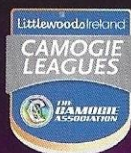

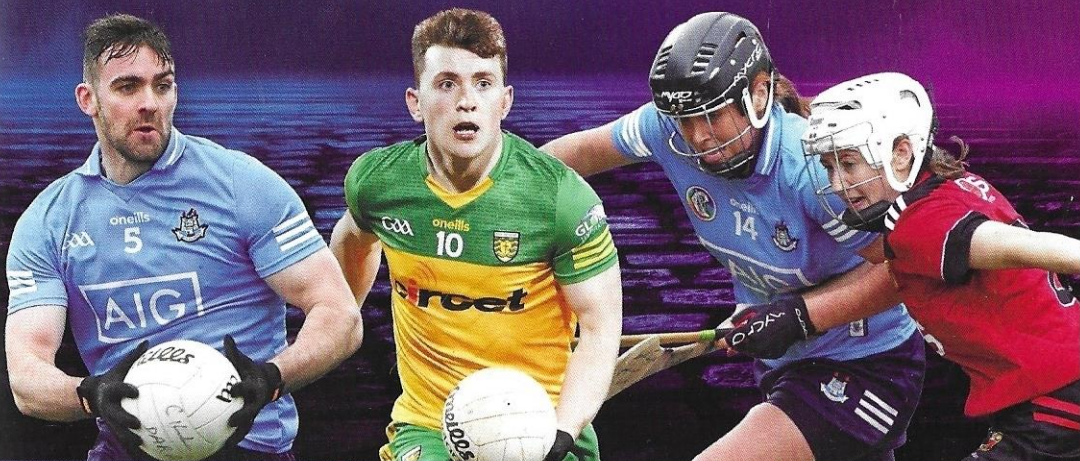

WELCOME

Fáilte romhaibh go léir go dtí Páirc an Chrócaigh tráthnóna.

I would like to welcome all to Croke Park this afternoon as we entertain Donegal in Round 6 of the Allianz Football League Division 1. I am also delighted that we can host our camogie team playing their final Littlewoods Camogie League Division 1 fixture against Down in our opening game.

Our footballers enjoyed a fine win on the road in Omagh last weekend against All-Ireland champions Tyrone, picking up two much needed points. Donegal lost out to Monaghan and it leaves things very tight in what has been a very competitive Division. Dublin will be keen to pick up another four points from our remaining two games and I am hopeful the first two can be secured here today.

Meath's Cormac Reilly will referee today's game and I want to wish him and his officials well and thank them for their commitment to our games.

I also want to thank our sponsors AIG for their continued partnership with Dublin GAA. With their support we have been able to grow our games in the city. I am delighted to report a 5% increase in the number of teams competing in our juvenile competitions and 4% at adult level. Over 200 juvenile competitions are organised annually by Coiste na nÓg. This also underlines the success of the development funding, in tandem with the investment by our clubs, in meeting its aim of growing participation in our games in the city.



Of course we also need to continue to provide facilities for our clubs and players in very challenging circumstances here in the city where available land is at a premium. But I am pleased to say that we will soon apply for planning permission for Hollystown and are progressing the development in the Spawell. It is intended that both facilities will be developed along similar lines with 3 flood-lit sand-based playing pitches and an all-weather 4G pitch, dressing rooms, a gymnasium, meeting rooms, ball walls and other facilities, much of which will be available for use by local schools and community groups.

Finally, it was great to hear the very vocal Dublin support in Healy Park last Sunday and I have no doubt it contributed to our great win. I know that our supporters will get right behind the team again here today and I am sure it can help the lads to secure another important victory.

CROKE PARK SAFETY AND GENERAL INFORMATION

REGULATIONS Páirc an Chrócaigh

1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the Health and Safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.
2. The management reserves the right of admission.
3. The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.
4. All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
5. Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket.
6. The following are not permitted:
- 6.1 Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders, or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.
- 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.3 The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behavior constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch.
- 6.5 Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
- 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
- 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
7. If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
8. Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.

Safety and General Information

Supporters are asked to respect the fact that they are entering and leaving the stadium through residential areas.



Safety Notice

In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.



The policy to prohibit such encroachment in the future has been taken to avoid further injuries and possible fatality and has been taken on the advice and promptings of the safety authorities, namely the Gardaí, Dublin City Council, Fire Brigade and the HSE. The full co-operation of supporters is requested to avoid serious injury and to ensure that games can be enjoyed without resource to fencing or avoidable obstructions to seeing action from all vantage points. Together we can ensure that the Croke Park experience is both enjoyable and safe, particularly for the young and vulnerable.

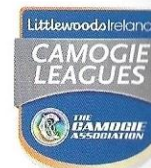

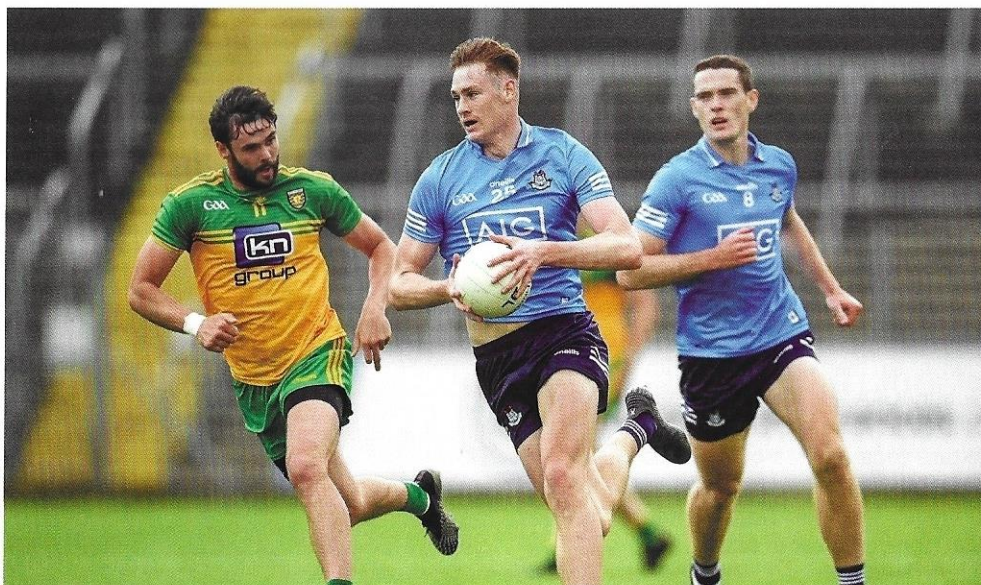

National Football League Semi-Final - 12th June 2021

DUBLIN 1-18 DONEGAL 1-14

All hail, then, the first ever joint-winners of the National Football League. The Dubs came through their semi-final with few complications, outstaying Donegal in a Breffni Park challenge match with a comfortable four points to spare. Presumably they and Kerry will meet in Thurles to pass the cup between each other for six months apiece.

"It is what it is," shrugged Dublin selector Mick Galvin afterwards. "But it probably shouldn't have come to this to be quite honest with you. You play a game like this, with the other semi-final being played on the same

night, obviously we would look forward to a final. How it came to this I don't know. We're happy with what we got out of the league but we'll just have to get on with it."

Not that this game had a whole pile of standing to begin with, but the rug was entirely pulled out from under it by the hammering Tyrone took in Killarney earlier in the day. It meant that these two teams were playing a semi-final for which there could be no possible final. A kind of a mezzanine match, taking place on the 7½th floor like in Being John Malkovich.

It looked every inch of it, too. Both teams sat in, packed their defences, gave the opposition the ball and looked to hit on the break. In the early exchanges, Donegal prospered –

Michael Langan notched a typically languid opener, Niall O'Donnell followed up with a fine breakaway score thanks to a 60-yard sprint from Ryan McHugh.

And though Dublin replied with a fisted effort from Con O'Callaghan and a Cormac Costello free, Donegal were well able to get out and score at the other end. Paddy McBrearty, who had a fine night all round, whenever Donegal could reach him, stitched an excellent effort from out wide and a no-fuss mark in the space of a couple of minutes. Caolan McGonagle got on the end of a terrific passing move to keep Donegal ahead.

But it was all very ho-hum. Nobody sweated too heavily or got too excited – save for Donegal selector Stephen Rochford roaring himself hoarse from the stands. Dublin had no real trouble keeping pace – Costello was unerring from dead balls and Paddy Small chipped in as well. With 10 minutes to go until the break, the sides were level at 0-6 apiece. Small earthquake in Chile, not many dead.

All it took really was for the Dubs to put a little more downward pressure on the pedal and they opened up clear water. Ciarán Kilkenny found a pocket of space where none looked to exist. O'Callaghan sized up Brendan Cole for a pair of concrete shoes and tossed him overboard with a swing of the hips to fist his second of the day. Costello nailed a free.

Next thing you know, Dublin turned the ball over in their own 45 and broke down the pitch like a pickpocket gang. Brian Fenton picked out the 50-yard sprint of Eoin Murchan as Small and Costello broke off him in opposite directions. Murchan transferred for Costello who put Small in behind with a sumptuous long handpass and the finish was emphatic.

Just like that, a draw game was turned into a five-point Dublin lead. The doughty McGonagle kept trucking and pulled one back before the break but the 1-8 to 0-7 half-time lead already looked to be enough for the Dubs.

And if there was any doubt on that score, they wiped it away with the first three points of the second half through Seán McMahon, Fenton and Kilkenny. It was all very straightforward really. The game was a game and then it wasn't. Donegal felt fairly happy with where they stood and then 10 minutes later they were gone.

If this was an ordinary league semi-final, they could maybe have been expected to go eyeballs out trying to pull the seven-point margin back. But since there was really nothing to play for – and since they are out in a fortnight in the Ulster championship – there weren't going to waste too much effort in the pursuit.

McBrearty stuck to his task and found the next three points (two from frees) – but they were the last Donegal scores for the next 10 minutes. Brian Howard got in on the action, Con fisted another, Costello was steady as the tides from the floor. A possible turning point was averted when Evan Comerford pulled off a fine save from Oisín Gallen on 52 minutes when a goal would have left just three between the teams.

Dublin eased home from there and a late 1-1 cameo from Donegal sub Eoghan McGettigan did nothing to worry them. They play Down in a fortnight in Newry. We can take it the video of this game will play little part in their preparations.

DUBLIN 2-10 DONEGAL 0-11

A terrific Jack McCaffrey goal seven minutes from time clinched a first win of the 2015 Allianz Football League for Dublin, pushing them to a 2-10 to 0-11 victory over Donegal.

Jim Gavin's side managed it despite losing Kevin McManamon to a red card 25 minutes from the end of what turned out to be a tempestuous enough encounter.

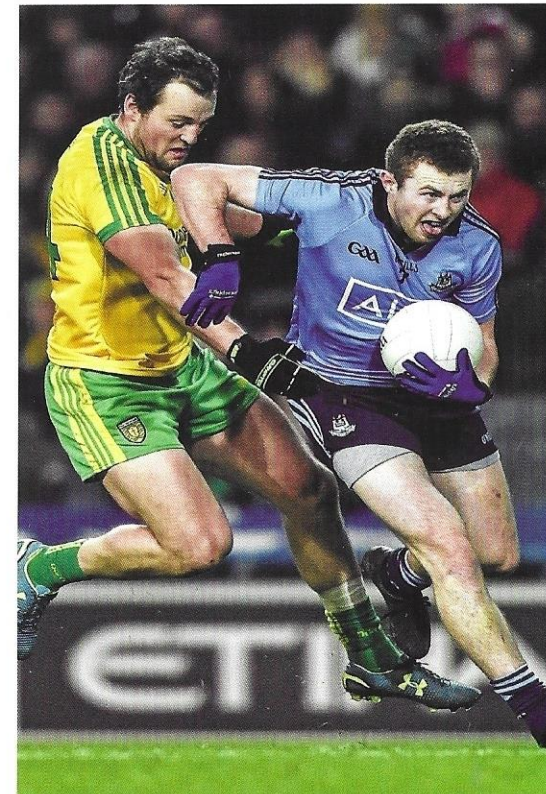
Not that it wasn't enjoyable. Far from it. Though the Croke Park lights were never in grave danger of being shot out, there were enough moments of genuine distinction to make it worth the admission. For every early-season oversight, there was a reminder of what we miss when the intercounty game goes dark for the winter.

The first Dublin goal five minutes in was a case in point. It began with a howler - Paul Durcan's kickout going straight to Eric Lowndes and the late Dublin replacement fed Kevin McManamon. A gorgeous inside kick-pass from McManamon found Lowndes who had continued his run and, when he found Cormac Costello, the corner-forward rounded Durcan to finish the move.

Whatever about the rust involved in Durcan's mistake - and it was his last act of the night as he took a knee to the head from Karl Lacey in trying to stop Costello - McManamon's pass was a piece of summer smuggled into February.

At the other end, Michael Murphy, too, was making a mockery of the date. He scored the first point of the night on the run from a Christy Toyne pass and potted the second from a free with the outside of his boot from 50 metres soon after.

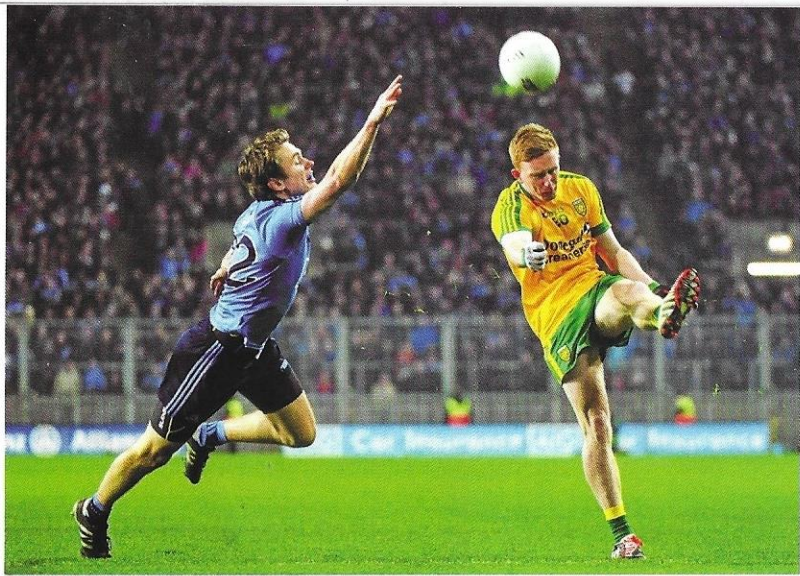
Donegal probably weren't moving just as slick as their hosts but as long as Murphy was able to get on the ball, they were usually causing trouble.

Patrick McBrearty came into matters too as the evening rolled by. With Dublin 1-3 to 0-3 ahead on 24 minutes - smart points coming from Emmet Ó Conghaile, Eoghan O'Gara and Davy Byrne, adding ballast to Costello's early goal - McBrearty fastened on to the end of a zippy Murphy run to stick his first of the night.

He followed it a minute later with his second and by now the game was ticking along at a fair old clip. Dean Rock iced a couple of placed balls before Christy Toyne and McBrearty again closed out the first half's scoring. They went to the break with Dublin a point up, 1-5 to 0-7.

The temperature was rising all the while. Neil McGee came in off the bench and straight away initiated a dialogue with anyone who came into his general sphere - whether they wanted to listen or not. He and Kevin McManamon found themselves with a yellow card apiece soon after his arrival and when McManamon clipped Mark McHugh as he came out of defence early in the second half, Dublin were down to 14.

As the game got bumpier and thumpier, it seemed to suit Donegal's rhythm better than Dublin's. Though Rock kept the scoreboard ticking with his pinpoint frees, Murphy, McBrearty and Toye knocked over classy points at the other end. By midway through the second half, there was still just a point in it and Dublin hadn't kicked a score from play for 33 minutes.

Enter McCaffrey.

Dublin had become a little laboured in attack with Donegal's massed defence gumming up the works on them time and again. McCaffrey found space through the simple tactic of running into it very, very fast.

His first contribution was a point on the run to push Dublin two clear before he polished off the game with a cracking goal. After playing a one-two with Davy Byrne, McCaffrey sprinted to the edge of Donegal's big square and pinged a right-footed shot high into the top right corner.

It put Dublin 2-9 to 0-11 up with seven minutes to go and wiped all doubt from the issue.

Colm McFadden and Ciarán Kilkenny swapped points and there was still enough time for Michael Murphy to see a black card - to the Hill's obvious glee.

Older Than We Thought !

Our traditional foundation date of 1928 has been drastically revised in light of recent research. The 1928 iteration was referred to in press reports at the time as the 'new' Schools' League as it was a revival of the 1905 version founded by some of the same personnel as were involved in the '20s. Indeed, anecdotal evidence seems to be pointing now to organised schools' games as far back as 1901, making the Dublin unit the oldest in the country. The importance of the organisation in keeping our native pastimes alive in the city was highlighted by the fact that schools' finals were often curtain-raisers to big games in Croke Park. A notice, from the Irish Independent advertises the Herald Cup final before the 1953/4 National Football League final. Carlow, appearing in their first and only league final, were defeated by Mayo for whom Pádraig Carney - 'the flying doctor', who came from America for the clash, and the great Tom Langan starred. 38,694 people attended.

"Herald" Cup Final

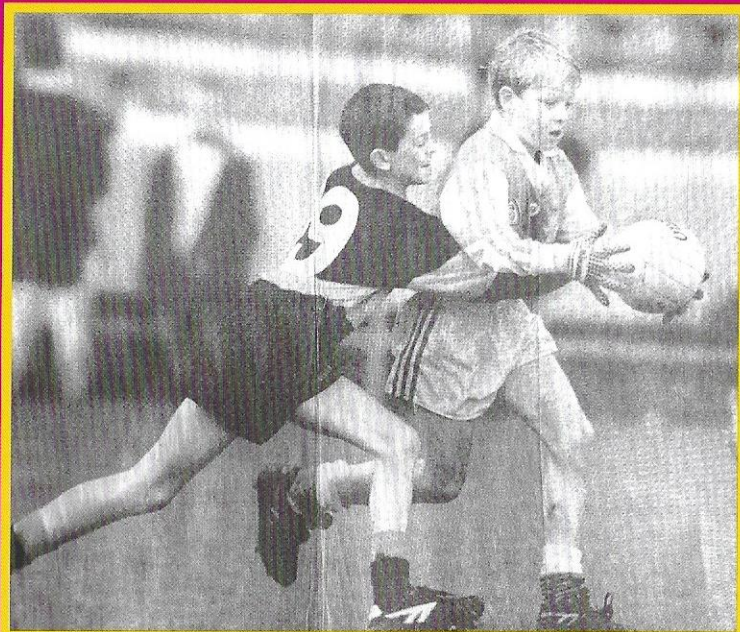

The athlete who played for Home Farm, Ipswich Town, Falkirk, Oldham Athletic, Crumlin United, Bohemians, Ireland U21, was sub goalkeeper for Dublin senior footballers in 2010 and he won a Dublin senior championship with St. Brigid's, Blanchardstown. He was called up to the full Ireland international soccer squad, under Martin O'Neill, in 2018.

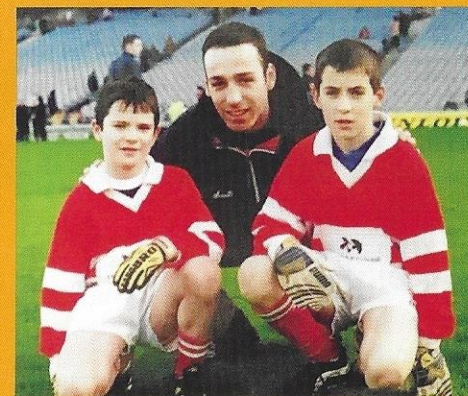
Shane was part of a hugely successful Scoil Bhríde, Blanchardstown, squad that won double-doubles in Junior/Senior hurling and football in 1997/'8. He represented the school in the annual friendly exchange in Belfast. At that time, Corn Herald, Corn Marino, Corn Oideachais, Corn Kitterick, Corn Uí Mhaoláin and Corn Chumann na nGael all graced the Scoil Bhríde trophy cabinet. In the 1997 Corn Oideachais (U11) hurling final, current Dublin hurling goalie, Alan Nolan - holder of 8 winners medals - lined out in goals. Shane Supple scored a goal that day and James Brogan, son of Jim, starred with four goals hitting the net. In the 1998 Div 1 Herald Cup hurling final, Shane was between the posts as James Brogan hit 5 goals, Alan Nolan, playing outfield, scored 1-1. Graham Morris, son of Dublin star, Joey, added 2 points and Peadar Carton, son of Peadar Snr, knocked over a glorious point. The Corn Uí Mhaoláin decider saw Shane score 1-1, Alan Nolan 4 goals and Peadar Carton 3-2 in a facile victory. In 1999, Scoil Mhuire, Marino, bounced back to win corn Herald against St. Mary's, Rathfarnham, when's Diarmuid Connolly netted 3 times. Waterford man, Martin Kennedy, was the maestro behind the incredible Scoil Bhríde success that launched the careers of wonderful role-models for our young players.
