The period 1970 to 1975 was probably one of the most critical periods in the history of our club. In that period the club had won a Junior Championship in 1971, then Under 21 championships in 1972, 1973 and 1974 and a county senior league in 1975. A good foundation stone was laid by the minor championship of 1964 but it was the 3 in a row wins by the under 21ís that provided the backbone of the winning senior teams of the seventies and eighties.

It is fitting, therefore, that 25 years later we acknowledge the work done during the period 1970 -1975 and take a brief glimpse at the happenings in our own club, County and Nationally during these years, while our main focus is on the reporting of the under 21 games that led to these memorable victories in 1972, 1973 and 1974.

The club officials and the team managers, Francis Barry Campbell 1972 and Seamus Gillespie in 1973 & 1974 deserve our gratitude for the commitment at that time as the Under 21 championship was in its infancy, having commenced in 1971.

Many of these players went on to win Donegal Senior championship, senior league and All-Ireland Gaeltacht medals with our club.

In the first round of the Donegal Junior football league N. Mhuire Kilcar wearing white jerseys, defeated Naomh Columba at the Parish Park, Cashel.

On the last Sunday in April Naomh Columba defeated Naomh Mhuire at the Parish Park, Cashel, in the first round of the Junior Championship.


In the senior championship Rosses Rovers had an easy victory over St. Patrick's, a combination of Kilcar and Glencolmcille.

Kilcar minors registered a 2-13 to 1-01 victory over Killybegs in the minor Championship at Towney.

In January Donegal had reached the Ulster Vocational School semi final with Hugh Shovlin at centre half back.

Seamus Gallagher was a sub on the Donegal U-21 team for the first round of the Championship. Danny Gillespie had an excellent game at centre half forward for Donegal Minor team in their Championship game against Cavan.

Fr. McClafferty Cup - Naomh Mhuire I-I2, Glenties I-5. Surprisingly good fcotball was served up in this I3-a-side competition for the Fr. McClafferty Memorial Cup which was played on Ascension Thursday evening in continuous rain on a field covered in pools of water. Half time score was Glenties I-5, N. Mhuire I-3. Kilcar had Jimmy Cunningham and Josie Gillespie as guests.

Kilcar got off to a bad start in 1971 with a defeat at the hands of Ardara on Sunday, 21st of February. The final score was Ardara 2-10, Kilcar 2-09 which meant that Ardara were the winners in this section of the Junior Football League.

On May 16th, Gweedore defeated St. Patrick's 4-12 to 0-05 in the final of the Senior Gaeltacht competition at Magheragallon and secured the trip to Cork on June 4th.

Tyrone beat Donegal U-21's in a thrilling first round game on a score of I-10 to I-08. Danny Gillespie had an outstanding game at centre half forward, Charlie O'Donnell (Ardara) was midfield and Michael O'Donnell (Kilcausey) was a sub.

By August Kilcar had reached the semi-final stage of the Junior Football Championship having disposed of Glencolmcille in an earlier round. Their opponents were Inch and the game was played at McCumhaill Park, Ballybofey. The result was a win for Kilcar 3-14 to 0-01 in a one-sided affair.

The Junior Football Championship Final between Kilcar and St. Michael's (Dunfanaghy) was played on the last Sunday in August. After a first half of sizzling football Kilcar led by I-02 to 0-04 but Kilcar lasted the gruelling pace the better to achieve a worthy but by no means easy win. The final score was Kilcar 2-06, St. Michaelís 0-07.

The event was overshadowed by the tragic death of St. Michael's Club vice-chairman, Sergeant Patrick Gill, Dunfanaghy, who was a spectator at the game.

Kilcar's scorers in the first half were Paddy Cannon I-0, Seamus Gallagher 0-02, Joseph Boyle 0-01, Sean McGinley 0-01 while Packie Haughey replaced Donie Cronin. The turning point of the second half came in the 12th minute after a good movement from Seamus Campbell to Packie Haughey to Joseph Boyle whose shot rattled off the post but Michael A. O'Donnell followed up to crash a great shot to the net leaving Kilcar four points ahead. Kilcar substituted Michael O'Donnell for Hugh Shovlin and Donie Doherty for Joseph Boyle.

These two combined well for another Kilcar point and Seamus Gallagher finished off the scoring with a point from a 14-yard free. The final score was Kilcar 2-06, St. Michael's 0-07. Once again Danny Gillespie towered above all his team-mates in the Kilcar side with Seamus Campbell and Sean McGinley also showing to advantage. The chairman of the Donegal County Board, Mr. Tom Walsh, presented the cup to the Kilcar captain Connie Hegarty.





Having won the Junior Championship the team had to automatically go Senior (no Intermediate Championship at that time) for the 1972 Championship. In the first round Kilcar were away to a team comprised of junior clubs of the North Division. Having been beaten rather easily on the last Sunday in May in Falcarragh, revenge was enacted in the home leg on June 25th on a scoreline of 2-09 to 0-07. The replay was played on the first Sunday in July in Glenties. Kilcar ran out easy winners with Sean McGinley outstanding.

So to St. Eunan's in the second round. Kilcar put up a good show but in the end had to give way to a stronger and more experienced St. Eunan's team that went on to win the Championship. The score that day was Kilcar I-06, St. Eunan's 2-07.

The club's participation in the U-21 Championship in 1972 provided a new inspiration for the future and gave the club the most successful run in under-age competition in our history.

In November under the management of Francis Barry Campbell they played Convoy in the final and won the match by a score of 6-15 to Convoy's 0-05. A "Derry People" reporter described the game as "the most accomplished performance by an under-age team that I have ever seen," with the "Donegal Democrat" reporter describing it as "the best display ever seen by an under-age team in Donegal". High praise indeed for a truly magnificent performance.

The following report on the final appeared in the "Donegal Democrat":

Convoy swamped by Kilcar in U-21 County Final

Kilcar6-16 Convoy......0-05

In taking their first ever Donegal Under-21 Football Championship title against Convoy on Sunday, Kilcar gave one of the best displays ever by a club side at McCumhaill Park, Ballybofey. Convoy, who had earned their way to the final with victories over Gweedore, St. Eunan's and Four Masters, were thought to be there with a good chance. They opened the scoring with a first minute point that should have provided them with some inspiration to press on, but any hopes they might have had of taking command were quickly smothered in a spate of irresistible Kilcar pressure that brought two goals and four points by the end of the first quarter, while Convoy's tally remained at one point.

Convoy did get a point at the beginning of the second quarter but this merely acted as a spur to the winners who surged forward again to reach half-time with a total of 4-06 to Convoy's 0-03.

Both sides had triumphed over atrocious weather conditions with biting rain and a blustery wind which favoured the winners in the first half, but so superior were they in fielding ability and teamwork that there was little doubt of their being able to maintain their supremacy on the turnover, and so it proved. Every man on the Kilcar team proved worthy of his place, and many of them shone with exceptional brilliance, including the keeper - Seamus Doogan - who brought off three good saves, defenders Sean Cannon and Hugh Shovlin, mid-fielders Danny Gillespie and Michael A. O'Donnell, and Michael J.

O'Donnell and Michael Carr in attack.

Convoy who lost whatever chance they had of getting back into this game with a missed penalty before half-time, had few stars, but John Dowds tried hard in defence with Dermot McBride and P.J. Hoey battling bravely at mid-field and Seamus McLaughlin running well in the forwards.

Convoy's first minute point was sent over by P.J. Hallihan from Seamus McLaughlin following a P.J. Hoey free. Kilcar took the lead in the 5th minute when Aodh Cannon connected with a side-line kick from Danny Gillespie to beat the defence. Scores followed rapidly for Kilcar, Michael A. O'Donnell pointing from a 35 yard free in the 7th minute. Michael Carr followed suit in the 8th minute, Michael J. O'Donnell adding another in the 9th minute, Michael A. O'Donnell capping this non-stop run of attacking football with a goal in the 15th minute. Seamus McLaughlin scored Convoy's second point of the game in the 16th minute, but Kilcar swung into action again to add a goal by Danny Gillespie in the 17th minute and a point by Michael Carr in the 20th minute. Convoyis third point of the first half came from the boot of Jim Crowley in a goalmouth tussle following a free from P.J. Hoey in the 21st minute.

Michael A. O'Donnell added another to Kilcar's steadily increasing tally in the 24th minute, and Michael Carr finished to the net from a Michael O'Donnell free on the wing in the 27th minute. Convoy were awarded a penalty in the 30th minute when Fergus McCarron was held in the square, but Patsy Mailey muffed the spot kick and the ball glided past the post.

Convoy instilled a brief moment of hope in their supporters with a point from a free by Seamus McLaughlin in the first minute of the second half, and P.J. Hoey had a rasping shot saved by the Kilcar keeper. The initiative, however, soon passed to Kilcar, who had stretched their lead by five more points by the 9th minute. The scorers were Aidan O'Donnell (3 points), and Michael Carr. In the 11th minute Dermot McBride the only great run on the Convoy side when he sprinted along right wing to send over a point. Doogan, the Kilcar keeper saved well from a Manus Harkin free. Kilcar monopolised the scoring in the last 15 minutes, during which they brought their tally from 4-11 to 6-16. Michael A. O'Donnell pointed in the 15th and 16th minutes. Michael J. O'Donnell sent over a point in the 20th minute, and Aodh Cannon had a goal in the 21st minute and Bernard Shovlin had the ball in the net again before a further minute had passed. Points from Michael J. O'Donnell and Michael Carr closed the account for the Kilcar men.





The First Ulster Senior Championship

On Sunday, 30th July 1972, the first ever Ulster Senior Football Championship was won by Donegal. A very special page in the history of G.A.A. in the county was written. This was a high point of achievement in more than sixty years of organised Gaelic athletics in the county.

In this, their third appearance in the Ulster senior final, Donegal had a merited 2 goals and 13 points to 1 goal and 11 points victory over Tyrone in what was in many ways a unique occasion. But while there was a very special flavour about winning the title of champions of Ulster for the first time, Donegal must have taken special delight in defeating Down and Cavan, the top teams in the province for several years, who had so often dashed the high hopes of the men from Tirconaill.

Along that road to the 1972 Ulster Final, Donegal had beaten Down by 1-8 to 0-8 at Ballybofey. They came from behind to earn a draw with Cavan at Irvinestown almost on the stroke of time -Donegal 0-12, Cavan 2-6. Those were exciting games that served to demonstrate more than anything else the spirit of determination that characterised this Donegal team that had been given so little chance earlier in the year.

The Cavan replay was arranged for Clones, practically a home game for the Breffni men - despite the protests of Donegal. But when the game got under way it became quickly evident that the football sparkle was coming from the Donegal attack. The Forwards led the Cavan defence a mesmerising dance and laid the foundation for an eventual 2-11 to 1-9 victory - a ticket to the Ulster final for the third time for Donegal.

The final was in Clones, and it was the first ever meeting of neighbouring counties Donegal and Tyrone at this stage of the Championship. It was a thrilling game through every minute. Once more the never-say-die spirit of this Donegal team was evident. They absorbed morale-sapping blows and fought their way back into the game and eventually surged to the front in the closing ten minutes that really shattered Tyrone and left Donegal with a five-point margin of victory.

This was the breakthrough so much longed for by Donegal G.A.A. officials, players and supporters. It was the county team's first ever eighty minutes' game, in recent years decided for Provincial and All-Ireland deciders. The staying power of the Donegal men told so much as they dominated the closing stages of the Ulster final.

The rain that had fallen ceaselessly for all the second half was forgotten as Captain Frankie McFeely was handed the Anglo-Celt Cup hoisted shoulder high by delighted team-mates and fans. Players beamed their delight as they were deluged with congratulations, the dressing-room was mobbed.

A JUBILANT AT WELCOME HOME

From then on it was jubilant celebration as the team was conveyed in a cavalcade of the cars back to the county, praised and feted and taken around their far-flung county in triumphal parade.

ULSTER SENIOR FINAL

Donegal's Title - After 86 Years

VICTORY in the Ulster Senior football championship is always sweet but, when one has waited 86 years to achieve it the joy knows no bounds. The long wait ended for Donegal at Clones yesterday when the Championship underdogs downed Tyrone.

The victory must have been all the sweeter, as it was so unexpected. Donegal, complete outsiders in the championship race, and only ranked in the second division of the League appeared to be fighting a losing battle for a long time against this Tyrone side.

To be frank, with ten minutes to play, I wouldn't have given tuppence for Donegal's hopes of the first senior football title. At this stage Tyrone were leading by a point and playing like a team inspired. Controlling the game beautifully, they were playing fast, precision football and looked sure to become the new Ulster champions.

However, their inexperience was telling in their failure to notch the vital scores and, in the space of two minutes between the 51st and 53rd, their rosy world collapsed. First Joe Winston tapped over the equaliser and, then in the 53rd minute, Seamus Bonner gained possessions in mid-field. The towering mid-fielder carried the ball a few yards and sent in a high, speculative shot which advancing goal-keeper Kieran Harte seemed to have well in control. However, Harte misjudged the flight of the ball and it went straight to the net.

It was a real hammer blow to Tyrone. For the first time in the game Donegal began to move with fluency and Tyroneís hopes were wrecked. It was a cool end to their title bid but rest assured they will be back again soon.

Rather disappointing but after the interval there wasn't a dull moment. It probably won't go down as a great Ulster final but these two Cinderella sides of Ulster football served up a game that I thoroughly enjoyed.

The start saw both sides rather tentative with neither establishing their superiority. It was anyone's game but, then, Brendan Dolan punched a ball into the Donegal net, the odds seemed stacked in Tyrone's favour and, in the second half after Mick Sweeney had goaled for Donegal, Tyrone appeared to have weathered the storm when they led after twelve minutes.

The Tyrone side wasted opportunity after opportunity through indeasion up front and they were to pay the penalty. Donegal, on the other hand, took most of the chances that came their way and this in the end was the deciding factor.

In the final estimation the star of the Donegal side was probably mid-fielder

Seamus Bonner. Massively proportioned he really came into his own in the second half. But, I think that he would make a much better footballer if he concentrated more on the ball and less on establishing his own physique. With him, Frank McFeeley played a sound game throughout, if somewhat less spectacular than Bonner did.

The full back line of Donal Monaghan, Pauric McShea and John Boyce were well nigh impregnable. In Front of them was a trio of fine defenders with Brian McEniff probably claiming most of the glory through his second half display, that included two magnificent points from long range.

In 1973 the Kilcar senior team did not fare too well and in one game early in January when missing quite a few regulars they were beaten by St. Joseph's, who were then ivirtually a county teamî, by a score of 6-16 to 3-06.

Kilcar players on the county panel were Danny Gillespie, Aodh Cannon, Michael Carr, and Michael O'Donnell.

On the county U-21 panel was Michael Carr, Aodh Cannon and Denis McBrearty, and on the Minor panel was John Carr and Tommy McFadden.

The Killybegs Boatyard brought home the factories title on the 1st of October 1973, by defeating St. Conals Hospital by 1-10 to 1-04. This Boatyard team had a large Kilcar influence with Denis McBrearty, Seamus Shovlin, Hugh Shovlin, Martin Gillespie, Michael O'Donnell and Ignatius Cannon.

In the Under 21 Championship Semi Finals with Seamus Gillespie as manager, Donegal Town beat Castlefin and Kilcar beat Urris. These games were 13 a side, which was a surprise for all as they should have been on a 15 a side basis.

The "Derry People" (Dec 15th, 1973) reported:

"There are several players of promise on both teams, in fact so much so that one wonders why the clubs have figured so comparatively little in the lists of champions. Donegal have footballers of considerable talent but Kilcar have them also and with plenty of height and strength that must give them an advantage at this time of the year".

The following report on the final appeared in the "Derry People" on December 22nd1973:

KILCAR ARE U-21 CHAMPS AGAIN

Kilcar......1-05

Kilcar, the holders, retained their Donegal Under-21 Football Championship with a 2-05 to 1-05 win over Four Masters, Donegal Town in the county final in Glenties on Sunday. And it was all decided in a two-minute period - those vital minutes being the difference between the teams.

After the opening twenty minutes of the game, played in miserable wind and rainy conditions, the teams stood level with 0-01 each. But in that vital two-minute spell that followed, Kilcar added 2-01 to their total.

It was a body blow to the Donegal Town team who up to this had much more of the play and they had not permitted Kilcar to cross the half-way line until the 10th minute of the game.

But, in that one breakaway it was significant that Kilcar scored a point - the sum total of all the Four Masters pressure and control of the game.

In the opening twenty minutes Donegal had eight wides and two fifties and took

A SPIRITED RALLY

On the resumption Kilcar went into the attack and added two points without reply in the opening five minutes - both from Michael Carr. It looked bleak for the Four Masters team but they fought back with great spirit and had some grand outfield football but closer to goal they found the Kilcar defence hard to break or unsettle. Try they did and won their way to within three points of Kilcar but the holders hit back immediately with another Michael Carr point.

Four Masters goaled after 17 minutes of the second half and it was from a grand shot by Eugene Fox that was scrambled to the net.

PLAYERS OF PROMISE

Kilcar's two senior inter-county players, Danny Gillespie and Michael Carr seemed to have a steadying effect on their team-mates and that was vital in the conditions that were almost impossible. Four Masters had good men in full-back Paul Duncan, Pat OíDonnell from Gweedore at centre half-back and Brendan Martin who had a very good game. Focus on Eugene Fox who starred and looked a great future prospect.

A tribute must go to all the players for their performance in the very difficult conditions. What could they serve up in the summer or autumn, the time this Championship must be staged in the future?

A word of praise must also go to the referee, Christy Molloy, who handled the game very well.

At the conclusion of the hour Donegal County Chairman, Tom Walsh, Gortahork, congratulated the teams and their officials in handing over the trophy to Kilcar's captain Hugh Shovlin.

The Minor team reached the county semi-final stages of the championship.

A junior team was fielded in the Championship.

In a tournament for National Schools at Ballybofey a young Martin McHugh was voted player of the tournament and Kilcar N.S. won the old Sliabh League Trophy.

The final of this League was between Kilcar N.S. and Cashel N.S. with a final score of 2-03 to 0-03. Kilcar scorers were James McFadden 1-02, Christy Gillespie I-0, and Martin McHugh 0-1.

The Under-21 won a historic 3-in-a-row of County titles which has never since been achieved by any other club in the county.

Heavy rain and gale-force wind made good football impossible at Glenties on Saturday, but even with the wind behind them Kilcar were in arrears at half-time.

Surprisingly in the second half facing the wind, Kilcar shaped much better and M. Carr and Aodh Cannon at mid-field gave their forwards plenty of the ball.

Whenever McCumhaills did attack they found full-back Dinny McBrearty in great form. It was a disappointment for a McCumhaills team that had shown such delightful football in the earlier rounds but undoubtedly Kilcar have a very strong side.

Best for Kilcar were Dinny McBrearty, Michael Carr, Aodh Cannon, and Peter Conroy, while J. Kelly, Martin Griffin, Brendan Dunleavy and M. Houston best served McCumhaills.

Referee Thomas McBrearty deserved special credit for turning out for the fixture in such atrocious conditions.

Kilcar completed a hat trick of U-21 Donegal Championships when they defeated Glenties 2-09 to 0-04 at Fintra, Killybegs, on Sunday. Their Victory was mainly due to inter-county man Hugh Cannon and Michael Carr at mid-field. Their defence was also very solid and time and again snuffed out many Glenties' attacks.

Glenties were a better side than the score-line would suggest and at times their mid-fielders S. O'Donnell and N. Byrne ruled this sector, but much work was wasted before the firm Kilcar defence.

With a slight breeze in their favour in the first half, Kilcar scored first with a Michael Carr point. J. Bonner in the goal halted another effort with a great save. Then E. O'Donnell and S. McBrearty scored to put Kilcar three up. Glenties came more and more into the game, but good raids were broken up. And they were out of luck in conceding a somewhat easy goal when M. Carr's lob from far out came off the post and ended in the net.

P. Furey had Glenties first score, a point from play with A. Cannon replying with two to leave the half-time score at Kilcar I-05, Glenties 0-01.

The second half was a livelier affair with M. Carr again first to score a point. He added another from a close in free. Glenties then missed a short free before S. O'Donnell scored two points for them. But then P. Conroy slammed home a Kilcar goal in the 48th minute. A. Cannon and J. Furey exchanged points before full-time.

For Kilcar, A. Cannon and M. Carr were outstanding and got good support from D. McBrearty, J. Carr, A. O'Donnell, P. Conroy, S. McBrearty and E. O'Donnell.

For Glenties, S. O'Donnell and N. Byrne shaped well opposing the Kilcar stars and others to show well were Phelim and Pat Molloy, M. O'Donnell, P. Furey, C. Byrne and K. Keeney.

On the playing fields 1975 started on a bright note with the winning of the Donegal Gaeltacht final defeating Ardara 2-0 to 1-06 and Rosses Rovers 1-16 to 2-05 at Gaoth Dobhair.

In the All Ireland Gaeltacht tournament at Whit weekend Kilcar were narrowly beaten by the Kerry champions but then went on to win the losers' group hammering the Mayo side in the final and were voted the most exciting team of the competition.

Putting the game into perspective it was probably the most important game that they played in the seventies in that it heralded the coming of age of the U-21 three in a row.

Although they lost narrowly on that August day in Donegal Town, St. Josephís not only went on to win the county final very easily but won the Ulster club championship and played the Connaught and Leinster club champions and beat both.

In the league on the 6th of July Kilcar were in third place with 10 points from 7 games, having lost the first two games as the club was not organised, one to Four Masters at home and one to Glencolmcille away. By the 26th of July Kilcar were on top in the League with victories over Urris 4-09 to 2-03 and St. Eunanís 4-13 to 1-06.

In late August Kilcar defeated St. Eunan's again by 3-17 to 2-09 but there was a lot of controversy in Gaoth Dobhair on the 5th of September when the referee recorded the final score as I-07 to 0-09 and Gaoth Dobhair officials claimed it to be 1-06 to 0-09. Later the Donegal county Board voted in favour of Gaoth Dobhair but the Ulster Council rejected this and the matter ended with Kilcar getting the two points.

Kilcar had a great forward machine in this year with later games won over Urris 3-13 to 1-05 (on the journeys to Urris there were some great picnics around Buncrana), victory over McCumhaills 4-12 to 0-06 and Kilcar decided the League by defeating Gaoth Dobhair 2-13 to 1-01 at Fintra on the 1st of December.

The final will be remembered for the great goal scored by Donie Doherty ten minutes from time, which decided the game for Kilcar.

At the annual dinner dance on Friday, 2nd January 1976, over 200 Patrons turned out to pay tribute to the teams success in 1975. To mark the occasion Gaeltarra Eireann presented the team members with specially woven tweeds for blazers and ties in the club colours.

THE "DONEGAL DEMOCRAT" 30/01/1976 An Open Letter To Mr. Brian Mc Eniff And The County Selectors

It is with great reluctance that I put pen to paper, but in doing so I feel that I have the interests of all followers of the Gaelic code in Donegal at heart. Having just seen published the Donegal team selected to play Sligo, I was astonished to find that neither of the teams which finished first and second in Div. I of the League in Donegal i.e. Kilcar and Gweedore, have a single representative on the chosen fifteen, and Kilcar in particular whose progress in the past year I record below, have, a few short weeks after walking away with the first division championship in 1995, a grand total of one substitute selected on the team to play Sligo. Gweedore club has fared no better in representation.

It is therefore patently obvious that either League form does not influence the choice of you our Selectors or else petty parochialism and you-scratch-my-back- I'll-scratch-yours thinking is the sole criterion for making a judgement as to a players merit and right to a county place.

Let me recall to you the records of the clubs of the chosen fifteen vis-a-vis that of the represented.

In the senior championship, Kilcar were beaten by two points by a full strength St. Joseph's side in the semi- final and this St Joseph's side done Donegal proud by going on to win the Ulster title and hopefully the National title.

Neverless, gentlemen, however unknowledgeable I may be in football matters, I do not consider a two point margin deserving of a ratio of representation in the announced panel of seven to one (i.e. Four playing and three substitutes), and I am absolutely certain that many people more intimately corcerned with the game in this county will agree with me. To further emphasise the quality and consistency of the football played by this Kilcar team, may I point out last year's achievements were no flash in the pan. The record reads as follows.

1972	U-21 Championship
1973	U-21 Championship
1974	U-21 Championship
1975	Senior League Champs

These are but a few of the achievements which also include numerous tournaments, challenges and seven-a-side competition wins and most notably the winning of the Gael Linn Cup in Comortaisi na Gaeltachta held in Gweedore last year where Kilcar impressed even the most cynical with the sheer elegance and brilliance of their style.

In anticipating a reply to the effect that the Sligo game is (or was) a practice match for the St. Joseph's club in preparation for their semi-final match in the All Ireland

series, in which I wish them well, incidentally, may I suggest that the interests of Gaelic football in Donegal would be better served by blooding young players of clubs such as Kilcar and Gweedore, among others, rather than creating such a seminepotism as seems to be emerging disguised in Donegal colours, as something that can only hasten the decline of interest in the code already evident in many clubs. If league consistency and form is not even tokenly taken as guideline in selecting county teams, then the dream of winning Sam Maguire, already a vision blurred by years of failure will simply disappear completely.

Having said all that, I bear in mind the central message at Convention in the speeches of the outgoing chairman, France Cunningham, and the incoming chairman, Seamus Rogers, in calling for unity of purpose and effort in all GAA affairs and clubs. Would you gentlemen, consider the choice of such an unbalanced county team to be conducive to wide club support for such ideas.

The Fr. McClafferty Cup

Fr. Manus McClafferty was appointed curate in Kilcar in early '52. He set about to organise the club, as most of the Kilcar players were playing for the Killybegs club, and the minors playing for Carrick at that time.

He spent every Sunday training at Towney Park with a group of young players.

He was drowned while fishing off the rocks behind Towney, and his body was found at Tralore, Muckross on August 20th 1953. He is buried outside the church in his native Falcarragh.

The club decided to purchase this cup in his memory. For many years it was played for in a 13-a-side competition at Towney Park.

Brother Jerome O'Shea donated this cup to the club in 1968 for under-age football.

A true Gael, he was a native of Dingle, Co.Kerry, and came to Kilcar on holiday for several years. He had a special interest in juvenile players, and encouraged them in the skill of kicking with both feet.

He was a personal friend of the great Mick O'Connell, Kerry. He died while climbing "Carreuntoohil" in his native county.




Snippets 1970-1975

In 1970 the rules were changed to protect the goal-keeper - he could no longer be bundled to the net.

In the All-Ireland final of 1970 Kerry's Din Joe Crowley soloed through for 40 yards and beat Meath's goal-keeper Sean McCormack with a spectacular shot.

The "Ban", a rule that prevented players attending or playing foreign games, i.e. Soccer, hockey or cricket, was removed at the Belfast Congress in 1971.

The football final of 1971 between Offaly (1-14) and Galway(2-8) was the first football final to be televised in colour.

In 1972 Offaly beat Donegal by four points in the All-Ireland semi-final having trailed by 0-5 to 1-4 at half-time.

Offaly won the All-Ireland of 1972 in a replay; score Offaly 1-19, Kerry 0-13. Tony McTague scored 10 points in the replay.

Teenager Jimmy Barry Murphy scored two goals in Cork's wins over Galway in the All-Ireland final of 1973. Final score Cork 3-17, Galway 2-13.

Kevin Heffernan was appointed Dublin Manager in 1973.

In 1973 Tyrone won their first Ulster title in 17 years were hammered by Cork in the semi-final by 5-10 to 2-4.

In 1974 Neilly Gallagher's extraordinary point 10 seconds from the end earned Donegal a replay in the Ulster Final against Down (1-14 to 2-11).

Donegal won the replay 3-9 to 1-12, but was Gerald McElwee outside the square when he was fouled for a penalty? Was Joe Winston in the square when he passed to Kieran Keeney who scored a goal with one minute left?

In 1975 Mick O'Dwyer, a fitness fanatic became manager of the Kerry team.

In the dressing rooms before the 1975 All-Ireland final both Mick O'Dwyer and Kevin Heffernan were said to have made speeches that would have them convicted under the Race Relations Act. Kerry won by 1-14 to 0-07.

The average age of the winning Kerry team of 1975 was 22 years. This young team won eight All-Irelands in 12 years.



Paddy Cullen became the first goalkeeper to save a penalty in an All Ireland final when he tipped Liam Sammon's kick around the post. He also secured the first of three Dublin successes in a four-year period.

First British soldier killed in Belfast (6 Feb.).

Fighting between Provos and Officials in Belfast (10 Mar.). Chichester-Clark resigns as P.M. (20 Mar.) succeeded by Brian Faulkner (23 Mar.- till 24 Mar. 1972).

Sean Lemass, Taoiseach 1959-1966 dies (11 May).

Reintroduction of internment without trial (9 Aug.): 342 arrested.

Ulster Defence Association (U.D.A.), paramilitary organisations of working class Protestants, emerge in Belfast (Aug.).

Discovery-well in gas field off Old Head of Kinsale completed (7 Nov.).

Senator John Barnhill shot dead at his hotel near Strabane by Officials (12 Dec.).

1972

Treaty of accession to EEC signed in Brussels by R.I., U.K. and Denmark (22 Jan.)

'Bloody Sunday': 13 civilians shot dead by paratroopers in Derry, following banned civil rights march (30 Jan.), Lynch declares 2 Feb. day of national mourning (31 Jan.); British embassy in Dublin burned (2 Feb.).

Bomb explosion, work of Officials, at officers mess in Aldershot, killing six civilians (22 Feb.).

Attempt to assassinate John Taylor, N.I. minister of state at Armagh (25 Feb.).

Explosion at Abercorn Restaurant Belfast (4 Mar.).

Marcus McCausland shot dead near Derry by Officials (6 Mar.).

Faulkner's government resigns, having refused to accept transfer of responsibility for

security from Stormont to Westminster; N.I. Parliament and government suspended; direct rule introduced under William Whitelaw as secretary of state for N.I. (24 Mar N.I. parliament abolished, 18 July 1973.

R.I. sets up special criminal court, to consist of three judges without a jury under Offences against the State Act, 1939 (26 May).

Officials suspend operations in N.I. (29 May).

Truce between Provos and British army (26 June; continues till 9 July).

'Bloody Friday' in Belfast (21 July); 22 explosions by Provos, killing 19 and injuring 130. Whitelaw's green paper, "The future of Northern Ireland", published (30 Oct.).

Sean MacStiofain, Provo's chief of staff, arrested by R.I. police (19 Nov.), after giving an interview to R.T.E. reporter, Kevin O'Kelly; interview broadcast later that day.

R.T.E. Authority dismissed by government (24 Nov.) over broadcast of MacStiofain interview.

Two car bomb explosions in London, killing one and injuring I80 (8 Mar.).

Act providing for assembly of 78 in N.I., to be elected by proportional representation (3 May).

Erskine Hamilton Childers elected president of R.I. (30 May; continues till 17 Nov. 1974).

Elections in N.I. to new district councils, first to be held since 1967 (30 May); final results: official unionistis 210 loyalist coalition 81, S.D.L.P 82, Alliance 63, others 83 (local 519).

General election for N.I. assembly (28 June); final results: official unionists 23, Alliance 8, N.I.L.P. I. (Total pro-assembly unionists 32) unpledged unionists 10; loyalist coalition 15; other loyalists 2 (total dissident unionists 27); S.D.L.P. 19 (total membership 78) (See 1969, 1975).

N.I. Constitution Act (U.K.) (18 July).

First meeting of N.I. Assembly ends in disorder (31 July).

Heath and Cosgrave meet at Baldonnell Aerodrome, Co. Dublin (17 Sept.).

First inter-church meeting at Ballymascanlon, Co. Louth, attended by representatives of all main churches in Ireland (26 Sept.)

Six oil-producing countries on Persian Gulf increase price of crude oil from \$3 to \$8 per barrel (I 6 Oct.); to \$11.50 on 23 Dec.; world economic recession follows.

Official unionists, Alliance, and S.D.L.P. agree to form 'power-sharing' executive under Faulkner (22 Nov.).

United Ulster Unionist Council, combination of loyalist parties, formed to oppose

power-sharing (6 Dec.).

Whitelaw succeeded by Francis Pym as Secretary of State for N.I. (2 Dec.; continues till Mar. 1974).

Eamon de Valera dies, aged 92 (29 Aug.).

Dr Tiede Herrema kidnapped in Limerick (3 Oct.); released after 18 days siege of house in Monasterevan (7 Nov.).

Convention votes by 42 to 31 to present report of United Ulster Unionist Council (rejecting power sharing) as report of convention while appending minority report (7 Nov.).

Detention without trial in N.I. ends (5 Dec.).

Two light-hearted gasurs were happy at play,
They frisked through slat mara the long happy day.

Some spied their old friends, and as fondly they greet them; They grasped a slat mara and cheerfully beat them; And some that for years had been angry and spiteful, When we met at Slat Maras their vengeance was frightful; And some growing weary Retired from the action, Repined, but rejoined, with renewed satisfaction.

A colleen that watched admired a stocca
Attired in scealtog of green baleen broca;
A massive Slat Mara he flashingly wielded,
Before him a battalion had yielded.
Her father decreed she would marry Mickey Owen,
A man twice her age with his feasog full grown;
And she with the sweetness of sugar and bruteen
Just looked like a queen and she puffin' her dudeen.

The owl lad, 'twas bruited, twenty-five pound,
And owned twenty acres of Oscar filled ground.
This lad that she loved had no acres at all,
He was brave, he was clever, was witty and tall.
His pockets were filled with an absence of shekels,
His big smiling face had abundance of freckles,
This means that his jeans had no dollars or nickels,

When borne on the breeze came a thunder-like prancing




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
