

- 03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
- 04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
- 05 Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gashorns and behaviour likely to cause confusion Of nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.

- 06. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.
- 07. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- 08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the

THE JURY FOR THE SENIOR COUNTY FINAL

head of Sunday's Donegal SFC club final Post sports editor Frank Craig has been gauging opinion around the county ahead of the big throw-in. Most opinion runs along a similar theme with the majority feeling Glenswilly will make life difficult for favourites Kilcar but that Martin McHugh's men will eventually get the job done. The only man to put his head on the chopping block and tip Michael Canning's outfit was Malin's Damien Harkin with the Post's panel of five backing Kilcar to end their 23-year baron spell on a voting difference of 4-1.


Gareth Concarr (Ardara): "It could be a low scoring game to start with as I see Glenswilly going defensive. With the pace Kilcar have shown all year, particularly against Termon and Naomh Conaill, they'd be foolish not to. Glenswilly definitely are a team to be taken seriously. They'll need a few things to go their way though. The weather for one – the game is still a week away and that would be an issue. I think for Kilcar if the pitch was heavy and there was some rain; Glenswilly would love to see a horrible day, I'm sure. People will be writing Glenswilly off and they'll only love that. They've huge experience. They've been written off all year but just look at them now. They have a few players like Neil (Gallagher), (Michael) Murphy, Copper (Gary McFadden), Joe Gibbons, Caolan Kelly, Ciaran Bonner... even someone like Cathal Gallagher will be a player that Kilcar might find hard to



handle with his height and power. They'll try to make Ballybofey as small and as tight as possible. If they cut out all the channels and block the whole thing up; the messier it gets the better it'll be for them. If that's what it takes and it gets them the win then they'll not care in the slightest. Kilcar, to be fair, they were seriously impressive all season. Glenswilly definitely have a chance. Over the hour though and if I have to pick a winner I just see Kilcar having that wee bit more energy."

Verdict: Kilcar.

Eoghan McGettigan, Naomh Conaill: "It's going to be very interesting to see how both sides deal with each other as it's a contrast really in styles. Pace versus power maybe. Both teams' game-changers are all very different types of players. Kilcar like to move the ball quickly out of defence and they work really hard on the turnover. It's probably a matter for Glenswilly to look to close down as much space as possible in Ballybofey and make the field as tight as possible. Glenswilly have been here before and it won't be new to them. But Kilcar have players that have played in huge games for Donegal at most levels so I don't see them bothered by that. It mightn't be pretty and if it's a bad day then it definitely won't. If Kilcar get off to a flier Glenswilly might struggle. But if they can stay with them then it'll be interesting to see how they react. Kilcar are the form side but Glenswilly have won titles before when they've had



bother in the league. There will be a big crowd there on the day. Having seen Kilcar up close I just feel they will have too much scoring threat. I don't' seen Glenswilly being able to keep them out over the course of the 60 minutes. That will take too much energy."

Verdict: Kilcar.


Sean O'Kennedy, Four Masters: "I think it's the manner in which Kilcar have got to the final is what is making them most people's big favourites. But you can't write off Glenswilly – particularly in a final. The powerhouses they have, they'll believe they have the kind of approach to rattle Kilcar. From what I've been reading their record is very good against them too in championship in recent years. It's two sides with contrasting styles. Kilcar came through a very tough group and the way they took care of Naomh Conaill was even more impressive. I think Glenswilly will look to bring their physicality to the game. They'll look to make that advantage count. They'll have to I think if they want to win. It's very hard to deal with the likes of Michael Murphy and Neil Gallagher if they decide to go direct. It's going to be very interesting. Kilcar like to run the ball



and it'll take Glenswilly being defensive and direct when the chances present themselves to counteract that. Styles make matches or so they say. I think it's going to be really tight. They'll need to stop Kilcar starting fast and want to be in the game after half-time. The longer it goes on the more interesting it will become. Experience will count for something then. That said, I just feel Kilcar will have a little too much for them over the course of the whole game. On form, I can't look past Kilcar.

Verdict: Kilcar.


Damien Harkin, Malin: "Looking at Kilcar, you've got the obvious lads and they've really impressed so far. But they're going to need a different gameplan against Glenswilly as they're not going to allow them the run of MacCumhaill Park like they've maybe been given so far. Against us, you could see the experience and knowhow kick in. Their only intention was to get over the line. It will be the exact same against Kilcar – as long as they get over the line, be it by a single point, they'll be happy. That's the kind of game they'll look to make it. I think Naomh Conaill thought they'd take Kilcar on in a shootout and both side went at it. But Kilcar are a different side under Martin McHugh. That played into Kilcar's hands and their counterattacking gameplan. Glenswilly will be a completely different proposition. I don't see those avenues or that



space being there. They will be so much more physical and harder to break down. They really rattle you. That will mean it will be so hard to get balls into Paddy McBrearty and it will also be hard for the McHughs to run at them. It will be that tight the next day. Everything in the build up is pointing to Kilcar being huge favourites. They've looked so well the whole way through so that's understandable. I think it's set up perfectly for Glenswilly to pull the rug out from under their feet. I think people are really underestimating them. I see Glenswilly surprising people and I think they'll win it."

Verdict: Glenswilly.

James Keaney, Bundoran: Any side with Michael Murphy and Neil Gallagher will always have a chance. But having played Kilcar recently; I knew they were good but I only realised how good from that game. Even with some of their regulars on the bench they beat us quite convincingly. With that pace, they can up it at any stage and find a big score like a goal or two. Glenswilly might look more one-dimensional but when you can have lads like Murphy and Gallagher inside that doesn't mean it's easy to guard against it. Over the course of the game, I just think Kilcar have a lot to them – a lot more firepower and a lot more energy. It's crazy how fast some of those lads are moving, particularly Eoin McHugh. They just get up and down. If Glenswilly pull it off I'll take my hat off to them. If they are still in



it with 10 minutes to go then who knows. But I expect Kilcar to get ahead early and stay ahead.

Verdict: Kilcar.

Kelly keen to add another championship success

You get the impression that Caolan Kelly isn't an individual that gets too excited.

The player - like alot of his teammates - is looking forward to his fifth SFC final since the Glen's original breakthrough back in 2007, when they were eventually downed by St. Eunan's in the decider. Since then, Glenswilly's strides have been truly phenomenal.

As well as collecting the Dr. Maguire twice, they also won through to an Ulster club final and were only just squeezed out by Ballinderry back in 2013. When Kilcar last scaled the championship mountain in 1993 Glenswilly, as a club, were just over a decade old.

Kelly admits that as a certain chunk of the panel enters their 30s they know the opportunities to build on the legacy they've already created are narrowing. You can't take anything for granted in football. And Kelly doesn't have to look too far for an example of that.

He said: "It's 23 years since Kilcar themselves last won one. I bet if you talked to them players that last did it back in 1993 they wouldn't have believed you if you told them they wouldn't be back in another one for so long.

"As players we definitely do realise that we're not getting any younger. I'm 30 now and the likes of Joe Gibbons, Neil Gallagher, Cathal Gallagher and so on; we know that we need to get as much out of it as we can and this is another opportunity. You can't take anything for granted in football."

There is a real parochialism to Glenswilly. They've had to drag themselves up to the level they are now at. Muscling in on a part of the action that some might have felt didn't belong to them has only tempered their resolve.

It's a group that has come up together and will, inevitably and perhaps unfortunately, depart together. You'd imagine that it's not hard to fabricate or develop a closeness in that type of environment.

Kelly himself calls that togetherness 'clannish'. You get what he means but by the word's very definition, he's well wide of the mark. Over the last few seasons any time the club has opened its doors to the media for various press nights the hospitality at Pairc Naomh Columba has always been excellent.

"It's so important - you have to have those people behind the scenes every night and doing the work that needs to go on now to make a club successful," he added. "We really appreciate it, In rural areas throughout the county most clubs have that tightness that clannishness.

"We're all friends and we all enjoy each other's company. There are lads down in that club that mightn't have ever kicked a football but are part of it in some other really important way. It's a real parish effort."

Kilcar represent a much different kind of challenge for Glenswilly than the one posed by Malin last time out. And while a SFC final appearance is, in a sense, new ground for them; Kelly doesn't see that as any kind of advantage for his side.

He explained: "I don't know... there is so much experience in that Kilcar side already. You think of the big games a lot of those lads have played in. So I don't think there is really an advantage there for us. I was looking at it the last day and I think between senior, minor and U21 maybe 10 or twelve of them might have already played in Croke Park.

"Any wee advantage we can get we'll take. If it works in our favour great. But it's certainly not something we'll be relying upon on the day."

DUNGLOE BAND

Dungloe band was first formed in 1972 and has been a big part of the town since its formation. Up until recent years it was a Children's band which brought great honour to the town winning many titles from Ulster to All Ireland Fleadh competitions.

In 2013 as part of 'The Gathering' celebrations, quite a number of past members from previous years came together to celebrate the event. Old friendships were renewed and great memories shared during the reunion. Many members from the original band felt they would like to keep the momentum going and ensure the town of Dungloe still held the tradition of having a marching band.



unaíodh fochumann Ghaoth Dobhair ag cruinniú i dtoigh Mhaighreád Frainc i mBaile Bhraighní roimh Shamhain na bliana 1931. Bhí rath ar an tríú iarracht seo fochumann a bhunú sa pharóiste. Bunaíodh Coiste Contae Dhún na nGall de C.L.G. i mí Dheireadh Fómhair 1905 agus bunaíodh 'The Gweedore Hurling and Football Club' (nó na Gweedore Old Celts) taobh istigh de mhí. Tháinig meath i ndiaidh na bliana 1907, meath a mhair gur athbhunaíodh an Coiste Contae in Earrach na bliana 1919. Níorbh fhada go raibh fochumann bríomhar agus foirne láidre ag Gaoth Dobhair. Bhain na Mionúir Craobh na Contae sna blianta 1933 agus 1934. Bhain na Sóisir an Chraobh sa bhliain 1935. Agus bhain Gaoth Dobhair a gcéad Chraobh Shinsireach an bhliain chéanna. Bhain Gaoth Dobhair an tSraith (Corn an 'Democrat') ceithre bliana i ndiaidh a chéile 1936-1939. Idir 1935 agus 1961, ainneoin imirce agus iargúlachta, bhain an fochumann Craobh Shinsireach Dhún na nGall dhá uair déag agus Corn an 'Democrat' ocht n-uaire.

I measc na dtoscaí a ba chúis le forlámhas Ghaoth Dobhair bhí an dianchoimhlint a bhí eatarthu féin agus a gcomharsanaí béal dorais, An Clochán Liath (agus bhí dúiche iomlán na Rosann ó Ghaoth Beara go Gaoth Dobhair faoi bhrat an Chlocháin Léith go minic). Is iomaí comhrac eipiciúil Craoibhe agus Sraithe a bhí idir Gaoth Dobhair agus An Clochán Liath sna blianta sin.

Is iomaí peileadóir iomráiteach a chaith geansaí ghlas Ghaoth Dobhair i mblianta na glóire. Ba é Hiúdaí Beag Eoghain Éamoinn a ba mhó clú - bhí sé ar an fhoireann a thug Corn an Bhóthair larainn go Cúige Uladh den chéad uair riamh sa bhliain 1942 (fuair sé a dhara bonn sa bhliain 1943). Agus bhí fathaigh eile ann - Eoghanaí Hughie agus Tom Diver sna chéad bhlianta; Danny Neddie, Jackie Phadaí Óig agus Jim Nóra ina dhiaidh sin; Hughie Tim, Bernard Coyle agus Micí Rua ansin... B'ábhar speisialta maoite an '4-in-a-row' (Craobh na Sinsear 1944-47) agus an '3-in-a-row' (1953-55). Bhí bliain a nglóire ag mná an phobail nuair a bhain siad Craobh na Contae sa Chamógaíocht shinsireach sa bhliain 1944.

Ba iad na blianta idir 1961 agus 2001 blianta an Ghorta Mhóir. Níor baineadh aon Chraobh Shinsireach le linn na mblianta fada sin.

Ach níor múchadh an lasair i mblianta an dorchadais agus coinníodh ag streachailt go dícheallach in am an anáis. Bhí dlúthbhaint ag Gaoth Dobhair le bunú Chomórtas Peile na Gaeltachta sa bhliain 1969. Bhain siad an Comórtas Náisiúnta trí huaire roimh dheireadh an chéid agus d'fhan dílis dá bhunphrionsabail. Tógadh an Clubtheach breá ag taobh na páirce agus fosclaíodh go hoifigiúil é sa bhliain 1984. Baineadh Corn an 'Democrat' sna blianta 1970 agus 1973: an Chraobh Idirmheánach sa bhliain 1985 (dícháilíodh Gaoth Dobhair go dtí an grád idirmheánach sa bhliain 1983 i ndiaidh 51 bliain sa Chraobh Shinsireach): an Chraobh Faoi-21 sna blianta 1971, 1984 agus 1991: Craobh na Mionúr sna blianta 1976, 1987 agus 1999: an Chraobh Faoi-16 (1962): an Chraobh Faoi-14 (1967). Bhíothas dílis do Scór Sinsear (Craobh na hÉireann ag Noel Ó Gallchóir 1981) agus do Scór na nÓg. Rinneadh iarrachtaí ócáidiúla leis an iomáint a chothú agus baineadh Craobhacha contae iomána faoi-aois sna nóchaidí.

Chas an rotha le teacht na mílaoise úire. Baineadh an Chraobh Shinsireach sa bhliain 2002 agus arís sa bhliain 2006. Phill Corn an 'Democrat' sna blianta 2003 agus 2006, an Chraobh Faoi-21 sa bhlain 2005, an Chraobh Faoi-16 sa bhliain 2012, Craobh na Mionúr sa bhliain 2014.

Naomh Adhamhnáin- A Brief History

The GAA was formed in Thurles Co Tipperary in Murphy and Guard Mulcahy. The move to 1884. However its was not until about twenty vears later that the Assocation really became established in Donegal. The first Donegal County Board meeting was formed in 1905 and the first Donegal senior football team fielded on St. Patricks day 1906 against Derry. It was nearly a decade later that the clubs really established throughout the county.

Letterkenny's first club was formed in 1917 following a meeting in McGovern's public house lower Main street. The club's first playing fields were on the current site of Scoil Colmcille on the convent road. The club established the Gaelic Codein East Donegal until the Black & Tan war reduced their playing numbers to such an extent that they were forced to cease activities in the early 1920's. Letterkenny re-emerged as a real force in the Association in the mid twenties with the formation of two clubs, the geraldines in 1924 and Letterkenny Rovers who won the County Title in 1927.

The year 1930 saw the foundation of the present St Eunan's club to embrace and unite all G.A.A people in the town as the Geraldine's and Rovers began to fade from the scene. They first played in Glencar and moved to O'Donnell Park, Sallaghagrane purchased for £300, in May 1937. The first St Eunan's officers and committee formed consisted of: President, Chief Supt. Leahy. Chairman, Supt Patsy Cronin, Secretary Guard Walsh, Treasurer, John Hourihan. Committee John Curran, John Crumlish, Guard

O'Donnell park and the foresight of three of the founding members of the club, John Hourihan, John Crumlish and Johnny Curran played a huge part ensuring the club would grow and prosper into what is today.

The first County Title under the St Eunan's name came in 1948 with a win over Gaoth Dobhair. who were seeking five championships in a row on the day, as Letterkenny men won by 1-07 to 2-01. St Eunan's hold the record of being the only club to have won at least one senior championship in every decade since that 1948 Wins victory.

1956.1960.1967.1972.1983.1998.1999.2001 three in a row from '07 to '09, 2012 and 2014 show a stunning mark of consistency and commitment within the club. The club also holds the distinction of having competed in the senior championship every year since its formation in 1930.

As well as successes on the field of play, another proud moment in the club's history came in 1980 when St Eunan's was announced as the winner in their category in the A.I.B All Ireland'Club of the Year'. On hand that evening to accept the award were club chairman Dr James McDaid, Secretary Frankie Campbell, Oifigeach na Gaeilge Seamus De Faoite, vice Chairman Sean Boyle and his wife Ann, who represented the ladies Committee and executive member Denis

THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT

IRISH REPUBLIC

TO THE PEOPLE OF IRELAND.

IRISHMEN AND JRISHWOMEN: In the name of God and of the dead generations from which she receives her old tradition of nationhood, Ireland, through us, summons her children to her flag and strikes for her freedom.

Having organised and trained her manhood through her secret revolutionary organisation, the Irish Republican Brotherhood, and through her open military organisations, the Irish Volunteers and the Irish Citizen Army, having patiently perfected her discipling, having resolutely waited for the right moment to reveal itself, she now seizes that moment, and, supported by her exiled children in America and by gallant allies in Europe, but relying in the first on her own strength, she strikes in full confidence of victory.

We declare the right of the people of Ireland to the ownership of Ireland, and to the unfettered control of Irish destinies, to be sovereign and indefeasible. The long usurpation of that right by a foreign people and government has not extinguished the right, nor can it ever be extinguished except by the destruction of the Irish people. In every generation the Irish people have asserted their right to national freedom and sovereignty; six times during the past three hundred years they have asserted it in arms. Standing on that fundamental right and again asserting it in arms in the face of the world, we hereby proclaim the Irish Republic as a Sovereign Independent State, and we pledge our lives and the lives of our comrades-in-arms to the cause of its freedom, of its welfare, and of its exaltation among the nations.

The Irish Republic is entitled to, and hereby claims, the allegiance of every Irishman and Irishwoman. The Republic guarantees religious and civil liberty, equal rights and equal opportunities to all its citizens, and declares its resolve to pursue the happiness and prosperity of the whole nation and of all its parts, cherishing all the children of the nation equally, and oblivious of the differences carefully fostered by an alien government, which have divided a minority from the majority in the past.

Until our arms have brought the opportune moment for the establishment of a permanent National Government, representative of the whole people of Ireland and elected by the suffrages of all her men and women, the Provisional Government, hereby constituted, will administer the civil and military affairs of the Republic in trust for the people.

We place the cause of the Irish Republic under the protection of the Most High God, Whose blessing we invoke upon our arms, and we pray that no one who serves that cause will dishonour it by cowardice, inhumanity, or rapine. In this supreme hour the Irish nation must, by its valour and discipline and by the readiness of its children to sacrifice themselves for the common good, prove itself worthyof the august destiny to which it is called.

1916 LEADERS IN DONEGAL

Donegal played host to several of the 1916 leading figures of the 1916 Rising, Pádraig Pearse, Thomas McDonagh, Joseph Mary Plunkett, Roger Casement and Willie Pearse all visited Donegal in the years preceding the rising. Roger Casement visited Donegal in 1912 it was for his love of the language that he visited the County visiting Inishowen, Fanad Tory Island, Falcarragh, Gortahork, and Glenties.

Padraig Pearse also spent time in Donegal before the Easter Rising, his association with Donegal, from 1905 when he represented Niall MacGiolla Bhríde, Cresslough on appeal to the court of the Kings Bench in Dublin. MacGiolla Bhríde had been summons for using a cart without his name and address not being in legible characters (His name and address were in the Irish Language) Pearse went on to visit Donegal on several occassions inclusing a visit to the Irish College in Cloughaneely. Pearse again returned to Donegal to visit Gweedore, The Rosses, Dungloe, Glenties, Ardara, Carrick, Kilcar, Killybegs, Croagh,Inver and Donegal Town.

Thomas McDonagh visited Donegal and addressed a meeting on Cruckaughrim Hill Ballyliffen, in Inishowen.

Willie Pearse also visited Donegal as a Sculptor and, with his father, was involved in the construction of St Eunans Cathedral in Letterkenny. The two men carved the marble railing, the caps, annulets, bases, and capitals. They were also responsible for carving the pulpit of the Donegal Masters out of Sicilian Marble, which is Situated on the right at the front of the main alter. As a child Willie spend a year in Fanad attending Ballydesken National School.







Kilcar - the long journey back to the big time

Two years ago I was planning for this day to happen. Michael Hegarty (or so I thought) was coming to the twilight of his career and Kilcar were looking good to get to the county final.

The song - '21 years is a mighty long time' - made famous by his cousin, Dermot Hegarty, was going to be my headline, but they went and blew it! My headline was for the dustbin.

Now, two years later, Hegarty is going better than ever and Kilcar have reached their day of destiny. ('23 years is a mighty long time' just doesn't have the same ring to it!)

It seems that Hegarty likes to go out on a high. He was man of the match in

his last game in the Ulster championship, the 2011 final. A knee injury was troubling him and he was happy to get his Ulster medal.

A championship medal in Donegal has eluded him. He knows that there will not be many more chances, but his value to the team in their run to a first final in 23 years is unquantifiable. Four points from play against Termon in the first half and that first goal against Naomh Conaill to get them going in the semi-final looks even better when viewed again on YouTube; he is in full flight as he takes the ball from Ryan McHugh and fires home an unstoppable shot.

The team went on to play champagne football and the parish are on a high once more.

With just one National School, they are one of the smaller parishes in the county, but since the mid 1970s they have been to the fore. A three in-a-row U-21 Championship run was the start of something special.

Sean McGinley lifted the Dr. Maguire in 1980, and they played in six finals between that and their last success in 1993, winning three and losing three. In the scheme of things, it was a good return, but they had some good players laced through those teams.

However, compared to the present team, there was little comparison. Those teams of the '70, '80s and '90s had a gritty edge to them; defenders of the calibre of Charlie McGroarty, John Quinn, John Carr and Din McBrearty took few prisoners. You wonder how that quartet would manage with the black card in today's game.

That was a time when the balance of power in the GAA world lay in the south and south-west. Between 1980 and 1999, the Dr. Maguire was only once won by a club outside of this area (St. Eunan's in 1983).

Kilcar won three of their five Donegal titles in the 1980s with their greatest performance in the 1980 final, defeating Ardara 1-13 to 0-8.

Their last win, in 1993, came as underdogs against neighbours, Killybegs, who were going for a three in-a-row. The heading in the Donegal Democrat in the preview was a clever one by then Sports Editor, Michael Daly - 'If anyone can, Kilcar can'. Daly, like most observers, fancied Killybegs, but the headline covered his bets. And he was able to follow it up the following week with 'If anyone can, Kilcar can - and they did'.


They are one of the best supported clubs in the county and no matter what the opposition in Towney, you will see their faithful supporters out in big numbers. Those supporters also travel in big numbers to all their away club games, and on many occasions they outnumber the home support at those games.

They have tasted success at underage level in recent years (minor and U-21) and now they feel they have a team that can bridge that senior gap.

There have been been many changes since that 1993 win. The night before that final an 'Up for the Match' was hosted in Kilcar House with the famous Sean Campbell playing the Des Cahill role. And among those interviewed were many of the team that were lining out the next day. You couldn't imagine that happening nowadays!

Sean McGinley was the first Kilcar man to lift the Dr. Maguire (there was no final played in 1925 when Kilcar were declared the winners in a very controversial year). Sean's son, Ciaran, is captain on Sunday and can join the select band of Kilcar men to lift the cup.



FOR AN HOUR this afternoon, they will be sworn enemies as they draw the battle lines with Dr Maguire on the line, having sat in the same trenches as comrades so often.

Think of Glenswilly: Murphy. Big Neil. Mention Kilcar: McHughs. McBreartys. Hegarty. All of them were never on the same side, but they were all intertwined at some point. Today, some of them – maybe even just one of them – will likely hold the wand that will conjour the magic and take Donegal football's most cherished prize to Towney or Foxhall. Michael Murphy has done it before at this level. He almost single-handedly landed Glenswilly's first ever SFC title in 2011 when they defeated St Michael's. Two years later, Murphy found himself at the centre of a storm as the Donegal final was set for a day after he was to captain Ireland in the International Rules series against Australia. Murphy led Ireland to a win at Breffni Park. He went out on Sean MacCumhaill Park's sod the following day and delivered another magical hour. His display turned Killybegs blood as Glenswilly savoured the day again. "It wasn't as easy thing for the club; they might have thought I was turning my back on the them slightly," Murphy told reporters that day. "But it was never the case. It was about just getting the head down. Two games in two games: it is football, is it what you love.

"To play for Ireland and your club in a county final in two days – you would take it every day. People doubted us within the county but we proved ourselves today." Murphy and Gallagher have an almost-telepathic understanding on the field. They've done it so often for Donegal and with Glenswilly they are even more central to the cause. Gallagher's return this year from injury has coincided of the revival of a Glenswilly side that looked doomed. Writing them off could be a dangerous exercise.

But what of Kilcar? Eoin McHugh only made his Championship debut for Donegal this summer against Fermanagh. That fact was even scarcely believable on the day given that Donegal had seen and heard so much about the latest flying terrier to come out of Bavin. 'The Mark McHugh role' has become part of the GAA's lexicon since 2012 and the elder statesman of the McHugh trilogy, allhough he's only 26, is back in wonderful form again. His leadership on the park has been a key part of Kilcar's march to the final, their first in 23 years.

Hyan McHugh seems a shoo-in for an All-Star, even if Donegal's early exit, albeit at the quarter-final stage, may work against him. One of the country's, never mind the country's most talented artists, many will earmark him as Kilcar's key man. Can that be the case when the imposing, deadly figure of McBrearty looms upon the edge of the square. Those eleven points for Donegal against Cork in the All-Ireland qualifier remain to the front of the mind. On his day, he can be lethal and he's been consistent right through Kilcar's run, showing maturity, ruthlessness and a sense of responsibility that comes with being a leading light, even in a team of stars.

Then there's Hegarty. The old wizard has lost none of the grace and none of the poise. He has the look of a man who could play football forever. He came back for Donegal in 2011 to win Ulster, but missed the capture of Sam a year later. He was coming on the scene in the late 90s when memories of Kilcar's last hour of glory was still fresh in the mind. As Kilcar and Glenswilly can testify, different years bring different stories, different tales and different heroes, though we can say with certainty that one of the county stars will shine brighter than others today. Who is the question. Therein lies the wonder of what will grip us once the O'Neill's leaves the hands of Sean McLaughlin.

Na Cealla Beaga : Dun na nGall Senior Championship Champions 1991 and Division 1 Winners.

While the Na Cealla Beaga victory on Sunday the 8th of September 1991 was the clubs third senior championship success (1952, 1988 being the previous ones)), nonetheless the hard fought victory over a very talented and determined Red

Hughs side was the catalyst to a very successful decade for the club. By the nineties end, the club had won four senior championships and four Division one titles accompanied by a raft of titles at underage levels. The Ninety One

panel, while most of the players had experienced Senior success in 1988, also saw championship final introductions for a number of new young players who were to contribute greatly to the 91 campaign and to future success's for the club hoth on and off the field. These were Barry Cunningham(Stut), Declan and Mark Boyle, Darren Cunningham, Stephen Burke and Peter Mc Ginley. Due to the demands of fishing and consequent unavailability of some senior players, all of these young players were also to prove vital to the winning of the Division title and oventual progress to the Ulster Club Senior Final in 1991.

The 1991 championship campaign itself started with an away narrow one point (courtesy of a late Manus Boyle score) victory over Ardara in Kentucky. However the second leg in Fintra was not as close, as victory was secured with a 5-7 to 0.11 score line. The quarter Final saw us paired with Glenfin with the team recording a unexpected relatively easy win on a 2-16 to 0-6 apprentine.

The semi final saw Naomh Columba as the apponents with a lot on the line given that this making was a repeat of the previous year's

county final which the men from Glen had snatched with a one point victory. However on this occasion with notable performances from John Ban, Barry Cunningham and Conor White, Na Cealla Beaga won 2-16 to 1-6, a result which was celebrated in the Harbour, Lone Star, The James Joyce and Squeakys.

The Final saw us pitted against a Red Hughs

side who had certainly erased any doubts about their ability or determination by defeating Four Masters(after two draws and a playoff), Kilcar and

MacCumhaills on their way to the Final. While many outside the club had us down as red hot

favourites, we were not convinced and so it proved as Red Hughs pushed us all the way as we won even more narrowly than the 2-7 to 0-11 score line might suggest.

Our reserves(see picture) also made it to the 1991 County Final only to be beaten by Kilcar although a lot of them had already won reserve championship medals in the double championship success of 1988. Indeed most of the younger players pictured in the reserve team would go on to win Senior Championship medals in either 1992,1995 or 1996.

To the Champions of 1991 on behalf of the club we both thank and salute you for the honour you brought to our club by your double winning exploits and then historic Ulster Final appearance.

Finally, Na Cealla Beaga GAA Club would like thank the County Committee and Management Committee for your kind inviataion and for honouring our 1991 Champions today on the biggest day of the year for all Donegal Gaels. Focal Scur.

While delving through old newspapers, yearbooks and programmes in order to pen this short tribute, I was struck by the change in the

fixture environment since 1991 and the way in which club competitions are catered for and the room afforded to them .In 1991 The Championship Final was played on the 8th of

September and the 18 game league divisions were completed by the 2nd of November. In case anyone thinks that this was perhaps the result of the county teams being knocked out early; this was not the case. The County Senior team were involved until they were beaten by Down in the Ulster Final played on the 28th July and the County Minors won the Ulster Final and thus were involved until they were beaten by Cork in Late August, yet

still the County Final was played on the first weekend of September.

To best illustrate how this was achieved and by way of example;Red Hughs played in 1991 six championship matches in total on 9th June, 23rd June, 7th July, 14th July, 17th August and 8th September. The ties played on the 7th July v Four Masters & 14th July v Kilcar were played between the Ulster Semi Final and Final despite plenty of county players being involved. It is also apparent that the mixing of club championship and county games doesn't appear to have hindered county success in this period as

Donegal reached five Ulster finals in a row winning two Ulster championships and One All Ireland.

Boyle, Barry Cunningham all of whom were playing for the county had this sample schedule of games. 20th October Ulster Club v Dungiven; 27th October N.F.L. v Antrim; 3rd November Div.1 League Final v Naomh Columba; 10th November N.F.L. v Longford; 17th November Ulster Club v Downpatrick.

The purpose of demonstrating is not to say that the current fixture schedules are totally wrong or that

past schedules was totally the right way to go, we will all have different opinions about that. This might however demonstrate that totally condensing club championships is not the only option available when planning for a county to be successful. As for burnout? Does players playing on numerous consecutive weekends on a continual basis for present the greatest danger of burnout? Or does excessive training, travelling or meetings required of players by club, college or county managers allied to and to some extent caused by a intermittent playing schedule present a much greater risk?

Killybegs the 1991 Champions

Killybegs in the late 1980s and the first half of the went on to win All-Ireland medals with Derry in 1990s were one of the top teams in Donegal and recognised as one of best club teams in the history of Donegal football. Between 1988 and 1996 they won five of the eight championships out of seven final appearances.

The team was littered with household names, not only in Donegal but at right around the country. Barry McGowan, John Cunningham, John 'Ban' Gallagher, Barry Cunningham, Manus Boyle and Conor White were All-Ireland U-21 medal holders by the time they won the first of their five championships in 1988.

David Meehan, Stephen Burke, Mark Boyle and Barry Cunningham jnr had worn the Donegal jersey in the Ulster Minor Championship and also played U-21 football for Donegal. And Barry McGowan, Manus Boyle, Barry Cunningham and John Cunningham went on to win All-Ireland senior medals in 1992.

In 1988, they defeated neighbours, Kilcar, for only 36 year gap.

They lost the 1990 final to Naomh Columba before Derry City, Sligo Rovers and Finn Harps. bouncing back to claim the number one prize again. In 1991, they defeated Red Hugh's in the team in 1991. They were only 17 at the time. final.

And in the words of Jimmy White, the then player manager they were 'lucky' to overcome the men from the Cross in the final. Killybegs defeated Red Hugh's 2-11 to 2-9 in the decider.

"We were lucky enough to win that final. We had gone into the final as the hot favourites but Red Hugh's had a very good team at the time and they were very unlucky not to win a championship in those years," said Jimmy White, who had taken over from John Joe O'Shea at the beginning of They were champions again in '92 - they defeated

Kerryman John Joe O'Shea, a teacher at Killybegs Vocational School, had masterminded the 1988 success after a number of years of great success at underage level.

"I was just thinking the other day how things have changed since 1991, when you look at the large numbers in managements and backroom teams nowadays. "In '91, I was player manager. I had no selectors and Michael Gallagher trained the team." As Donegal champions, Killybegs defeated Dungiven, the Derry champions and the Down champions, Downpatrick, on their way to an Ulster final. In the provincial decider they lost out narrowly The rest of the squad was: Kevin White, John on capturing an Ulster club title.

"We had a good run in Ulster. Dungiven were a good side. They had Kieran and Emmett McKeever, Brian McGilligan, Joe Brolly, who all Fintan Gallagher, Colm Cunningham.

"That game was in Ballinascreen. We played Barry Breen and Conor Deegan's Downpatrick in Newcastle, in the semi-final to qualify for the final. In the provincial decider in Healy Park, Omagh, Killybegs were pipped by a Eugene 'Nudie' Hughes powered Castleblaney Faughs. The Monaghan champions won that game by two points, 0-8 to 0-6. Tony Hegarty had a chance for a late dramatic goal for Killybegs, but drove inches wide. "It was disappointing to lose the final but overall we had a great run and when you take into account that five of the starting 15, a third of the team, were on the high seas for most of the Ulster campaign, it illustrates just how talented a squad of players they

Denis Carberry, Conor White, David Meehan, Rory McNelis and Rory McNelis were the five fishermen. One of the other highlights from 1991 for Jimmy White was the emergence of two young stars of the the club's second championship as they bridged a future who went on to play for Donegal at U-21 and at senior level and one of them for Glasgow Celtic.

"Declan Boyle and Peter McGinley broke into the

"Declan broke into the team at the start of the championship and played in all our championship games right through Donegal and Ulster.


"Peter didn't play in any of the games in Donegal but he played in the three games in Ulster. And he went on to be one of our top players for over a decade."

Killybegs with, by and large, the same squad went on after '91 to contest four of the next five Donegal finals, winning three of the them.


