PRESIDENT'S FOREMORD






Pat is from the Killinkere club in County Cavan. Pat joined the Ulster Referees Academy in 2014 and graduated from it in 2015 and has been an active referee on the provincial panel since. Interestingly, his brother James is on the National Hurling Referees panel so refereeing runs through the family!

He has taken charge of games in the Dr McKenna Cup, Under 20 Football Championship, Minor Football Championship and Minor Football League as well as Ulster Club Championship games over the past six years, while today will be his first Ulster Final.

In 2021, Pat refereed the Cavan Senior Football Championship and League Finals to add to his Intermediate Final that he has previously done. He was the man in the middle for the Under 20 Football Championship First Round game between Down and Fermanagh earlier this year.

He will be joined on the biggest day of his career to date with his team of loyal umpires; Gerry Sheridan, Matt Banville, Martin Sexton and Keelan McCarville.

thanks to a late goal from Donegal's Donal Gallagher, Tyrone goalkeeper Conor McAneney turned out to be the hero by saving the decisive penalty. The Red Hands had begun the defence of their Ulster title with a win over Cavan in the first round, with captain Eoin McElholm bagging 1-6 in an eight-point win before a comprehensive victory over Antrim.

The Loughmacrory man will again be pivotal to his side's chances today as they prepare to take on a Derry side who have enjoyed relatively smooth passage to the final. Ruairi Forbes was part of the St Mary's, Magherafelt team which won the MacRory Cup earlier this year and he scored 0-3 in their semifinal win over Cavan last weekend. Marty Boyle's team will also look to the likes of Fionn McEldowney in defence to provide some solidity against a fearsome Tyrone forward line which has averaged over 20 points a game in the championship.

Not that Derry are to be found wanting in that department either. They have scored 5-10, 2-11 and 0-16 in their victories over Armagh, Donegal and Cavan so far in this year's championship and will be hoping that another high return is enough to bring the Fr Murray Cup back across the Sperrins. Since the minor grade switched to U17 in 2018, either Tyrone or Derry have qualified for the Ulster Final, although this is the first time they will meet each other at this level.

Tyrone are looking to extend their record to 25 Ulster minor titles while Derry, second on the roll of honour, are aiming for title number 16.

It should be a fitting appetiser for the senior decider and will be equally closely contested.

PIUOTAL PLAYERS

RUAIRI FORBES

Speaking recently on The GAA Social podcast with the BBC, Forbes portrayed a wise head on young shoulders as he spoke passionately about representing his club Ballinderry and captaining Derry Minors, all while managing to win a MacRory Cup medal with his school St Mary's Magherafelt back in February. That campaign for St Mary's brought him into the spotlight as one of the most talented players of his age, with several standout performances throughout the competition. He has certainly carried that momentum into this year's provincial campaign for Derry, acting as a driving force at midfield in a side brimming with talent. He helped himself to three points in last weekend's semi-final clash with Cavan and played a pivotal role in several others. Derry will be hoping for more of the same today.

FIONN MCELDOWNEY

The challenge of nullifying Grimes is most likely to fall to the tight marking corner back from Slaughtneil. A supremely talented defender, McEldowney's pace and quick feet make him a nightmare for any inside forward to shrug off. He has been Derry's go to defender in the early part of the competition to date, providing a steadying influence across the entire backline as well as effectively cancelling out the oppositions main threat. He captained St Patrick's Maghera to the Rannafast Cup title back in March, breezing through the competition where they defeated Tyrone opposition in the form of St Patrick's Academy Dungannon, St Joseph's Donaghmore and Omagh CBS in the early rounds. And yet, despite all his defensive capabilities, he still found the time to maraud forward against Donegal in Round 2 and kick a fine score.

EOIN MCELHOLM

When Tyrone found themselves three points in arrears with time running out at Celtic Park last week, they needed someone to grab the game by the scruff of the neck and give themselves a shot at victory. Up stepped McElholm, taking on a captain's role as the Red Hands reeled in a three-point deficit to force extra time. Firstly, his incisive run and pass set up Callum Daly to cut the gap to two. Then, after Sean Hughes left one point between them, McElholm kicked a wonder score from the stand side to force the extra 20 minutes. A survivor from last year's Minor side who won the Ulster Championship and reached the All-Ireland Final, McElholm's influence has been crucial in Tyrone reaching back-to-back finals.

NOAH GRIMES

The Donaghmore sharpshooter has helped himself to 1-12 across the three Championship games that Tyrone have played thus far. With captain Eoin McElholm operating in the half forward line, the mantle has fallen to Grimes to provide the scoring threat closer to goal, and he hasn't disappointed. His ability to score off both feet, alongside a lightning injection of pace, make him more than a handful for any defence to get to grips with. With Donegal dropping numbers back behind the ball, Grimes' ability to making probing runs and break the line were crucial to Tyrone keeping a foothold in the game. He also stepped up to slot home Tyrone's first penalty in the shootout. A big game player who Tyrone will hope can spark into life in the wide open spaces of Clones.

The goal came somewhat against the run of play in what had been a dull affair up until that point. Derry had started the brighter, with frees from Brolly and Eamonn Burns helping open a two point lead after just 10 minutes before Donegal hit back through Brendan Devenny and Adrian Sweeney to level matters at 0-3 each at the break. Devenney and Tony Boyle gave Donegal the early advantage in the second half, and thought they had clinched the game when John Duffy punched to the net only for it to be disallowed. On a rain-soaked afternoon in Clones, Derry ended Donegal's reign as All-Ireland Champions with a famous victory and game where scores were at a premium, the accuracy of Enda Gormley was a crucial part of Derry's success. Manus Boyle and Joyce McMullan had given Donegal an early lead, which could have been even more had John Duffy not blasted wide when through on goal. Derry were reeling at this stage, as a more physical Donegal side adapted better to the conditions. Gormley got Derry off the mark with a free before Damien Cassidy and Martin McHugh exchanged scores to see Donegal lead 0-5 to 0-4 at the half time break. Derry would return to the field like men possessed after the break, and they rattled off four scores in a row from Anthony Tohill, Cassidy, Damien Barton and another Gormley free. That scoring burst inside the first eight minutes of the second halfwas enough to win the game.






Conor Glass calling time on his Australian Rules career with Hawthorn and returning home to don the Oak Leaf County colours was news to delight for Derry fans two years ago.

The powerful midfielder has been quick to make the impact they'd hoped he would, thriving for both club and county since his return. Last year he was at the fulcrum of Glen's Derry title win, as well as sealing league promotion to Division Two with Rory Gallagher's side.

This Championship campaign has saw Glass push on again. He excelled in the air in the Tyrone game, most of it competing and breaking down Niall Morgan's long kickouts which set the foundation for Derry's memorable victory. He was already dominating the midfield exchanges by the time Brian Kennedy saw red in the first half, while Conn Kilpatrick also struggled to match his rival's aerial ability.

Against Monaghan the Watty Graham's man had a fascinating and very even battle with Niall Kearns, who was arguably one of Monaghan's best performers on the day. He took his fair share of high catches and ensured Derry maintained their steady platform to go on and book their place in their first Ulster Final since 2011.





PEADAR MOGAN

In a Donegal squad with plenty of Anglo Celt medals to go about, Peadar Mogan's pockets are empty. The successful 2018 and 2019 campaigns came too early for the St Naul's dynamo as he broke onto the scene in 2020. He made an instant impact in his rookie year however, helping to dispatch Tyrone on his Championship debut, before scoring 1-2 in a Man of the Match performance against Armagh in the semi-final.

That year Donegal came undone in the final against Cavan, and last season they fell to eventual Ulster and All-Ireland champions Tyrone at the quarter final stage, but they find themselves back in the familiar territory of a provincial decider this time, and Mogan's contributions have again been key to the path.

He acted as Donegal's sweeper for most of the semi-final against Cavan but as Donegal got to grips in the second half, the ever-energetic Mogan also got forward more late on to good effect.

His direct ball carrying and insatiable work rate has been a facet of Donegal raising the tempo in the second half of both games to date, and he is more than capable of chipping in with scores as he pieces through the gaps in the opposition defence.



ULSTER FINAL PREVIEW ANALYSIS

Coming into today's game, we take a look back at some of the stats both teams have contributed in their respective games.

ATTACK ANALYSIS

The counter attacking brand of football has led to an increase in attacks and scoring opportunities as teams opt to ditch the blanket defence and patient build up for high press turnovers and high intensity attacks.




Over Donegal's campaign so far, they have contributed an average of 43 attacks per game, 9 more than their opposition today. In relation to getting shots towards goal Donegal also have contributed an average of 31.5 per game (73.2% shots from attacks) in relation to Derry's 25 per game (73.4% shots from attacks). Derry have been the more efficient team however creating an average of 17 scores per game (50% of attacks result in scores) in relation to Donegal's 17.5 (40.6% of attacks result in scores).



While there are many areas scores can be sourced from we take a look at some of the main contributors and trends which highlight some of strengths in each team.

Donegal have used the ability and accuracy of Shaun Patton on kickouts to launch several attacks resulting in scores. Donegal had 7 scores v Armagh and 6 scores v Cavan which came directly from their own kickout. In Derry's favour the majority of their scores come from creating forced and unforced turnovers to create scores. Against Monaghan, Rory Gallaghers men converted 6 scores from 21 turnovers, and created 11 scores from 23 turnovers against Tyrone.

KICKOUT ANALYSIS



While both teams have had a similar number of total kickouts over their 2 games each, Donegal have the superior retention rate at 84%. Patton successfully found a Donegal jersey 20/23 times v Cavan and 17/21 times v Armagh.

Kickout styles have varied throughout the Championship with both teams exploring which method suits them best. Donegal have opted for a shorter range on kickout retention going short 28/44 times, whereas Derry have opted to try and gain possession further out the field on more occasions going long 31/40 times. It should be an interesting battle as to which team can come out on top on Ulster final day and how it will contribute to the overaoutcome of the game.

If Derry aim to lift the Anglo-Celt for the first time since 1998 they will need to continue to have a high conversion of scores from turnovers but also target the Donegal kickout.

Donegal may seek to draw on their huge Ulster final experience having been in 10 of the last 12 finals.



DEGLAN BONNER

An All-Ireland winner for Donegal as player in 1992, Bonner has had two spells as manager of the county team. The first, from 1997 until 2000, saw him denied an Ulster Senior Football Championship by a last-minute Joe Brolly goal in the 1998 Final, still Derry's last Anglo Celt Cup triumph.

After getting involved with various Donegal Development Squads, he led the county minor team to the 2014 All-'Ireland Minor Final before securing an Ulster title with the U21's in 2017.

That same year he returned to the Donegal senior job, and guided them to two successive Ulster Senior Football Championships, in 2018 and 2019, becoming only the second manager in the county's history, after Jim McGuinness, to retain the title.

Bonner was only 23 when he became player-manager with his club Na Rossa, his first managerial appointment, and during this time he won the 1989 Donegal Intermediate Football Championship. Having made his Na Rossa senior debut aged just 14, 40 years later he was still turning out for the Dooey club, stepping in to play goalkeeper as the club reached the semi-finals of the Donegal Junior Championship in 2019.

Bonner played in four Ulster SFC Finals, recording two wins and two losses, an achievement he equalled as manager in 2020.

CHRISSY MCKAIGUE V PADDY MCBREARTY

McKaigue has so far been deployed on two of the game's finest forwards in Darren McCurry and Jack McCarron, underlining his status as Derry's man marker in chief. He held McCurry to two points from play, no mean feat, and was an example of defensive discipline throughout the contest.

The Slaughtneil man kept McCarron scoreless from play, but did concede a point from a mark and gave away three scores from frees.

McBrearty looked to be well curtailed by Armagh in the early stages of the quarter-final, but the Kilcar ace's quality came through as he broke free of the shackles in the second half, swapping passes with Caolan Ward to fire in a goal and landing a stunning point from play.

Hs display versus Cavan bore a similar pattern, McBrearty coming to the fore after the break to float over a beauty from the right wing without looking at the posts before being on hand to slam home a late goal.

ODHRÁN LYNCH V SHAUN PATTON

He was safe as houses under the high ball against Monaghan, and it was his huge delivery downfield that led to Benny Heron's first goal.

Patton has forged a reputation as one of finest goalkeepers in the business. Made a fine save to deny Armagh's Aidan Nugent early in the second half, and Donegal retained 17 of his 21 kick-outs as they pushed on to an assured victory.

He kept a determined Cavan at bay in Clones three weeks ago, making a vital save when he got fingertips to James Smith's goal-bound drive before half-time, which came back off the crossbar. His distribution from kickouts is a massive feature in the Donegal gameplan.

SHANE MCGUIGAN V BRENDAN MCCOLE

The Slaughtneil sharp-shooter was Derry's leading scorer in the League, and he carried that rich form into the quarter-final tie with Tyrone registering 1-4. McGuigan's confidence was evident from how decisively he rifled his penalty past Niall Morgan, and his two points from play were also flourishes of quality.

He was again a handful at the Athletic Grounds a fortnight ago, finishing the first half with a mark and two points from play, while also taking a brilliant mark on a kickout. It total, he kicked seven points from eight shots against the Farneymen.

McCole's series of impressive league performance had him tasked with marking Armagh's talisman Rian O'Neill at Ballybofey, and he utterly excelled. The Crossmaglen man never scored, and with his nullification by McCole went any real hope of an Armagh victory on the day.

The job against Cavan's Paddy Lynch proved to be a much trickier assignment, especially in the first half, but the Crosserlough forward's influence waned in the second period. McCole then went onto the alsodangerous James Smith and looked more comfortable. He'll have to be at his very best to put a stop to Derry scoring chief McGuigan this afternoon.

Such is the strength of the Ulster Championship, the Anglo-Celt remains welcome and prized wherever it goes. Today Chrissy McKaigue hopes to become the first Derry man since 1998 to lift the trophy. Meanwhile Michael Murphy will be aiming to repeat the walk up the steps which he has already

JUBILEE TEAM AN CABHÁN 1997

In hindsight, the signs were there. Cavan were coming. The county team had failed to win a match for seven years before Martin McHugh, winner of a Celtic cross in 1992, came on board and they reached the Ulster Final in 1995.

The following year, the U21s made it to the All-Ireland Final and by the dawn of '97, optimism was high. Brilliant players such as Larry and Peter Reilly, Terry Farrelly, Mickey Graham, Dermot McCabe and Anthony Forde had graduated from that side and with experienced men of the calibre of Damien O'Reilly, Fintan Cahill, Stephen King, Bernard Morris and Ciaran Brady forming the spine of the team, the Cavan side had a potent look about it.

The league was a little up and down – good performances in defeat, such as against Kerry, were the norm – but Cavan began to come good at the right time, defeating Tyrone in Dungannon – where the Red Hands were traditionally nigh on unbeatable – and then in a play-off in Clones to retain their league status, with Dermot McCabe punching two goals.

Confidence was high in the county but things almost came unstuck in the first round against Fermanagh.

"As the unthinkable became a distinct possibility, Anthony Forde, so often the unsung hero, became like the Greek giant Hercules, unchained, and his point will become legendary if Cavan win the replay," gushed the Anglo-Celt.

The Cavan team remained in their dressing-room for a long time after the game, with McHugh later admitting to his reporters that his side "got out of jail". Cavan were slightly better a week later, with Mickey Graham and sub Terry Farrelly excelling, as they won by three points before 17,752 spectators. "Fermanagh in the first round was always going to be difficult," recalled McHugh in a 2012 interview.

"But I remember against Fermanagh, Paul O'Dowd saved my job. Fermanagh were a point ahead, and the game looked over. Liam McBarron went through on goal and kicked a bad wide. He should have put it over the bar. But anyway, Paul O'Dowd, just as the ball was going wide, picked up the ball and took a short kick-out to Morris. Morris gave it up the field, Anthony Forde got it and he kicked the equalising point and then the ref blew the whistle and we beat them in the replay."

Suddenly, McHugh's home county stood between them and a second Ulster Final appearance in three seasons. Cavan were seeking a first championship win over Donegal, who had swept Antrim aside in the first round, since 1976. A haul of 1-7 from the recalled Ronan Carolan was crucial to Cavan's victory on the day, earning him a



photo on the front page of this paper under the heading "Brilliant Carolan".

His goal, taking a handpass from Patrick Sheils and blasting home to the roof of the net, was one of the best of the championship, with commentator Jimmy Magee's reaction—"ohhhh yesss!"—mirrored by the huge Cavan support among the 21,000-strong crowd. "A couple of weeks ago I didn't know if I would be playing again. I'm just happy to be back," was Carolan's reaction as Cavan won by 2–15 to 1–10 to advance to the final against the winners of Derry or Tyrone.

In the end, Derry trounced Tyrone in the other semi-final. Having played on three successive weekends due to the replay against Fermanagh, there was a break of three weeks before the Ulster Final during which the county board managed to get a round of the club championships in all three grades played off.

Derry's go-to forward at the time was Joe Brolly, who was quoted in the Irish News at the start of the final build-up. "I'm sure McHugh is delighted with the way Derry played because I presume the media will descend en masse in favour of Derry for the title, which puts pressure on us which will be unusual because we have had no pressure at all this year," said the Dungiven man, then, as now, always a reporter's dream.

"At the present time, I think Cavan are better than Tyrone. They are very fit and are not choking the same way they did two or three years ago in big matches. Cavan is a county with a massive Gaelic football tradition. They are football mad and in football, you just don't know from game to game what is going to happen."

And for those couple of weeks, they were indeed football-mad. The Celt reported on a "ticket frenzy" and the County Board actually issued a statement requesting of supporters "not to ask members of the panel for tickets". The Irish Independent described the panic as "ticket hysteria" which was "reaching record levels". And as the days ticked down, the hype grew.

Derry named their team on Tuesday night and manager Brian Mullins made no changes from the side which destroyed Tyrone by 2-15 to 2-3, with their starting team including nine of the 15 who lined out in their All-Ireland Final win four years earlier and four of the All-Ireland-winning U21 side from that Spring.

Cavan named theirs the following evening, with one

change – in came Philip Kermath at corner-back, with Damien O'Reilly, regarded as one of the finest defenders in the country, moving into the attack (the first time he would start up front for Cavan since the drawn game against Donegal in 1992) and current manager Mickey Graham the unlucky one to lose out on taking his place behind the band.


Nine of the Cavan team – Paul O'Dowd, Damien O'Reilly, Gerry Sheridan, Bernard Morris, Stephen King, Dermot McCabe, Peter Reilly, Ronan Carolan and Fintan Cahill – had started the 1995 Ulster Final. In a piece in the Irish Independent two days before the game, Damien referenced the semi-final win over Donegal and mirrored Brolly's comments.

"We will have to play like that again if we want to beat Derry. Up to that, we were lucky to get out of the two games against Fermanagh. It has been a difficult season for us. For years we went into championship matches as underdogs yet we were favourites in the two matches against Fermanagh and also Donegal. That can create a bit of pressure. Judging on the performance against Tyrone, Derry will be favourites on Sunday. It should result in some pressure being removed from us."

Stephen King was very much in demand among the media. In many ways, the Killeshandra man, in his 18th year on board, was the public face of the Cavan team. In the programme for the Donegal game, northern journalist Michael McGeary reckoned it would be "hard to imagine a Cavan teamsheet without him". King handled his media duties in his usual genial manner, joking with an Irish Times reporter that he hadn't had time to take his fishing rod from under the stairs since the defeat to Down the previous year.

"I haven't had a chance to go fishing this year, we haven't been beaten yet. Mind you," he added with a smile, "the weather hasn't been great either."

The match itself, a sell-out (naturally), was played at a blistering pace. Cavan won the key battles. King, despite straining a hamstring after 15 minutes, battled manfully around the middle where Dermot McCabe was sensational as they managed to thwart Anthony Tohill and Dermot Heaney.



Ronan Carolan vied with McCabe for the Man of the Match award while Larry and Peter Reilly ran the Oak Leafers ragged. At the back, Gerry Sheridan made sure enfant terrible Brolly was totally subdued and would not be blowing kisses on this occasion.

The sides were level at 0-9 apiece at half-time but Cavan had squandered a lot of good chances. But three quick points on the restart got them ticking over and Jason O'Reilly's goal 10 minutes from time, after a typically superb piece of ball-winning from namesake Damien, plus Paul O'Dowd's heroic save, sealed the deal. "I was roaring and shouting at Damien for the ball," 'Jayo', described by one prescient commentator as 'a goalsmith', would say afterwards. "It seemed a long time. He eventually passed to me and I left it on the carpet."

On The Sunday Game that night, Pat Spillane would joke "Ravanelli gets £42,000 a week for doing that, this man should get just as much" – and if the 21-year-old butcher from Belturbet had asked for it that week, some Cavan benefactor probably would have stumped up.

Cavan got a little bit of luck, with a wide from 23-year-old Kingspan employee Raymond Cunningham registering, but it was generally agreed they were the better side. The celebrations were extraordinary. King's speech, including the iconic line "The Anglo-Celt Cup is coming home", will never be forgotten.

GASEMENT PARK

On the eve of last year's Ulster Senior Football Final played in front of a restricted crowd in Croke Park in July 2021 there was welcome and long overdue confirmation that the Department for Infrastructure Minister Mrs Nichola Mallon, MLA had formally granted planning permission for the Casement Park project. After almost four and a half years in the planning process for the second time the news came as great relief for all Ulster Gaels.

In the Autumn, it then emerged that a small number of local residents had decided to submit an application for leave for a judicial review of the Minister's decision. Leave was subsequently granted by the courts and the judicial review was heard in the High Court in Belfast during March and April 2022.

Judgement on the case is due before the end of this month, just a few days after the 2022 Ulster Football Finals in Clones.

This is not the appropriate forum for providing a commentary on the legal case nor to predict the outcome. That said, Ulster GAA and our partners in the project in the public and private sectors are feeling optimistic about the upcoming ruling.

The re-development of Casement Park is a long-standing commitment of the GAA at National, Provincial, County

(Antrim) and Club level. After a series of frustrating delays and challenges to the project having the outcome of the court proceedings in view is hugely encouraging for those at the coal face of the project.

We are hopeful for a positive decision that will reward the patience and resilience of the GAA community in Ulster and Antrim especially as we strive to have equality with our colleagues in rugby and soccer who have enjoyed the benefits of new stadia in Belfast for six or seven seasons

Personally, I have been working with Ulster GAA as Project Sponsor for the best part of a decade now. It has been professionally one of the most challenging times in my career, however the prospect of a new modern fit for purpose stadium befitting of our Association in Ireland's second city remains the focus of our entire team.

As you read this article in today's match programme meticulously prepared by my colleague Stephen Donnelly, imagine yourself sitting in a brand-new stadium and the pride and joy that would bring to all of us in a few years' time. They say "good things come to those that wait" ... On that basis, our prize should be a great one!

- 1. All persons entering this ground are admittedonly subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 2. Fireworks, smoke canister, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, air horns and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry. Should any flag cause an obstruction or present a risk to health & safety, due to the size or type of flagpole used, the GAA reserves the right to have that flagpole removed from the grounds. Flags other than the national flag, Association flag and the flags of competing teams should not be flown from flagpoles at our games.

- Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.

- 11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.

What happens next? That's the question everyone will be asking should today's game finish in a draw. If the teams finish level after normal time, the game will go to the standard extra-time of 2 periods of 10 minutes each way. Should that fail to produce a winner, then we move to a penalty shootout. The GAA's "Result on the Day" protocols were introduced in 2017, with a free-taking competition the method proposed for breaking the deadlock. That was

So here is what happens next;

- 1. Well first thing first, only goals will count at this stage.
- 2. Each team will pick five penalty takers, a goalkeeper and a substitute goalkeeper. These are the only players who will take part until we find a winner.
- 3. All these players had to be on the field at the end of extra-time to take part (apart from the substitute goalkeeper, who can come from the panel and will only be used if the goalkeeper is injured during the penalties).
- 4. These players are registered with the referee along with the order the penalty takers will take their penalties.
- 5. Five penalties each, and whoever scores more wins the game.
- 6. If they're still level after five penalties, then there will be sudden death until we find a winner. The same five penalty takers must be used, though they don't have to be in the same order as before.
