided the helping hand and within 24 months in 1980 Tom married Mary Cleary (also with a Gaelic Games pedigree) and so

his commitment and involvement in Clones St. Tiernach's were cemented.

Success on the field soon followed with junior and intermediate league a Championship titles with Tom as a staunch and talented corner back and captain playing a pivotal role. A gammy knee cut short his playing career at 30 Tom and Mary by this stage in the early nineties had five mouths to feed with Lorcan. Eoin, Eimear. Ciaran and Fintan

all well immersed in

the activities of the local club. So his role extended from the playing field to a variety of jobs that need doing to sustain a club.

I was invited to come to St. Tiernach's Park and train with the lads I was smitten, and so began for me a thirty five year affair with this club and the Drumlin county of Monaghan

As a volunteer Tom has acted as a player, coach, Juvenile convenor, manager of several teams at all ages, referee, umpire, linemen, jersey washer, field committee, Lotto Organiser, gateman, club delegate to the County Board, executive and committee member.

These years of involvement have not however been without tragedy. Orla, Tom and Mary's second daughter, lost her battle as an infant to a congenital condition and in 2011 their eldest son Lorcan lost his life to suicide. While nothing can ever replace these losses Tom in his 2012 address at the clubs' 125 Gala Ball event said "As a family we experienced the value of Club and community and the support and comfort it provides in a time of crisis, and we are so grateful for it". Monaghan County board honoured Tom in 2012 as "clubman of the year" not just for his tireless effort for promoting Gaelic Games but also for his spirit of giving, attitude and undoubted love of community.

So today, as the teams of Monaghan and Donegal do battle, while Tom and the Kelly family take pride that their son Fintan has consolidated his place on the Monaghan senior panel we ask you to consider the efforts made by volunteers who not only make our association great but our communities strong.

THEIR FIRST **ENCOUNTER**

BUNDORAN, 1929

Ag Amharc Siar - Reflecting on 125 Years of the Ulster Championship

When Muineachán and Dún na nGall first locked horns in the Ulster SFC first round at Bundoran in 1929. it was in a very different sporting environment from that of 2013

The absence of previous clashes between these two teams owed chiefly to the Ulster Council's policy of arranging first-round matches between adjacent counties, and the poor standards then in Dún na nGall, who seldom advanced beyond the first round.

The wider political and social events of the 1920s had significant ramifications on both county units. An influx of gardaí, soldiers and civil servants from around the Free State brought with it a cohort of established inter-county players. The Muineachán side in this 1929 match contained the likes of Tom Shevlin (a Ros Comáin native) and Thomas Weymes (from Westmeath); while its captain was Superintendent Paddy Kilroy, who had won a Connacht SFC title with Gaillimh in 1922, played for Baile Átha Cliath in an All-Ireland final, and won a Leinster SFC title with Loch Garman in 1925.

Dún na nGall benefited too. The Tír Chonaill team included three gardaí. as well as four teachers, a fisherman. the manager of a licensed establishment, a university student and a doctor. The last of these, Dr Joe Kearney, a Corcaigh native who had captained Munster to Railway Cup victory a year earlier, was now working at Letterkenny Mental Hospital, Alas. Kearney and two others could not field on the day: John O'Donnell, a UCD student (and later Fine Gael TD) who was unable to travel; and goalkeeper W. O'Neill of Raphoe, who encountered problems on his journey and arrived late.

Dún na nGall's chaotic build-up took its toll on the pitch. The team 'failed completely in football,' stated the Derry People. Eight times out of ten, the backs cleared the ball recklessly into the hands of Muineachán men, while the side's 'entire lack of understanding' apparently reflected 'continual chopping and changing' in team selections from game to game. Dungloe (five), Killygordon (three) and Ardara (two) provided the bulk



of this team, but the dispersal of players around a disparate county, alongside a culture of minimal intercounty training, militated against progress on the field.

After Kilroy's goal from an 'unsaveable' shot on the twentyminute mark, Muineachán ran riot and eventually won by 2-8 to 0-1. It was such form that would secure the Anglo-Celt Cup that year and bring the county as far as its All-Ireland final debut in 1930. Dún na nGall gained some form of retribution by beating Muineachán by fifteen points in the Ulster SHC match that day, and indeed it was in the camán game that Tír Chonaill prospered more until the 1940s.

In their two subsequent championship meetings in the 1930s, Muineachán's superiority was much less pronounced. Three points separated the teams in the 1936 semi-final at Carrickmacross, 2-8 to 0-11. A certain J. McGuinness scored the first goal for Muineachán, and Terry Clerkin the second. Possibly smarting from having to travel to the southern Farney venue then, two years later Dún na nGall argued for their semifinal to be held at Cuchulainn Park, Carndonagh. Muineachán appealed to the Ulster Council to switch the match to Bundoran, to shorten the distance of travel and enlarge the crowd. Dún na nGall succeeded with the argument that the match would spur on the sport in the north of the county, despite the financial concerns expressed by the provincial secretary, Gerry Arthurs. Carndonagh got its big day.

In a tense game, Muineachán scrambled to victory by 0-7 to 0-6, courtesy not least of points from Pat McGrane, after whom the other Clones Stand is named.



- 1. The aim of opt for life is to put in place a state of the art organ donation system North and South. Our friends and neighbours are dying needlessly. We can put a stop to this.
- 2. In the North, a good infrastructure for organ donation/transplantation is already in place. All that is needed to bring us into line with Europe's leading donor rate countries is the new law. In the South, a proper infrastructure is needed as well as the new law.
- 3. On the 5th of February 2013, the Joint First Ministers announced that the Executive is moving towards the soft opt out proposal set out in this document. All of the parties in the NI Assembly support it. It is endorsed by the BMA (British Medical Association) and all of the NI patient groups. An all-party group comprising MLAs, doctors and leaders of the patients' associations has been formed to spearhead the move towards the new law. Public consultation is soon to begin and the Health Minister is keen to introduce the new law as soon as possible.
- 4. The Irish government has already held public hearings in relation to 'soft opt out' and is determined to bring in the new law. TDs indicated their overwhelming support for the proposal in the course of a Dail debate on the 1st of May 2013.

The proposed new law

- a. In future, we will all start out as donors. This reflects the fact that the vast majority of people believe donation after death is a good thing. One deceased donor can save seven lives.
- b. Those who do not wish to be a donor after death, can register their objection to donation by opting out online. Those who opt



out will not be considered for donation after death.

- c. Even if someone does not opt out online, the next of kin will always have to give their consent at the hospital before donation can proceed. No consent, no donation.
- d. This is therefore a system based on family consent.
- e. The reason for the requirement of family consent is that we believe organ donation is a sacred gift from one family to another at a very difficult time. The new law will therefore enshrine the principle that donation after death is a gift freely given.
- f. This change will transform our organ donation system. Donation will become the norm and we will have a state of the art system

similar to those in place in the world's leading donation rate societies.


- g. The North already has in place a state of the art organ donation infrastructure. The South would need to put in place a similar infrastructure in order to take full advantage of the new law.

A new book chronicling the lifetime of service to the GAA in Ulster and All-Ireland by former President, Paddy McFlynn, is to be published later this year.


